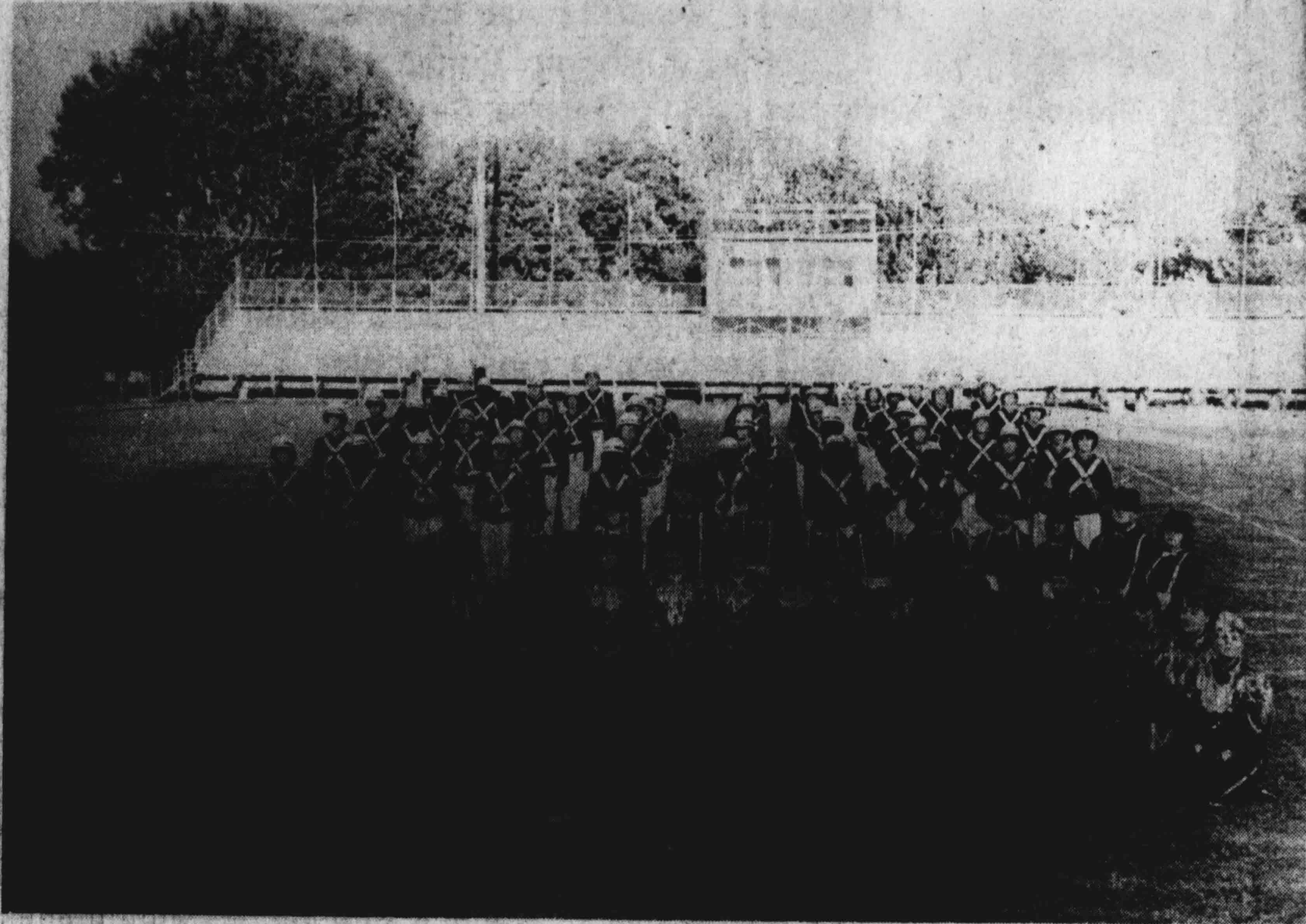

LAUDERDALE COUNTY and DYER COUNTY OFFICIALS and citizens gathered on Highway 51 north of the Highway 88 exit Sunday, October 25, to unveil the State Historic Marker, designating the former Dyersburg Army Air Base at Halls as an historic site. The drive for the approval of the \$1100 marker was initiated by Earl Willoughby and Tim Bivens of the Dyer County Historical Society. After the formation of the DAAB Memorial Association, securing the marker became one of its priorities. The Lauderdale County Executive, Dyer County Executive, Town of Halls, and interested citizens contributed to pay half the cost with the state paying the balance. Before the unveiling, those in attendance listened as DAAB President Pat Higdon said "While it is specifically a reminder of the civilians who worked here, the 7700 servicemen who trained here, and 114 fliers who died here, it is also a memorial to all training stations in the U.S. and the success of the troops they trained". After the remarks, the Dyer County Historical Society representatives and area veterans removed the cover. While most of those gathered were from Dyersburg, Halls, and Ripley, the group welcomed C. R. Avery from New Concord, Kentucky, who brought Henry Murchison with him for the ceremony. Mr. Avery, who had worked on the base, said he certainly didn't want to miss the unveiling. 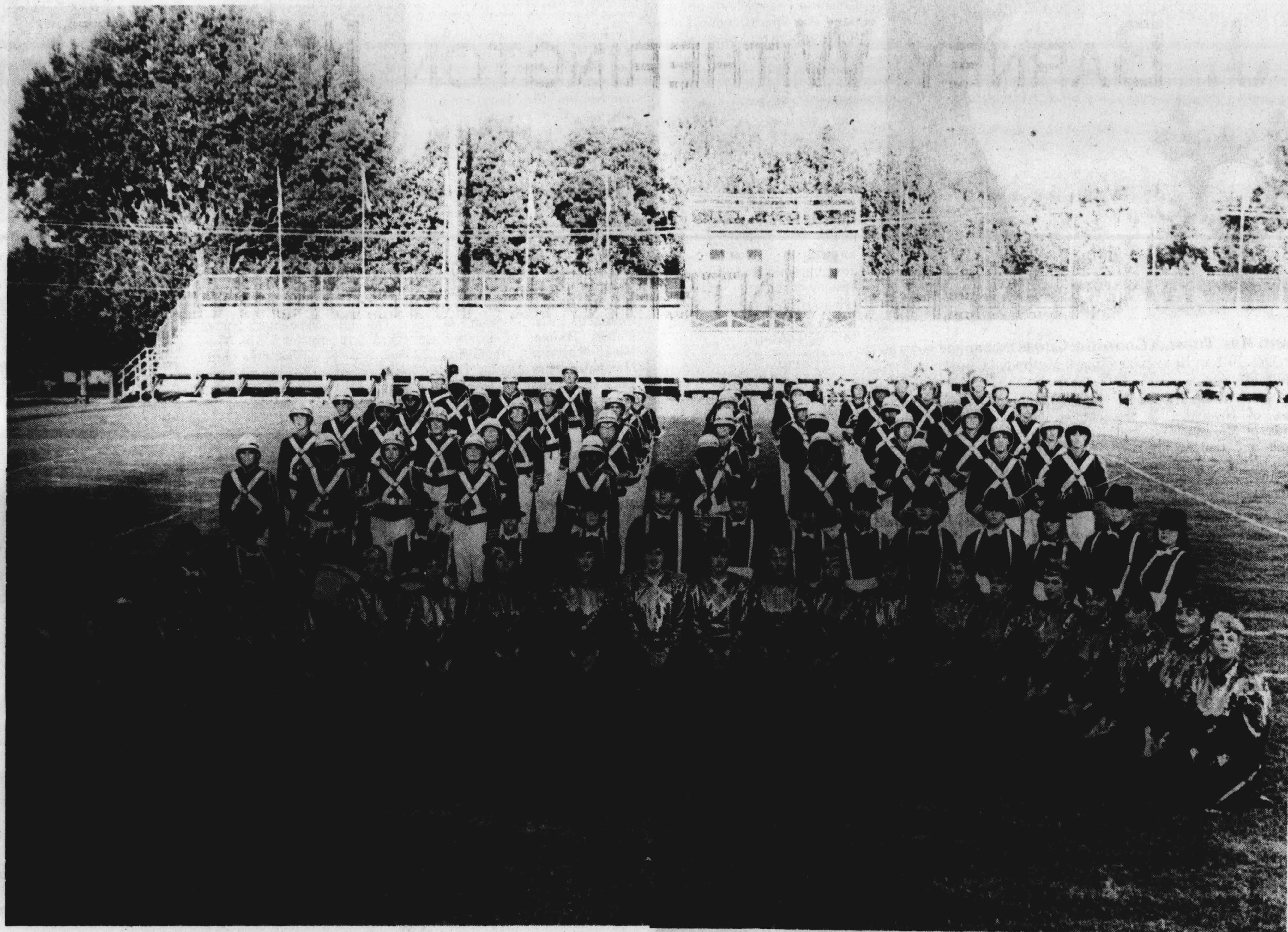

FmHA Invests 2.3 Million In County

Loans and grants approved by the Farmers Home Administration serving Lauderdale County totalled \$2,337,750 during fiscal year 1992, according to Harriet V. Smith, FmHA County Supervisor.

Farmers Home Administration currently has a portfolio of \$9.5 million outstanding. This portfolio consists of 376 loans and grants made to farmers, rural homeowners and community facilities and programs.

The current caseload consists of 311 Rural Housing borrowers and 58 Farmer Program borrowers.

During the 1992 Fiscal Year, thirteen county farmers borrowed \$776,250 for farm operating expenses and to purchase farm equipment.

An additional twelve farmers received Guaranteed farm oper-

ating loans, totalling \$1.05 million.

An additional investment of \$502,000 was made through Rural Housing loans. These loans provided thirteen families with an opportunity to become homeowners. Two elderly families received assistance to make needed repairs on their homes.

In addition, 26 Rural Housing borrowers made substantial progress and graduated to other sources of credit to pay their houses off early. These funds contributed over \$247,000.

Get yourself a little sunshine! Research at the University of Toronto suggests a correlation between bulimia and seasonal affective disorder (SAD). Rx: get up earlier and increase exposure to daylight, even bright indoor light if need be.

Study at the University of Pittsburgh showed even modest exercise can protect post-menopausal women against heart disease and osteoporosis.

Getting antibiotics up to two hours before surgery helped patients avoid infection in a test at LDS Hospital in Salt Lake City. It worked better than medication given earlier or after the operation.

It takes longer to heal broken bones in smokers than in nonsmokers, according to a study reported to the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons. Lower blood oxygen levels in smokers may be the reason.

Peppermint Chiffon Cake

- 2 1/4 cups Softasilk cake flour
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1/2 cup cold water
- 1/2 teaspoon peppermint extract
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 7 eggs (separated)
- 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 15 drops red food color
- Glaze (below)
- Crushed peppermint candy

Heat oven to 325°. Mix flour, sugar, baking powder and salt in large bowl. Beat in oil, water, peppermint extract, vanilla and egg yolks on low speed about 1 minute or until smooth. Beat egg whites and cream of tartar in large bowl until stiff peaks form. Gradually pour egg yolk mixture over beaten egg whites, folding with rubber spatula just until blended. Mix 1/3 of the batter and the food color. Pour batters alternately into ungreased tube pan, 10x4 inches, beginning and ending with plain batter. Gently swirl through batter with knife.

Bake 55 minutes. Increase oven temperature to 350°. Bake about 15 minutes or until top springs back when touched lightly. Invert pan onto glaze bottle or metal funnel; let hang until cake is completely cool. Remove from pan. Spread Glaze over cake, allowing some to drizzle down side. Sprinkle with candy.

Glaze: Mix 1 1/3 cups powdered sugar and 2 tablespoons milk until smooth.
