Jerry Crain Facing 4 Months In Prison

Former Lauderdale County Sheriff Jerry Crain, 51, who resigned in October after he pleaded guilty to a single count of violating the civil rights of Cynthia Nichols, 20, was sentenced Friday to four months in prison, two months in a "half-way house," and 200 hours of community service.

U.S. District Judge Julia Gibbons, in Memphis, denied Crain probation because she decided his striking and choking the woman, in his jail, Sept. 4th, was "unprovoked" and "motivated solely by Mr. Crain's own racial attitudes."

Nichols, white, said Lauder-

dale County deputies seized her, illegally, at her home in Union City and brought her to the jail in Ripley because she was suspected of harboring a former boy friend, Kenneth Culp, black.

Culp, a jail inmate, had walked off an outside work assignment about two weeks earlier.

Nichols was jailed in Ripley for 21 days before county charges

Ripley Board Studies Election By Districts

Ripley's Board of Mayor and Aldermen, urged by an African-American group to divide the city into districts, for the purpose of electing aldermen, appointed a committee to study the matter.

Aldermen voted 5-1 to authorize the mayor to name the committee. Tommy Dunavant voted "No." The mayor then named Billy Poston, Billie Ann Hendren, and Jon Pavletic to the committee.

Annual salaries were set at \$7,200 for the mayor and \$1,800 for each alderman.

The board voted unanimously to close College St. to through traffic, with the agreement of all neighbors.

The mayor presented a request from County Executive Gwinn Matthews for funding to promote an Interstate 69 proposed through the county, from Indiana to Mexico. No motion was offered. The board then unanimously adopted a motion endorsing the project but providing no funding.

It was noted that the city's sale of 1.78 acres in the North Industrial Park, formerly used for a cooperative vegetable packing plant, included an option to repurchase the property, if not used for a packing plant, at the sale price, \$3,760. The option expires April 4, 1993. The board voted unanimously to have the city attorney contact the Fullens and exercise the option, if applicable.

The mayor reported that owners of the Simmons-Walker property, objecting to an access road built from Rice Park to South Jefferson, are suing the city for damages. J. Thomas Caldwell represents the complainants. The mayor said the city understood proper permission had been obtained.

The mayor reported objections had been heard from industrial firms north of Ripley about drainage changes which would result from the widening of Old U.S. Hwy. 51 north from Oak St. to the North Industrial Park. He said the objections are not to the widening, only to changes in drainage. He said the state had agreed to meet with a group from this county, in Nashville, at a date not yet set. He invited any participa-

Another drainage problem was reported with plans for a speculative industrial building west of Marvin Windows. Part of the site is in a flood zone. Also, Marvin has noted the site might figure in future expansion of its plant.

The board unanimously approved the mayor's appointment of Lee Griffin to a 5-year term on the Zoning Board of Appeals.



Baked Fish With Chilean Grapes

4 fresh or frozen white fish steaks (1 1/4 pounds) Pepper 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1 clove fresh garlic, minced

2 teaspoons olive oil or vegetable oil 1/2 teaspoon dried oregano, finely crushed 1/2 teaspoon dried mint, finely crushed 1/4 teaspoon chili powder 1/4 cup chopped green or red pepper 1/3 cup thinly sliced onion

1/2 cup sliced or chopped pared cucumber 1 tablespoon finely chopped parsley 3/4 cup halved fresh Chilean seedless green or red grapes

Arrange fish in a shallow baking pan. Sprinkle with pepper and lemon juice. Place tomato slice on each fish steak. Cover and bake at 375 degrees for 10 minutes. Saute garlic in oil with herbs and chili powder over medium heat, 2 to 3 minutes. Add green pepper, onion and cucumber. Spoon over fish and bake uncovered 10 minutes longer. Add parsley and grapes and continue baking 5 to 10 minutes, until fish flakes with a fork. Makes 4

A new breath analyzer isn't designed to spot drunk drivers. Instead, it measures breath components that signal certain liver and kidney diseases. Readouts are almost instantaneous from the device now being developed at Bat-telle Memorial Institute in Columbus, Ohio.

Eating yogurt fights more than just vaginal yeast infections. Scientists at the University of California/Davis found that eaters of yogurt containing live cultures produced four times as much gamma interferon as those who ate heat-

treated yogurt or none at all. Pediatricians in Maywood, Illinois, have found an alternative to X-ray to check youngsters who have swallowed coins: they use a metal detector. If the swallowed coin has reached the stomach, the child can usually pass it safely and
