He was treated at Baptist Hospital Lauderdale and dismissed.

Douglas said four or five young men emerged from woods behind his home and opened fire.

Police say at least two shotgun blasts and 21 9-mm. rounds were fired into the Douglas home and two homes across the street.





Tanner Denounces FmHA's End Here

U.S. Rep. John Tanner on Fri-day urged caution relative to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's plan to consolidate its operations clearing the way to close more than 1,200 field offices.

"I find it ironic that this is being done by an administration only 12 days before it expires," Tanner said. "I don't want to be too cynical about this, but if it is such a grand idea then why didn't they move forward with if before the election.'

The Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service, the Soil Conservation Service, and the Farmers Home Administration each have field offices currently operating in Lauderdale County. Under the USDA's plan, however, Lauderdale County would only lose its FmHA office. Lauderdale County's FmHA field office would be closed and moved into regional offices in Dyersburg.

In a letter sent to Agriculture Secretary Edward Madigan on Friday, Tanner called on the administration to delay implementation of the plan long enough for the incoming administration to review the plan.

Tanner also suggested in the letter that it might be appropriate for the House Agriculture Committee to review the pro-





"I see some smiles about that," Caldwell said, "but unless you get a bond issue started for a new jail and justice complex, by the end of the year, you may have a federal judge telling you what you have to do."

Commissioner Rob Reviere said a meeting is set for Jan. 29th to consider proposals to replace the present jail.

New Vegetable Varieties Cited

By Jerry Parker County Extension Leader

Lauderdale County vegetable growers have been briefed on new varieties to consider:

Dr. Alvin Rutledge, Extension regetable specialist, said that processing bush snap-bean varieties being added to the recomnended list for 1993-94 are Hialeah, a new release that has performed very well in trials at Crossville: Strike, a consistently high producer with an attractive processor pack; and Peak, a good-yielding variety with an attractive pod.

Opus is a new release that has oderate resistance to rust, major disease problem during the hot, humid days of late ummer.

Pole-bean varieties now being added to the recommended list for commercial growers include Dade, a flat-podded, white-seeded variety that has good consumer appeal; Kentucky Blue the most recent pole-bean release, a stringless variety that's a cross between Kentucky Wonder and Blue Lake Pole; an Blue Lake Pole, noted for its reezing qualities, but, has a ten dency to drop flowers during hot

ReBell bell pepper is a new lease that's shown good tolerance to bacterial spot. It's slightly elongated, medium thick-walled pepper that has produced equal to or better than olo Wonder

Arcadia broccoli is being commended for trail in the processor market. It has a good bac terial resistance, uniform florets, tight heads and may be slightly earlier than Shogun.

Before trying on the fresh market, plant a large enough quantity to see if the stem size will be acceptable in the market.

Green Cup cabbage is a recent lease that has a firm, mediumo-large, blue green head. It's sidered a mid-season variety that doesn't have a high level of sistance to black rot.

School Board Sets **Rules Of Morality**

The county Board of Educa-tion, meeting Thursday of last week, adopted this statement on "teaching morality":

It appears that most of oblems in our society today are the direct result of a decline moral education. In recent years we have done an extremely poor job of teaching our children to live respectably. We must all get back to the task of teaching morality and expecting each individ ual to accept responsibility for their own actions. Individual responsibility for moral behavior is the cornerstone of a good and safe society.

Data related to violence, su cide, drug use, and illegal behavior clearly indicate basic ethical principles are not being learned by our young people. For many, there appears to be no coherent set of values which are deeply and firmly implanted into their character. Nor are there suffi cient models for them from which to learn appropriate moral

The Lauderdale County School System believes that the school has an obligation to impart common moral values into the lives of its students and has established a criteria for moral behav ior in the following statements: . Each individual has dig-

nity and worth. 2. A free society requires appropriate respect for persons,

property, and principles 3. Each individual has a right to learn and the freedom t achieve.

4. Each individual, regardless of race, creed, color, sex, ethnic background, or economic status, has equal opportunity.

5. Each individual is responsible for his/her own actions. 6. Each individual has

responsibility to the group, as well as to the total society. 7. Democratic societies are based on law.

8. Problems are solved through reason and orderly pro-

9. An individual should be tolerant of other religious beliefs and should have freedom to exercise his/her own.

10. Each individual has the right to work, to pursue an occupation, and to gain satisfactions from personal efforts.

Good Citizenship is under standing and appreciating these ethical principles. Character development is not an easy task.

This does not, however, relieve the school's obligation to support and necessary, correct moral training. Our schools must take greater interest in citizensh education. By building individ ual character, we can creat schools of character. It is time for all of us to carry the shield for moral education.

Virginia Satir once stated: In a society where there is so much be done, nothing is really of any consequence, unless first we learn the behaviors that raise men and women above the arena reserved for animals. That can e achieved if we but feel the bligation to do so.
