County Commissioners Monday added 35¢ to the real estate tax rate to build a new jail, north of the intersection of New U.S. Hwy. 51 and State Hwy. 19 By-Pass, south of Ripley.

The 29-acre site's north line is Keller Lane. The site straddles Hwy. 19 By-Pass, with about seven acres south of 19. The south line of those acres is the north line of Lauderdale Middle School's property

The tract is owned by James R. Fitzhugh, of Ripley. He and the late C. S. Carney bought it from the estate of Doug Fowlkes, in 1964. Although he has offered it for sale for school purposes, he expects the county to acquire it, for a jail, by condemnation.

Condemnation means that the county can take immediate possession of any real estate in the county (except generally, property owned by an incorporated city), for payment into Circuit Court available to the owner within 30 days, of an amount as determined by a professional ap-

Issues raised in the letters from concerned citizens included: the potential for water contamination, dust problems, insects or rodents. The most frequent concern noted was the history of violations at Mr. Hutcherson's Industrial Landfill operation.

The proposed facility would be located west of Halls, Tennessee on the property of Hutcherson Scrap Company, Inc on Old Highway 51 North between Nankipoo and Double Bridges in Lauderdale County. The official that would be responsible for operation is Mr. Wiley Hutcherson, c/o Hutcherson Scrap Company, Inc., Old Highway 51 North, Halls, Tennessee 38040; telephone (901) 836-9435.

The proposed facility would accept municipal, industrial, commercial, demolition and yard waste. No hazardous wastes, as regulated by the Tennessee Hazardous Waste Management Act (Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 68-46-101, et seq.) and the Rules adopted pursuant to the Act, shall be accepted for disposal at this facility.







For Miles Around

By Murray Miles Tennessee Farm Bureau **NO-TILL HEAD SAYS** FOOD NEVER SAFER

John Bradley is the superintendent of the University of Tennessee Experiment Station at Milan. Each year some 7,000 persons gather at the station to see the results of farming without a plow, known as no-till farming. He has done wonders there, and the methods developed and shown at Milan have helped convince farmers all across the state (and other parts of the nation) to shift to no-till.

Experiments at the station have shown farmers that they can preserve soil, cut water and soil runoff, raise crops with less expense, and increase yields using the no-till method.

If you farm this way, you have to use herbicides. They are needed to kill the vegetation where you are going to plant. So, if anyone knows about the use of farm chemicals, it's John Bradley.

He spoke to the Milan Rotary Club just prior to the July 22 annual No-Till Field Day. What he said to them about food and chemicals and reported in the Milan Mirror-Exchange needs to be shared with more consumers than just that club.

"Today's farming practices have never been more environmentally sound or productive", he told the Rotarians. "In fact the U.S. has the safest, low-risk food in the world."

He also passed along this data from researchers:

*A 40 pound child would have to eat 340 oranges every day for the rest of his life and still not consume the amount of pesticide residues found to cause health problems in laboratory mice.

*A 150 pound adult could eat 875 pounds of broccoli everyday and still not consume the amount of pesticide residues found to cause health problems in mice. A 20 pound child could eat 873 apples a day and still not consume that amount.

Bradley told the Milan Rotarians that "according to the American Cancer Institute, there is no scientific evidence that ingestion of pesticide residues on fruits and humans."

But this is not the perception that some have about these production enhancing tools. He cited a recent survey that asked persons to rank a

list of 30 sources of death. "The League of Women Voters ranked pesticides ninth", he reported. "College students ranked them fourth behind nuclear power, handguns and smoking. Business and Professional Club members ranked pesticides 15th."

Bradley showed the actuarial table of the 30 leading causes of death and pesticides ranked 27th behind vaccinations, food coloring and food preservatives.

"Mortality due to pesticides is not the problem that most folks perceive it to be", he said. "In fact no one has ever died because of residual pesticide.

"The poison is the dosage. The supply.

problem is in the perception. However the facts are the American public eats better, fresher, cheaper and lives longer because of our vegetables causes cancer in outstanding crop protection chemistry".


And how would Americans fare if there were no pesticides? Bradley had this to say:

"Food safety would deteriorate. Natural toxins produced in food....some of which have been shown to cause cancer...would increase in certain foods. American's health would suffer. Because of lower nutritional quality and reduced food supplies, the risks of certain types of cancer and heart disease would increase. The poor would get poorer. Food prices would rise about 45 percent. People with low incomes would need to spend almost \$1,000 more on food each year."

So before you get so concerned about pesticides, talk to folks like John Bradley who work with them all the time and know what they do to help provide our abundant food


