Halls Man Jailed (But Wrong Man)

Anthony Tyrone Patrick, 24, of Halls, employed by Anderson-Hickey, spent a day in the Dyer County Jail and is short about \$600 because authorities failed to check his identity, beyond his name, the Dyersburg State-Gazette reports.

When Lauderdale County officers found his vehicle abandoned May 10th and checked his license plates, a Dyer County radio dispatcher said he was wanted in Dyer County on a February, 1991, indictment for aggravated burglary, the State-Gazette says. Patrick was delivered to the Dyer County Jail.

His physical description, driver's license, and Social Security card (all available to officers in both counties) didn't match that of the man wanted, but he spent a night in jail, paid \$125 to a bondsman, to put up a \$1,000 bond, employed an attorney, for \$300, and lost pay at Anderson-Hickey.

The Department of Health and Human Services has awarded a grant in the amount of \$3,478,911 to the Northwest Tennessee Economic Development Council, U.S. Sen. Jim Sasser's office announces. The funds will be used for Head Start programs throughout a 13 county region in Northwest Tennessee. Counties included in the program are Benton, Carroll, Crockett, Dyer, Fayette, Gibson, Henry, Lake, Lauderdale, Madison, Obion, Tipton, and Weakley. "Head Start programs are some of the best investments the federal government can make," Sasser says. "They give children the opportunity for a real future."

Determination Act (PSDA), now requires all health care facilities that receive Medicaid or Medicare funding (about 95 percent of all facilities) to advise patients being admitted that they have the right to fill out an advance directive.

All 50 states and the District of Columbia have laws recognizing some form of advance directive—either a living will or a durable power of attorney for health care ("health care proxy"). 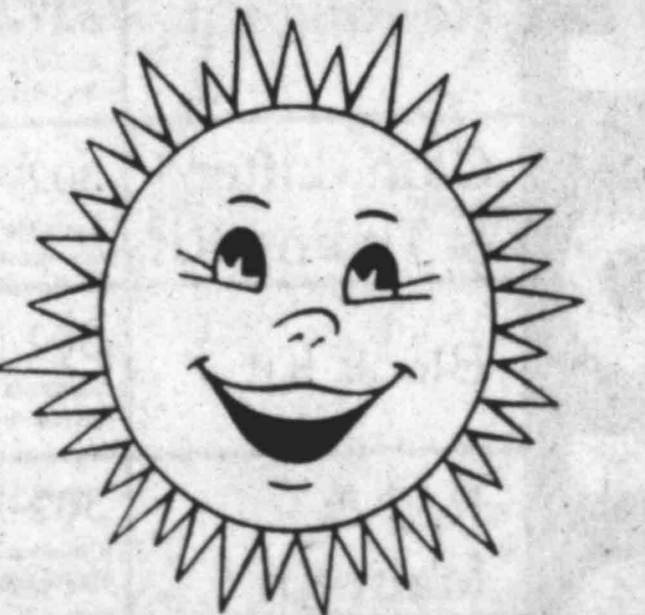

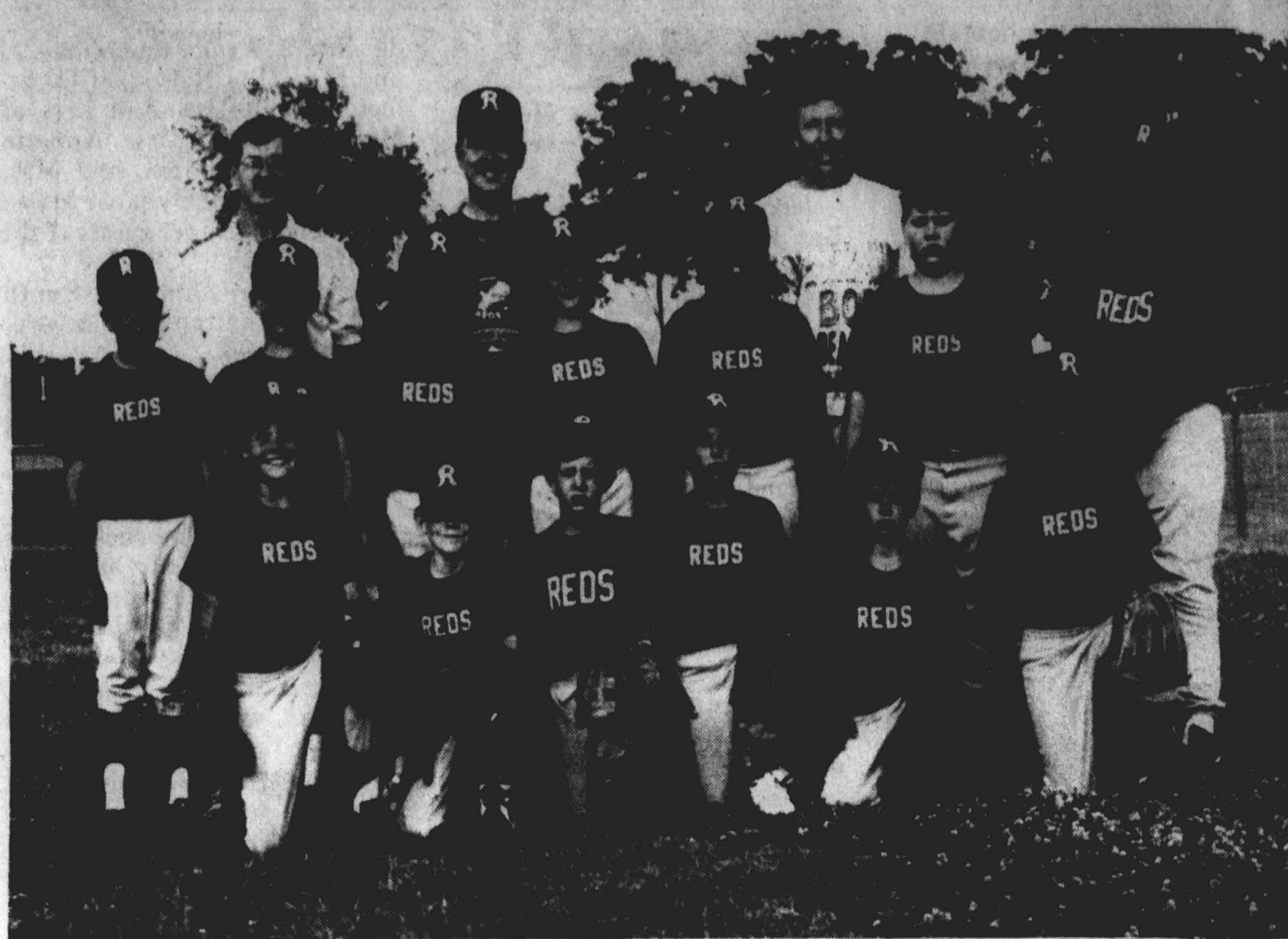

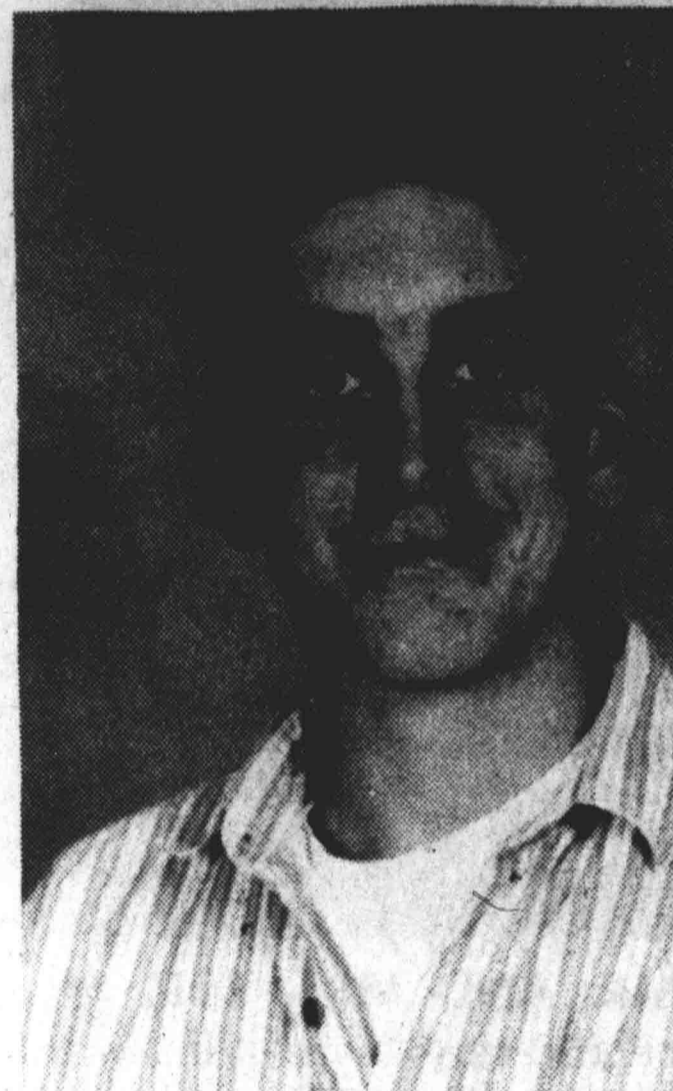

Storm Claims New Grad, Groom, Pastor Prospect

Costa Antonio Aethranis, 40, of 209 Lowell, Charlestown, Ind., son of Christine (Mrs. John L.) Todd, of Ripley, who retired this year as Spanish teacher in Ripley High School, was killed Wednesday of last week when storm winds collapsed a house he was helping to build.

The house was one of six under construction in Stone Bridge Sub-Division, a 41-home project which has 23 homes completed.

Aethranis, a carpenter, had been on this job for less than a week.

Authorities said he and two other workers were collecting their tools, as a storm approached, about 2:40 p.m., when the house creaked and popped.

Clark County Building Inspector David Cole said the wind lifted the house and "dropped it straight down." He found no defects in construction.

Warren McClanahan, 46, of Greenville, Ind., ran for the front of the house but was pinned when the second floor fell on him. He suffered severe leg injuries. He was taken to the Medical Center of Southern Indiana, where he was reported in stable condition.

Richard Lewis, 26, dove through a window and escaped injury.

Aethranis, running for the other side of the house, was trapped between floors. Charlestown firemen had to cut through sections of the second floor to remove his body.

"Tony" was born in Knoxville, son of a Greek immigrant. He had used his skill as a carpenter to help pay his way through the University of Tennessee, from which he took a master's degree

in toxicology. On May 21st, he took a master of divinity degree from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville.

June 12th, he married Sueveda Kingminghae, a native of Thailand, whom he met in a singles Sunday School class at Walnut St. Baptist Church in Louisville.

They had planned to do mission work in Russia this fall.

On their return, Aethranis planned to engage in biological research while pastoring a small congregation which could not afford to pay a pastor, relatives said.

The proposed facility would be located west of Halls, Tennessee on the property of Hutcherson Scrap Company, Inc. on Old Highway 51 North between Nankipoo and Double Bridges in Lauderdale County. The official that would be responsible for operation is Mr. Wiley Hutcherson, c/o Hutcherson Scrap Company, Inc., Old Highway 51 North, Halls, Tennessee 38040; telephone (901) 836-9435.

The proposed facility would accept municipal, industrial, commercial, demolition and yard waste. 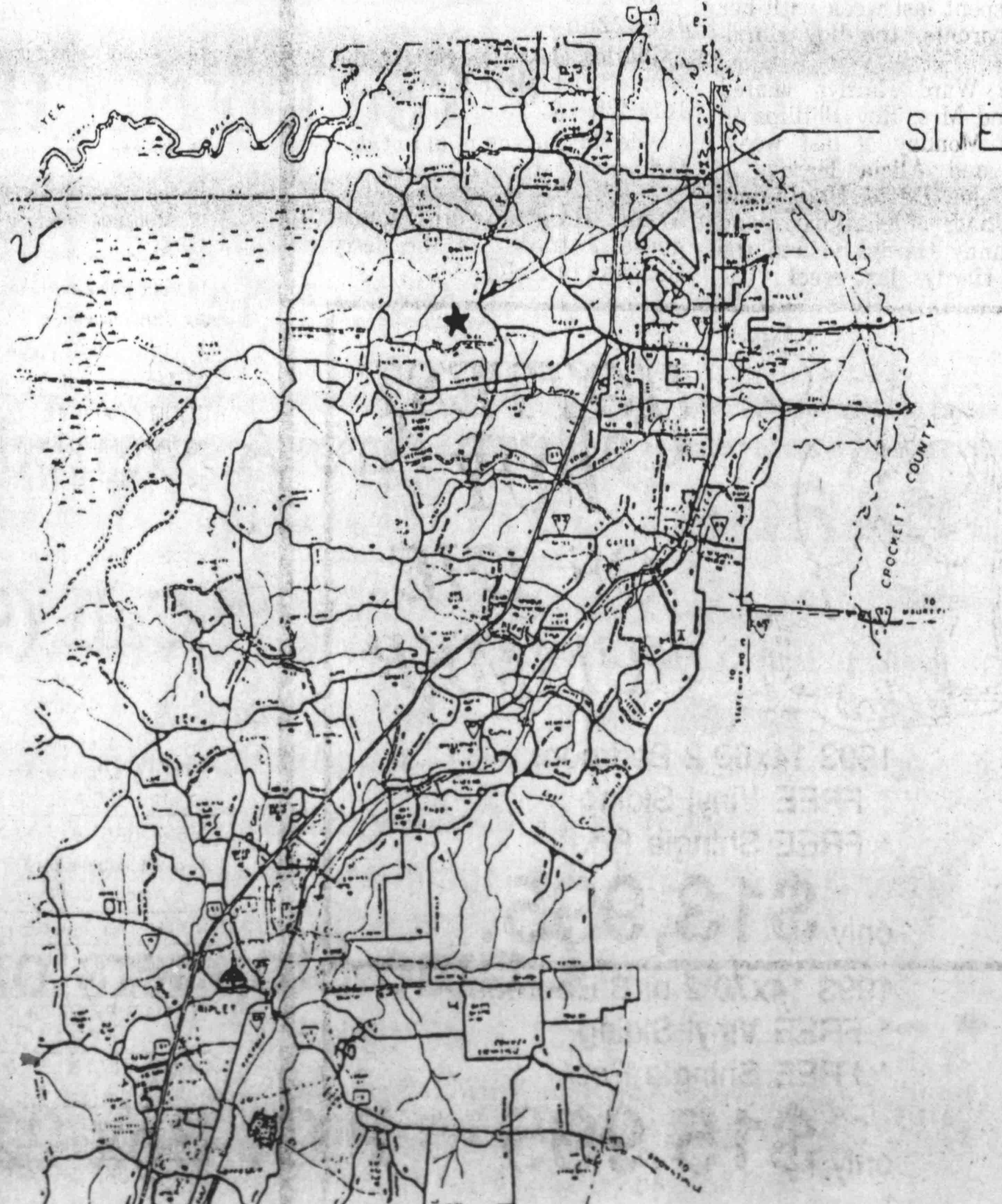

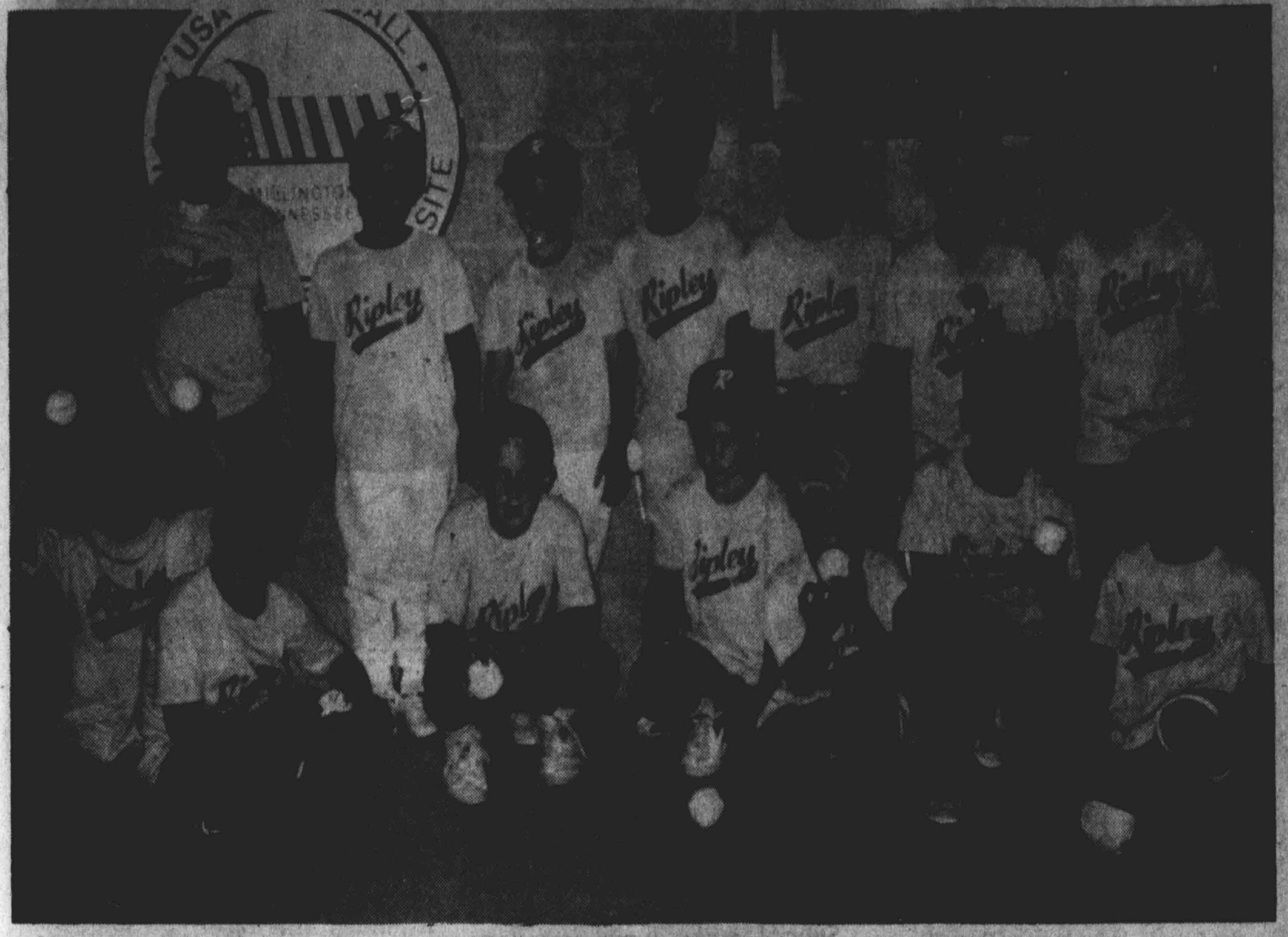

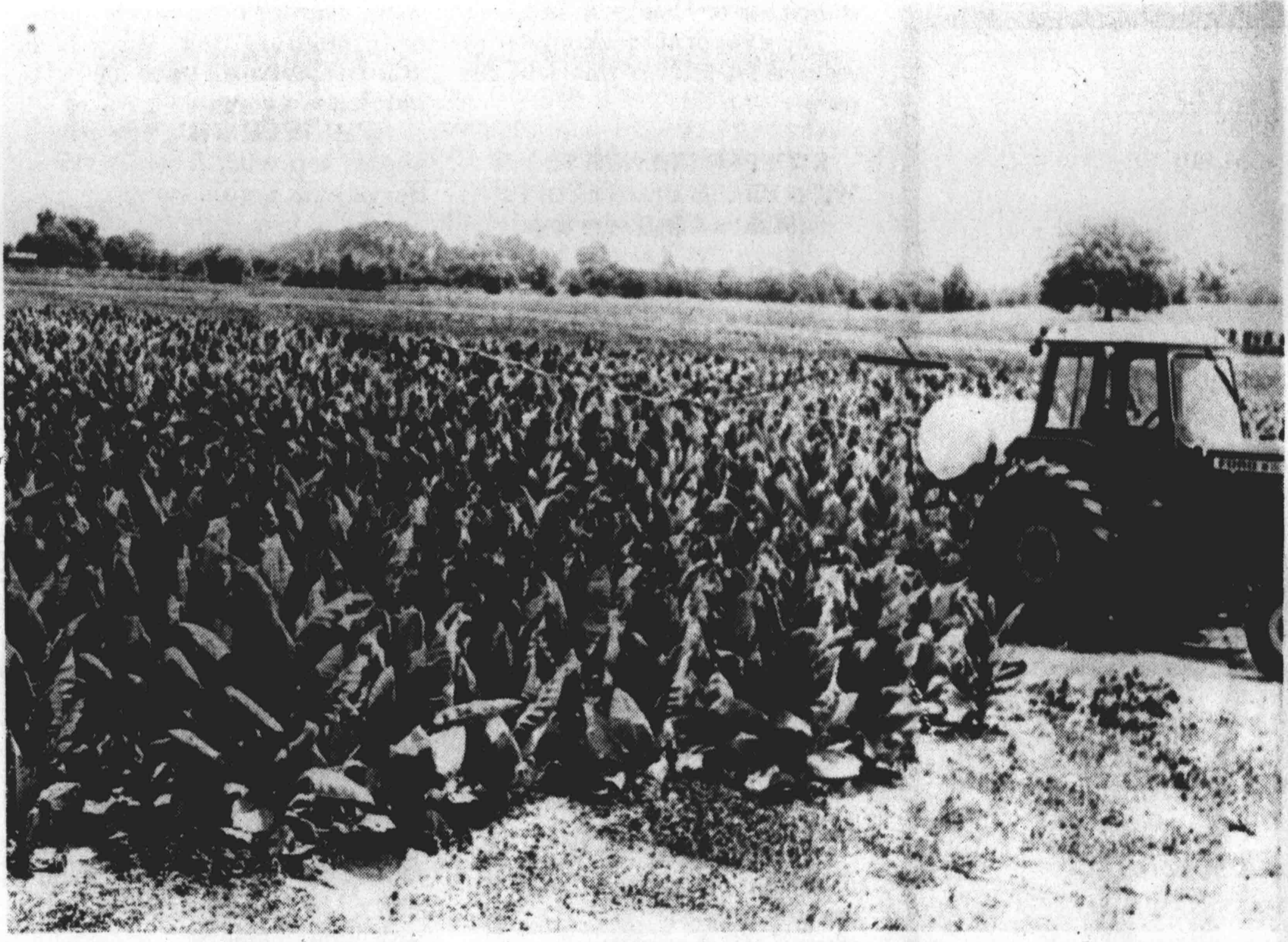

For Miles Around

NO-TILL HEAD SAYS FOOD NEVER SAFER

John Bradley is the superintendent of the University of Tennessee Experiment Station at Milan. Each year some 7,000 persons gather at the station to see the results of farming without a plow, known as no-till farming. He has done wonders there, and the methods developed and shown at Milan have helped convince farmers all across the state (and other parts of the nation) to shift to no-till.

Experiments at the station have shown farmers that they can preserve soil, cut water and soil runoff, raise crops with less expense, and increase yields using the no-till method.

If you farm this way, you have to use herbicides. They are needed to kill the vegetation where you are going to plant. So, if anyone knows about the use of farm chemicals, it's John Bradley.

He spoke to the Milan Rotary Club just prior to the July 22 annual No-Till Field Day. What he said to them about food and chemicals and reported in the Milan Mirror-Exchange needs to be shared with more consumers than just that club.

"Today's farming practices have never been more environmentally sound or productive", he told the Rotarians. "In fact the U.S. has the safest, low-risk food in the world."

He also passed along this data from researchers:

*A 40 pound child would have to eat 340 oranges every day for the rest of his life and still not consume the amount of pesticide residues found to cause health problems in laboratory mice.

*A 150 pound adult could eat 875 pounds of broccoli everyday and still not consume the amount of pesticide residues found to cause health problems in mice. A 20 pound child

could eat 873 apples a day and still not consume that amount.

Bradley told the Milan Rotarians that "according to the American Cancer Institute, there is no scientific evidence that ingestion of pesticide residues on fruits and vegetables causes cancer in humans."

But this is not the perception that some have about these production enhancing tools. He cited a recent survey that asked persons to rank a list of 30 sources of death.

"The League of Women Voters ranked pesticides ninth", he reported. "College students ranked them fourth behind nuclear power, handguns and smoking. Business and Professional Club members ranked pesticides 15th."

Bradley showed the actuarial table of the 30 leading causes of death and pesticides ranked 27th behind vaccinations, food coloring and food preservatives.

"Mortality due to pesticides is not the problem that most folks perceive it to be", he said. "In fact no one has ever died because of residual pesticide."

"The poison is the dosage. The

problem is in the perception. However the facts are the American public eats better, fresher, cheaper and lives longer because of our outstanding crop protection chemistry."

And how would Americans fare if there were no pesticides? Bradley had this to say:

"Food safety would deteriorate. Natural toxins produced in food...some of which have been shown to cause cancer...would increase in certain foods. American's health would suffer. Because of lower nutritional quality and reduced food supplies, the risks of certain types of cancer and heart disease would increase. The poor would get poorer. Food prices would rise about 45 percent. People with low incomes would need to spend almost \$1,000 more on food each year."

So before you get so concerned about pesticides, talk to folks like John Bradley who work with them all the time and know what they do to help provide our abundant food supply.
