

#### TURNER CENTER

The Exchange Club/Tina Turner Child Abuse Prevention Center is now available to Lauderdale County. The Center is located in the old Lauderdale County Hospital on Tucker Street. The phone number is 635-

The center is set up to serve families with children under the age of 12 who are abused or at risk of being abused. All of the services are provided at no cost to clients. Several programs will, be offered to the families of Lauderdale County. The first

#### program is the one that makes the Exchange Club's Child Abuse Prevention Program unique and successful. It is the Volunteer Parent Aid Program. Volunteers from within the community make up this program. Each volunteer is trained to work with an at risk family. The training can be done in one day,

and can be done at the Ripley center. The volunteer becomes an important part of the at risk family. Another program of the center is the Parent Education Class. Group parenting classes will be taught each week at the center.

These classes will stress child development, child management, child protection, basic first aid, and nonabusive disciplinary techniques. These skills are emphasized in order to break the

cycle of child abuse and neglect that occurs within the home. Not only will these classes be for families with a history of abuse, but they will be offered to those parents who are interested in becoming better parents. The classes will last 6 to 8 weeks.

These are just two of the programs that will be offered through the Exchange Club-/Tina Turner Center. #### Conner, Gates, Henning **Awarded Federal Grants**

State Rep. Floyd Crain, of Ripley, reports these state allocations of Community Development Block Grants, from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development:

- \$352,625 to re-work 65,000 feet of under-sized water lines in the Conner community, east of Ripley. The project will require \$34,875 in local funding.
- \$152,100 to buy a fire truck and equipment for Gates. Local funding requirement is \$16,900.
- \$121,863 to add 20 homes in Henning to sewer lines. Local funding requirement is \$10,597.





#### PLEASE DON'T WAIT UNTIL THE DAY YOU MOVE IN!

After you have received your 911 house address, you must realize how important it is for you to place those numbers somewhere on your house or in your yard in such a manner that they can be seen at any time during the day or night. It does the emergency response personnel NO GOOD if they are delayed in finding your house, and you must realize it does YOU NO GOOD if you can't be found!

### Waiting For A Bone Marrow Transplant

It's been a long, long road for young Chuck Gremard. A road filled with doctors, hospitals, needles, medicine, and all the other things that go along with illness and the medical profession that treats that illness. It has been his way of life

Chuck, 25, his wife, Patty, and their two girls, Jessica, 3, and Brandy, 6, make their home with Patty's mother, Barbara Yarbrough Blakely, in the Curve Community near

After graduating from Ripley High School in 1986, Chuck began the next phase of his life, never suspecting that in a few short months that life would forever be changed. He married, and he and Patty had their first child. As with most young couples, life was tough, but a daily challenge that only the young and healthy can conquer. Then Chuck began to have symptoms that wouldn't go away.

In September 1987, Chuck entered Baptist Hospital Central in Memphis, not even suspecting that he would not come out again for 16 months. In December of that year he was diagnosed with A-Plastic-Anemia, and treated with chemo therapy eight hours a day for eight days - that was the first round, and it did not work. Then came the second round. It

It worked after Chuck, who couldn't leave his room for one year, had 73 blood transfusions, severe drug reactions, extrememly high fevers (for which he was packed in ice many times), and all the other side effects that come with most chemotherapy treatments.

Chuck, who loves the outdoors, including fishing, hunting and just walking in the woods, found this confinement and not being able to see his child, the hardest part of the nightmarish months spent in confinement

Finally, in early 1989, Chuck went into complete remission from the illness that had struck so swiftly and so harshly. He and Patty, who had rarely left his side during those long months, came home to their friends, family and their fast-growing little girl.

I wish I could give you the happy ending now, in this story, but that will come later for Chuck and Patty, because in April of this year, the illness struck again, in another form. This time it is diagnosed as PNH, a very short version of a very long medical term for an illness that does not allow

Chuck is on a very discriminating list for a bone marrow transplant, and left Monday for Vanderbilt Clinic in Nashville to go through evaluation, consultation, procedures and blood tests, to prepare him for the possibility of this transplant becoming a reality. There are at the present time, six potential donors who have passed three of the five tests necessary to qualify them as donors for Chuck. This comes after all family members, including a brother, sister, mother, and father, have all tried and failed to be their loved ones donor, His mother, Mrs. Linda Miller, who works at Blue and White Cafe in Ripley; his father, Jim Gremard, of St. Louis; tried, but did not match up with Chuck in all five of the tests needed to qualify them to be a donor.

Chuck had been advised that the illness could come back, but four years, another beautiful little girl, and life, all went by for the family, giving them a false sense of security. Patty attends Dyersburg State, maintaining a 3.75 average in the nursing program, and Chuck worked for Marvin Windows (he is now on medical leave)

Although they don't know where or when the transplant will take place, each day is spent in preparation for this opportunity of a full and rewarding life. Without the transplant there is no hope...with it there is a 50-50 chance for that new life. Chuck, and all who love him, believe that this is worth the chance he will have to take.

He received two blood transfusions last week when the old symptoms went out of control...tiring easily, shortness of breath, sleeplessnes, and overall a feel bad feeling. Doctors in Memphis are trying not to give any more transfusions until the transplant can be done, but there are times when they just can't postpone it, and Chuck can't hold out that long. This is the reason the transplant has become crucial

Through the years there have been so many people who have come forth to help Chuck and his family, and those same people are still standing by for them. Plus more! There have been yard sales, bake sales, gospel singings, fish suppers, road blocks, and many more fund-raising events. So much support has come from local churches, like Grace Bible Church, Mary's Chapel Baptist Church, Ashport Baptist Church, and from local bands, organizations, and friends like Regina and Bob Taylor. Bob is a lab technician at Baptist Hospital Lauderdale, and has been a big help to the Gremard family in understanding this illness.

There is some help through insurance, but testing and all expenses for donors from the National Bone Marrow program are paid for by the recipient, and the testing alone costs \$500 per possible donor. This, plus all expenses for Chuck and Patty to travel to the clinic, room expense, meals and other necessities, are Chuck's responsibility.

When the transplant is begun, Chuck will have 14 straight days of radiation to kill all the cells in his body. both placing him in a very vulnerable position in regard to germs and viruses, and preparing his body to receive the donated bone marrow through his veins. And then comes the waiting. Waiting to see if the transplant has been successful.

Is there some way you can help this young man? Yes! There is a way. There has been a Chuck Gremard Transplant Fund set up at the Bank of Ripley, with Mrs. Taylor acting as the treasurer of this fund. There are more fund raising events coming up in the future and there is prayer. community praying together for a person can accomplish amazing results. The power of prayer, and the power of everyone pitching in to give of themselves to a fellow human being is incentive enough for any individual...but adding to that incentive is the feeling you will receive for having contributed just a small piece of yourself to help.

Chuck is such a proud young man. Pity is not what he wants or expects from the community. He will fight his battle to the best of his ability, cooperate with the doctors, and with a little bit of help from his family, friends, and the Lord, he will make it through and come out the winner.

One more time folks, let us join together as a community and as the good neighbors we are, and help Chuck Gremard get that chance at life. We can do it!

Chuck, as you know, I had a member of your Class of '86 who would really be pulling for you right now. In fact, I'm sure my Patti is smiling down on you, and doing a great job as your own personal Guardian Angel.

#### For Miles Around

By Murray Miles Tennessee Farm Bureau REMEMBERING "ONE MAN'S FAMILY"

If you're not over 50, you might as well not waste your time reading this column because you can't relate to it at all, but your parents probably can. This is only applicable to those of us who grew up before television Halls, and a sister, Mrs. Ger- and used our vivid imagination in the days of radio.

> Many of us from that era can still see Fibber McGee's closet door opening and all the contents falling out. We can picture Jack Benny's Maxwell car chugging along, or what the characters looked like sitting on the front porch of Lum and Abner's Jot'em Down Store. It was quite different when you had to imagine all those things. Now television leaves nothing to the imagination, unfortunately.

Remember the soap operas then?. That's how the name "soap operas" came to be. Most of the afternoon, and sometimes morning, was filled with quarter hour radio programs sponsored by Rinso, Duz, Oxydol, Ivory, Lux, Octagon and other soaps or powders that you may or may not remember or recognize.

There were shows like Ma Perkins, Stella Dallas, Pepper Young's Family, Mary Marlin, Guilding Light and others that ran

daily in the daytime. I never did consider it a soap opera, but the longest running such program was on at night. It was called, "One Man's Family", a 30 minute show that was on the radio each week from 1932 until 1959. According to Broadcast Magazine, there were 3,256 episodes. I don't know how many of those I heard, but during the 1940's, I didn't miss many of them.

What brought "One Man's Family" rushing back into my brain was a recent news item that the creator and writer of the show, Carlton Morse, had died at the age of 91.

"One Man's Family" was about the Barbour family that lived in an area of San Francisco called Sea Cliff. It overlooked the Golden Gate Bridge.

I don't know why after all these years that I can name the characters. There was father and mother Barbour. If they were ever called, anything else than this, I don't remember hearing it.

They had five children. There was Paul, the eldest and World War One veteran. There was Hazel who was pretty normal; Clifford who was the maverick; Claudia who married an Englishman of nobility; and Jack who was the youngest and went off to World War II.

It was good family entertainment and was all about the Barbour family and their successes and failures and good times and bad.

When we only had radio for our entertainment, we looked forward each week to our favorite programs such as the ones that I've already named. The only way I ever went to a movie was by listening to Cecil B. DeMille's "Lux Radio Theater". I could imagine what was going on

about as good as seeing the actual movie.

Nowadays, there are very few programs on television that I look forward to with anticipation.

That could be my age, or it could be the quality of the programming. And again, it could be that I was more impressionable when I was growing up with radio. Whatever the reason, memories began to flow when I read about the death of Carlton Morse. He kept millions of radio fans entertained each week for 27 years with his weekly "One

Man's Family". Maybe you remember it, too.
