

Mourned



ROSS W. DYER, 81, Halls attorney and former chief justice of the state Supreme Court, died at 4 p.m. Sunday in his home at 205 S. College, Halls, after long illness with artery problems.

Services were at 2 p.m. Tuesday in First United Methodist Church in Halls, whose Men's Bible Class he taught for 40 years. Burial was in Halls Cemetery, Halls Funeral Home in charge.

Born at Halls, March 10, 1911, son of the late Clarence and Zona Smith Dyer, he attended the University of Tennessee and Cumberland University and took his law degree from the Young Men's Christian Assn. Law School in Nashville in 1937.

His practice in Halls was interrupted by three years of service as a captain in administrative duties with the Army Medical Corps in World War II, including duty in Europe.

He was elected to the Limited Constitutional Convention of 1953 and represented Lauderdale, Crockett, and Dyer Counties in the state Senate in 1957, serving as Democratic floor leader.

He was executive assistant to Gov. Buford Ellington, who appointed him to the Supreme Court Sept. 8, 1961, succeeding John E. Swepston, retiring. He was elected in August, 1962, to complete Swepston's term, and in August, 1966, to a full term.

He leaves his wife, Agnes Moss Dyer, formerly of Gallatin, a son, Thomas R. Dyer, Memphis attorney; three sisters, Virginia Dyer, of Jacksonville, Fla., Mrs. Clarene Edwards, of Memphis, and Mrs. Margaret Smith, of Albany, Ga.; and two grand-children.



Section 2. Building Permits. It shall be unlawful to commence the excavation for or the construction of any building or other structure, including accessory structures to commence the moving (this includes including accessory structures or to commence the filling of land until the building inspector has issued that the plans, specifications and intended use of such structure in all respects conform with the inspector on forms provided for that purpose. It shall be unlawful for the building inspector to approve the plans or issue a building permit for any excavation or construction until he has inspected such plans in detail and found them to be in conformity with this Resolution. To this end, the building permit for excavation, construction, moving (this includes mobile homes) or alteration shall be accompanied by a plan or plat drawn to a scale and showing the following in sufficient detail to enable the building inspector to ascertain whether the proposed excavation, construction, moving or alteration is in conformance with this Resolution:

A. The actual shape, location and dimensions of the

B. The shape, size and location of all buildings or other structures to be erected, altered or moved and of buildings or other structures already on the lot. C. The existing and intended use of all such buildings or other structures.

D. Location and design of off-street parking areas and off-street location areas. Such other information concerning the lot or adjoining lots as may be essential for determining whether the provisions of this Resolution are being observed.

What spots breast cancer earlier than a mammogram New tests at the University of California, San Francisco, may be able to identify women at high risk of developing the cancer years before. It analyzes breast fluid—removed painlessly-for abnormal cells.

Section 2. Building Permits. It shall be unlawful to commence the excavation for or the construction of any building or other structure, including accessory structures to commence the moving (this includes mobile homes,) alteration or repair of any structure, including accessory structures or to commence the filling of land until the building inspector has issued for such work a building permit containing a statement that the plans, specifications and intended use of such structure in all respects conform with the provisions of this Resolution. Application for a building permit shall be made in writing to the building inspector on forms provided for that purpose. It shall be unlawful for the building inspector to approve the plans or issue a building permit for any excavation or construction until he has inspected such plans in detail and found them to be in conformity with this Resolution. To this end, the building permit for excavation, construction, moving (this includes mobile homes) or alteration shall be accompanied by a plan or plat drawn to a scale and showing the following in sufficient detail to enable the building inspector to ascertain whether the proposed excavation, construction, moving or alteration is in conformance with this Resolution:

A. The actual shape, location and dimensions of the lot to be built upon.

B. The shape, size and location of all buildings or other structures to be erected, altered or moved and of buildings or other structures already on the lot. C. The existing and intended use of all such buildings

or other structures. D. Location and design of off-street parking areas and off-street location areas. Such other information concerning the lot or adjoining lots as may be essential for determining whether the provisions of this Resolution are being observed.

It shall be unlawful to commence the excavation for or the construction of any building or other structure, including accessory structures to commence the moving (this includes mobile homes,) alteration or repair of any structure, including accessory structures or to commence the filling of land until the building inspector has issued for such work a building permit containing a statement that the plans, specifications and intended use of such structure in all respects conform with the provisions of this Resolution. Application for a building permit shall be made in writing to the building inspector on forms provided for that purpose. A. The actual shape, location and dimensions of the lot to be built upon.







or other structures. D. Location and design of off-street parking areas and off-street location areas. Such other information concerning the lot or adjoining lots as may be essential for determining whether the provisions of this Resolution are being observed.
