'His law enforcement career began in November, 1986, when he was accepted by the Ripley Police Department as a patrolman.



'He attended Memphis State University and the University of Toledo while servign in the Air Force as a bomber pilot during World War II.

'He joined the Bank of Ripley in 1945.

'He has served his community as President of the Jaycees, the Chamber of Commerce, the Rotary Club, the Heart Fund, the Cancer Society, and numerous other civic functions. He served as the President of the West Tennessee Area Council of the Boy Scouts and has received its Silver Beaver Award.

'He has long been a member of Ripley First United Methodist Church and is presently on its Administrative Board. He is a

'He served as Mayor of Ripley for two terms, a position which his father held before him.

'He has been President of the Bank of Ripley since 1975, a position he recently gave up to his son. He is currently Chairman of the Board of the bank.

'I'm proud to say that he is the one who appointed me Chief of Police in April, 1962.




MWA Aid For West County Firemen

100 Years Old




THE SANCTUARY of First Presbyterian Church in Ripley, on which work commenced in 1892, was dedicated the first Sunday in May, 1893. The picture, with picket fence, appeared in The Lauderdale County Enterprise in 1898.

The original building was one large auditorium, with a room across the front which could be closed off with folding doors.

The pulpit, reed organ, and choir were on the west side. In 1911, a pipe organ was installed on the east side, with the choir loft and pulpit in front of it. The sanctuary was re-modeled in 1955, when a new, smaller pipe organ was installed on the north side, with pews facing north. Additions were made to the building in 1920, 1948, and 1981.

New Board Members At Bank







To simplify the surgery by which doctors insert small tubes in the ears of children who suffer chronic ear infections, a New Jersey physician has invented a tube with a sharp edge that cuts its own way in and produces a hole just the right size. More testing is needed.

High blood pressure may cause deadening of brain tissue on the left side and an increase in fluid on both sides (a sign of tissue loss), according to a report in Hypertension. Vitamin E may help slow atherosclerosis, research at the University of Texas Southern Medical Center suggests. New study at Creighton Medical School in Omaha shows that women keep growing bone even after they reach full

JRG: THE SPIRIT OF SMALL TOWN AMERICA

LYNCHBURG, TN — The Jack Daniel Distillery didn't have to look any farther than its own back yard for the ideal site to host its "Best Small Towns in America" contest

The tiny Tennessee town of Lynchburg (pop. 361), the distillery's home since it was licensed in 1866, may very well be the mecca of small town life. For more than 35 years. Lynchburg's hills and hollows and local characters have been featured in the black-and-white photography that adorns Jack Daniel's advertising. In response to Lynchburg's invitation "to come see us," between 250,000 and 300,000 out-of-towners visit Lynchburg annually for a taste of small town life and a tour of the distillery where the famous spirit is made.

"Even though our visitors will ask, we don't give any samples on the distillery tour because Lynchburg's been dry since before prohibition," said Roger Brashears, distillery worker and the Best Small Towns in America spokesperson. "But I don't think folks come so much for a taste of whiskey as they do for a taste of a slower pace."

The pace of life in Lynchburg remains much like it was some 125 years ago when young Jack Daniel set up his distillery at the old cave spring in this mule-trading town. Since that day in 1866, the distillery has remained in the Cave Spring Hollow. Over the years, while the popularity and world-renown for Jack Daniel's whiskey has grown, the small town that crafts the spirit has remained much the same. Today, Lynchburg is perhaps the most famous small town in America and has come to exemplify all that is special about small town life.

"The distillery gets much of its character from the spirit of these prideful small town folks and their honest way of life," said Brashears.

"I guess Lynchburg is sort of the secret ingredient in every bottle of Jack

Like any small town, Lynchburg has its share of local attractions in addition to its most famous landmark, Mr. Jack's famous distillery.

One of those landmarks is Miss Mary Bobo's Boarding House. Built in the 1850s, the house sits on Main Street and still serves family-style midday dinners, though it no longer takes in boarders. Miss Mary Bobo ran the boarding house from 1908 until her death in 1983. She was just shy of her 102nd birthday.

Mr. Jack Daniel regularly ate his noon meal at Miss Mary's so it's appropriate today that the proprietress is Miss Lynne Tolley, who is Mr. Jack's great grandniece. Meals are served every day (except Sunday) promptly at 1 p.m. and are a marvelous spread of good old-fashioned Southern fare.

Guests sit about 10 to a table, and the food is served in the traditional "pleasepass-to-your-left" fashion while a hostess presides over the conversations and encourages second and third helpings.

Visitors to the town square pass by the Moore County Courthouse, built in 1884, and across the square, view the old Moore County Jail.

Around the square are rows of stores, including the Lynchburg Hardware & General Store. Here, you can find just about anything, from overalls to horse collars. According to Brashears, the bench in front of the Hardware Store is the best place to hear the latest political debate around town.

"Some of the town's expert whittlers tend to gather there and discuss the affairs of the day," added Brashears.

Then of course there is Lynchburg's most notable landmark, the Jack Daniel

The distillery is the oldest registered distillery in the United States and is listed with the National Register of Historic Places. Free, hour-long tours are available yearround, seven days a week, (except Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's).

On the tour, visitors see a barrelhouse, where more than 20,000 barrels of whiskey are stored while aging; the brickyard, where hard sugar maple is burned to make the charcoal used to mellow the whiskey (drop by drop); the bubbling, fermenting vats; and the underground cave spring where the iron-free water used to make Jack Daniel's run at a constant 56 degrees year-round.

Each step in the process is important to making a good whiskey and visitors on the tour see firsthand the pride each employee takes in doing their part to make every drop the best.

Just as importantly, the Jack Daniel Distillery appreciates each employee and is proud of its small town roots. The Distillery is equally proud to sponsor the "Best Small Towns in America" contest to honor other small towns for the unique contribution to American life.

The contest will identify and recognize seven of America's best smaller communities for the values, spirit and qualities of life that make them special places to live. "Because we've been located here in Lynchburg for so many hears, we know a little bit about small towns," said Brashears. "We are trying to find other small towns like Lynchburg around the country and honor them. You don't ever hear about the best small towns to live in and we think it's time to hit a lick for them."

Each of the seven winning towns will receive \$1,000 and a sign designating the town as "One of the Best Small Towns in America."
