'His law enforcement career began in November, 1986, when he was accepted by the Ripley Police Department as a patrolman.

'James R. Fitzhugh was born in Dyer County on January 26, 1923. He was educated in Dyer County Elementary Schools, graduating from Ripley High School in 1941.

'He attended Memphis State University and the University of Toledo while serving in the Air Force as a bomber pilot during World War II.

'He joined the Bank of Ripley in 1945.

'He has served his community as President of the Jaycees, the Chamber of Commerce, the Rotary Club, the Heart Fund, the Cancer Society, and numerous other civic functions. He served as the President of the West Tennessee Area Council of the Boy Scouts and has received its Silver Beaver Award.

'He has long been a member of Ripley First United Methodist Church and is presently on its Administrative Board. He is a

Trustee of Lambuth University in Jackson.

'He served as Mayor of Ripley for two terms, a position which his father held before him.

'He has served on many boards and positions in his career field, including the State Banking Board under two governors, President of the Tennessee Bankers Assn., a state Vice-President of the American Bankers Assn., a member of the Executive Council of the Independent Bankers of America, and a board member of the Memphis Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank.

'He has been President of the Bank of Ripley since 1975, a position he recently gave up to his son. He is currently Chairman of the Board of the bank.

'Married for 48 years to Frances, he enjoys golf, travel, and his son and two grandchildren.

'I'm proud to say that he is the one who appointed me Chief of Police in April, 1962.

'It is an honor for me to present James R. Fitzhugh with the F.O.P. "Man of the Year" Award.'

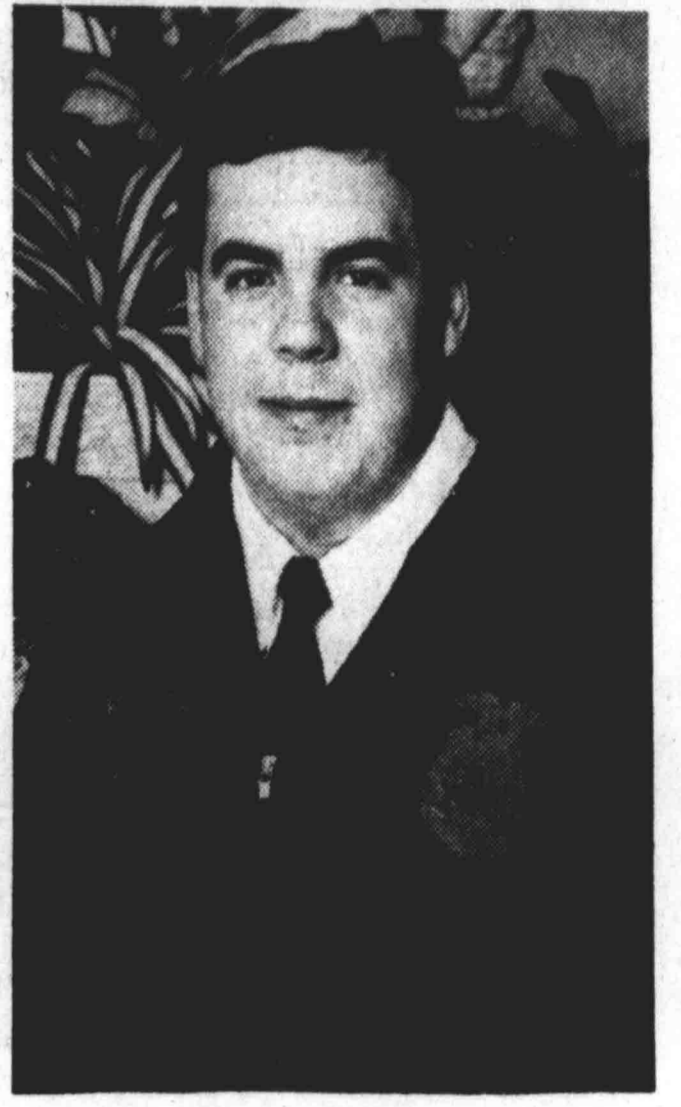

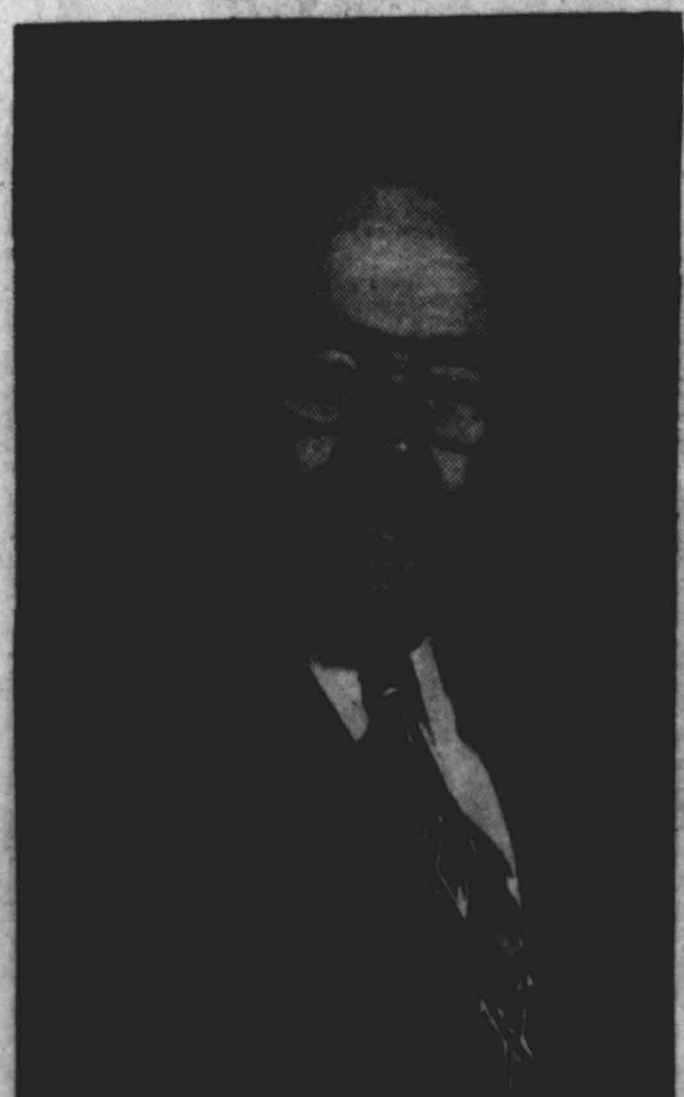

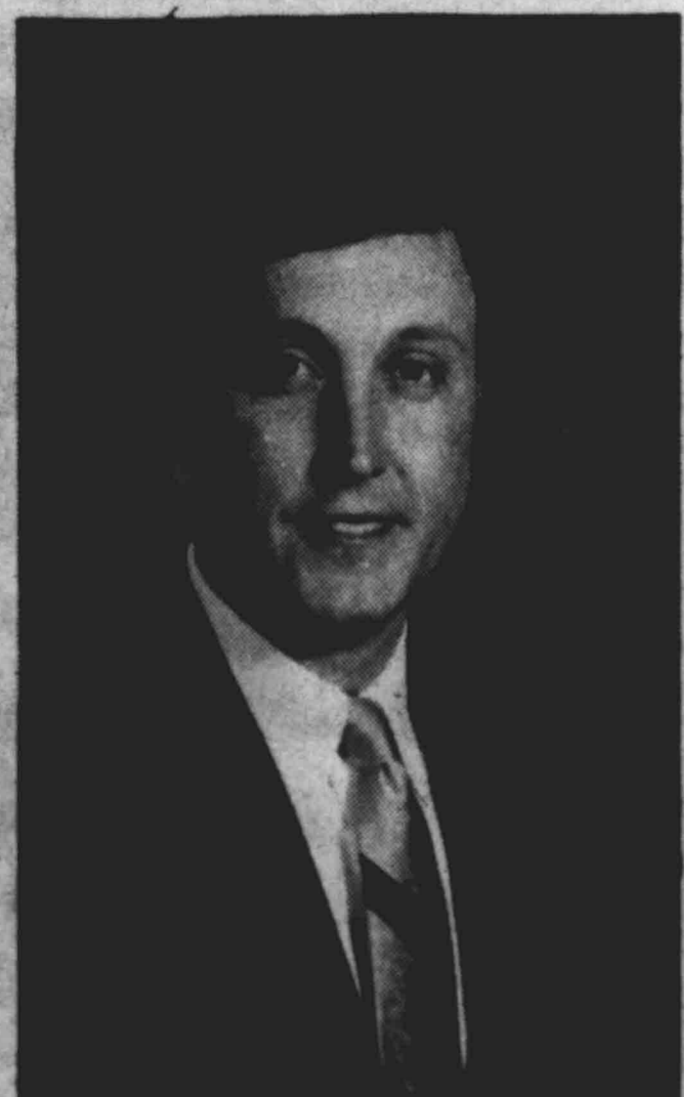

New Board Members At Bank



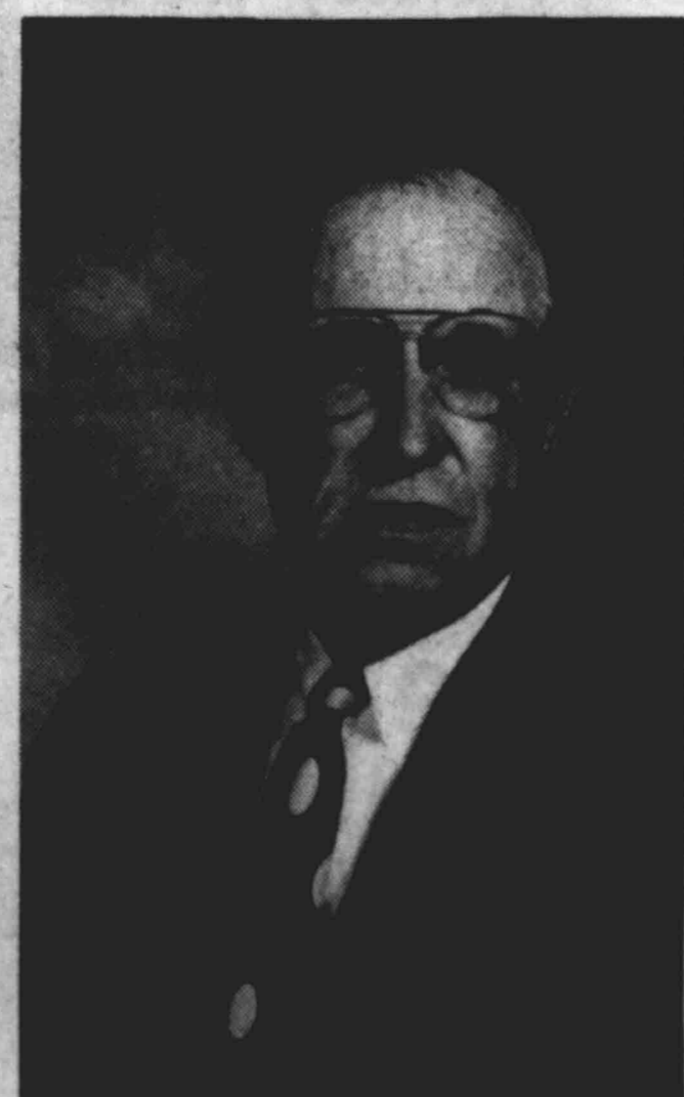

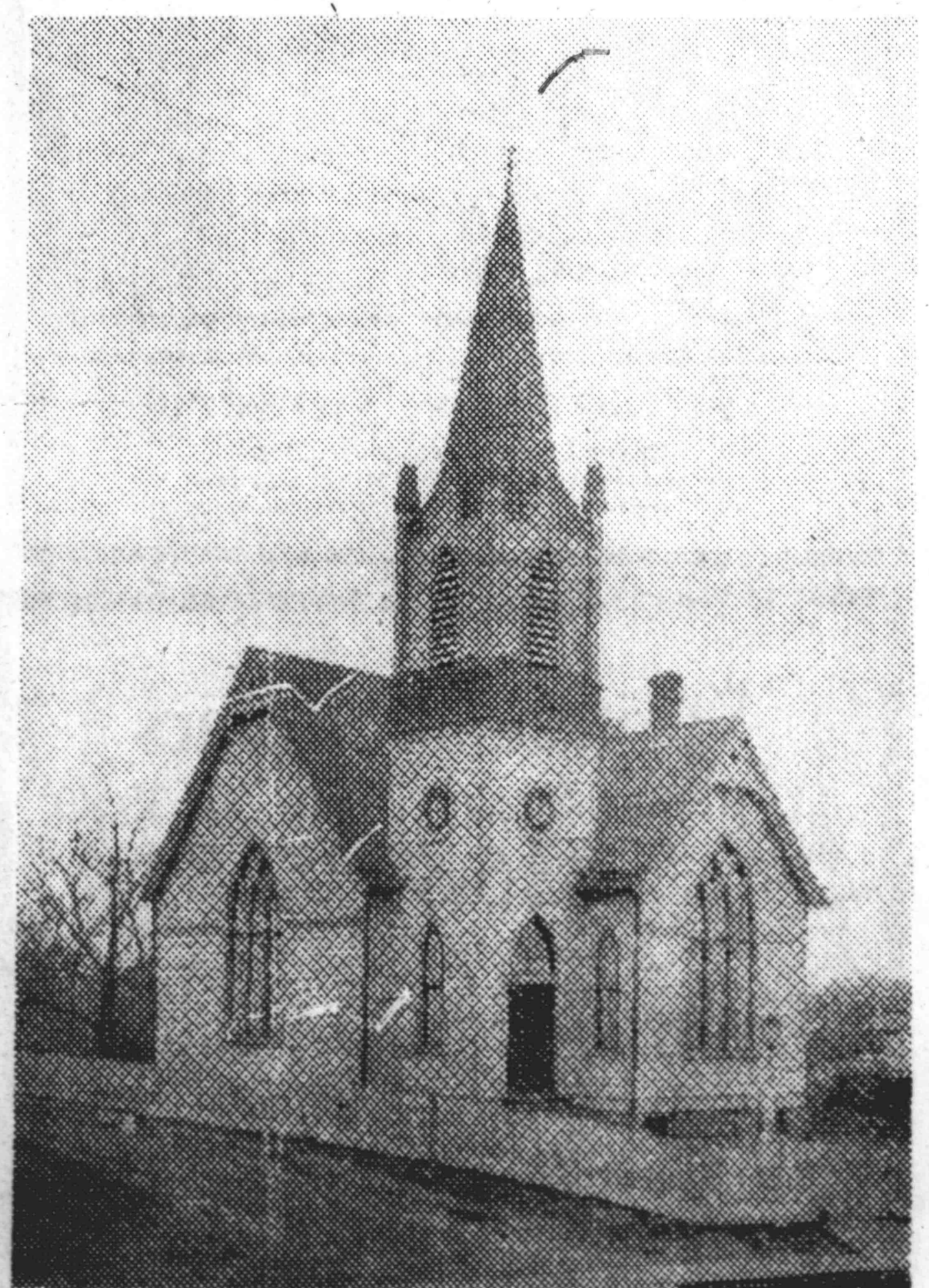

100 Years Old



THE SANCTUARY of First Presbyterian Church in Ripley, on which work commenced in 1892, was dedicated the first Sunday in May, 1893. The picture, with picket fence, appeared in *The Lauderdale County Enterprise* in 1898.

The original building was one large auditorium, with a room across the front which could be closed off with folding doors.

The pulpit, reed organ, and choir were on the west side. In 1911, a pipe organ was installed on the east side, with the choir loft and pulpit in front of it. The sanctuary was re-modeled in 1955, when a new, smaller pipe organ was installed on the north side, with pews facing north. Additions were made to the building in 1920, 1948, and 1981.

To simplify the surgery by which doctors insert small tubes in the ears of children who suffer chronic ear infections, a New Jersey physician has invented a tube with a sharp edge that cuts its own way in and produces a hole just the right size. More testing is needed.

If you are moving or building in the incorporated areas of Lauderdale County, please call the City Hall in that area.

PLEASE NOTE: The two telephone numbers for the County are answering machines. Be sure to leave the information the messages request. The messages left on the answering machines are checked daily.

After you have received your 911 house address, you must realize how important it is for you to place those numbers somewhere on your house or in your yard in such a manner that they can be seen at any time during the day or night. It does the emergency response personnel NO GOOD if they are delayed in finding your house, and you must realize it does YOU NO GOOD if you can't be found!

Planning Commission Weighing Complaints

Don Ammons, of Ripley, chairman of the county Planning Commission, told fellow County Commissioners Monday that the Commission is considering complaints presented in a petition and in a public meeting Friday, and will consider them further in a meeting May 28th.

ADD-ONS WEIGHED

The committee favors adding two court-rooms and offices for court clerks in the Courthouse in Ripley, for an additional \$1,700,000.

Meadows says this revises his estimates to a tax jump of 49¢ (at 5.5%) or 51¢ (at 6%).

Rob Reviere, jail committee chairman, told commissioners that the jail is an absolute necessity to meet federal requirements (commissioners are facing a federal lawsuit resulting from the present facility).

He advocated adding the courtrooms for three reasons: -The cost of adapting the Courthouse to meet standards for handicapped access (another federal requirement, and an expensive one) would be sharply reduced.

-Having prisoners easily accessible to courts would greatly reduce time, expense, and security risks of transporting them to trials.

-The move would provide offices remaining in the Courthouse with badly needed additional room.

The committee said the Ripley Police Department could be added to the building for about \$1,000,000, but Mayor Richard Douglas told commissioners he thought the location was too far south of central Ripley to be of interest to the city government.

Sooner or later, the committee noted, the county could consolidate, on the 46 acres, the highway department headquarters, the school bus garage, and fuel service (since many existing fuel tanks must be replaced, again to meet federal requirements).

This might permit sharing revenue.

There is in my files a letter from the FCC dated April 23, 1976 stating that there was no such petition, but they had already received three million letters about it.

Here it is 1993, 17 years later, and the rumor continues to surface. A mimeographed letter came across my desk the other day. It reads just like the first one I saw in 1976, and a year later in 1977, and two years ago in 1991. There's the same petition number, 2493. There's the story that Mrs. O'Hair took 27,000 signatures with her, and that a million signatures are needed to stop her efforts. The only difference is that the 1993 letter spells her name, "O'Hara".

The most recent figure from the FCC is that they have received 21 million pieces of mail in the past 15 years on the subject. Now, since postage rates have changed several times in 15 years, I don't know how much postage has been sent, but let's just say it averaged 25 cents per letter. That's \$5.25 million dollars wasted on a rumor.

The "Pup-ulation" Explosion

(NAPS)—In a recent survey of dog owners who own at least one dog not neutered or spayed, 26 percent say it's because they want to breed the pet. Twenty-three percent feel it's not necessary, four percent say it's too expensive, three percent say it's cruel to pets, two percent dislike the procedure and another two percent feel it's too much trouble.

While some breeders find homes for the dogs or cats they breed, within six years a breeding pair of dogs can theoretically be the source of about 67,000 descendants. About 50 percent of the dogs and cats born each year never find a permanent home and millions must be put to sleep (euthanized), including many purebreds.

The Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) is calling for tough measures to stop the breeding of cats and dogs, including:

- A Voluntary Breeding Moratorium—Pet owners should spay or neuter their pets, or, at a minimum, not breed them. Professional breeders should not breed their animals until the crisis has passed.
- A Mandatory Breeding Moratorium—In some communities the only solution is to pass legislation prohibiting breeding for a time.

There are many things you can do to help with the pet overpopulation problem. Do not breed your pets—spay or neuter them. Urge others to join in the voluntary moratorium. Support legislation to control breeding. Support your local humane organizations and shelters. Be a responsible pet owner—don't let your pets roam and make sure they wear identification at all times.

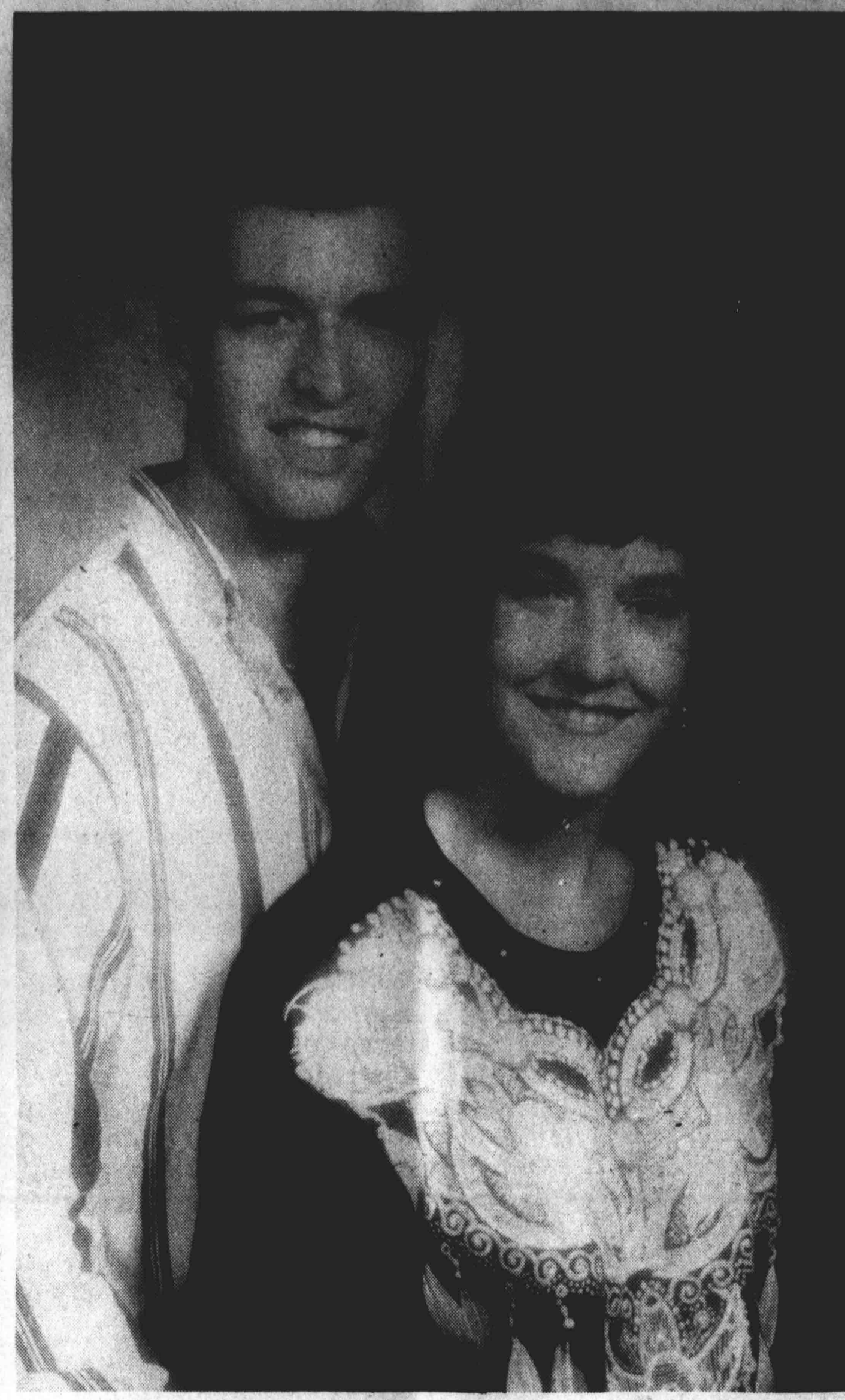

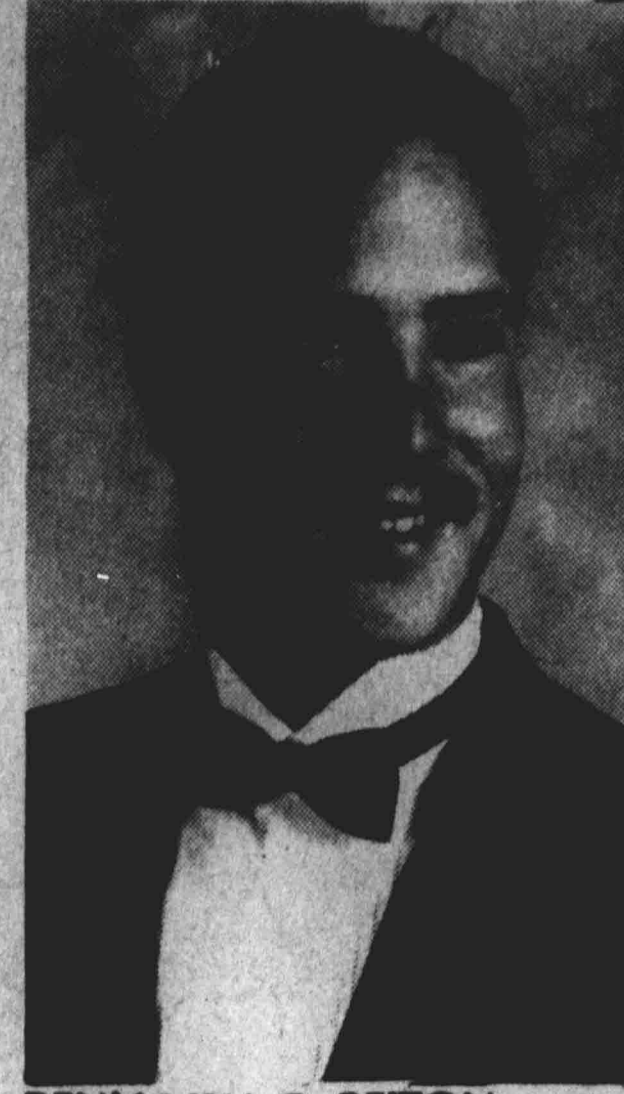

Miles Around

CENTENARIANS ARE USING DAIRY FOODS ABOVE AVERAGE

The slogan, "You never outgrow your need for milk" has been around for a long time now, and apparently is just as true today as when some advertising executive came up with the slogan.

At least a study done by the University of Georgia is indicating that. A recent article in their "Agriseach" quarterly says that Georgians who are a hundred years old or older are twice as likely to drink whole milk and eat real butter and ice cream than are other elderly consumers.

What they want to find out next is whether or not dairy foods are helping these centenarians maintain good health.

One of the researchers on the project said that these oldest of the older citizens are much more likely to have low body weight than have a problem with being overweight. "And dairy products are a good source of both nutrients and energy," said Mary Ann Johnson.

Johnson and her associate researcher, Joan Fischer, want to learn more about the elderly's attitudes toward food, and especially dairy foods. They also want to know what factors influence their buying habits.

They already know, through surveys, that 70 and 80 year olds seek out low-fat, low-cholesterol dairy products. They want to find out if the folks over 100 are ignoring the warnings about fat, or simply don't have access to the information.

While Johnson and Fischer want to know if the whole milk, ice cream and real butter is responsible for

keeping these centenarians alive and healthy, they also want to know how easy it is for them to get dairy products.

"We plan to study some of the predictors and barriers to dairy food consumption", Johnson said. "For example, are the sealed bottles and packages difficult to open? Do elderly people feel cheated because a half gallon of milk costs almost as much as a gallon? Would they buy more milk if they felt the prices were more fair?"

They also want to know how often elderly Americans buy dairy products and how do they get them? Do these products sometimes spoil and would foods with a longer shelf life encourage them to buy more?

There is a two year study planned to find out all these answers. The first year will deal with analyzing all the information that they have gathered to find why the over 100 group are "expert survivors".

The second year will be spent conducting a national survey asking 70, 80, 90 and 100 year-olds why they do (and don't) buy dairy products.

Johnson says "we know from studying young people who have a low intake of dairy and meat that they usually also have a low intake of essential nutrients. We believe this is probably also a problem with the elderly".

Who knows what researchers will come up with next in the food line? I was surprised the other day to read where some scientists are now saying that drinking milk and eating dairy products actually help prevent kidney stones. That's a real switch.

Maybe we'll find out from the Georgia study that we should eat real butter, ice cream and drink whole milk in order to live to be a hundred.

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
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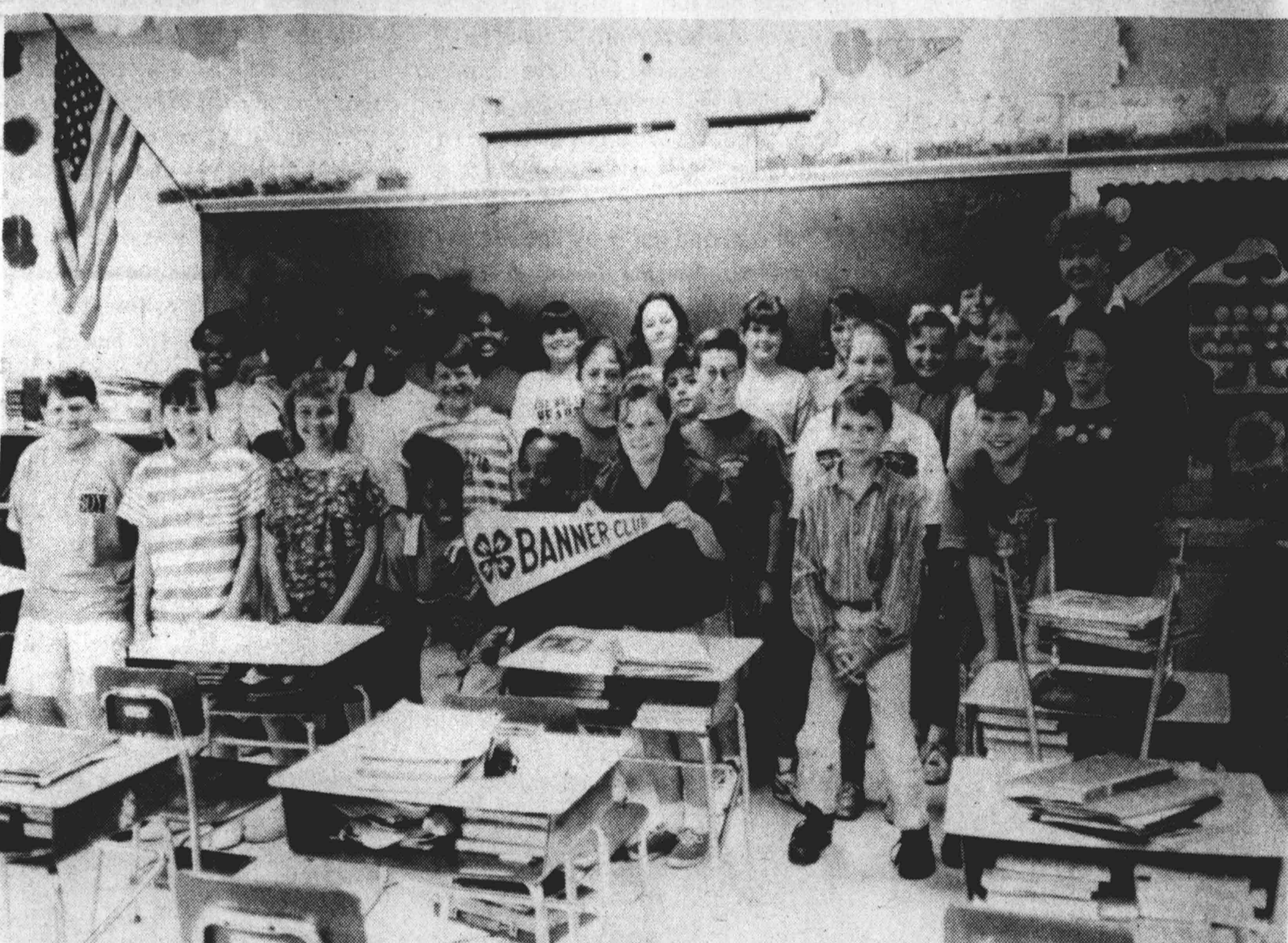

LYNCHBURG: THE SPIRIT OF SMALL TOWN AMERICA

LYNCHBURG, TN — The Jack Daniel Distillery didn't have to look any farther than its own back yard for the ideal site to host its "Best Small Towns in America" contest.

The tiny Tennessee town of Lynchburg (pop. 361), the distillery's home since it was licensed in 1866, may very well be the mecca of small town life. For more than 35 years, Lynchburg's hills and hollows and local characters have been featured in the black-and-white photography that adorns Jack Daniel's advertising. In response to Lynchburg's invitation "to come see us," between 250,000 and 300,000 out-of-towners visit Lynchburg annually for a taste of small town life and a tour of the distillery where the famous spirit is made.

"Even though our visitors will ask, we don't give any samples on the distillery tour because Lynchburg's been dry since before prohibition," said Roger Brashears, distillery worker and the Best Small Towns in America spokesperson. "But I don't think folks come so much for a taste of whiskey as they do for a taste of a slower pace."

The pace of life in Lynchburg remains much like it was some 125 years ago when young Jack Daniel set up his distillery at the old cave spring in this mule-trading town. Since that day in 1866, the distillery has remained in the Cave Spring Hollow. Over the years, while the popularity and world-renown for Jack Daniel's whiskey has grown, the small town that crafts the spirit has remained much the same. Today, Lynchburg is perhaps the most famous small town in America and has come to exemplify all that is special about small town life.

"The distillery gets much of its character from the spirit of these prideful small town folks and their honest way of life," said Brashears.

"I guess Lynchburg is sort of the secret ingredient in every bottle of Jack Daniel's whiskey."

Like any small town, Lynchburg has its share of local attractions in addition to its most famous landmark, Mr. Jack's famous distillery.

One of those landmarks is Miss Mary Bobo's Boarding House. Built in the 1850s, the house sits on Main Street and still serves family-style middy dinners, though it no longer takes in boarders. Miss Mary Bobo ran the boarding house from 1908 until her death in 1983. She was just shy of her 102nd birthday.

Mr. Jack Daniel regularly ate his noon meal at Miss Mary's so it's appropriate today that the proprietress is Miss Lynne Tolley, who is Mr. Jack's great grandniece. Meals are served every day (except Sunday) promptly at 1 p.m. and are a marvelous spread of good old-fashioned Southern fare.

Guests sit about 10 to a table, and the food is served in the traditional "please-pass-to-your-left" fashion while a hostess presides over the conversations and encourages second and third helpings.

Visitors to the town square pass by the Moore County Courthouse, built in 1884, and across the square, view the old Moore County Jail.

Around the square are rows of stores, including the Lynchburg Hardware & General Store. Here, you can find just about anything, from overalls to horse collars. According to Brashears, the bench in front of the Hardware Store is the best place to hear the latest political debate around town.

"Some of the town's expert whittlers tend to gather there and discuss the affairs of the day," added Brashears.

Then of course there is Lynchburg's most notable landmark, the Jack Daniel Distillery.

The distillery is the oldest registered distillery in the United States and is listed with the National Register of Historic Places. Free, hour-long tours are available year-round, seven days a week, (except Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's).

On the tour, visitors see a barrelhouse, where more than 20,000 barrels of whiskey are stored while aging; the brickyard, where hard sugar maple is burned to make the charcoal used to mellow the whiskey (drop by drop); the bubbling, fermenting vats; and the underground cave spring where the iron-free water used to make Jack Daniel's run at a constant 56 degrees year-round.

Each step in the process is important to making a good whiskey and visitors on the tour see firsthand the pride each employee takes in doing their part to make every drop the best.

Just as importantly, the Jack Daniel Distillery appreciates each employee and is proud of its small town roots. The Distillery is equally proud to sponsor the "Best Small Towns in America" contest to honor other small towns for the unique contribution to American life.

The contest will identify and recognize seven of America's best smaller communities for the values, spirit and qualities of life that make them special places to live.

"Because we've been located here in Lynchburg for so many years, we know a little bit about small towns," said Brashears. County Executive Gwynn Matthews, Mayors Richard Douglas of Ripley, Randy Harris, of Halls, and Fred Montgomery, of Henning, School Supt. Bobby Webb, Ripley Area Vo-Tech director Jerry Little, Chamber of Commerce executive secretary Carolyn (Mrs. James) Mitchell, and others joined State Rep. Floyd Crain, of Ripley, to seek the school in part, in hopes of locating Sunbeam Corp. in the Tupperware plant in Halls).

Dr. Floyd told the counties they would be expected to find a buyer for the present school property, in Ripley's South Industrial Park, and to provide a 20-acre site plus \$200,000 in local funding, to spark a state investment of millions.




