DEBORAH TALBOT, daughter of the Richard Lazures, of Halls, who as a senior vice-president of Chase Manhattan Corp. has headed its private banking business in the U.S. for about 30 months, has been chosen to head a new unit, with a staff of 1,600, to serve customers in 30 countries.

"Just last year - only months into her job as Individual Banking's Financial Management Executive - she overhauled funding procedures," the firm's magazine, "Directions," reports.

"Previously, businesses like Chase Home Mortgage Corp. got money to make loans from Chase Treasury.

"Now, funding is as likely to come from deposits in the Metropolitan Community Bank.

"Treasury works as a wholesale clearing house, funding the entire Corporation," she says.

After a 3-mile run in the Chase Fitness Lab, she describes her path to the top ranks of international banking as "a meandering cow path."

A 1972 graduate of Memphis State University, she taught briefly, worked for a Memphis bank, and was working for the management consulting business of Peat, Marwick, Mitchell's when hired, in 1982, to head Chase's Funds Availability Management Division, minimizing the delay in collection of checks, totaling about 2-1/2 billion dollars a day, deposited in Chase accounts.

In 1986, she became Student Loan executive; a year later, its profits were up 33%.

Deb has not forgotton her "roots," growing up among cattle and soy-beans. She thinks they may have taught her something about being open to new ideas, whether in farming or in banking. She spent her only vacation in 1985 running her sister's restaurant, the Memphis Pig Out.

Principal Adds New Computers

Books and technology are coming together in the Halls High School Library/Media Center (LMC). Due to the initiative of the new high school principal, Larry Winegarden, and the generosity of several local businesses, the Halls High School LMC has leapt into the world of technology. Located in the LMC, a multicomputer system media awaits students, many of whom have already discovered this fascinating research tool.

At a meeting of the Citizens **Advisory Committee Tuesday** of last week, a presentation was made by Donna Smith, librarian, demonstrating the new system. The system is comprised of a MacIntosh LC III computer with color monitor, laser printer, CD ROM multimedia kit, headphones and modem. There are two encyclopedias on CD ROM and a history CD ROM program, donated by Linda Weeks for student use. A CD ROM version of the World Fact Book, Monarch Notes, and a Survey of Western Art will be added.

Students and teachers will have access to Internet. This "computer network of computer networks" links millions of users in more than 40 countries world-wide. A minimum of four faculty members have or will receive training in accessing the Internet System.

The economic value of this computer system is as notable as its educational and motivational values. Students familiar with computers are better prepared to enter the work place and college. The cost of printed materials continue to rise but there has been a decline in the cost of computers and CDs. The amount of material available on one CD is equivalent to 60,000 pages of printed text.

Ripley Board Weighs Alderman Districts

Ripley's board of Mayor and Aldermen, meeting Monday, heard proposals it requested from Tim Roach, state planner, to divide the city into six districts, each electing one alderman, instead of all six being elected city-wide, as at present.

No action was taken. Whatever the city board decides, action by the state's General Assembly (legislature) will be required to amend the city charter.

The board unanimously approved Doris Sandlin to succeed S. N. Anthony, Jr., on the board of the Ripley Housing Authority. Mr. Anthony, chairman of the board, resigned after decades of service on it.

The board approved a Christmas bonus of a ham, or 2% of pay, to city workers.

Pat Harcourt of Grace and Associates told of the need for a ramp, elevator hallway, and improvements to bathrooms and other inciden tal renovations at an estimat of \$177,000. Harcourt said funds to assist in funding the project will be sought from the Department of Transportation. The county has until January, 1996 to comply with

The school board has endorsed a plan for two new high schools and extensive renovations and additions other schools in Halls and Ri pley to meet state compliance or the handicapped as well teacher/pupil ratios, and severe crowding at Ripley Middle School. The project is esti mated to cost approximately \$20 million.


