

Tuholski Chosen Stellar Alumnus

Halls High School.

James E. Tuholski, M.D. who was born in Henning and whose mother, Virginia, resides in Henning, was honored Sept. 17th as the year's Outstanding Alumnus of the College of Medicine of the University of Tennessee in Memphis.

Reared in Henning and New Jersey, he took his M.D. degree from U.T. in 1948.

He completed a rotating internship at the U.S. Naval Hospital, St. Albans, N.Y. and residencies in pediatrics at U-T Memphis in 1949-1951 and at St. Louis Children's Hospital in 1953-1954.

From 1954-1956, he was instructor of pediatrics in U.T. Memphis and director of resident student training in LeBonheur Children's Medical Center.

In 1956, Dr. Tuhalski began work for Mead-Johnson Co., as associate director of clinical research, subsequently, director, then vicepresident of product development.

In 1961, he became president of Mead-Johnson Laboratories, the pharmaceutical and nutritional marketing division of Mead-Johnson.

From 1962 to 1977, he rose to president and chief executive officer. He served as executive vice-prsident of Bristol-Myers and president of its Health Care Division from 1977 to 1984.

With his wife, Sis, he resides in Greenwich, Conn., and Stuart, Fla. He has five daughters.

State, U.S., Push Costs Onto County

County Executive H. Gwinn Matthews got some (more) bad news Tuesday of last week in a regional meeting of the Tenn. County Commissioners Assn. at the University of Tennessee in Martin.

On the recommendation of the Department of Human Services, this county's Juvenile Court last year sent nine "troubled" children to state mental health institutes, at a total cost of \$79,272.

Cost per child ranged from \$14,240.40 to \$3,085.42. Payments came from the state budget. Not any longer, according to Finance Commissioner David Manning.

This fiscal year, the state will pay only for Juvenile Court defendants cases charged with felonies.

County taxpayers will fund any others. County taxpayers are also paying for many programs mandated by the state and federal governments.

This fiscal year, the state will pay only for Juvenile Court defendants charged with felonies (extremely serious crimes). County taxpayers will have to pick up the rest of the bill.

Matthews is disturbed by an increasing tendency of the federal and state governments to order the county to spend money the federal and state governments don't provide.

"We are not necessarily questioning the decisions being made," Matthews notes, "but when Washington (whether it's a transportation, health care, human services, prison, or environmentally related issue) requires local governments to do something within a specific time frame, then they've got to send us the funds to implement the requirements."

"We in county government have a finite amount of money, and we have to provide a certain amount of basic service that no one else provides.

"If a decision at the national level is made by Congress and signed by the President, then they should respond and send us the dollars to implement the programs.

"It is time the American public understands the pressures that are occuring at the local level and understands what the federal government is doing to every taxpayer in this country.

"In short, the federal government is using our property taxes as its credit card. We get stuck with the bill.

"Our aim behind this effort by the National Assn. of Counties is not to oppose goals of federal mandates, but rather to stop the federal government from dumping the full cost to implement these mandates on local governments.

"We all agree that clean air, safe drinking water, fair wages, assisting the disabled, and protecting endangered species, are commendable national priorities that should be carried out.

"However, we believe the federal government must be willing to pay to support these programs.

"Federal mandates are a problem for three reasons: (1) they are imposed without consideration of local circumstances or capacity to implement the federal requirements; (2) they strain already tight budgets (forcing increases in local tax rates and fees to pay for mandates); and (3) they set priorities for local governments without local in-

"Some may ask, what is the difference if the taxes have to be levied at the local level or at the federal level, as Congress did with the gas tax? Isn't it the same tax-paying American public that foots the bill either way?

"Yes, they are the same people, but the tax base is quite different. In counties, the main source of revenue is property taxes, and many counties have a cap on how much they can generate. Counties are limited in the other types of revenue they can generate. The federal government has a much broader base of taxation ability than we do.

"Local officials need to be involved in the decision- making process. We feel that if the same people who make the legislation have to pay for it, they will be much more careful in drafting the legislation.

Park Land Cost Stands; Ripley Curb Expansion

Ripley City Attorney Rachel J. Anthony advised the city board Monday against appealing a court award of about \$5,000 an acre for about 48 acres the city is developing as a park, south of Keller Lane, west of Old U.S. Highway 51,

west of Ripley High School. The city had offered \$2,400 an acre; owners asked \$4,800. The city took possession by condemnation, leaving purchase price to the court.

The board voted Monday to borrow money for the park on 10-year capital outlay notes.

Mayor Richard Douglas said the city would freeze hiring, eliminate over-time unless mandatory, buy no vehicles and fix no sidewalks this and stop garbage pick-ups on Sunday. He said any city purchase for more than \$100 would require his personal approval.

The board voted a \$50 fine for non-residents of the city dumping garbage into city containers.
