## Cepparulo Heads Police Re-Study

Edmond Cepparulo, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Cepparulo, of Curve, heads an 11-man team of Jackson police officers who have been selected to recommend, to Chief Rick Staples, changes they feel needed in Jackson's police department.

Cepparulo, 41, joined the department in 1973. A lieutenant, he commands the evening shift and handles crisis management and dignitary protection.

Personally, he'd like to see more cops walking a "beat," knowing everyone in an area and quickly spotting strangers or unusual activities, The Jackson Sun reports.

But he says this can't happen until police shed other duties.

His department's 160 officers respond, around the clock, to:

Nearly 2,000 family spats a year; most victims decline to prosecute.
At least 2,000 false alarms

from buildings with alarm systems.

- About 700 calls a month

-- About 700 calls a month from motorists who lock themselves out of vehicles; the average call requires half an hour to service.

- Funeral escorts. When scores of officers went to Jackson-Central Merry High School during a massive disturbance last school year, escorts were briefly suspended, drawing a tirade, The Sun

cepparulo hopes alternative services can be found to free up highly trained officers to devote their attention to major crimes.

"The community has got to decide what they want us to be," he says. "We can't be all things to all people."

## School Board Wants \$18,410,719 For 2 New High Schools

The county Board of Education voted unanimously Monday to ask taxpayers to spend \$25,456,073 (plus land and financing costs) to up-grade county schools in two phases -- Phase I including a new Ripley High School (for 1,200 students, last year's enrollment 927), at \$11,224,771, and a new Halls High School (for 600 students, last year's enrollment 455), at \$7,186,008.

Construction estimates were obtained from Fleming Associates, of Memphis.

The crew members, who had not all been together since they completed their 25th mission in Europe, shared memorabilia with each other, Tim Bivens, Pat Higdon, City Hall personnel and all who dropped by as they talked and kidded about their Army days at DAAB. Tommy McDearman and Bettie Davis talked with them about people and former service-related facilities.

These men, part of Reeves Provisional Group, completed their training at Halls on Sept. 24, 1943 and moved on Grand Island, Nebraska; Bangor, Main; Goose Bay, Labrador; Greenland and Iceland. Their airplane, a B17F was called "This Is It."

Pauline Straub felt that Halls was one of the nicer places she and her husband were stationed because they weren't "out to get our money." They lived with the Jack Shannon family at 414 W. Tigrett during their stay. Her husband, Earl, passed away two months ago, but she and her daughter wanted to join the remaining crew for the historic visit.

Fred and Estelle Lemmons vividly recalled their marriage in Ripley where they lived with the D. B. Archer family. Dick and Norma Walters also were married while stationed here; they lived in Mrs. Siler's house, which was located on College Street near W. Tigrett

Charlie and Ruth Stang lived by a Norman family in Dyersburg. Because they lived in Dyersburg, he didn't remember anything about Halls, but he sure remembered going back and forth to Dyersburg.

Pilot Genther lived on the base, which he described as " place to sleep with good food;" with tongue-in-cheek, he said didn't have much fun," and his fellow crew members roared with

For ball turret gunner Newhall, the "Baby" of the crew and 17 years old at the time, and bombardier Lemmon, a tent with a wooden floor was their barracks while at DAAB. They all remembered that their main activity here was flying training mission after training mission.

Before coming to Halls on Friday, the group had been visiting tourist sites in Memphis, which included the "Memphis Belle. While at the Memphis Zoo, they were interviewed by the Channel 5 news team, and that interview was aired on Channel 5 on Sept. 10th. They all agreed they would try to return to the June WWII Commemoration activities in either '94 or '95.

## CC OKs Moving Courts With Jail

real estate tax rate per \$100 assessment. Commissioners banned smoking in the Courthouse.

## Ripley Moves Against Out-Of-City Dumpers, Eyes Board Districts

Ripley's Board of Aldermen, meeting Monday, approved a public hearing (see ad in this issue) on an ordinance providing fines for non-residents of the city who dump garbage into city dumpsters but pay no taxes toward the disposal costs.

The board asked Tim Roach, state advisor to its Planning Commission, to offer a proposal to divide the city into different districts-in one senario the city would be divided into six different districts, each of which, would elect one alderman in another, three districts, two aldermen each would be elected. Aldermen are now elected city-wide.

District lines adopted could increase the chances of black representation on the board.

Districting would have to await approval by the city board and then by the state legislature, to amend the city charter.

Alderman Billie Anne Hendren suggested one seat be reserved for voting by owners of property in the city who do not reside in it but are an important part of its economy and of its


#### Old Buildings Go?

The board encouraged a plan by Mayor Richard Douglas to buy and demolish buildings on the east side of South Main. south of Jenny's Cafe, at Main and Washington, and up to the former Webb Theatre property.

Douglas hopes to buy the properties from Henry Norfolk, Tom Sanders, and Mrs. Dillard Henning for about \$35,000, and use the site for better development.

The board authorized \$10,000 to erect a building east of the Fire Station, between it and the railroad, to house the department's water truck and a hook and ladder truck to be delivered next month.

Ned's scores of albums, over-flowing his "stamp room" into an adjoining hall-way, neatly mount U.S., Canadian, and United Nations stamps from 1847 to date, including singles, plate blocks, and full sheets.

Ned's collection includes the U.N. complete and just about everything the U.S. Postal Service has produced in first day covers, first day programs, and commemorative panels. Plus post cards, one of 300 sets of NASA envelopes, duck hunting stamps, Christmas Seals from the first, in 1907, you name it, Ned's got it or is looking for a few elusive items.

Those include, of course, some last century regular postage stamps in nice condition. Ned has a big start on those and has recently separated his mint and used stamps into two collections, seeking a choice example of each.

Ned, operator of River Road Dodge in Ripley, can't remember when he wasn't a stamp collector.

His daughter is also a collector and raids Ned's stock of duplicates.

Bill and Ned, fellow members of the American Philatelic Society, note that stamp-collecting can be expensive or cost no more than the face value of stamps you can always use on mail.

Great finds have been made in the sort of mail which you throw away every day, but you'd need specialized knowledge to note most of them. Meanwhile, you can't be too young or too old to collect a few stamps, miniature works of art (some inspired, some atrocious).
