


The Town of Gates will hold its annual Christmas Tree lighting ceremony at 6 p.m. Dec. 9th at the city hall.



## Educator



**DR. HERBERT C. ROBBINS**, of Dallas, Tex., brother of Dr. B.G. Robbins, of Ripley, estimates he has touched the lives of as many as 6,000 students in 40 years of teaching college level biology.

"One of the great things about this," said Dr. Robbins, "is hearing from one of your former students and learning how something you said in class had a positive influence on his/her life."

Dr. Robbins has retired as dean of the College of Natural Sciences and Mathematics after 15 years in that position (10 of those as head of Arts and Sciences).

This year Dr. Robbins, 65, celebrates his 25th anniversary on University Hill. He is taking a sabbatical for the fall semester and will return in the spring of 1995 as senior professor of biology at the college.

Growing up during the Depression years on a farm in Tennessee, Robbins developed a good work ethic early in his life.

He walked to a one-room country school where the teacher taught several grades. Dr. Robbins related in chapel recently that the teacher often had him teach the younger pupils, instilling in him the love of teaching and planting in his mind the idea of a teaching career.

He graduated magna cum laude with a bachelor's degree in biology and a minor in English from Union University in Jackson in 1951; in 1952 he received a master's degree in biology with a minor in education from George Peabody College for Teachers in Nashville. He earned his Ph.D. in biology in 1962 from Vanderbilt University.

After brief stints teaching high school biology and general science, Robbins began his full-time teaching career in 1955 at Belmont College, a Baptist school in Nashville. From 1957-60 he was a biology instructor at Vanderbilt University in Nashville. He was assistant professor of biology at Baylor University, 1960-63. Dr. Robbins became full professor and chairman of the biology department at Kentucky Southern College in Louisville in 1963.

When the Baptist school closed its doors due to financial difficulties in 1969, Dr. Robbins brought his family to Texas, where he joined the faculty of then Dallas Baptist College. He was promoted to chairman of the Division of Arts and Sciences in 1979; in 1982 he assumed the deanship of the Col-

Smoking during pregnancy may lower the child's IQ by a few points, a study at Cornell University suggests. Children in the study will be followed in future years.

Scarabration, an outpatient procedure similar to dermabrasion, can sometimes make fresh scars disappear, says a plastic surgeon at the College of Physicians and Surgeons in New York. The procedure is most effective at about eight weeks after surgery or injury.

Combination regimen of calcium supplements and slow-release, low-dose sodium fluoride seemed to restore bones weakened by osteoporosis in a test at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas. The treatment increased bone mass by 5 percent a year.

Healthy eating—and staying at one's ideal weight—seems to prevent the return of breast cancer. *Annals of Internal Medicine* reports that women more than 20 percent over ideal weight had 1.33 greater chance of recurrence than slimmer women.

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

## Pharmacy Topics

Can heavy exertion trigger a heart attack? Only if your body isn't used to it. Regular vigorous exercise cuts the risk way, way down, *The New England Journal of Medicine* reports.

Oral doses of the protein collagen seemed to reduce pain and swelling of severe rheumatoid arthritis within three months, researchers at Harvard Medical School reported.

Moderate exercise three to five times a week can cut as much as 10 points off both systolic and diastolic blood pressure readings, a study at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School found.

Chewable vitamin C tablets, taken often, can damage tooth enamel. Better, the *American Journal of Dentistry*, advises, rinse thoroughly after chewing tablets, or use the nonchewable kind.

Drug approved against cyclic thromin seems to work against acute strokes of chronic thrombin, the University of Texas Health Science Center reports. Included drug helps dissolve blood clots.







Safe rehydration treatment for diarrhea, especially for kids: 1/2 cup dry instant baby rice cereal, 2 cups bottled water and 1/4 tsp. salt. Carry the cereal and salt if you travel and get bottled water anywhere, say doctors at Boston City Hospital.

Another black mark for smoking: new Harvard study links it to colorectal cancer. Unlike the case with lung cancer and heart disease, the extra colorectal risk remains even after a person stops smoking.

According to a Boston University/Harvard study, previous use of oral contraceptives gives postmenopausal women 50 percent more protection against developing uterine cancer than women who never used the Pill.

Something in olive oil actually may change the chemical composition of high density lipoproteins, making them more fluid and better at pushing out the low density lipoproteins, a French study found.

It's easier to swallow a pill if you take a swallow of water or other fluid first; put the pill as far back on the tongue as possible.



Officials found that monoxide had built up from a faulty heating system and operation of fork-lifts without sufficient ventilation of the building.

The gas causes dizziness and headaches.

Workers complained of these Thursday morning. Several became unconscious.

The firm evacuated all of its workers about 10:30 a.m.

The plant manufactures fans, humidifiers, and vaporizers.

### A CHRISTMAS GIFT OF COMPASSION

Children are naturally curious about wildlife, and they are naturally con-

cerned when wildlife is threatened with extinction, so this Christmas you can give them the gift of compassion. To help children understand why many wildlife species are in danger, and why rescuing them is so important, the National Wildlife Federation (NWF) has published a

new book for young people, *Endangered Animals*. The publishers of *Ranger Rick* magazine and the nation's foremost experts in conservation education, NWF has selected in *Endangered Animals* the stories of Earth's rarest and most fascinating

creatures. Through these pages, young readers will learn about the humpback whale, which weighs an average 35 tons, and often carries as excess baggage 1,000 pounds of barnacles. An equally imposing creature from the reptile world is the Komodo dragon, a huge, carnivorous lizard found only in isolated parts of Indonesia.

In almost every case, the creatures in *Endangered Animals* have become threatened through human activity, and their stories are sometimes discouraging. But *Endangered Animals* offers more than grim reading. Here young people can also learn about the sometimes heroic efforts of conservationists who are trying to save endangered species.

Until the mid-1900s, for example, about 1,400 whooping cranes lived in isolated, marshy areas throughout North America. By 1941, after decades of decline, only 16 migrating cranes remained. The dramatic story of how scientists rescued the whooping crane from extinction will engage every young reader.



be as simple as seeing the *The Nutcracker Suite* or attending a holiday concert at the local school.



## 2 Held In Murder Of Halls Resident

Tony Hedges, 24, of 501 Church St., Halls, and Michael Maclin, 34, of Coleman St., Halls, are charged with first degree murder and aggravated burglary in the death of Eva Sue Willis, 36, at 678 W. Tigrett in Halls, about 6:30 p.m. Friday.

They are held under \$200,000 bond each.

Sheriff Ron Rickard reports the events as follows:

About 6 p.m., L. C. Cannon and Guy Lewis, sharing the home, received a phone call asking help for a friend's car reported stuck in mud.

### Pharmacy Topics

New clot-blocking drug, given to angioplasty patients, seems to thwart reclosing of the arteries (restenosis) and cut deaths and complications after surgery, according to a study at the Cleveland Clinic Foundation. One drawback: a high risk of bleeding.

Another weapon against restenosis from the Cleveland Clinic is the use of a wire-mesh stent—threaded to the blockage site and expanded with a balloon—that remains in place to keep the artery open.

The FDA now certifies mammography facilities, checking the training of personnel and the quality of equipment. Look for the FDA approval when you make an appointment.

Researchers at Rutgers University say black tea is just as good as green tea in preventing cancer—at least in rats. In a study exposing subjects to respiratory viruses, moderate drinkers who don't smoke were less likely to have cold symptoms than nondrinkers, the *American Journal of Public Health* reported.

### DISASTER ASSISTANCE

Producers who believe they have eligible production losses, including quality losses, may file for 1994 crop disaster assistance. Benefits are authorized for 1994 crop losses resulting from

damaging weather or related conditions occurring in 1994.

The sign-up period began Dec. 1, 1994 and ends Mar. 31, 1995. Applications are taken by appointment only. Contact the Farm Service Agency (formerly ASCS) at 635-9091 to schedule an appointment.

Producers, at a minimum, will need to furnish marketing agreements; marketing contracts; receipts for purchase of seed, fertilizer, chemicals, etc.; production records showing date of sale or exchange; disposition of crop; identify crop and season; and signature of buyer. All production records should be verifiable. If applicable, submit Federal Crop Insurance records showing policy number, appraisal or production and indemnity payments.

Producers are required to designate crop fields as harvested, unharvested or prevented. They should also describe weather conditions and dates that effected the crop; any other conditions; land preparation and equipment used; all production measures, amounts, rates and dates, planting dates and harvest dates.

In addition, producers of non-program crops, will need to furnish receipts for items used in the care and production of the crop.

Additional program details are available at the Lauderdale County Farm Service Agency.
