He also farmed and worked in factories. He was employed by Colonial Rubber, in Dyersburg, nine years.

Emphysema forced his retirement in 1990. He died Monday of last

week, in his home.

In 1927, he was "adopted" by the then year-old Ripley Rotary Club and boarded with families in Ripley, including the Crocketts, the Fergasons (Edgar and Lawson operated a drug store on the west side of the Square), and the McCallums, on Church

He recalls support from S. N. Anthony, Sanford Drake, Bob Kirkpatrick, R. S. Maclin, Sr., Dan Majors, Solon Neighbors, C. C. Partee, and William Tucker III.

Rotary saw him through sixth grade in Ripley and sent him to Nashville to graduate from the Tennessee Industrial School.

He worked in Memphis as a mechanic, came back to Barr in 1948, but soon returned to Memphis, after his home burned.

He returned to Barr, in 1955, for good.

His wife, Pauline, died in December. Their daughter, Paula (Mrs. Kenny) Phillips, employed by Anderson Hickey in Halls, was unable to attend Ripley Rotary's meeting Tuesday, but their son, Dana, was on hand as his father presented to Craig Fitzhugh, current Rotary president, an unrestricted gift of \$10,000.

Craig assured Mr. Freeman that Rotary would use the gift to carefully promote the Rotary ideal which had meant so much to Mr. Freeman -- "Service Above Self."

DEAR PARENT - YOUR CHILD NEEDS YOUR HELP!

You probably know that our student enrollment has increased and our schools are overcrowded. In addition, a new state law mandates that we reduce every class size by five (5) students. I am writing to ask your help by doing three specific things.

- Those of you who live in our cities need to contact your aldermen and ask them to allow the schools to receive all of the 3/4¢ sales tax increase, if a proposed 3/4¢ sales tax referendum passes. The School Board and I feel that 75¢ on each \$100 we spend will affect us less than a property tax increase. (We are not asking the cities to give up ANY of the revenue they are now receiving, just the new revenue from the proposed sales tax); a list of aldermen is attached.
- To urge EVERY PARENT to contact your county commissioners to ask them to support the 3/4¢ sales tax in order to avoid any property tax increase:(a list of commissioners is attached); and
- To ask you to vote for and support the sales tax when the referendum is presented

On October 5th your child should have brought home a letter from me concerning the need to add school facilities in our county. I'm sure most of you know that we have had a substantial increase in our student population which has caused overcrowding in our schools. The Board of Education has conducted a thorough study of the problem and has recommended that we build new high schools in Ripley and Halls. We would, of course, continue to use all of the school buildings we now have but convert the current high schools into middle schools. Our plan would give us four (4) schools in Ripley and four (4)

Lowering pupil/teacher ratio has proven to be one of the most effective ways to improve education because the teacher can spend more individual time with each child and it reduces discipline problems in the classroom. The state will provide the funds needed to employ these additional teachers, but we must provide the additional classrooms.

The Board of Education has recommended that this building program be funded by using existing sales tax construction revenue, as much state education money as allowed, and a local 3/4¢ sales tax increase. Lauderdale County sales tax is currently lower than all other surrounding counties. Most of us already pay this slightly higher sales tax every time we shop in Dyersburg, Tipton County, Jackson, or Memphis and these other counties keep our tax money.

The County Commissioners must approve this referendum and in order for the schools to receive all of this 3/4¢ sales tax revenue, the four (4) cities (Ripley, Halls, Henning and Gates) must agree to give all of this new revenue to the schools if the referendum passes. The cities must agree because there is a state law which says that all local sales tax collected within a city is equally divided between the city government and county schools. This law was needed because many cities in Tennessee operate a separate city school system (such as Memphis, Covington and Dyersburg) and they would need their share to operate their city schools. As you know, there are no city school systems in Lauderdale County. All the students in our county, including those who live in the cities, attend Lauderdale County schools.

I have already asked the City of Ripley to allow all of the new revenue to be used by our schools if the voters approve the referendum but they have not yet agreed to this. I have not met with the other cities to ask for their approval. As I stated before, we are not asking the cities to give us any of the sales tax money they now receive - just the revenue from the new sales tax if the tax is approved by the voters.

Our overcrowding problem and the new state laws leave us no choice but to build additional classrooms. The only question is - HOW DO WE FUND IT? If the cities, county, and voters do not agree to the sales tax proposal which the school board has recommended, there is no other revenue source to turn to except a property tax increase. It would take a property tax increase of \$ 1.60 to fund the proposed building program. However, the School Board strongly believes that a 3/4¢ sales tax increase with NO property tax increase is better and fairer than raising property taxes.

Ninety (90) percent of the nearly 800 responses I received from parents said they supported the proposed construction plan. Many of the remaining 10% said they would not make a commitment until they knew where the money would be coming from. OUR PROPOSAL IS A 3/4¢ SALES TAX INCREASE WITH NO PROPERTY TAX INCREASE

BUT.....WE MUST HAVE YOUR HELP!!!!!

As you can imagine, some citizens who have no children currently in our schools are telling the city aldermen and county commissioners that they don't want any additional tax for any reason. The fact remains we will have to fund some type of building program and we feel a mere 75¢ for every \$ 100 you spend will effect you much less than higher property taxes.

We are fortunate to have many excellent teachers in Lauderdale County. However, another problem that has plagued our schools is the loss of good teachers to surrounding counties because of our salary schedule. According to state records, our average teacher salary is \$ 4,554 per year less than the average teacher salary in Tennessee. If the 3/4¢ sales tax is approved, we will be able to use our annual increases from state funds to help pay for our construction. This will enable us to use part of the new sales tax revenue to increase salaries. Currently, Lauderdale County is ranked 93rd of the 95 counties in local taxes spent per child for education.

We collect only \$ 406 from local revenue per student while Tipton County collects \$ 620 per child, Haywood receives \$ 715 per child, and Dyer County has \$ 1202 per child from local taxes. It's easy to see that if we had the same \$ 620 per student Tipton County has, this extra \$ 214 per child would provide the funds we need to meet the state teacher salary average.

Our children are our greatest asset and our greatest hope for the future. They need and deserve adequate facilities and the best teachers available. I am doing everything I possibly can to provide these facilities and teachers, but unless our elected officials hear from you, our parents, these problems will never be adequately resolved or we will be forced to substantially increase property taxes in order to comply with the state law.

For the sake of your children, and to avoid a substantial property tax increase, please contact your aldermen and or county commissioners within the next few days.

Methotrexate, the anticancer drug, has proved effective against resistant juvenile rheumatoid arthritis, a study at Children's Hospital Medical Center, Cincinnati, found. Low doses of the drug were able to reduce pain, swelling and

Vitamins were able to cut cancer deaths in a large-scale study in China. Over a five-year period, patients who got beta carotene, vitamin E and selenium had a 13 percent drop in cancer deaths, and an overall drop in death risk of 9 percent. Researchers at Harvard Medical School note a correlation

between high levels of homocystine, an amino acid, and a higher risk of heart attack. Folate, a B vitamin, can lower homocystine levels to normal, but doctors don't know yet how that affects heart attack risk.
