Widening Of Old 51 N. Of Ripley OK'd

Mayor Richard Douglas told Ripley's city board meeting Monday that agreement had been reached with the state to widen Hwy. 209 (Old U.S. 51) for 400 feet north and south of the road to the west, serving Marvin Windows.

The state had proposed widening the road from Webb St. (at Northcrest Community Center in Ripley) to north of the North Industrial Park, but there were objections about drainage.

John Meibaum was appointed to the board of Ripley Power and Light Company, succeeding Jim Seeley.

Mayor Douglas said the city's fire rating, for insurance, had improved from 6 to 5, which should reduce fire insurance premiums for city residents.

He said the Bank of Ripley had donated a building on which it had foreclosed, on South Main, the second building south of Washington, to add to a block the city is acquiring for re-development.

He said Ripley is on a list of nine sites under consideration by the state for a new Area Vocational-Technical School.

He said purchase of the 165-acre Walker property, south of Ripley, for industrial development, is near completion.

"When I called, and when I came to California to learn from them, I was treated like trusted and respected friend, not like the stranger that I was. They gave me time when they had no time, and patient answers to my questions, and ideas and encouragement. And affection.

"On my last day at Levitt and Quinn, I noticed that Ziva was wearing a beautiful painted-bead necklace. I told her how beautiful the necklace was, and I wondered she had collected it during her world travels. She didn't remember where she got it but thanked me for the compli-

"That afternoon, as she left for the day, she wished me a safe trip, and then she handed me a little red metal box, shaped like a heart. "A memento," she said, in typical laconic style.
