## Widening Of Old 51 N. Of Ripley OK'd

Mayor Richard Douglas told Ripley's city board meeting Monday that agreement had been reached with the state to widen Hwy. 209 (Old U.S. 51) for 400 feet north and south of the road to the west, serving Marvin Windows.

The state had proposed widening the road from Webb St. (at Northcrest Community Center in Ripley) to north of the North Industrial Park, but there were objections about drainage.

John Meibaum was appointed to the board of Ripley Power and Light Company, succeeding Jim Seeley.

Mayor Douglas said the city's fire rating, for insurance, had improved from 6 to 5, which should reduce fire insurance premiums for city residents.

He said the Bank of Ripley had donated a building on which it had foreclosed, on South Main, the second building south of Washington, to add to a block the city is acquiring for re-development.

He said Ripley is on a list of nine sites under consideration by the state for a new Area Vocational-Technical School.

He said purchase of the 165-acre Walker property, south of Ripley, for industrial development, is near completion.



Six panels of judges chose the McMinnville unit for the award from among 52 plants competing.  
The McMinnville facility completed 100 capital improvements totaling \$2,100,000; recycled 200 tons of corrugated, computer, and bond paper; cut emissions from volatile organic compounds about 35%; and eliminated use of ozone-depleting chemicals.

## Cold Creek Dairy Facing Prison Food Svc. Shift

The state legislature has approved a plan to employ a commercial business to prepare 19,000,000 meals a year, for 49 state institutions, including state parks, in Nashville, and truck them, chilled and vacuum-packed, to the institutions and parks for reheating.  
The institutions include the Cold Creek Correctional Facility (the former Fort Pillow Prison Farm) on Highway 87 west of Henning.  
The state expects to save at least \$3,500,000 on a 3-year contract totaling about \$100,000,500.  
The winner of the contract will have to spend about \$15,000,000 to construct a central kitchen on the grounds of the now closed State Penitentiary in Nashville, which would take about a year, and then phase in the service over about six months.  
The state will lease the kitchen, with an option to buy it.  
Savings are proposed to come from volume purchasing and processing of foods.  
Competing for the contract, to be awarded by the state's Building Commission, are Belz Enterprises, of Memphis, teamed with an international firm, Canteen; Cumberland Bend Associates, a limited partnership including Marriott Corp.; and Old Hickory Foodservice Management.  
Assistant Finance Commissioner Jerry Preston says the program will end 166 of 388 jobs for skilled inmates of prisons, and 40 jobs for non-inmates.  
Of special interest at Cold Creek, depending on final terms of the contract, now being negotiated with the three bidders, is the fate of its dairy.





gracious throwing parties for society or working for the poor.

Ziva is a genius of systems, able to reduce complexity to its lowest common denominator and to find the way to get the greatest possible effect from the least expenditure of time and precious assets. She designed the Levitt and Quinn system and keeps it current, modified and super-efficient. She also fundraises, oversees, and mothers.

"She gave me so much information about how to run a family law center that it should fill a textbook. But somehow she conveys it in reduced form, a few sentences, a few invitations to watch, a few questions answered succinctly, after she has thought for a moment.

A medical geneticist at Indiana University, in a long-term study of twins, found that moderate drinking - about 1 or 2 drinks a day - seemed to improve memory and problem-solving abilities.

Laboratory tests look positive for a form of calcium phosphate that can cause the discomfort of sensitive teeth. The tooth-building material dissolves in the mouth and crystallizes on the teeth. Special toothpaste and chewing gum may be available this year.

Giving surgical patients morphine before the operation seems to lessen pain after, say doctors at the London School of Medicine. Intravenous dose was most effective.

Beta-carotene, a fat-soluble vitamin, is best absorbed with a meal. Tight control of blood sugar levels in insulin-dependent diabetics will slow the progression of eye disease by 20% and kidney disease by half, the journal "The Lancet," reported. Large-scale U.S. study notes the new regimen produces a higher risk of hypoglycemia.

## Anderson Hickey Finds Fire Extinguisher Fund

Ron Cannon, human resource manager for Anderson Hickey in Halls, says he "stood by helplessly and watched as a small truck caught on fire, off Hwy. 51, and burnt completely up while others, including a local police officer, were unable to do anything other than direct traffic, because none of us had a fire extinguisher in our cars."

"While standing there, thanking God that it was not my car, I began to think, what if there had been someone inside, and we couldn't get them out because of the flames."

"My thoughts were that it is bad enough that none of us had a fire extinguisher in our personal vehicle (we all should have), but what seems worse to me is that our police vehicles do not carry them, either."

"I surveyed our Ripley, Halls, and Lauderdale County Sheriff's Department to find out that none of our police vehicles have extinguishers, and, according to the chief of each department, it is only because of the cost of the extinguishers."

"I couldn't help but think, that but for the cost of about a \$30 extinguisher, a car or maybe even a life could be saved if all of our police cars had an extinguisher."

"They are often first on the scene and might prevent a re-occurrence of the event I had witnessed."

"For less than \$1,500, we can outfit every Lauderdale County police car with portable fire extinguishers."

"Is that too expensive for the possibilities that can occur if we don't react?"

With the full backing of Joe Sorrells, plant manager, Ron is asking local industries and businesses to recognize this need, and, he says, "let's take care of it ourselves."

"We don't need to get government involved, let's just fix it."

"It could be you or your family, the next time."


