

Up to date teaching tools and updated courses are essential but nothing can ever take the place of teaching skills, concern, compassion, patience, and love of children. These will always be the key ingredients in what makes up great teaching. We are truly fortunate to have an abundance of great teachers in Lauderdale County who possess all these ingredients.

# Classrooms

Lauderdale County Schools are involved in the development of a major technology initiative developed by The Department of Education Office of Education Technology. This initiative, the Tennessee Education Network (TEN) Project, is divided into two parts. The first part, the Tennessee Education Network Student Information System, will link all school systems in the state and serve both the local school system and the State

Department as an information management system. The second part of the TEN project, the 21st Century Classroom Project, has brought structional technology into 15 classrooms in Lauderdale County. This month, six additional classrooms have been named t receive \$20,000 worth of com-

puter hardware and software enhance standard instructional programs. Funding was based on the school system's percentage of statewide ADM. Although the state is funding the majority o each classroom, Lauderdale County is required to match 15% of the funding.

Each teacher in Lauderdale County was given the opportunity to apply for one of these 21st Century Classrooms by submitting a proposal for how they would use the technology in their classroom. 58 teachers submitted proposals for the first 15 classrooms, named in Sept. '93, and 53 submitted a proposal for the six new classrooms, named in May '94. A Selection Committee reviewed each application and placed the new classrooms across the county. Teachers were selected on the basis of interest in technology

County-wide this is a total of 21 classrooms.







# Jury Frees Leggett Of Rape Charges

After a full afternoon and morning of testimony and argument, a Circuit Court jury Thursday of last week quickly found Kenneth "Kenny" Leggett, 34, of 157 Tucker, Ripley, not guilty of two charges of rape of a mentally retarded boy.

Before the trial, Mrs. Elizabeth Rice, of Somerville, district attorney general, dropped a third charge she brought against Leggett, of statutory rape (sex with someone under 18, with or without consent of the minor).

also sought, unsuccessfully, a stay (postponement) of the trial from a state Court of

At age 17, the alleged victim, a special education student in Ripley High School, was sent to the Ripley Police Dept. in June, 1993, by the state Job Training program, as one of three young people employed there for summer jobs.

Two girls were assigned clerical duties -- typing, filing, etc. The boy, who testified that he could only write his name and the word "fish" (his hobby, collecting tropical fish) was assigned janitorial duties -- washing police cars, mopping floors, etc.

All three were supervised by Leggett, a 9-year Ripley policeman, in charge of records and training, after having been a guard at Fort Pillow State Prison and a police officer

The boy failed to report for work in July. When he turned up later, Leggett refused his further employment.


The boy testified that he was seeking extra money when he went to Leggett's home, to do yard work.

He said Leggett answered the door in his underwear, invited him inside the house, and told perform oral sex on Leggett. him to make himself comfortable

"I took all my clothes off," the boy testified, and when Leggett returned to the room, the boy

testified that he suggested that h He testified that this was followed by anal penetration by Leggett, using a condom. (Continued On Page 5)

Jury Frees Leggett Of Rape Charges

After a full afternoon and morning of testimony and argument, a Circuit Court jury Thursday of last week quickly found Kenneth "Kenny" Leggett, 34, of 157 Tucker, Ripley, not guilty of two charges of rape of a mentally retarded boy.

Before the trial, Mrs. Elizabeth Rice, of Somerville, district attorney general, dropped a third charge she brought against Leggett, of statutory rape (sex with someone under 18, with or without consent of the minor)

(postponement) of the trial from a state Court of Appeals.

At age 17, the alleged victim, a special education student in Ripley High School, was sent to the Ripley Police Dept. in June, 1993, by the state Job Training program, as one of three young people employed there for summer jobs.

Two girls were assigned clerical duties -- typing, filing, etc. The boy, who testified that he could only write his name and the word "fish" (his hobby, collecting tropical fish) was assigned janitorial duties -- washing police cars, mopping

All three were supervised by Leggett, a 9-year Ripley policeman, in charge of records and training, after having been a guard at Fort Pillow State Prison and a police officer

The boy failed to report for work in July. When he turned up later, Leggett refused his further employment.

The boy testified that he was seeking extra money when he went to Leggett's home, to do yard work.

On the witness stand, he first denied he had returned to home, but repetitive questioning by Mrs. Rice, said he had gone there again, a few weeks later, after he was 18, and that Leggett again had anal sex with him.

The boy testified that Leggett later paid him \$5.

The boy made no public complaint about any of this until his guardian, Patsy Johnson, who operates the Corner Quik Stop at Ashport, told authorities, months after the boy's alleged sex with Leggett, that she had found Herbert Harrington, 47, of Covington, who operates video stores in Henning and Munford, unclothed and running from a room in the home she provides for the boy, while administering his government payments.

#### D.A. Abandons Rape Charges

Six months after the crimes alleged, and three days before Herbert Harrington, 47, of Covington, was to face trial Friday in Circuit Court in Ripley on two counts of rape of a retarded teen-ager, Mrs. Elizabeth Rice, of Somerville, dismissed the widely publicized charges.

She said the alleged victim, 18, was reluctant to testify.

He testified, in the trial of Kenny Leggett, Ripley police officer facing two rape charges. that when he went to Leggett's home, in Ripley, on the teenager's proposal to mow Leggett's lawn, "I took all off all my clothes" and proposed and performed oral sex on Leggett, followed by anal penetration by Leggett, without any force or threat other than the doors were locked and he feared that Leggett, a policeman, had a pistol.

Despite any such fears, he testified that he returned to Leggett's home a second time for more of the same.

Within an hour, the jury acquitted Leggett of the two charges of rape.

**Pharmacy Topics** 



Two mutator genes that seem to be responsible for as many as 95 percent of all cases of hereditary colon cancers have been identified by research teams at Johns Hopkins Oncology Center in Baltimore and at the Dana Farber Institute in Boston, along with other researchers.

New treatment for varicose veins, the photoderm, uses a broad spectrum of laser frequencies, emitting more light than ordinary lasers. Now in final clinical testing, the 10-minute treatment may be ready by the end of the year.

Another tick-borne disease, erlichiosis, has been reported in the southeastern United States. Ticks also support the microbes that carry Rocky Mountain spotted fever, babeosis and other diseases.

A new drug, rulizole, seems to slow the progression of amytrophic lateral sclerosis, popularly known as Lou Gehrig's disease. The nerve disease robs people of muscle control, ng in time those for breathing and swallowing. The test study was conducted in Paris.
