# Milton Hamilton Jr., Launches Campaign For Tennessee Public Service Commission Seat

Milton Hamilton Jr., Union City businessman and senator from Tennessee's 24th Senatorial District, today formally announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for the Tennessee Public Service Commission. He will be seeking the West Tennessee seat on the three member body.

A 28-year veteran of Tennessee's General Assembly in both the House and Senate, Hamilton said he brings to his quest for the PSC post "a strong desire to utilize my experience in dealing with issues facing Tennessee in a positive and productive fashion."

Hamilton said by the time the PSC campaign is over, "I will have served the people of my district for nearly 30 years and will have accomplished for the district perhaps most that I can effectively do. It is my desire to try and use the experience and knowledge I have been able to gather over those years about how state government operates for the welfare of everyone in Tennessee.

"I have children who live and work in Tennessee and several grandchildren who are growing up and being educated in Tennessee schools. It is my desire that the opportunities they, and the other children and young people of Tennessee have, be even greater than those I've been privileged too. My commitment is serving within the framework of the Tennessee Public Service Commission's responsibilities to see the state develop a strong economic program utilizing the infrastructure the General Assembly and the governors of the state have tried to build over the last several years."

The PSC candidate said he has intense interest in telecommunications and seeing the applications of the state's long-range plan for "electronic super highways" become a reality. "We must forge new partnerships and new cooperation between industry, business, government, education and consumers to position Tennessee as a global competitor. "We are in the race at that level as we consider the economic impact of what is happening with the relocation of business and industry."

The candidate holds numerous leadership positions in the General Assembly including serving as deputy speaker and as chairman of the Calendar Committee, which schedules debate and action on all legislation before that body. He has gained numerous awards as "Legislator Of The Year" from various organizations. A retired officer from the Tennessee National Guard, Hamilton has long been active in his community. He still lives in the Community Pride area near Union City, the community where he was born and reared. He attended Memphis State University and graduated from Murray State Univer-

# Brown, Henning Suspect, Flees

Jabar Brown, 19, of 171 Barbee, Ripley, jailed in Ripley on charges of aggravated robbery in Henning, escaped through a rest-room window Friday.

Mark Roy, sheriff's investigator, says the case involves these allegations:

- Jan. 20th, Brown held a .22 pistol to the head of a clerk in Midway Market in Henning, at the first north traffic signal, taking about \$300, while Brennan Copeland, 18, of Hwy. 87 near Henning, and a Henning juvenile kept watch. Copeland is under \$10,000 bond on a charge of armed robbery. Roy says defendants say the pistol was thrown into a creek near a relative's home. Efforts to recover it have failed.

-- Feb. 4th, James Williams, operating the former Escue's Grocery across the street from City Hall in Henning, was accosted by Brown, wielding a .380 Jennings automatic pistol, as Williams was entering his pick-up truck after closing the store. Williams punched Brown in the face, and he fled. Henning police gave pursuit but did not run down Williams' assailant.

-- Then, Feb. 5th, William Kemp, 18, Lester Scott, 18, and a juvenile, all of Covington, drove in Scott's car to Rosie's Bar, west of the main traffic signal in Henning. Behind the night-spot, shots were fired by the juvenile and by Brown. Scott, injured in his right shoulder, was treated in Baptist Hospital Lauderdale and sent to Memphis. A .380 Jennings pistol was found at the scene.

A high school baseball umpire, he was chosen to umpire in the 1993 state tournament.



Studies at Harvard School of Public Health and Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston suggest that taking 100 IU of Vitamin E a day may reduce the incidence of heart disease in both men and women. People on anticoagulants or with eye disease should check with their doctors.

Study at Boston University School of Medicine found that male smokers are four times more likely to become impotent than those who don't smoke, because of damage to blood vessels.

In a group of more than 4,000 elderly women, researchers found the risk of stroke paralleled exactly the degree of osteoporosis. Writing in "Modern Medicine", they explained that osteoporosis does not cause stroke, but that both conditions reflect low calcium and estrogen.

Researchers at 17 hospitals around the country are testing orlistat, a compound that seems to neutralize a fatprocessing enzyme in the abdomen, thus reducing fat absorption. But don't get too excited. You can't take enough of



It's not only kids who are hyperactive. 'Psychiatrist at UCLA and the University of Utah found many adults--often parents of hyper youngsters--also suffer from attention deficit hyperactivity disorder. Similar medications and therapy work for the adults, too.

Experimental drug, carboxyamidotrizaole (CA), was developed at the National Cancer Institute. It inhibits cells from using calcium and seems to stop tumor growth. Side effects are milder than for standard chemotherapy drugs, doctors report.

Arginine butyrate, a drug now being tested, shows promise against sickle cell disease. It helps the body continue to make the fetal hemoglobin that prevents anemia and sickling, the "New England Journal of Medicine" reports.

The best treatment for back pain, say doctors in Sweden and at the University of Wisconsin Medical School, is exercise therapy. It works better than bed rest for pain and improves function as well.

Estrogen replacement therapy after menopause seems to reduce the risk of a woman's getting Alzheimer's disease or make the symptoms milder if she does, scientists at UCLA found

A new, genetically engineered drug to treat cystic fibrosis has recieved approval from the Food and Drug Administration. Pulmozyme is not a cure, but it reduces the risk of respiratory tract infections, improves lung function and reduces the need for hospitalization.

Ballon angioplasty to clear blocked arteries is just as safe and effective as bypass operations for patients with advanced coronary artery disease, according to a study at Emory University. One drawback: half the angioplasty. patients need a second procedure.

Small electric shocks eased the discomfort of nausea in experiments at Pennsylvania State University. The device used in the test delivered current to a classic acupuncture point above the wrist. A battery-powered wristband should be on the market soon.


