



Candidate Ripley Board Holds Stance On Firemen

As in last month's board meeting, Ripley aldermen voted 4-2 Monday against a proposal by Mayor Richard Douglas to hire more full-time firemen and reduce the use of volunteer firemen.

Despite reading of a letter from Ripley industries favoring the change, only Billy Poston and Jon Pavletic supported the proposal. Dr. Tommy Dunavant, Lawson Elder, Billie Ann Hendren, and Pete Lawrence remained unconvinced.

"I have been stopped," he says, "by many friends and asked to please run for the position of sheriff.

"After much consideration about the needs of Lauderdale County, I have decided to place my name on the ballot for the Aug. 4th election. The rest will be up to you, the voters.

Crain Enters Sheriff's Race As Ballot Closes

Just before the dead-line, at noon Thursday of last week, to qualify for Aug. 4th balloting, Jerry Crain turned the sheriff's race into a 6-way contest.

Three other courthouse positions are contested, plus a State Representative seat:

-- Sheriff Milford "Pop" Durham lost his bid for re-election to Crain, in 1990, by 15 votes.

Crain resigned Oct. 12, 1992, after he pleaded guilty in U.S. District Court to a single criminal rights violation (a federal misdemeanor, not a felony, and not barring him from future service as sheriff).

Crain's chief deputy, Charles Ted Sutton, was elected by the County Commission to complete Crain's unexpired term. Sutton

Durham is running again this year, as is his predecessor as sheriff, Joe B. O'Steen, who lost to Durham in 1982, by 1530 votes. Also running are two veteran Highway Patrolmen, Ron Rickard and Raymond L. Smith.

-- Circuit Court Clerk Richard Jennings is opposed for re-election, for his 4th term, by his former assistant, Anita Elder Trosper. -- Unopposed for re-election are County Court Clerk Vernon McBride, Jr., for his 8th term, and County Trustee Paul Meadows,

-- In the Democratic primary, Craig Fitzhugh, president of the Bank of Ripley, seeks nomination for the state House of Representatives, to succeed State Rep. Floyd Crain, of Ripley, to represent Lauderdale and Haywood Counties, plus a part of Hardeman County. His opponent is Charles Morrow, of Hardeman

Jean Carney, of Brownsville, has filed to face the winner. She plans to be an independent candidate on the Nov. 2nd general

Carney ran, unsuccessfully, against Crain in 1988 She lost by 4,093 to 1,104.

Jim Sasser A Report for Tennesseans

A MORE CAUTIOUS APPROACH

Tennesseans trying to borrow money to finance a new house or their children's education have probably felt the constraint of higher interest rates. In an effort to hold down inflation, the Federal Reserve has raised short-term interest rates several times this year. Unfortunately, this has hurt working Americans more than it has helped them.

A recent report by the U.S. Department of Commerce revealed that there has been no sign of accelerating inflation. Prices paid by Americans in the first quarter rose by only 2.3 percent, the smallest increase of a broad inflation index

Working Americans feel the pinch when the Fed raises short-term interest rates. Borrowing money to buy a home or a car becomes much more difficult. Financing a child's education takes an even greater toll. Businessmen and women feel the pinch when they try to borrow money to finance new ventures

We all agree that we need to keep inflation in check. But to take unnecessary re-emptive strikes only stifles what appears to be a healthy economy gaining

Late last month I wrote a letter to Fed Chairman Alan Greenspan warning him that any further action to raise interest rates could be very risky. We should remain watchful and take action only after we have seen evidence of impending inflation. In short, I advised Mr. Greenspan to follow common sense: If it isn't

Last year, we passed a deficit reduction bill that put us on the right track toward lower deficits and an expanding economy. We are beginning to see the results of our action. Real federal spending on goods and services declined at an annual rate of 12 percent, the third consecutive quarterly drop.


