Turnip Greens Told To Nation

For the first time in the 76-year history of *The Wall Street Journal*, Lauderdale County made its front page Monday.

Reporting, in its lead article, abuses of federal aid through the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, the *Journal* said that this county's turnip-green acreage "jumped seven-fold last year, to 1,221 acres, far more than the nearby Memphis market can digest."

"In one Arkansas county," the *Journal* said, "the government is interested in how two [county] committee members got \$100,000 each in aid for turnip greens, a crop barely grown there a few years ago."

The *Journal* article focused on Mitchell County, Ga., which led the nation with 10,000 acres reported planted in squash, 20 times the acreage in the 1980s.

"Many growers were planting squash betting they wouldn't have to pick it," the *Journal* says.

"Some planted at weird times, sowed cheap seed, or didn't irrigate during dry spells."

"The payoff was federal crop disaster aid that was far more lucrative than selling squash."

"The growers -- mostly cotton and peanut farmers -- reaped millions of dollars of relief for a crop many normally don't touch."

Halls Garbage Pact Still Held

Chancellor Dewey C. Whittenton, of Bolivar, holding court in Ripley Tuesday, extended an injunction forbidding the Town of Halls to proceed with garbage collection plans, opposed by the Halls Business Association.

The chancellor said he planned to have the matter heard by a judge from outside his district. No date was set for further hearing.

Tenn. Highway Patrol checkpoints at three locations in the county, from 6:30 p.m. Friday, to 1:30 a.m., found little changed from previous results, Oct. 14th.

Checking 315 vehicles, officers found 138 drivers not wearing seat-belts, arrested seven for driving while intoxicated, and cited three to appear in court for driving with children not properly restrained.

Sasser Caravan Visiting County

Jim Sasser, Democratic candidate for re-election as U.S. Senator, plans a campaign stop at Sir Charles Restaurant in Ripley from 9:30 to 10:15 a.m. Tuesday, public invited.

He will be accompanied, in a caravan, by Gov. Ned McWhorter, U.S. Rep. John Tanner, who is also a candidate for re-election, and Sara Kyle, candidate for the Public Service Commission.

The caravan is scheduled to leave Covington at 9 and stop in Ripley, Dyersburg (11:30 a.m., Courthouse Square), Union City, Martin, McKenzie, and Paris.

Phil Bredesen, Democratic candidate for governor, tentatively plans to join the rally in Paris, which begins at 7:30 p.m.

Cover Planting Penalty Eased

The Soil Conservation Service has extended planting deadlines for over-seeded or no-till drilled wheat to Nov. 10, for over-seeded rye to Nov. 10, and for no-till drilled rye to Nov. 20.

U.S. Sen. Jim Sasser, who contacted the SCS on behalf of farmers, applauds the decision.

"Higher than normal rain-falls delayed the cotton harvest," he noted. "This extension gives farmers the time they need to get cover planted on those fields without penalty."

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Pharmacy Topics



Digital mammography—using electronics instead of film—permits clearer images, possibly with less radiation. FDA approval of the test may come some time next year.

The same bacterium that frequently causes digestive ulcers—the very common helicobacter pylori—also seems to raise the risk of a rare stomach cancer, say scientist at Stanford University.

An effective aerosol-delivery system for insulin is being tested at Johns Hopkins and other hospitals. More clinical tests are expected.

There may be a correlation between caffeine intake and miscarriage. In a McGill University study, the risk of pregnancy loss went up 1.22 times for every 100 mg. of caffeine—or cup of coffee—per day.

A birth-control pill for men may be available soon. It's actually a blood pressure medication, Nintedipine; quite by accident, doctors found it interfered with patients' fertility. Further testing is being done on proper dosage and safety of use.

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
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

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

Cooking Corner

Five A Day: The Low-Fat Way
(NAPS)—The National Cancer Institute (NCI) and the Produce for Better Health Foundation have a program, "5 A Day for Better Health," that encourages Americans to eat five or more servings of fruits and vegetables each day. Leading health authorities agree that eating more fruits and vegetables can help Americans stay healthy and may reduce their cancer risk.



Add minced garlic and pepper to the liquid in which the vegetables are being cooked.

Unfortunately, a good number of Americans eat vegetables cooked in some kind of fat while others add fat—butter, margarine, cheese or cream sauce—to already cooked vegetables.

To keep vegetables good-tasting, but low in fat, try some of these seasoning ideas:

- Squeeze juice from a fresh lemon, orange or lime over hot, cooked vegetables.
- Add minced garlic and pepper to the liquid in which the vegetables are being cooked.
- Stir-fry vegetables using low-fat cooking spray instead of oil.
- Sprinkle on fresh or dried herbs before serving.
- Toss warm vegetables with thinly sliced green onions or chopped parsley.
- For a Mexican flavor, stir in some salsa and chopped fresh cilantro before serving.

Remember to eat five a day—the low fat way.



In Crump Stadium Friday, Wooddale quarterback Terrance Tillman got 300 yards on 30 carries and posted a record 50-point night in Shelby County grid history, running TDs of 3, 1, 4, 65, 5, and 37 yards, taking TD passes from Demetrius Leach for 51 and 27 yards, and adding a 2-point conversion pass.

County Accorded Nashville Notice

Larry Daughtrey, political columnist for The Nashville Tennessean, issue Oct. 30th wrote this positive note on the Lauderdale County Schools:

"Pages from a political notebook:

"In all the negativism of this year's campaigns, it's easy to overlook the positive.

"Last week in Ripley, in dirt-

poor Lauderdale County on the edge of the Mississippi River, school superintendent Bobby Webb got some good news indeed.

"It was a summation of the recent value-added school report cards. Lauderdale County now ranks in the top 10 of Tennessee's 139 school systems in gains in all five rankings in language, reading, math, science and social studies.

"Moreover, the schools soared above both the state and national averages in all five categories, by as much as 24 percentage points above the national norm in language.

"Webb confesses to a little uncertainty about how that happened. He wants to talk to other top schools in the state to find out what they have in common.

"School funding has increased by 73% in the last three years, thanks to the new equalization formula. The system has hired 36 new teachers to reduce classroom size. An extra half hour of instruction time has been added to the school day. The system's racial mix is 38% black, and blacks are doing as well as whites.

"Clearly, something good is happening in Lauderdale County. The solution to all the problems of crime, welfare and jobs the politicians are talking about is developing in the classrooms there."

Crash Tuesday North Of Halls



Fitzhugh Site Is Chosen For New Ripley School

The county Board of Education decided Thursday of last week to purchase, for \$125,000, from Ripley banker James R. Fitzhugh, 25 acres on which to construct a new elementary school.

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Hutcherson Wins State Approval For Landfill

After 15 months of controversy, the state has issued a permit to Wiley Hutcherson/West Tennessee Enterprises, Inc., of Halls, to construct and operate a Class I land-fill between Double Bridges and Nankipoo.

The Division of Solid Waste Management of the Department of Environment and Conservation issued the permit Monday of last week.

Protests from local residents resulted in a public hearing Aug. 12th of last year.

The state accepted comments from the public through Aug. 19th of last year.

The state's responses to comments received have been obtained by this newspaper.

COMMENT 1: Will Mr. Hutcherson be notified in advance of inspections to be made by state inspectors? How often are inspections made?

RESPONSE: Unannounced inspections are made at least monthly, as required by regulation; however, more frequent inspections and follow-up inspections are made if problems exist.

2. The local zoning board has yet to zone the area for land-filling. Will this affect the state's decision to permit the site?

3. My, and our, major concerns are the roads not being adequate to handle the increased traffic and big trucks. Roads are too narrow and bridges not strong enough for heavy garbage trucks.

4. What will prevent Mr. Hutcherson from selling the land-fill, and do we or the state have any control over this? How will this affect the permit?

5. We've lived here a long time and are proud of our community. The land-fill will decrease our property values and discourage good homes to be built. No one wants to live close to a dump.

This does not absolutely necessitate a synthetic liner in the final cap, because it does not experience the same hydraulic head as the bottom liner system. Therefore, infiltration can be less for the final cover system, due to

the lack of hydraulic head. This application provides for a final cover system which meets the current regulatory standard.

In regard to gas build-up under the final cap, the present application includes a passive gas ventilation system, which is an acceptable arrangement by the current Tennessee regulations. A gas migration layer and an active gas recovery system are not required at this time.

15: Specify depths of proposed ground water and gas monitoring wells.

R: Ground water monitoring wells: It is not feasible to specify the depths of proposed ground water monitoring wells, as this must be determined by a field geologist upon installation of each individual well. Specific locations of wells occasionally require adjustment in the field to accommodate site conditions, terrain, etc., and ground water elevations can fluctuate, depending on such factors.

Gas monitoring wells: The construction plans indicate that the final depth of the proposed gas monitoring wells will be determined by the Division of Solid Waste Management (DSWM).

16: Documentation for presence/absence of endangered or protected species.

R: The applicant's conclusion regarding this issue is based on a letter, dated July 30, 1992, from the TWRA, which was located in the DSWM's file rather than the operations manual.

17: Construction quality assurance (CQA) plan concerns.

R: CQA Certification: Rule 1200-1-7-04(1)(c) of the Tennessee Solid Waste Rules does require certification by a Tennessee registered professional engineer (P.E.) Therefore, any registered geologist retained to certify construction would also have to be a Tennessee registered P.E.

Testing Frequencies: The Department's guidance document for sampling and testing earthen construction materials is available for guidance only; it is not a regulator requirement. However, the DSWM can require additional samples and tests if deemed necessary, based on site specific conditions. The DSWM may also conduct its own sampling and testing as appropriate.

Final Survey: Although not explicitly required by regulation, CQA (for the bottom liner, leachate collection, and final cover systems, etc.) requires that a final survey be performed to ensure that the completed land-fill system conforms to design drawings before a P.E. could certify proper construction of the various components.

18/19: Why will Hutcherson Scrap be allowed to locate a Class I land-fill in a seismic [earthquake] zone? Why will Hutcherson Scrap be allowed to locate a Class I land-fill in an area which is known to have earthquake-induced landslides?

R: New regulations concerning both seismic impact zones and unstable areas became effective July 10, 1993, for all new land-fills. Hutcherson Scrap submitted a seismic evaluation which successfully demonstrated that the facility could resist forces due to an earthquake.

20: What will protect our ground water from contamination from the land-fill?

R: A geologic buffer of at least 5 feet of 1x10⁻⁶ cm/sec from the bottom of the liner to the seasonal high water table or top of the uppermost unconfined aquifer is required by Tennessee Solid Waste Rule 1200-1-7. In addition to the geologic buffer, a combination synthetic liner and soil liner and a leachate collection system will be required. Also a ground water monitoring system will be installed to provide detection should any of the preventative measures above allow contaminants to enter the ground water.

21: What will protect the wells, springs, and streams in the area?

R: No springs were found to be present within the fill area. The land-fill is required to maintain buffer distances from all wells, springs, or surface water, as specified in Tennessee Solid Waste Rule Chapter 1200-1-7. The same geologic buffer, liners, and leachate collection system which protect the ground water will also help to protect your surface water, springs, and wells. Monitoring of surface water will also be conducted to help insure that no contaminants are getting into the surface waters.

22: What type of remediation will occur if the groundwater becomes contaminated?

R: Under Tennessee Solid Waste Rule Chapter 1200-1-7, there are regulations which determine the process and requirements for remediation should any contaminant be found by ground water monitoring. The type and extent of the remediation is dependent on the type and extent of the contaminant found in the ground water.

23: Why does Hutcherson Scrap not have to do another geologic report fulfilling the recommendations in the Hydrogeologic Investigation Guidance Document?

R: At the time the hydrogeologic report was submitted and accepted there was not a guidance document recommending any specific "recommendations" for a hydrogeologic investigation. Therefore, this site is not subject to these recommendations. The Division of Solid Waste Management believes the site has been adequately characterized. Since the proposed cut is near the minimum separation distance, the Division is requiring, as a condition to the permit, that additional testing be performed in certain areas to confirm the presence and thickness of the geologic buffer as well as the location of the water table.

24: Is this site located in a wetland?

R: The land-fill site was determined not to be located in a wetland, based on Corps of Engineers evaluation.

25: What about the ground water table being measured in November, when the seasonal high water table is likely to be lower than during other parts of the season?

R: The borings were actually conducted during September, with the report being completed and submitted in November. The report stated that the water levels in the Cockfield Formation are generally higher from April to September and generally low from December to January. The shallow ground water encountered in the boring B-6 was not determined to be the

Helpful Hints For Turkey Leftovers

Seventy-five million turkeys attend the American Thanksgiving dinner. The average turkey purchased for this feast weighs between 15 to 20 pounds. All of which means, without resorting to college calculus, every three people in America have approximately 17 pounds of turkey to eat on Thanksgiving day. More likely the real Thanksgiving crisis will become apparent to the food preparer about 10 p.m. Thanksgiving evening. What to do with the leftovers, most especially the bird, after everyone has eaten the mandatory turkey sandwich?

According to the National Turkey Federation, the average Thanksgiving meal consists of the bird, stuffing, gravy, sweet potatoes, peas, rolls, cranberries, a relish dish, pumpkin pie with whipped cream and beverages. An informal survey of southerners produced cornbread dressing, different vegetables such as broccoli, carrots, turnips, green beans, brussels sprouts, onions, and a wider variety of pies and desserts. Even the most exotic menu of the survey, roast pork loin, red cabbage, mashed turnips, carrot puree and peach half with chutney, lends itself to many great dishes after the fact.

Thanksgiving is a time of home-coming for visiting relatives. It's a few days off work to spend with family, friends, favorite football teams and maybe a trip to the mall's big sales. We celebrate our abundance and take time for fellowship. Willing hands help with meal preparation. A little pre-holiday planning and a few additions to the grocery list can turn the "leftover situation" into tasty meals for the long weekend.

To best preserve the bird for later use, as soon as dinner is finished, dismantle the carcass and ziploc, bones and all, before the refrigerator dehydrates the meat. Crock pot the bones with water for stock. Moist heat provides the best way to maximize flavor when reheating almost anything, so think microwave or liquid in sauces or steam.

Soups and Chili

Italian White Bean Soup -- Cook the beans separately with no salt. Saute' the finely chopped relish dish (no pickles), add gravy, turkey bits, sage, turkey stock. Add beans.

Turkey Red Chili -- Use your favorite chili recipe. Substitute ground turkey and chopped turkey for beef. Serve over leftover rice. White chili is fun, also.

Turnip/Root Vegetable Soup -- Saute' the finely chopped contents of relish dish (no pickles). Add mashed turnips or any root vegetable, chicken stock and simmer. Cream is optional.

Any One Vegetable Soup -- Broccoli, carrot, cream of onion, follow directions above.

Entrees

Turkey Lasagna -- Layer noodles, chopped vegetables, ricotta cheese, turkey and either spaghetti or white sauce. Top with sauce and grated cheese. A crowd pleaser with a salad.

Turkey Pot Pie -- Turkey, gravy and vegetables topped with a pie crust. Option two, season the pie filling well and top with mashed potatoes, a

Seasonal fluctuations in a confined or semi-confined aquifer would be minimal, due to the confined nature of the aquifer. CHEESY TURKEY POT PIE

Prep time: 17 min Bake time: 35 min

- 1 jar (18 oz) turkey gravy (2 cups)

- 1 (14-oz.) can sweetened condensed milk (NOT evaporated milk)
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Sweet Bread Pudding -- Bread chunks tossed with chopped pie and cranberry sauce. Pour over 2 eggs mixed with 2 cups milk (cream). Sprinkle with sugar. Bake. Serve with syrup.

Sweet Potato Pancakes -- Add chopped pecans to the batter. Top with ambrosia or cranberry sauce or sauteed apples. Great waffle idea for Sunday breakfast, too.

Bread Machine Bread -- The bread machine cookbooks are full of breads made with various vegetables, potatoes, stuffing and fruits. A delicious parking place for leftovers.

Holiday leftovers do not have to be a dreary procession of dry turkey sandwiches, replayed Thanksgiving dinner and the universal pot of turkey-vegetable soup. With the wealth of spice mixtures available today, our universal taste buds and a little creative pre-thinking, we can enjoy...the...meals from...the trimmings after the holiday as much as the feast itself. As for that exotic menu, I would suggest pork lasagna with tomato sauce and carrot soup. The red cabbage would be wonderful with a baked apple and sausage dinner.

Cranberry-Apple Pie

- 3 cups diced peeled apples
- 1 cup cranberries
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 3 tablespoons Minute Tapioca
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 package (15 ounces) refrigerated pie crust
- 1 tablespoon margarine or butter

Heat oven to 400° F.

Mix fruit, sugar, tapioca and salt in large bowl. Let stand 15 minutes.

Bake 60 minutes or until juices form bubbles that burst slowly. Cool.

Makes 8 servings.

Note: For a golden top crust, brush pie crust strips with beaten egg before baking.
