

Ripley Mayor Adds Full-Time Firemen

Ripley Mayor Richard Douglas broke a tie vote of aldermen, 3-3, Monday, to hire five more full-time fire-men, for a total of 13, with 16 "volunteer" fire-men to be paid \$240 per month, for 24 hours of service per month, "on call" to fight fires or receive or furnish training.

Alderman Gardes Thomas proposed the change, with a second by Jon Pavletic, and support from Bill Poston. Voting "No" were Dr. Tommy Dunavant, Lawson Elder and Billie Ann Hendren. The mayor broke the tie.

Receive 3-Star Recertification

Gov. Ned McWherter announced that the City of Ripley has successfully completed the fourth-year recertification process under the Three-Star Community Economic Preparedness Program.

Presentation of the award will be made by Gov. McWherter on Oct. 17th at the 42nd annual Governor's Conference on Economic and Community Development in Nashville. Accepting the award on behalf of Ripley will be Mayor Richard Douglas, Lauderdale County Executive Rozelle Criner, Executive Director of the Lauderdale County Chamber of Commerce, Carolyn Mitchell and Three-Star Chairman Craig Fitzhugh.

"Community development and preparedness initiatives precede all successful sales and marketing efforts for new jobs through new and expanding industry," Gov. McWherter said. "The growing global competition for jobs makes it increasingly important that communities be organized locally with a meaningful development program and that necessary community services be in place.

"The people of Ripley honor themselves and their state on successfully meeting the criteria for recertification in the Three-Star Program. I congratulate

them on their level of preparedness and their participation in the program," stated Gov. McWherter.

\$200,000 For Ripley Parks

The City of Ripley will receive a \$200,000 state grant from the Local Parks and Recreation Fund announced Gov. Ned McWherter, Speaker Jimmy Neifeh, Rep. Floyd Crain and the Department of Environment and Conservation Interim Commissioner Edward H. Cole. The grant will be used to develop a new city park with a ballfield and a walking trail.

Crain thanks Seal Elder, of the city's Parks & Recreation Department, for much of the process of justifying the grant, and all the other city, county, and Chamber of Commerce efforts for it.

The Local Parks and Recreation Fund Grant Program was established by the General Assembly as part of Tennessee State and Local Parks and Recreation Act of 1991. The act also set aside money for the acquisition of wetlands, state park lands and natural areas. Tennessee's apportionment from the Land and Water Conservation Fund is being allocated 100 percent to local projects.

All 68 Local Parks and Recreation Fund grants will be matched at the local level. These grants must be used for the acquisition or development of public recreation facilities. The Local Parks and Recreation Fund and the Land and Water Conservation Fund Grant Programs are administered by the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation.







Pharmacy Topics



The "winter blahs" are real; some 10 million Americans are said to suffer Seasonal Affective Disorder with sadness, fatigue, irritability and similar symptoms. Light therapy, with natural or artificial light, seems to help. So does chocolate, say Swiss scientists in Basel.

Ancient doctors used leeches to "bleed" their patients. Now hirudin, a substance in the saliva of leeches, has been found very effective to prevent blood clots without causing excessive bleeding, the journal *Circulation* reports. Today hirudin is made by genetic engineering.

"Acupressure" bracelet eased post-surgical nausea in patients at Maimonides Medical Center in Brooklyn. Velcro band has a plastic bead that presses on a point on the inside of the wrist often utilized in acupressure or acupuncture against nausea.

Extra calcium is especially important for teenagers, say doctors at the University of Utah School of Medicine - first, because of growth spurts at that time, second because of needs as they age.

Lightfoot Loses Landmark



LIGHTFOOT SCHOOL, built in the 1890s as Union School, is being demolished to allow Lightfoot's Methodist Church to expand its cemetery.

The land was originally donated by Carter Whitson.

After fire destroyed Union School in 1917, it was rebuilt and named Lightfoot School, according to Leslie Lightfoot, a former student.

George G. McLeod was the school's first principal. In 1902, his sister, Hattie McLeod Barnes, and T. I. Barnes were teachers.

Also teaching there, in the early years of the century, were Mr. and Mrs. S. E. Pierce. Both taught later in Ripley High School, and Mr. Pierce served as the county's superintendent of schools.

Another teacher was Laura Osteen, mother of former county sheriff Joe Osteen.



MRS. TOLLIE CALDWELL, 83, of 289 Lackey Lane in Ripley, is sad about the tearing down of Lightfoot School, which she entered in 1917.

Born Feb. 23, 1911, as Carolyn Roberson, daughter of the Carl Robersons, of Lightfoot, she says she walked a mile to the school with a teacher, Gene Lunsford, and his sons, Charles and Ewart, who were neighbors.

"Charles helped with beginner readers, the Primer Class."

"I was eight years old, in first grade. We were eager to learn."

"Some children walked two or three miles to school, even from Luckett, though there was a Luckett school. Older students assisted the younger ones."

"Back then, times were hard for many people, and we really appreciated the opportunity to go to school."

Carlyn, wife of TOLLIE CALDWELL, who formerly managed the Federal Compress in Ripley, has helped to preserve county history by serving, for many years, as chairman of the Board of Trustees of Sugar Hill, The Lauderdale County Library, in Ripley. She was the board's second chairman, succeeded by William A. Klutts, now serving.



Pharmacy Topics

Starting smoking at a young age increases the risk of lung cancer, say researchers at the University of Utah. Men who started at 19 or younger were twice as likely to get the disease; women who started at 25 or younger were three times more at risk.

New blood test developed at Wayne State University in Detroit measures the damage to DNA wrought by free radicals; women with breast cancer indicate 40 percent damage.

Similarly, a New York University biochemist measured antibodies to DNA damage. Women who were at high risk, who had cancer or who developed the disease within a year had twice as many antibodies.

More women are using hormone therapy after menopause, a Gallup poll found; 38 percent are using estrogen or estrogen with progesterone.

New more sensitive urine test can measure bone turnover, indicating the risk of osteoporosis, and can follow the results of therapy. The test is being reviewed by the FDA and may be ready late next year.



Teen Dies, 3 Hurt In Crash County Schools Star In State's Rankings



PATRICK CHILTON RING, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rick Ring, of 231 Drake, Ripley, died about 7 a.m. Sunday, in the Regional Medical Center in Memphis, of internal injuries after an automobile crash involving three other senior students in Ripley High School.

The state's latest "report card" for Lauderdale County Schools is a great one.

County schools matched or led state averages in attendance, 95.34%-95.02%; promotion rate, 96.45%-96.06%; proficiency rate in math, 90%-90%; drop-out rate, 13.96%-17.37%; and in "value added assessments," in language arts, 124%-107.3% (8th among 139 school systems in the state), in math, 110.9%-95.9% (8th in state), in reading, 121.7%-104.7% (2nd in state), in science, 116.5%-98% (3rd in state); and in social studies, 108.5%-93.7% (7th in state).

THP Arrests 13, Cites 27; Seat Belts Often Un-Used

Tenn. Highway Patrol check-points at three locations in the county, from 5 p.m. Friday, to 3 a.m., monitored 295 vehicles, found 121 drivers not wearing seat-belts, made 13 arrests, and cited 27 for court appearances.

Nine arrests were made for driving while intoxicated, and four on drug charges (one for a small bag of marijuana, three for possession of drug paraphernalia). Being arrested means going to jail, unless you can quickly post bond.

Among those cited, to appear in court, are seven persons who were driving vehicles with children aboard, who were not in safety restraint devices.

Eighteen other drivers were given warning tickets.

The check-points were on Hwy. 19 west of Ripley, on U.S. 209 (Old U.S. 51) north of Ripley, near Skeeter's Restaurant, and at the intersection of Old Hwy. 51 (now 209) and New U.S. Hwy. 51, west of Henning.

The federally-funded check-points will be repeated Friday, Oct. 28th, but not necessarily at the same locations.



Pharmacy Topics

The power of positive thinking: it can help you live longer, say doctors at the University of California/San Diego. Chinese-Americans born in years "unlucky" for certain diseases died sooner of them than people born in other years or those who didn't believe the tradition.

"Passive smokers"—folks who live or work with smokers—have 24 percent less vitamin C in their blood than other non-smokers, even on the same diet, studies at Lawrence Berkeley Labs found. Researchers recommend increasing vitamin C intake.

What causes Alzheimers disease? Scientist at Duke University find that many patients carry a genetic variant of the normal blood protein needed to sustain nerve cells; as a result, the nerve cells die.

Injections of timmesporphyrin helped newborns avoid dangerous jaundice, the journal *Pediatrics* reported. The drug inhibits the enzyme that produces bilirubin. Premies are most at risk, but the researchers would give the drug to all babies for the first 24 hours.

Here are the fully documented positions of the candidates for governor on the major issues facing Tennesseans today. Please read them before you make your choice.

Phil Bredesen, a successful businessman, spent 12 of the last 15 years creating 6,000 new jobs through a Tennessee-based company he started in his home.

Phil Bredesen's put more police on the street; and he's taken a leadership role in curbing domestic violence, believing people have no more right to beat or hit their spouse than they do a total stranger.

Congressman Sundquist voted against the crime bill (this bill provides Tennessee with 2,000 new police and new funds to control juvenile crime in rural areas); and he believes men who beat their wives should get probation, then have their record wiped clean if they behave themselves⁹. Sundquist also voted against providing additional funds to immunize children against disease¹⁰.

Mr. Bredesen was elected mayor of Nashville with 71% of the vote. He said he'd manage government like a successful business. He has. The city now has a \$10 million surplus.

Congressman Sundquist served on the Board of Directors of a company that allowed his political crony (and convicted felon) to run Kirby Pines Retirement Community in Memphis. Now residents are suing Sundquist and others for mismanaging their life savings. (The felon is still running the community.)³

As mayor, Phil Bredesen instituted a tough new ethics policy in city government soon after taking office.

As congressman, Don Sundquist voted to raise his own pay by \$35,000, giving himself a \$133,600 annual salary and a \$43,000 pension for life, and recently called that an "ethics bill"⁴; he also accepted free trips to 21 countries, paid for by taxpayers and special-interest groups⁵; and three times he voted against raising the minimum wage to \$4.55/hour⁶.

Look at the facts. Make your choice.

Since becoming mayor, Bredesen's created 24,000 new jobs in the private sector; and he helped obtain the Tennessee-London air route, which will provide more new jobs.

Congressman Sundquist voted to cut Tennesseans' Social Security cost-of-living increase allowance¹¹; he voted to cut Medicare by \$25 billion in 1991, by \$138 billion in 1992, and by \$34 billion last year¹². Sundquist was the only Tennessee congressman to vote against overriding the presidential veto of the Textile Bill¹³. The override failed. The veto would have saved Tennessee jobs from going overseas, but instead textile factories have closed all over the state, with at least 11,000 Tennessee jobs lost already.
