New, high-resolution digital ultrasound can differentiate between benign and malignant growths in women whose breast lumps or mammograms indicated the need for biopsy. In a study at Yale University School of Medicine, the scan had a 99 percent accuracy rate.

Non-insulin-dependent diabetes in the elderly responds well to medication, says a report in The Journal of Gerontology. Even where the disease is mild, medication seems to improve mental function.



Expected cost is estimated at \$16,500,000, according to Superintendent of Schools Bobby Webb. Under the new oposal, the high schools would receive additions, as well as Halls Elementary School, bringing them up to state standards.

The new proposal will be presented to county court in its next session in October



Two new drugs seem to be effective against psoriasis. Calcipotriene ointment, a vitamin C variation, brought improvement in 61 percent of test subjects. And an oral medication for leukemia helped against severe plaquetype and hand and foot psoriasis.

Hip or knee replacement patients who practiced their rehabilitation routine before surgery were able to trim their hospital stays, the White Plains (New York) Medical Center reports. They were less fearful of managing walkers, crutches and the like.

Nicotine patches--usually worn by smokers trying to quit-have proved to be an effective treatment for ulcerative colitis. Some patients in a study had complete remissions, and many others were greatly improved. A few reported typical nicotine side effects.

Dentist are using Gore-Tex membranes to provide a framework for regenerating gum or bone tissue cells, helping to hold teeth in place. New, biodegradable membranes have gotten FDA approval.
