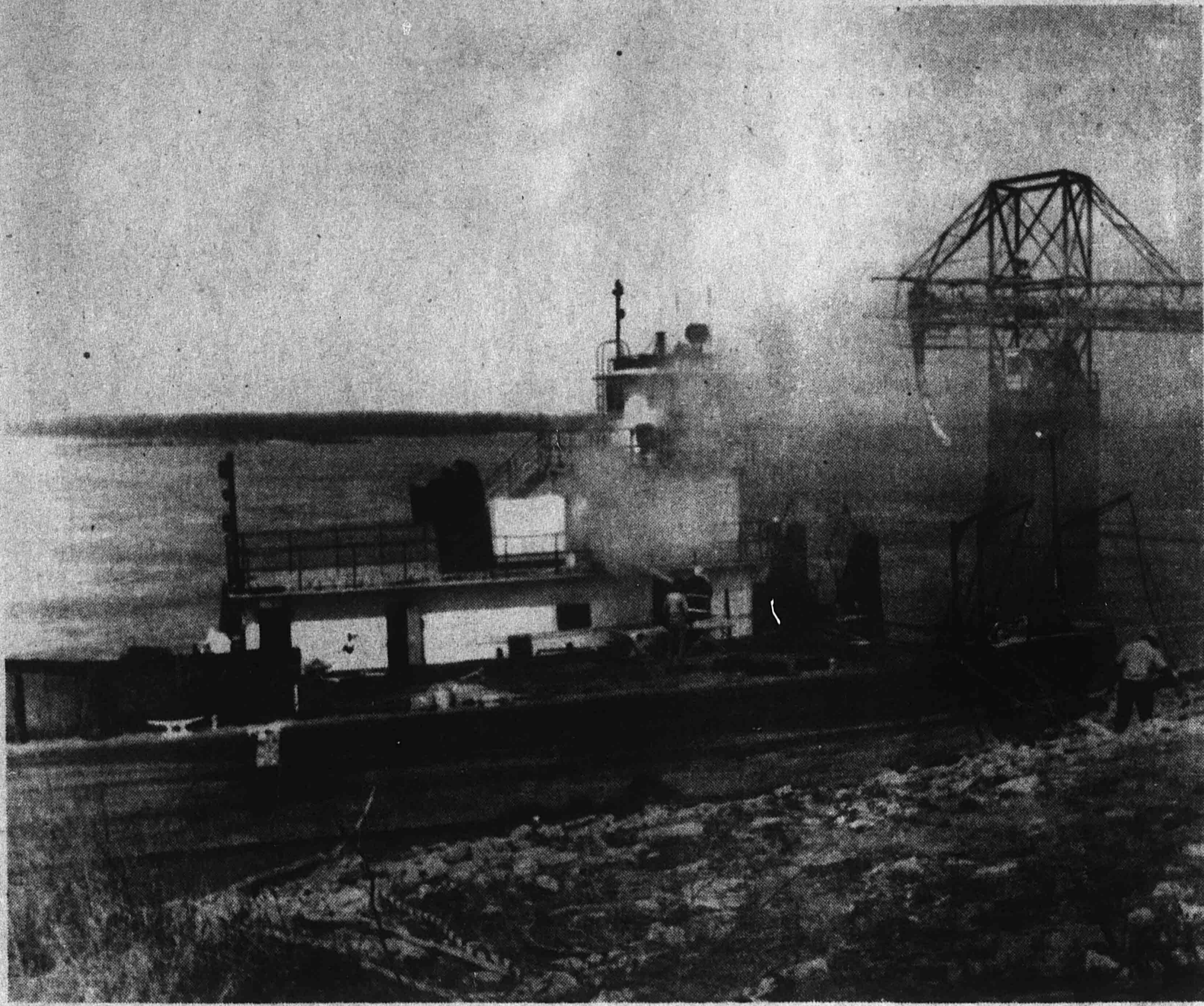

THE TUG 'ELIZABETH SHOAF,' owned by Lauren Shoaf, of Shoaf's Island, was heavily damaged by fire March 23rd near the Continental Grain terminal near Wynnburg. Brad Dean and Aaron Smith, employed by Continental, battled the

blaze until the Tiptonville Fire Dept. arrived. Extinguished in about 25 minutes, the flames damaged chiefly sleeping quarters on the second deck. Terry Roncali is captain of the tug, which is one of 13 Mississippi River vessels owned by Mr. Shoaf.

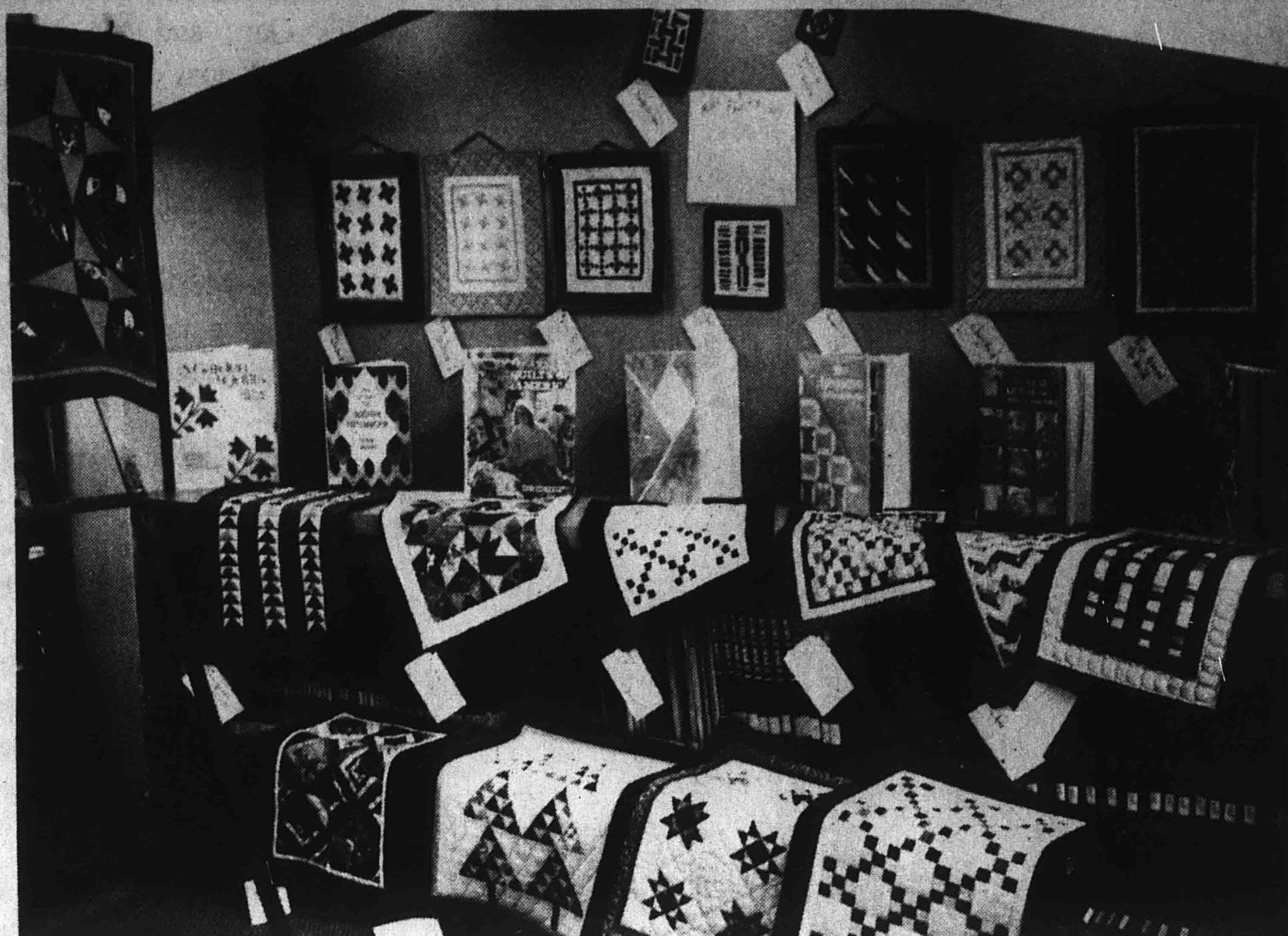

Quilts Displayed At Library



THE APRIL DISPLAY at Halls Public Library for the month of April is quilts by Mrs. Celia Wiley Ricks.

Mrs. Ricks is a fourth or fifth (or more) generation quilter and needle-worker. As far back as she can remember, somewhere there was a quilt in a frame to play under, as neighbors and aunts quilted and chatted. She first learned to keep every-one's needles threaded, and it just evolved from there; making doll clothes, sorting and choosing colored scraps for the quilt blocks. Each quilt was a history of someone's dress, skirt, pajamas, etc.

The daughter of a farmer, Celia grew up in Bethesda community on Highway 88 west of Halls. She attended Halls schools and graduated from Halls High School. She was a student at the University of Mississippi, where she met her husband, Bill Ricks. They have two sons.

Her husband is now retired from the Firestone Tire and Rubber Co., International Division. They have lived in four U.S. locations and three foreign countries including Rome, Italy; Nairobi, Kenya; and Cuernavaca, Mexico. In 1993, they moved back to the family farm near Halls, from Del Rio, Texas where Celia worked as a Realtor. She was a member of the Chamber of Commerce Red Carpet Committee, the Firehouse Quilters and the Upstagers Little Theater Troupe.

As an exhibitor in quilt shows since 1989, she has won several blue ribbons for miniature quilts. She has also taught and judged in the Del Rio, Texas area. Celia is now a member of the Key Corner FCE Club.

FAIR HOUSING RESOLUTION TOWN OF HALLS

LET IT BE KNOWN TO ALL PERSONS of the Town of Halls that discrimination in the sale, rental, leasing, financing of housing or land to be used for construction of housing, or in the provision of brokerage services because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, familial status, or handicap is prohibited by Title VIII of the 1968 Civil Rights Act as amended (Federal Fair Housing law). It is the policy of the Town of Halls to implement programs to ensure equal opportunity in housing for all persons regardless of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, familial status, or handicap. Therefore, the Town does hereby pass the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED that within available resources the Town will assist all persons who feel they have been discriminated against because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, familial status, or handicap to seek equity under Federal and State laws by filing a complaint with the Tennessee Human Rights Commission or the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Atlanta Regional Office Compliance Division.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Town shall publicize this resolution and through this publicity shall cause owners of real estate, developers, and builders to become aware of their respective responsibilities and rights under the Federal Fair Housing law and any applicable State or local laws or ordinances.

SAID PROGRAM will at a minimum include, but not be limited to, (1) the printing and publicizing of this policy and other applicable fair housing information through local media and community contacts; (2) distribution of posters, flyers, and any other means which will bring to the attention of those affected the knowledge of their respective responsibilities and rights concerning equal opportunity in housing.

This resolution shall take effect April 3, 1995.

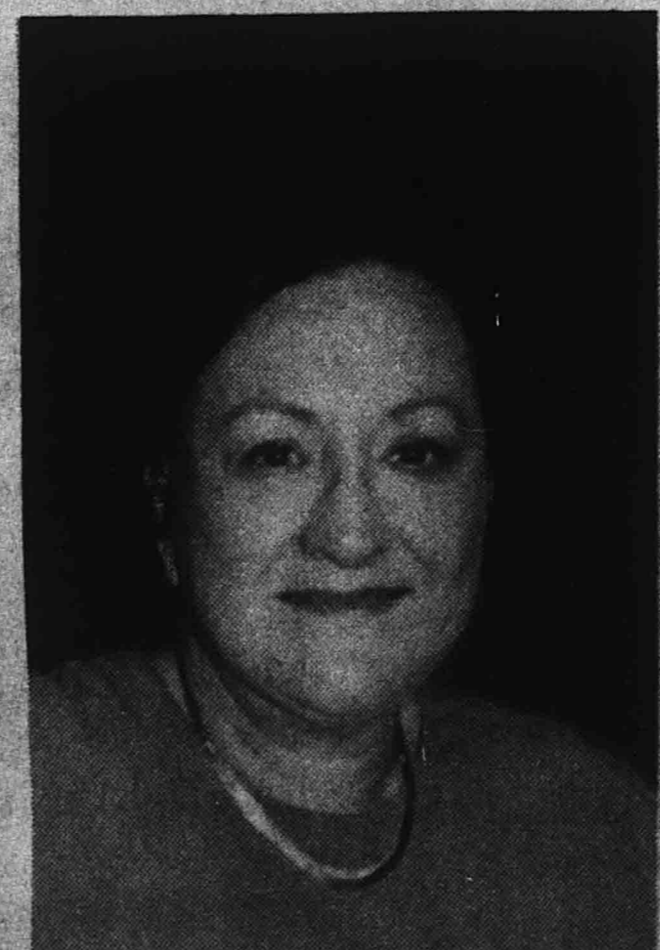

Burke Handed Top Sentence: 30 Mos.

Jerry Burke, of Memphis, former Riplian, who pleaded guilty to mail fraud and tax evasion in U.S. District Court in Memphis in January, was sentenced Friday to 30 months in prison.

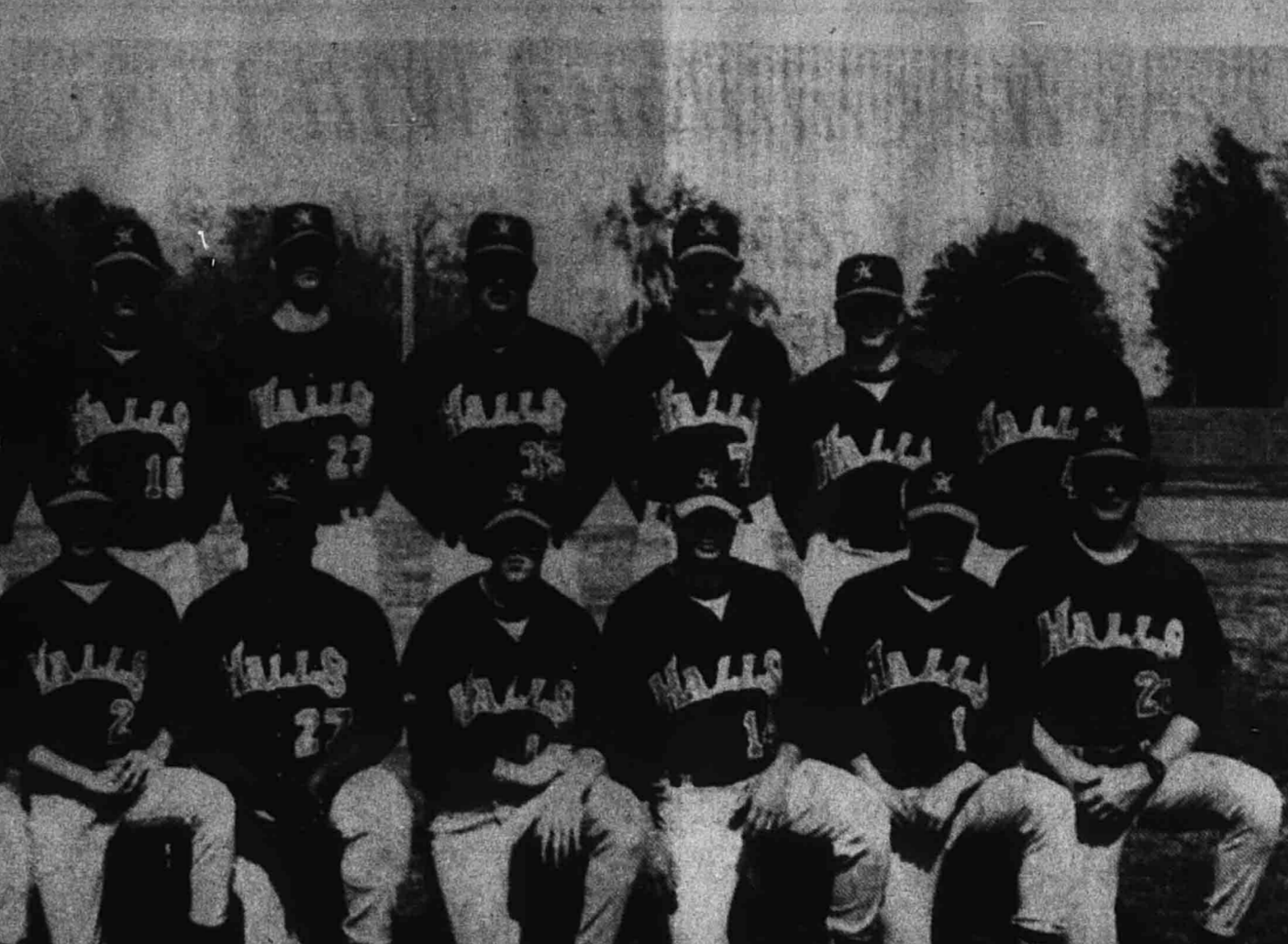

Editor: Somewhere in the lonely night of March 28th, a young man took his life.

Just another statistic for those who did not know his plight. For those who knew him and tried to help, he was a human being crying out for his life.

At one time, a few weeks ago, in Ripley, a small and supposedly caring town, he pleaded to be jailed and locked away from harm. He was turned away, as were others who asked.

Counseling Centers were repeatedly called about his condition and needs. They kept referring to others.

No one could seem to care quite enough for this young man in trouble. Even doctors would not see his misery.

Pharmacy Topics



Lately the news has had a lot of stories about a certain class of drugs called calcium channel blockers. The news has been suggesting that these drugs are causing people to have heart attacks. Here's a broader perspective on this situation:

The calcium channel blockers are a large group of drugs. Some names of these drugs are nifedipine (Adalat, Procardia), verapamil (Calan, Isoptin, Verelan), diltiazem (Cardizem, Dilacor). Millions of people have used these drugs. The drugs are used for several purposes, but most people use them to control their high blood pressure.

Researchers made some interesting discoveries and presented their findings at a scientific meeting of the American Heart Association. They said that using calcium channel blockers could lead to a 60% increase in the chance of getting a heart attack.

They arrived at these numbers by looking at cases of patients who had been on these drugs and compared them to patients who were on different drugs. Their results can be summarized as follows: If 1000 patients with high blood pressure are treated with diuretics or beta-blockers for one year, about 10 might be expected to have a heart attack in that one-year period. This study says that if they were taking a calcium channel blocker, the number might be 16 rather than 10. This is how the news media came up with the 60% figure.

But this is not the type of study that you can draw definite conclusions from. It's a RETROSPECTIVE study. In other words it looked backwards in time to patients who had already been selected to use these drugs. They may have been selected because they were already sicker than patients who were put on other drugs, and therefore already had a higher risk of a heart attack. Or there may be other factors that skew the results.

Because of this study, researchers are now alerted of something to look for in a PROSPECTIVE study. They can randomly assign new patients to receive different drugs and then follow the patients for years. This type of study gives much more meaningful answers. And this sort of study is already underway.

The study that was recently reported is very useful to the medical community because it raises an important question. But it doesn't ANSWER any questions. Physicians and pharmacists understand how the results of this study help further medical knowledge. Medical knowledge is like a big puzzle, and we have to fit the small pieces together one at a time. Pharmacists and physicians take this study as just one more tiny bit of information to help fit the whole puzzle together.

The news media and the public should not misunderstand this study and jump to conclusions. People should NOT change the therapy they are on now because of this study. It might work out that this is the overall best therapy.

Fifty eighth graders from Halls Junior High School attended the annual reenactment of the Civil War Battle of Shiloh April 9th.

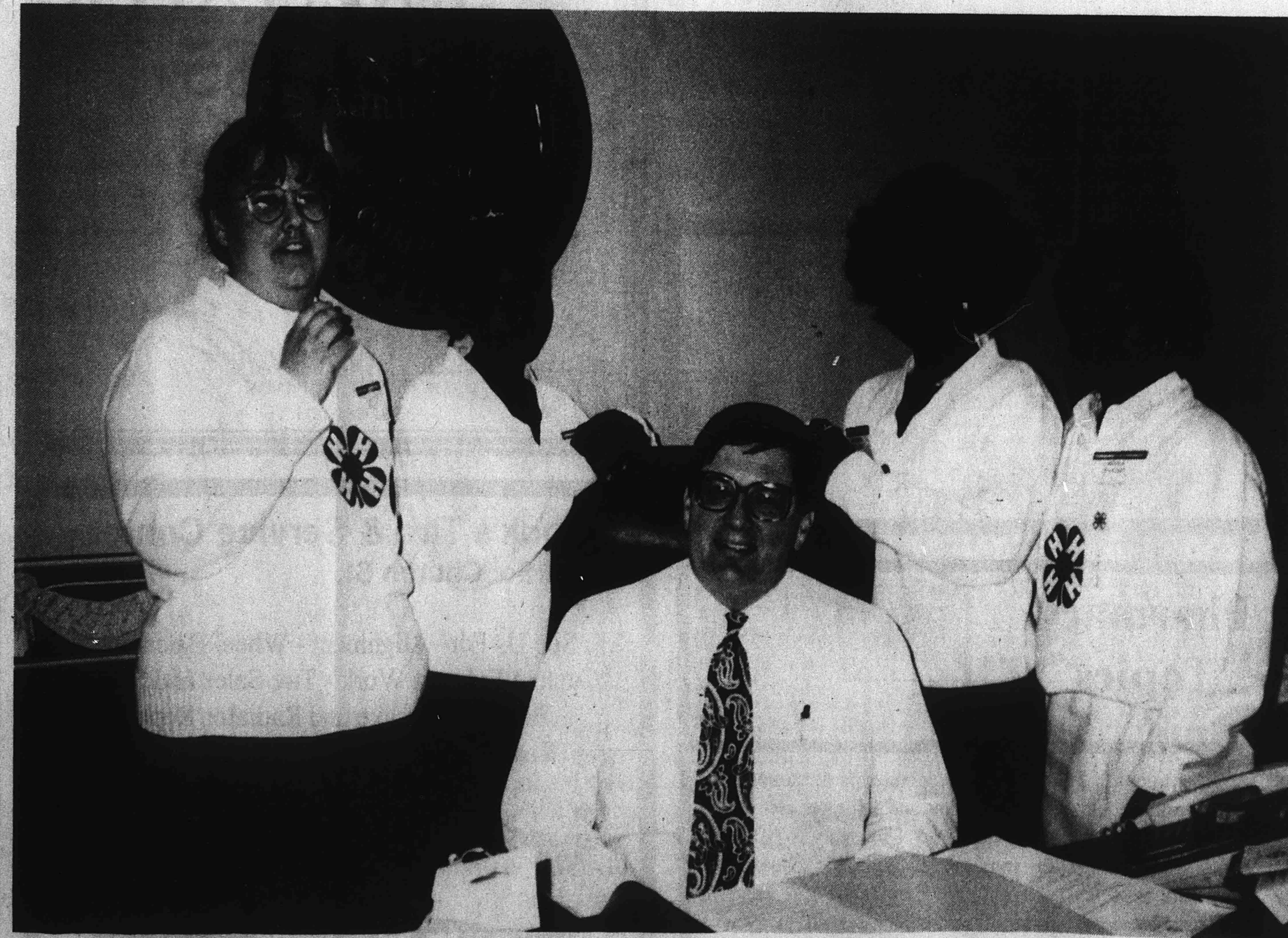
Students saw demonstrations of the Confederate artillery, infantry and cavalry.

Pharmacy Topics



Music to cut by? Surgeons who operated to the sound of their favorite music performed better and felt more relaxed, according to a study at the State University of New York/Buffalo. Quiet--or someone else's music choices--didn't work as well. Recent increases in hip fractures in women, a New Zealand internist showed, are due to a longer hip axis--a longer bone that can be attributed to better nutrition in the last 30 to 40 years. 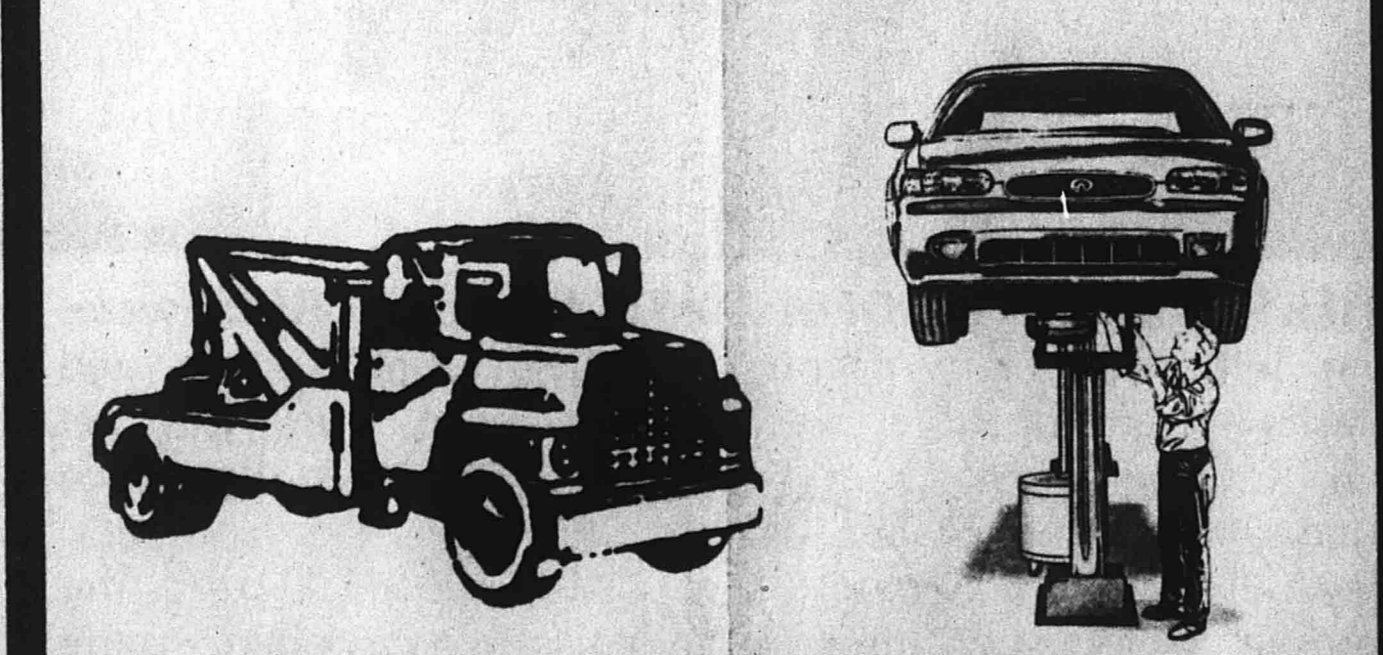

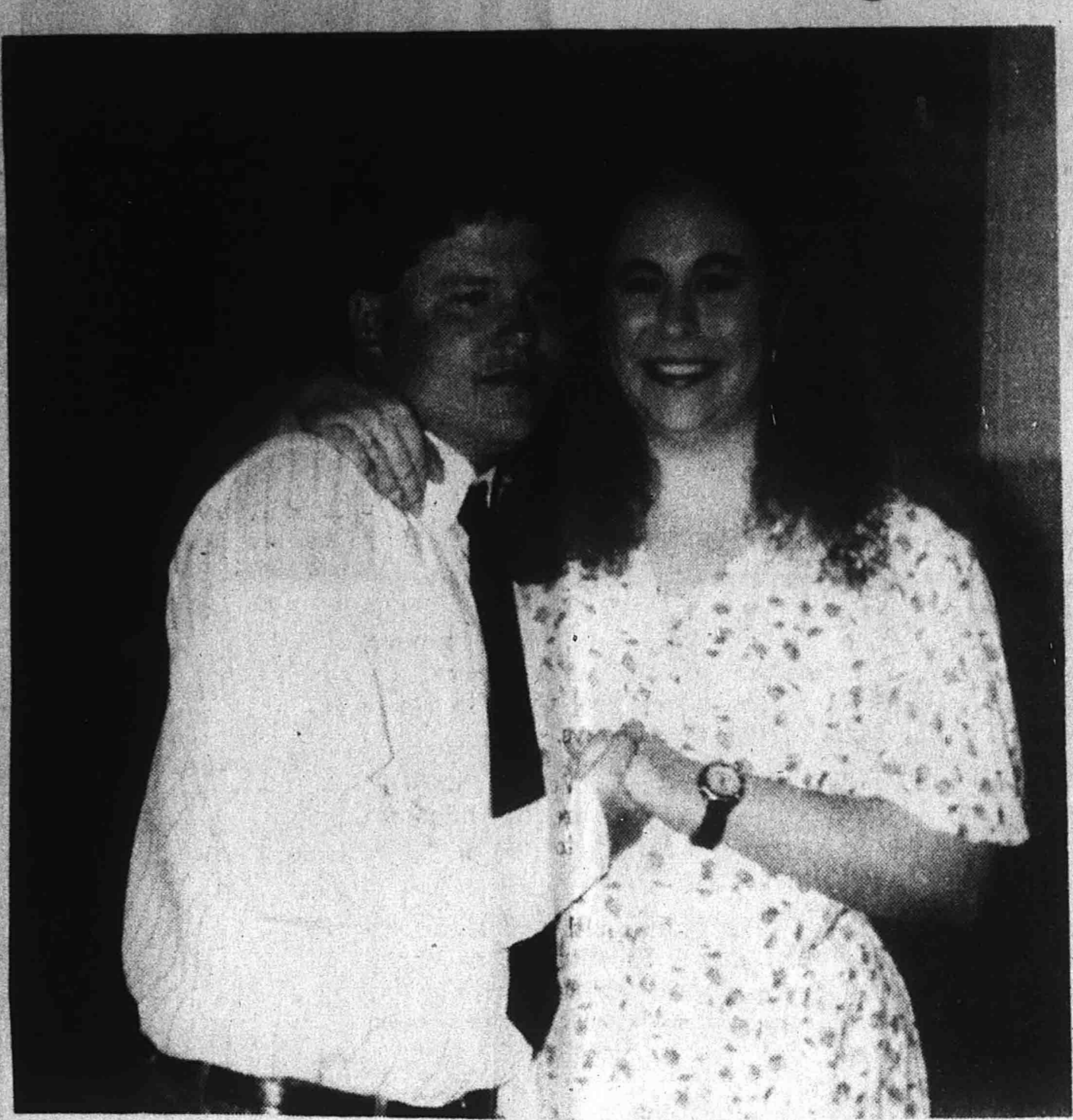

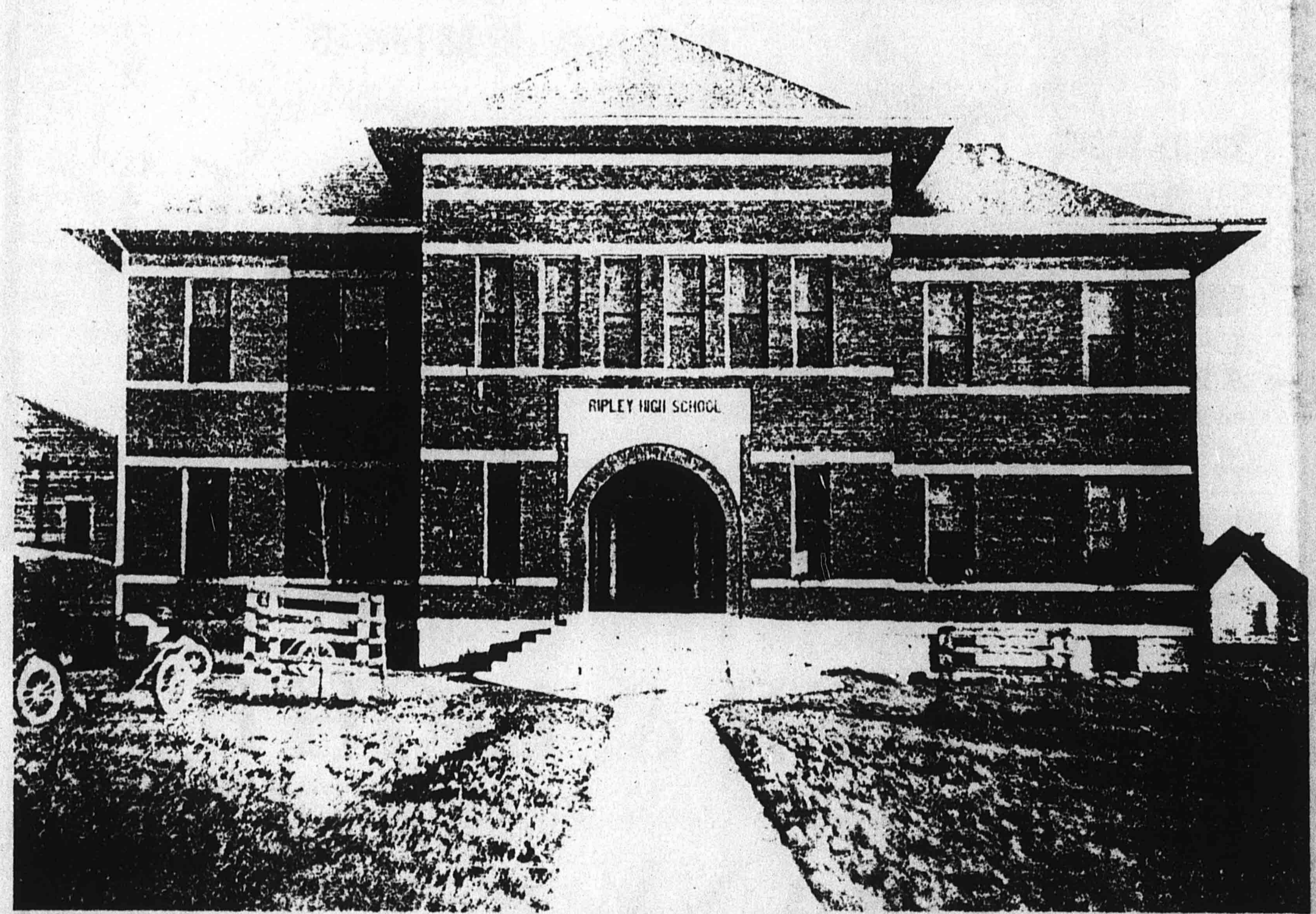

Designed and created by Nancy Neacise's Halls High School Art Department, the major work was accomplished by Kate Ewell and Stacy Cox.

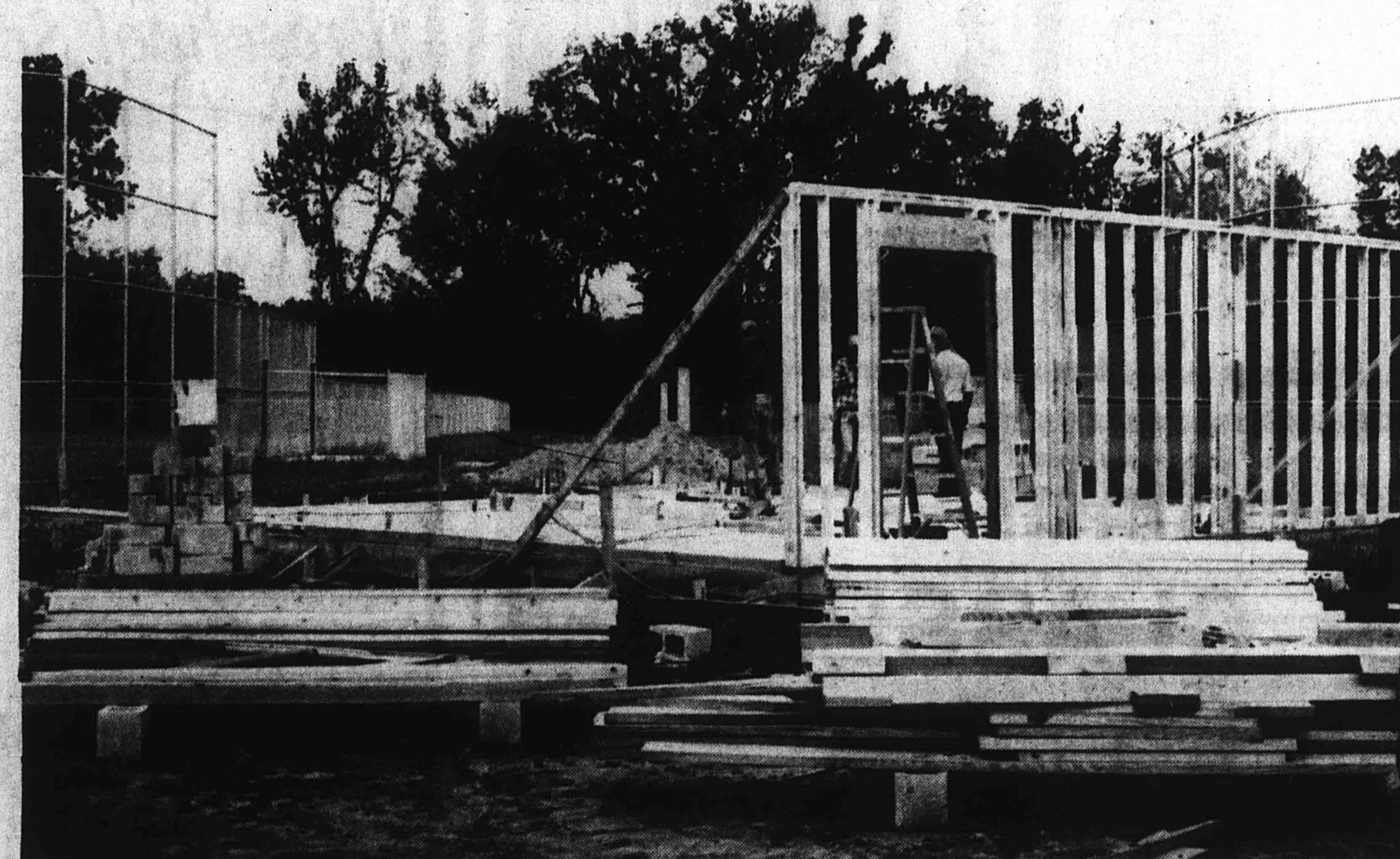

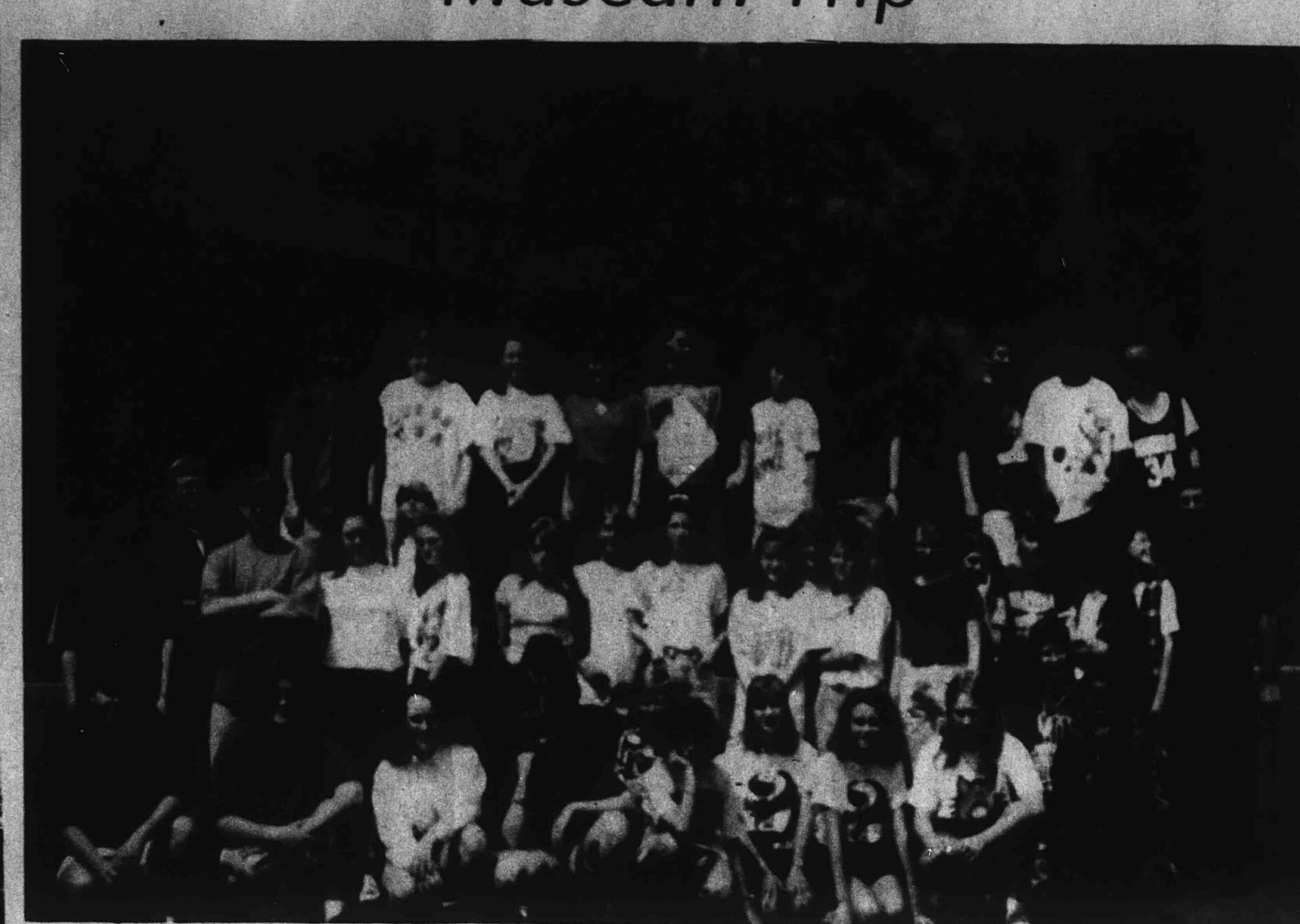

Pharmacy Topics

New treatment for prostate cancer utilizes cryosurgery--destroying tissue by freezing it. Recovery is faster than after standard surgical procedures, and there's less likelihood of incontinence, but doctors are still cautious.

Scientists at the University of Utah have identified the gene that seems to account for some cases of breast cancer. Next step: a blood test to detect it in women with a strong family history of the disease.

A Yale University study says high cholesterol does not increase the risk of heart disease in those over 70--but the jury is still out.

Two new drugs are being tested against rheumatoid arthritis: cA2 and CDP571 seem to cut the pain and joint swelling in half, the British medical journal Lancet reports.

The Food and Drug Administration has approved a new, semisynthetic version of Taxol, the anti-cancer drug that once was made from the bark of the Pacific yew tree. Another similar drug is expected soon.

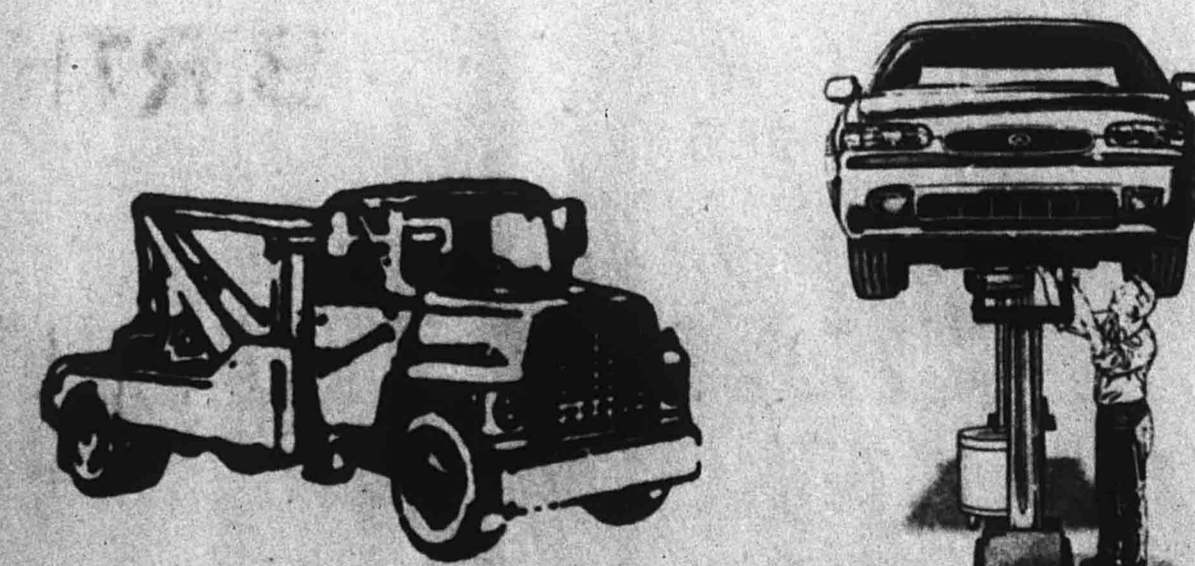

LEO MUDD, left, retired Kentucky State Police officer, delivered a motivating and captivating message to Halls and Ripley High Schools Thursday and Friday sponsored by the Board of Education and the Sheriff's Department along with Project D.A.R.E. Mr. Mudd shares his experiences both as a uniform officer of 12 years and as an undercover agent for seven years, a period where he did not cut his hair or shave his face. He shares a story of working undercover and buying "crack" cocaine from a woman who is blowing marijuana into her infant child's face so that it will go to sleep. Mudd states, "I spent seven years with the scum that is poisoning the minds of our young people."

Mudd uses a lot of different illustrations to get his message across, senseless deaths

involving drunken drivers, comedy, true stories of experiences, but most of all Mr. Mudd tries to emphasize the importance that young people take time to think (consequences, addiction, etc...) He believes in his message so strongly that he named his corporation 4T's Inc. (Take Time To Think)

This award is presented to persons for outstanding service by Governor's Office for the Commonwealth of Kentucky.
