



Allergists at Georgetown University School of Medicine found a correlation between ear infections in young children and food allergies. Staying away from the allergens seems to clear up the infections, too.

Extra warmup time before workouts helps asthmatics avoid exercise-induced attacks, doctors at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver found. Best results were achieved with 15 minutes of moderate, continuous exercise before the regular routine.



FAIR HOUSING RESOLUTION TOWN OF HALLS

LET IT BE KNOWN TO ALL PERSONS of the Town of Halls that discrimination in the sale, rental, leasing, financing of housing or land to be used for construction of housing, or in the provision of brokerage services because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, familial status, or handicap is prohibited by Title VIII of the 1968 Civil Rights Act as amended (Federal Fair Housing law). It is the policy of the Town of Halls to implement programs to ensure equal opportunity in housing for all persons regardless of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, familial status, or handicap. Therefore, the Town does hereby pass the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED that within available resources the Town will assist all persons who feel they have been discriminated against because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, familial status, or handicap to seek equity under Federal and State laws by filing a complaint with the Tennessee Human Rights Commission or the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Atlanta Regional Office Compliance Division.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Town shall publicize this resolution and through this publicity shall cause owners of real estate, developers, and builders to become aware of their respective responsibilities and rights under the Federal Fair Housing law and any applicable State or local laws or ordi-

SAID PROGRAM will at a minimum include. but not be limited to, (1) the printing and publicizing of this policy and other applicable fair housing information through local media and community contacts; (2) distribution of posters, flyers, and any other means which will bring to the attention of those affected the knowledge of their respective responsibilities and rights concerning equal opportunity in

This resolution shall take effect April 3. 1995.
