

13 Votes Can Decide County's Tax Puzzle

The County Commission, in its regular monthly meeting, Aug. 14th, can adopt, by 13 of its 25 members, a \$2.51 real estate tax rate per \$100 assessed valuation, without increasing the \$25 wheel tax, to fund a 1995-96 budget.

A proposal to increase the wheel tax to \$45, with a lower real estate rate, would need 17 votes, Aug. 14th and Sept. 12th, to take effect Oct. 1st. There would be no extra income from wheel tax for the first quarter of the 1995-96 fiscal year.

A 4-hour meeting of the county's Budget Committee Monday suggested a \$2.24 rate, plus a \$45 wheel tax, would cut \$125,000 proposed for Courthouse compliance with U.S. disability access laws, and \$15,000 from Ripley park funding, with some smaller cuts, but with the \$45 wheel tax.

County Executive Rozelle Criner submitted cost comparisons for various rates (see table), showing that a \$2.51 rate with the same \$25 wheel tax would save money for many tax-payers.

In the table, the "Certified" rate is the equivalent of previous rates, before the 1995 re-appraisal. Criner warned, months ago, that last year's budget did not cover costs, especially for the new Justice Center and for federally mandated disability access to public buildings.

Postoperative headaches may be nothing more than caffeine withdrawal, a Mayo Clinic study found. People who missed breakfast before outpatient surgery felt better

Yet another reason to eat your veggies: the carotenoids in leafy green vegetables seem to protect against macular degeneration, a common vision problem in older people, the Journal of the American Medical Association

A new technique to test suspicious breast lumps and other tumors provides fast, accurate results. It uses ultrasound or CT scan to aim a fine needle to aspirate cells from the lump and a special staining method to distinguish between cancer and benign tissue.

Treatments for multiple sclerosis seem to offer real hope. Beta interferon seems to stave off relapses, and an improved version is now available. Copolymer-1, being used in research studies at the University of Maryland, may work even better.

Harvix, the first vaccine to prevent hepatitis A, has received FDA approval. Especially recommended for high-risk military personnel, travelers, and lab workers, it offers protection within 15 days.





Although he put the words down on paper, the author is real ly his mom. She was 101 when she began to narrate the events of her life to Tom, and it remarkable what total recall she

"Her remarkable retention the past allows us to probe socia customs, family life, women's aspirations, humor, friendships and the South at the beginning o the twentieth century", Tom writes in his introduction.

The book is titled, "The Class of 1912". The name comes from the fact that she graduated that year from Mississippi Synodica College in Holly Springs. The college had two missions, she said One was intellectual attainmen and the other was correc

"I never managed to deter mine which carried the most im portance by the faculty, compos ed of prim and proper womer who guided our learning in academic subjects, as well as our character", Mrs. Adams said.

She was the first member of her family to go to college. Her mother had died when Inez was born. She had an older sister who was supposed to go, but she had eloped at the age of 16.

When her father learned about the elopement he threw a fit, she said. "Cursing and throwing up his hands, he paced around the house for several hours. Not only did he not like the boy, he had plans for his daughter. He meant to send her to college. Sending me away was to avoid a second heartache."







Vitamin C may be able to stem kidney, eye and nerve damage in diabetics. In a study reported in the Journal of the American College of Nutrition, daily doses stopped the body from producing the excess sorbitol that seems to instigate the damage.

Flavor enhancers--spices and herbs that make foods taste better--also seems to "feed" the body's immune system, say researchers at Duke University. On the same amount of food, levels of B cells and T cells-both important in immune systems--rose.





HOMECOMING AT COUNTRY CHURCH IS SPECIAL **MEMORY TIME**

One of my happy memories from childhood was the annual birthday of my great uncle, Tom Miles. Each year on the Sunday nearest his birthday, family and friends would gather at Bethel Methodist Church in Rutherford County, where he was one of the stalwart leaders, and possibly the oldest living member at that time. After church, we'd all go to home, complete with a big front yard and lots of shade trees, and have dinner-on-the-ground.

Uncle Tom died over 50 years ago, but Bethel Church, first built in 1818, still is an active and growing rural congregation. They had not had a homecoming observance for about five years, but on August 6, current and former members, and those of us members, gathered to praise God in sermon and song, and remember. It was good to see kinfolks and other friends and

meet new ones. Copies of the church history were presented, and there were displays of pictures of some of church. One of those was of my great grandfather, who was one the mid to late 1800's. I have the obituary clipped from the newspaper when Cas Miles, Sr passed away in 1904, but I had never seen his picture before. family resemblance, and realize how strong his genes were to pass along his features.

In the history booklet, there was a copy of a deed for proper ty given by my grandmother, Lida Blackman Miles, in 1925. She donated two acres of land to the church. The deed read, "I convey this property to the said parties (Trustees of the church) to be used as a playground for the use children who attend the Bethel

After church services and unch, we all gathered back in th sanctuary to share memories days gone by. I had to share on that my father had told me, a illustrated that peace and harmony had not always prevailed a Bethel. This saga happened several years before I was born. Here's the way I remember m father's story:

Cousin Jim Sanders was the organist and song leader at the church. He was a carpenter, and an artisan as far as wood is concerned. The pulpit, still in use after at least 75 years or more has the word "Bethe" engraved in it. Cousin Jim did that fine

Cousin Jim felt that the organ should be on one side of the church, but some of the church leaders thought it should be on the other side. When Cousin Jim would leave the community for a week to do a carpentry job out of the area, my grandfather, Cas Miles, Jr., and several of the other men, would go down to the church and push the organ back to their desired side. Cousin Jim would come in on

Sunday morning, and shove it back to his favorite spot. During the week, Granddaddy Miles and the others would come in and move it again, and Cousin Jim would repeat his movements on the next Sunday morning. This apparently went on for

several weeks until one week, the leaders came in and moved the organ, crawled under the church, used a brace and bit and bored holes in the floor, and bolted the organ in place. That ended the weekly movement of I don't know what Cousin Jim's

reaction was when he tried to shove it back to his favorite spot the next Sunday, but it must have been an interesting sight, and you can imagine the subdued snickers that probably wer through the congregation tha

At least Cousin Jim didn't ge mad and quit. I remember till leading singing ten or ears after this incident who was eight or ten years old.

It's wonderful to have a loving family, and it's also wonderful to have a loving church family wherever you attend. Although never officially belonged to the **Bethel United Methodist Church** did accept the Lord there 55 years ago, when the pastor of the Smyrna Methodist Church where our family attended, was holding a revival at Bethel

It is still a special place for me as the church of your youth or of your parents, grandparents, and great-grandparents is a special one for you.


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
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What makes some people fat? Researchers at Rockefeller University have isolated a gene in rats and humans that tells the body it's time to stop eating. But it will be years before any drug or treatment can come out of the research.

In preliminary tests at the University of California/San Diego, injecting tiny amounts of an antiviral drug directly into the eve seems to control an infection that causes blindness in many AIDS patients.

Also effective: an eye implant that slowly releases the antiviral drug ganciclovir. Some reports on this therapy come from Emory University School of Medicine. A safer whooping cough vaccine is expected to be
