# Professors List Educated Guesses About New Year

University of Memphis professors have released their annual "educated guesses" about the New Year:

The GOP Takes Power -The toppling of the Democratic majority in Congress gives Republicans an opportunity to embarass President Clinton and block his re-election, say Dr. Kenneth Holland, Dr. Patrick Fett, political science professors.

Though Congress may make some movement toward reforming the nation's welfare system, it is unlikely that any major health care reform proposal will appear in 1995, they say.

But don't look for enactment of the complete Conservative Agenda contained in House Speaker Newt Gingrich's "Contract With America."

"The Republicans really have no obligation to support the contract, " says Holland, chairman of his department. "The contract came out as a political advertisement. A lot of things the conservatives want to do are not even in the contract -- like banning abortions." '

"The Republicans have a specific agenda they said they wanted to do immediately," says Fett, an assistant professor, "but they have already started to back off. For example, Rep. Dick Armey, of Texas, and other GOP leaders have taken a cautious stance on issues such as term limits for Congress.

"Armey is now saying, "Maybe we should see if we Republicans can clean things up before we pass term limits." But when Democrats were in power, Armey wasn't saying that."

Fett does expect Republicans to reform the Congressional committee system and to reduce the number of staff members on Capitol Hill.

The way it is now, it makes the legislative process very confusing," Fett says. "The Republicans can cut the staff because they don't have the extensive leadership tree that the Democrats have.

Holland predicts that the GOP leadership will back off its promise to place limits on the terms of committee chairmen in Congress.

"Now that they are in power, some of the Republicans who have been waiting around for years for a chance to head up a powerful committee aren't likely to give up that power."

Holland says people should not be surprised if the next two years are marked by a return to the legislative grid-lock that marked the Bush administration.

"Because the Democrats still control the White House, the Republicans can say that the reason nothing is getting done is Clinton," Holland says.

As for the GOP proposal to enact a Constitutional amendment requiring a balanced federal budget, the professors agree that political reality may take over

"You have a Republican majority both in Congress and among the governors," Holland notes. "The governors are going to oppose a balanced budget unless the states are protected from the unfunded liabilities of federal programs."

Holland says Clinton is in a politically difficult situation.

"We must not forget their sacrifice," Rickard says.

"We must show those who are protecting us now, we do recognize your efforts."

"He is something of an opportunist. Clinton's only chance for re-election is his willingness to work with Congress.

But, Fett says, "If he moves too far to the right to reach an accommodation with the Republicans, he's alientating his Democratic constituency."

Holland said there is an outside chance that the next year may see the President decide he will not run again.

That would leave the way open for Al Gore to run in 1996.

The trade agreement known as GATT will be good for the Mid-South from both an economic and a business viewpoint, say Dr. Ben Kedia and Dr. David Kemme.

The General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade will mean lower prices for shirts manufactured in Mexico and sold in Memphis, more Arkansas rice on Japanese tables, and wider mar-kets for Tennessee-made automobile parts and Mississippi-grown cotton, the professors say.

They do see some negative features. Clothing manufacturers in the Southeast U.S. will see much of their market won by Mexican companies, they think.

But Kemme says that "whatever we have to do to compensate those who lose...is a small price to pay for the benefits the rest of the country will receive."

Top school problem is not what's happening in the schools, it's what's happening in society, says Dr. Lucinda H. Chance. She continues as follows:

"Children don't come to school and get guns -- they get guns elsewhere and come to school. Children don't come to school to get pregnant. They get pregnant, and get drugs and alcohol elsewhere, and bring these problems to school.

"Teachers and principals alone cannot solve social ills. We as a whole community must deal with these issues.

"Many years ago in education, we basically drew a line at the front door of the school, telling parents and others in the community, "Leave your children here. We'll take care of all your children's needs." We've learned that this approach is not always the best way to educate a child.

"The African proverb that it takes a whole village to raise a

child is fact. We must involve the whole community in a child's education because what happens in school is only one very small but important piece of the child's education.

"We need the collaborative support of families, churches, industry, universities, government and other agencies at all levels to solve the problems we're facing.

"In school, children's needs have changed from being able to regurgitate thousands of facts into being able to think creatively, solve problems, and manipulate data resources through computers, printed materials, and other media.

"Technology and other innovations will help us get past an educational system that was developed for an earlier, very different time."

The family is "remarkably durable," says Dr. Rex Enoch, professor of sociology.

"It's not as fragile as it's currently depicted.

"We've just interpreted some of the statistics incorrectly. They imply more than they prove.

He says today's statistics that indicate higher divorce rates must be viewed in light of the society of the past.

"One hundred years ago, divorce wasn't an alternative for people, particularly for women.

"Also, life spans were shorter, so people who might eventually have divorced, regardless of the stigma it carried, probably died before they were driven to take that drastic step."

The changes that we have seen, Enoch says, are in the roles of women, and these changes make us feel uneasy about society. "Males have been in charge for so long that we know what to expect from them," he says, "but if we have to take into consideration what may be expected of and by people of other genders, ages, etc., the picture becomes less clear.

# Ripley Board OKs 3 Election Districts 4

Ripley's city board voted Monday, 5-1, to ask the state legislature to amend the city charter to provide for election of six aldermen from three districts in the city, with each candidate required to run for one of the six seats.

The three districts would be nearly the same as the three into which the city is now divided for voting in county-wide and other elections, but not exactly, so the County Election Commission would have to set up an entirely different set of records of eligible voters, for every municipal election in Ripley.

Tim Roach, state planner, devised the 3-district plan to equalize voters at 2,151 (651 black) in Dist. 1, 2,271 (726 black) in Dist. 2, and 2,244 (1,455 black) in Dist. 3 Alderman Tommy Duna-

vant voted against the plan. If it goes into effect, for the election in April, 1996, each of the three new districts will elect two aldermen, but not the two top vote-getters in each district.

Any candidate in any district must reside in the district, according to city attorney Rachel J. Anthony, and must specify which of the two alderman seats at stake in the district is sought -- perhaps seat "A" or seat "B" -- but cannot file for both

A candidate for seat could win with less votes than cast for a loser for seat "B."

Candidates know for which seat they should file, unless they knew or speculated on which seat opponents might seek. Possible foes would face the same puzzle.

The plan would affect any re-election plans by four incumbent aldermen -- Dr. Dunavant, Lawson Elder, Billie Ann Hendren, and Jon Pavletic, all residents of the proposed District 2.

Bill Poston and Glardes Thomas would be alone as incumbents in Districts 1 and 3.

In other business, a committee, chaired by alderman Billie Ann Hendren, recommended that after the April 1996, elections, the mayor, now paid \$600, be paid \$800 per month, and that aldermen be paid, as now, \$150 per month, plus \$35 for each committee meeting attended, with a limit of three members per committee.
