

#### Tomatoes Continues To Become Important Crop

The Lauderdale County Chamber of Commerce says there are some 50 growers of tomatoes in Lauderdale County. Almost 1200 acres of Lauderdale County farmland are planted in tomatoes for the 1995 season. This labor intensive crop, using the latest technology, enables these specialty producers to not only produce income, but also enjoy working with the soil.

Staked plants, grown on highly productive soils, develop large fruits which ripen to a flavorful red color. Lauderdale County tomatoes are a favorite throughout the Eastern United States. Direct marketing to stores, brokers and fruit stands with long-standing customers enable growers to provide the grade and color these markets desire.

Tomatoes grown in Lauderdale County have become popular, and a ready market is nearly always available during the growing season.

The Lauderdale County Chamber of Commerce salutes the Lauderdale County tomato industry and the tasty tomato fruit by promoting the Lauderdale County Tomato Festival.

#### No Cost Of Living Jump In County's Budget Plan

County workers paid from the General Fund will get no cost of living increase this year, the budget committee of the County Commission will recommend when the Commission meets Monday.

County Executive Rozelle Criner says elected officials are also expected to fore-go any COLA.

The Budget Committee is recommending a real estate tax rate of \$2.50 per \$100 assessed valuation and a \$20 jump in the county wheel tax, to \$45.

Tax increases are needed to remedy a budget short-fall last fiscal year and to meet costs of the new Justice Center and disability access requirements.

#### \$119,000 U.S. Grant Assists New Library

Sugar Hill, The Lauderdale County Library, has learned, unofficially, that it has been approved for a federal grant of \$119,000 toward building a new, \$350,000 library, at essentially no cost to the county.

A formal announcement is expected soon from state Secretary of State Riley C. Darnell, who oversees the state library system, and from U.S. Rep. John Tanner, who has supported library funding.



Lowering blood cholesterol levels with drugs not only cuts heart attack risk--it can reduce the death rate of heart disease patients, a Scandinavian study found. In five years, there were 42 percent fewer heart-related deaths than among those on a placebo.

More on cholesterol: there's a new test in the works that shines a low red light into the fluid in the front of the eye. As the beam scatters off cholesterol particles there, a device counts the HDL and LDL particles.

With microsurgery, it is possible to reverse a vasectomy. Men under 30 who have the surgery within five years of the vasectomy get the best results, American Family Physician reports.

People whose ears hurt when they fly often get relief by taking a decongestant containing pseudoephedrine 30 minutes before takeoff. Researchers in Michigan explain that the medication dilates the eustachian tubes so it's easier to clear the pressure buildup.
