## Allege Robbery At Knife-Point

The two, with companions, drove around until about 11:30 p.m., when they arrived at Keeley's Trailer Park, on Watkins, to leave some passengers.

There, it is charged, Boyd held a paring knife to Prater's throat and took his wallet, keys, and knife, including \$640 in cash.

Lt. Sanders says Boyd denied the robbery but did not deny she was at the scene, and showed officers where evidence was thrown.

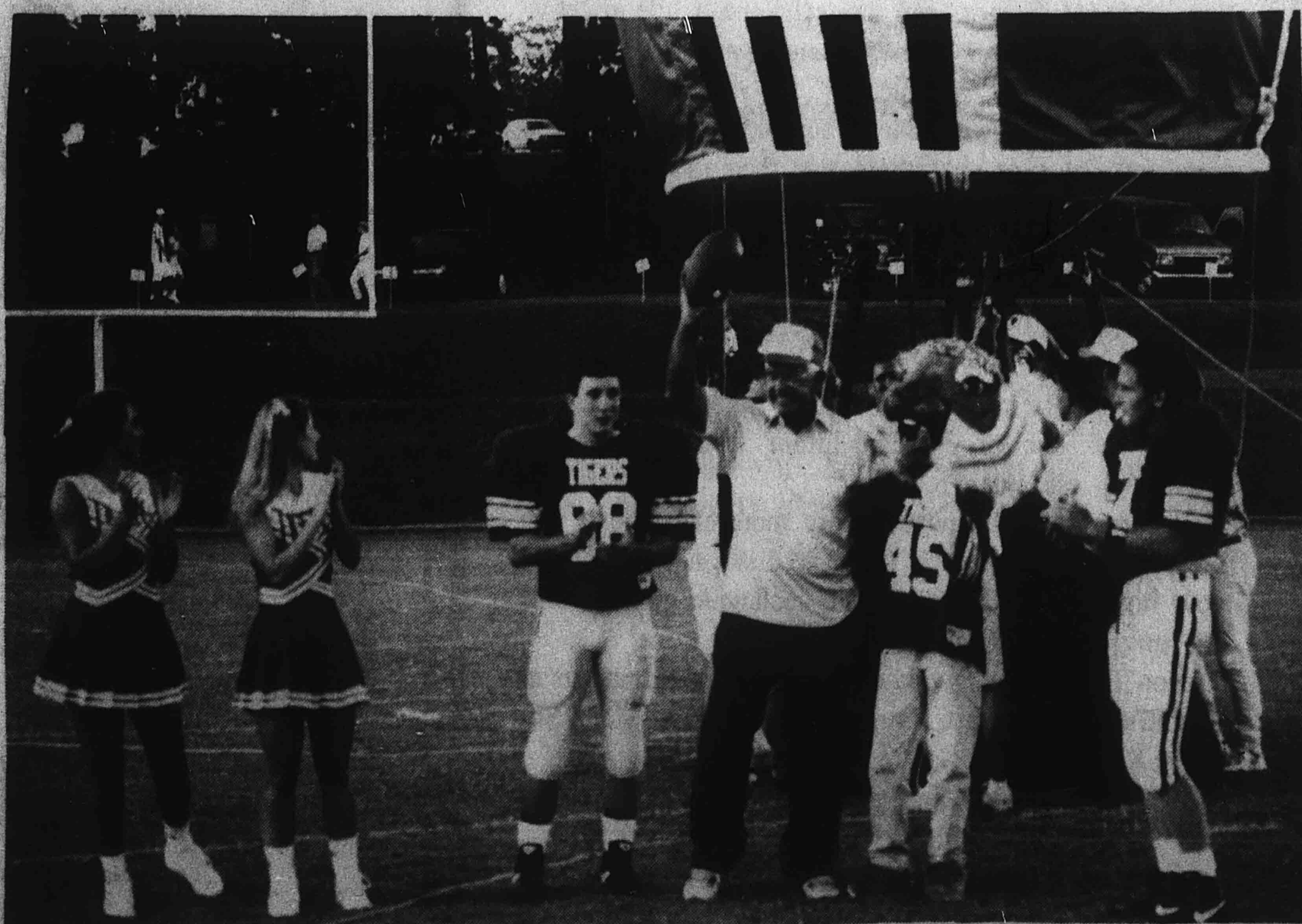
## USWA Wrestling At Ripley High

Swedish scientists have managed to grow cartilage in a test tube to implant into the joint from which the "seed" was removed. Doctors say the technique, while effective for the young, is still a long way from easing osteoarthritis in older people.

A new diagnostic test can screen people to determine if they carry a gene that may give their children cystic fibrosis.

Biochemists in Australia now can freeze human eggs for future fertilization. The technique will be offered to women about to undergo chemotherapy or radiation that could damage their eggs.

When adults who care for babies smoke, it more than triples the risk of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, California researchers report.

Asthma spray medications are more effective if you breathe in the mist slowly (for 3 to 5 seconds), then hold your breath for 10 seconds. The technique gets more of the spray into the lungs.

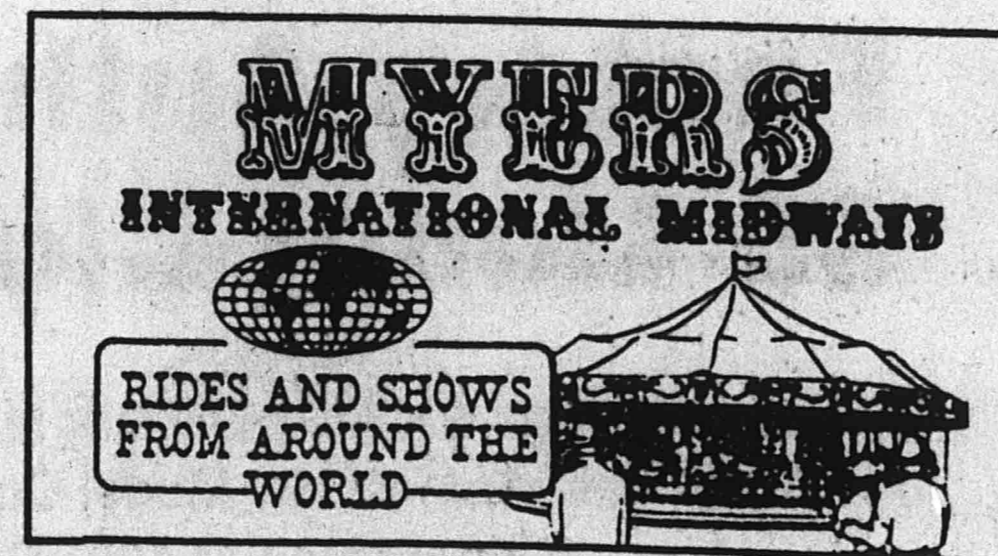

# For Miles Around

### CORPS DECISION ROBS HENRY COUNTY COUPLE OF \$351,000 RETIREMENT

Until a year ago, Nan Robbins of Paris knew nothing about wetlands, hydric soil, delineation, or the Corps of Engineers. Now she does. She never thought she would ever go to Washington and testify before a Senate Committee. Now she has.

Mrs. Robbins is another victim of the federal bureaucracy that has robbed her and her husband of the only inheritance that they have. Here is her story, in her words, as she testified before a U.S. Senate Committee in July of this year:

"My husband and I own a 39 acre commercial parcel in Paris, Tennessee that also includes our home of 20 years. The parcel is now within the city limits, and on

the main highway in a planned business zone.

"My husband has been totally disabled for over 11 years. Our financial security is in the commercial market value of our land."

"In the spring of 1994, we entered a contract to sell our 39 acres for a mobile home sales operation for \$351,000, with \$100,000 held in escrow. Three days after we went to contract, the retractor was asked if he had checked for wetlands.

"When contacted, the Soil Conservation Service said they didn't have the information, but advised us to call the Corps of Engineers. I had no problem. Our land was not a swamp or a marsh, so we called the Corps."

"Our town was seven and a half inches above normal rainfall on the day in March 1994 when the Corps person showed up.

There were puddles on the parcel being filled across the street. Our driveway had puddles. There were puddles in our field and, of course, I got mud on my shoes.

"Immediately the bureaucrat claimed we own a wetland, but he decided to give me advice. Quote 'I am an entrepreneur and almost have my realtor's license and you have this man (the buyer) over a barrel. He's going to lose his \$100,000 or buy this property because you already have a contract'. Unquote.

"I informed him that this is not how I do business and that I do sleep every night."

At the end of the 30 day contract, he had never delineated a wetland before. This was his first.

At this point, she and her husband decided it was best to hire a consultant, who was on the Corps approved list. On his first visit he said, "This is not what I expected. If you were in the Memphis District, your property would be sold. They would never claim this as a wetland". Incidentally, the Memphis District begins less than two miles from her land.

But she got busy. She even called the Pentagon. They told her someone from the Nashville office would do the delineation. They didn't. She called Washington again. Finally, the Corps employee who came the first time returned with his boss and a state employee.

"I had my son to be with me when we met, and when my son asked how they checked the hydrology, the bureaucrat said, without blinking an eye, 'by your mother's shoes', presumably referring to the mud on my shoes after it rained."

She also learned that the Corps employee, who was a parks and recreation major in college, had never delineated a wetland before. This was his first.

At this point, she and her husband decided it was best to hire a consultant, who was on the Corps approved list. On his first visit he said, "This is not what I expected. If you were in the Memphis District, your property would be sold. They would never claim this as a wetland". Incidentally, the Memphis District begins less than two miles from her land.

She also learned another "government absurdity", as she said in her testimony.

"If we would have been growing corn, as was done in the past, our land would have been an unregulated prior converted cropland. The Corps says corn is a commodity, hay is not". She was told that her land was unusual because she mows the hay she grows.

She reminded the Senate Committee that "Webster defines a commodity as anything of value."

Also in her testimony to the Senate Committee, she said, "While the Corps was delineating our land, dirt was being hauled in daily to fill the parcel directly in front of ours...land that is lower than ours. That was a business where the bureaucrat went for lunch on at least one occasion. They have no permit, yet they can fill."

No one knows what will happen next. Mr. and Mrs. Robbins have lost the sale of their property that would have provided their retirement. Maybe someone with enough power will decide that their land is not a wetland after

all. However, if that happens, don't expect to hear from anyone at the Corps of Engineers. The words, "We're sorry", and "We made a mistake", are not likely to be found anywhere in their voluminous manuals.

## County Taxes Up; Again Next Year?

A day after the County Commission, 21-2, raised real estate taxes to \$2.30 per \$100 assessed valuation, plus a \$55 wheel tax, County Executive Rozelle Criner gave Ripley Rotarians a strong hint that taxes could rise again next year.

Though he declined to predict that, all the statistics he provided pointed in that direction:

--The new Justice Center, he said, planned before he took office and financed by \$5,500,000 in bonds, came in under that figure only by cutting the gravel under the parking lot by an inch, eliminating one coat of paint on interior walls, and substituting plastic for metal plumbing, vinyl for more durable floors, and a 10-year, instead of a 30-year, roof, on a project financed by 20-year bonds.

No provision was made, he said, for the \$100,000 cost of selling the bonds, the costs of furnishing the building, nor for the additional costs of running the new complex, which he said may run \$300,000 to \$400,000 a year above present jail operation costs.

He said the complex "appears 20% to keep prisoners and 80% for new offices."

He said some offices may open half-furnished.

Criner noted that Forcum Lannom Associates, of Dyersburg, construction manager for the project, has failed to complete it by the July 23rd date specified, but that its contract does not provide any fines for delay.

--The county's two landfills at Dry Hill face an October, 1996, dead-line, without installing a costly synthetic liner. Criner said closing the landfills would cost about \$840,000, with the county having responsibility for the next 30 years.

He indicated a preference for the county continuing to operate a land-fill, rather than bidding it out to a commercial firm, with only a few bidders expected.

The county is asking, first, for a variance from the regulations and then hoping for aid from the state legislature when it meets in January, to ease requirements.

Monday's Commission vote for the new tax rates was 21-2. Dissenting were Akin Barnes and Lawson Elder.

## Halls, 3-0, Is Hosting Huntingdon In 7-2A

Halls High School's Tigers, 3-0 after coasting through a 55-12 win from Greenfield, host Huntingdon this Friday to dispute a 1-0 tie in the region, along with Martin Westview and Union City, who meet this week-end in Union City.

Huntingdon's Mustangs were 10-2 last fall, losing in the second round of the play-offs to David Lipscomb.

## Longer Duck Season Voted

This fall's duck-hunting season will run 50 days, up 10 from last year, with more liberal limits--five per day, up from three.

Dates are Dec. 2-24 and Dec. 26-Jan. 21.

Daily limit may include no more than four mallards (only one female), two wood ducks, and/or one each black duck, canvasback, pin-tail, or red-head.

## In Henning, A New Board Member, New Policeman

Henning's city board, meeting Monday evening, saw Herman L. Reviere administer the oath of office to Kathryn Farmer, as an alderman, elected unanimously by the board to succeed Wesley Jennings, who resigned after a federal indictment for bribery.

The board employed Steve Jackson, 25, of Route 4, Ripley, as its first full-time day-time policeman.

## Ripley Hosts Region Star: Fayette-Ware

Ripley High School's Tigers face a biggest test this Friday when they host the Wildcats of Somerville's Fayette-Ware.

The Wildcats and Collierville's Dragons are almost unanimously expected to vie for the Region 7-4A crown when they clash, Oct. 27th, to close each team's regular season.

But there are four play-off spots available, in a 6-team region, and Friday's game could prove crucial for Ripley, now tied with Collierville and F-W, 1-0 in the region.

The Tigers go into the game undefeated, after a 23-6 win from Frayser, a 48-21 region win from Bolton, and an open date last week.

Fayette-Ware's Wildcats won their opener, hosting Memphis Treadwell, 48-6, and took a region win hosting Covington, 30-7, before losing a close one last week, hosting a non-region foe, Bolivar, 35-32.

Last fall, the Wildcats were, like the Tigers, 5-5.

This fall, they have seven home games, three of them among five region foes. Their visit to Knee Field this Friday will be their first road game.

And they haven't lost the assets which have taken them to the play-offs for two consecutive years.

Last fall, their offense led the state, averaging nine yards a play and 37 points a game.

Junior quarterback Avis Carter, only 5-5, 150, ran eight touchdowns and passed for 16.

Hurling for close to 2,000 yards, he went the last 200 tosses without an interception.

Theophil Benson (5-10, 180) is back after 42 receptions, for more than 1,100 yards, and 22 TDs in the past two seasons.

Antonio Dye (5-11, 165) received for 600 yards.

F-W lost to Brentwood in the first round of play-offs last fall.

Coach Arnett Thomas (21-25) had the luxury, this year, of choosing the region's heaviest offensive line, from players like tackles Ray Clayton (6-5, 305), Clarzel Spencer (6-3, 300), Kelvin Beasley (6-2, 290) and Jason Johnson (6-2, 265).

F-W lacks, however, experience in the secondary, with only juniors and sophomores there.

### Treadwell Lost On Turf

Treadwell, Class AA, lost to F-W, 48-6, on the ground. F-W rushed for 285 yards, to minus six, and passed for 21 -- a 12-yard TD, Carter-Benson, and a 9-yard TD, Carter-Dye.

Hosting Covington, F-W again dominated the ground play, 223 yards to 32. It was after a half-time lead of 16-0 that F-W scored TDs on passes of 22 yards (Carter-Benson) and 32 yards (Carter-Dye).

Last week, Bolivar (Region 6-4A, 2-8 last fall, and largely manned by sophomores, but with a smoothly working offensive line) edged F-W, 35-32, in a non-region encounter.

## Burglars Steal Cash Registers

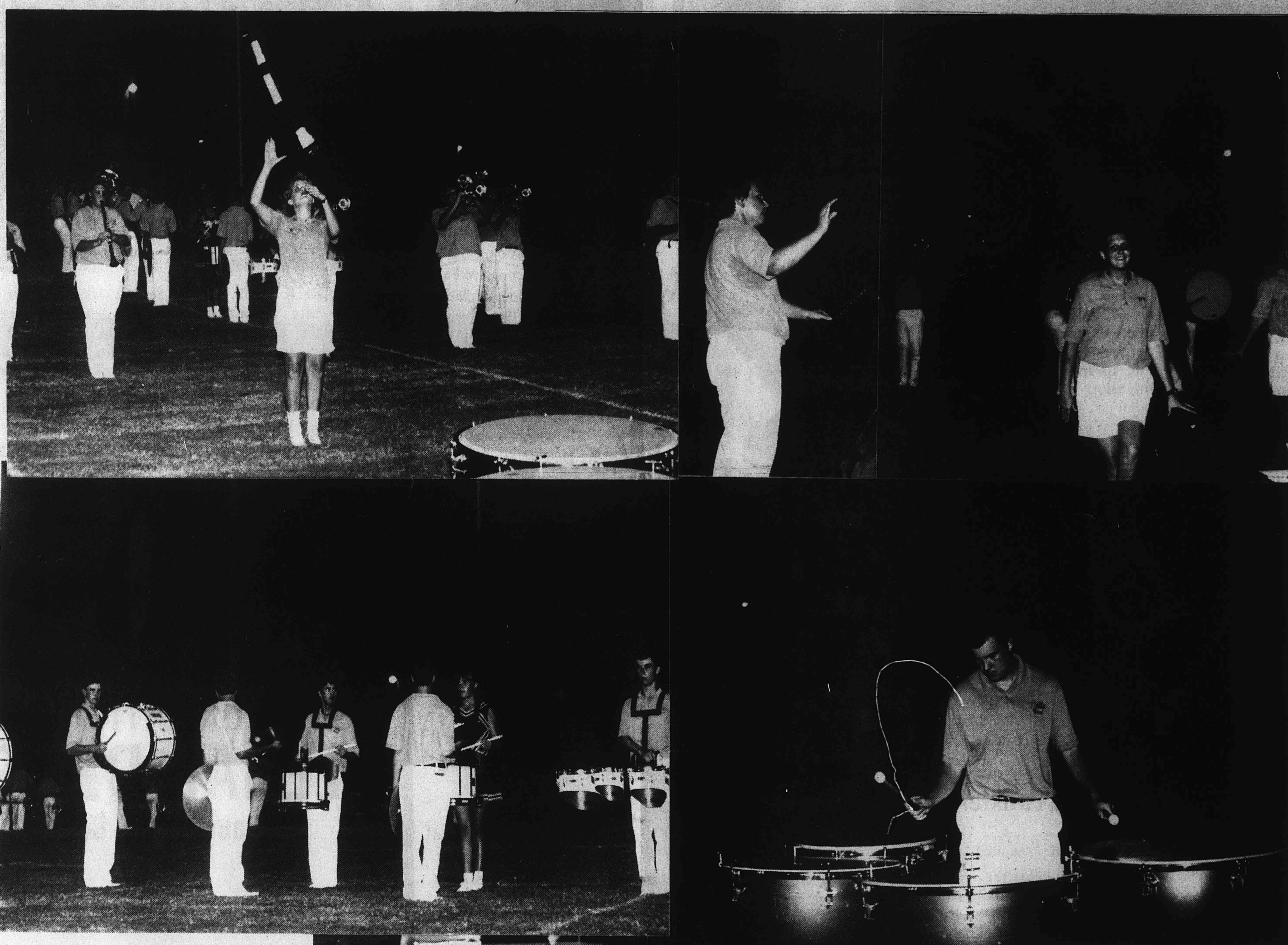
Mills Grocery on old Highway 51 South was robbed Tuesday morning.

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### Pharmacy Topics

Diet seems to play a role in ovarian cancer, say scientists at Yale School of Medicine. Cutting out 10 gm. of saturated fat a day lowers the risk by 20 percent, and adding 10 gm. of vegetable fiber drops the risk another 37 percent.

Theophylline, a drug often used for asthma, can help restore arrhythmic hearts to normal, a study at the University of Florida found. It seems to block the action of adenosine, a natural chemical sometimes overproduced after a heart attack.

A daily multivitamin seems to increase immunity in people over 60 who continue their normal diets, say scientists at New Jersey Medical School. They suspect the older subjects need the extra nutrition.

New, faster blood test can tell doctors in little more than one hour--instead of eight--whether a patient is really having a heart attack, so that clot-buster drugs can be given safely. New technology was reported in the *New England Journal of Medicine*.

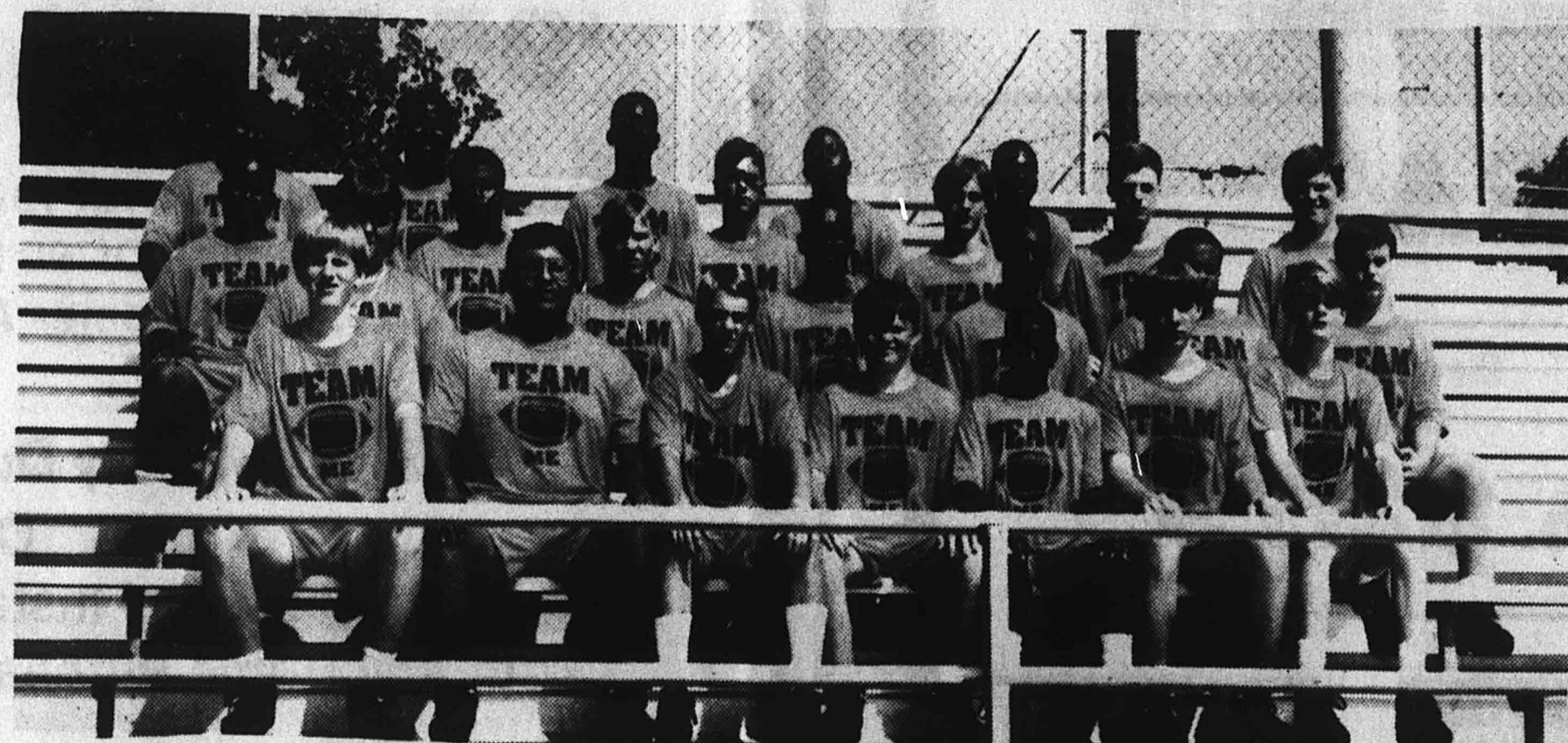

There's something about salmon that seems to protect against diabetes. A study in Seattle noted that folks over 40 who ate salmon every day were 50 percent less likely to have any glucose intolerance, often a precursor of diabetes.  
Men get hot flashes, too, as a side effect of treatment for prostate cancer, Mayo Clinic doctors note. New treatment, a hormone called megestrol acetate, seems to alleviate the problem without apparent side effects.

### FACTS ABOUT FAMILIES

Families Can Help Children Cope With Fear And Anxiety

(NAPS)—Whether tragic events touch your family personally or are brought into your home via newspapers and television, you can help children cope with the anxiety that violence, death and disasters can cause.

Listening and talking to children about their concerns can reassure them that they will be safe. Start by encouraging them to discuss how they have been affected by what is happening around them. Even young children may have specific questions about tragedies. Children react to stress at their own developmental level.

The Federal Center for Mental Health Services offers these additional pointers for parents and other caregivers:

- Encourage children to ask questions. Listen to what they say. Provide comfort and assurance that address their specific fears. It's okay to admit you can't answer all of their questions.
- Talk on their level. Communicate with your children in a way they can understand. Don't get too technical or complicated.
- Be honest. Tell them exactly what has happened. For example, don't say that someone who has died has "gone to sleep"; children may become afraid of going to bed.
- Find out what else frightens them. Encourage your children to talk about other fears they may have. They may worry that someone will harm them at school or that someone will try to hurt you.
- Focus on the positive. Reinforce the fact that most people are kind and caring. Remind your child of the heroic actions taken by ordinary people to help victims of tragedy.
- Pay attention. Your children's play and drawings may give you a glimpse into their questions or concerns. Ask them to tell you what is going on in the game or the picture. It is an opportunity to clarify any misconceptions, answer questions and give reassurance.
- Develop a plan. Establish a family emergency plan for the future, such as a meeting place where everyone should gather if something unexpected happens in your family or neighborhood. It can help you and your child feel safer.

If you are concerned about your child's reaction to stress or trauma, call your physician or a community mental health center.

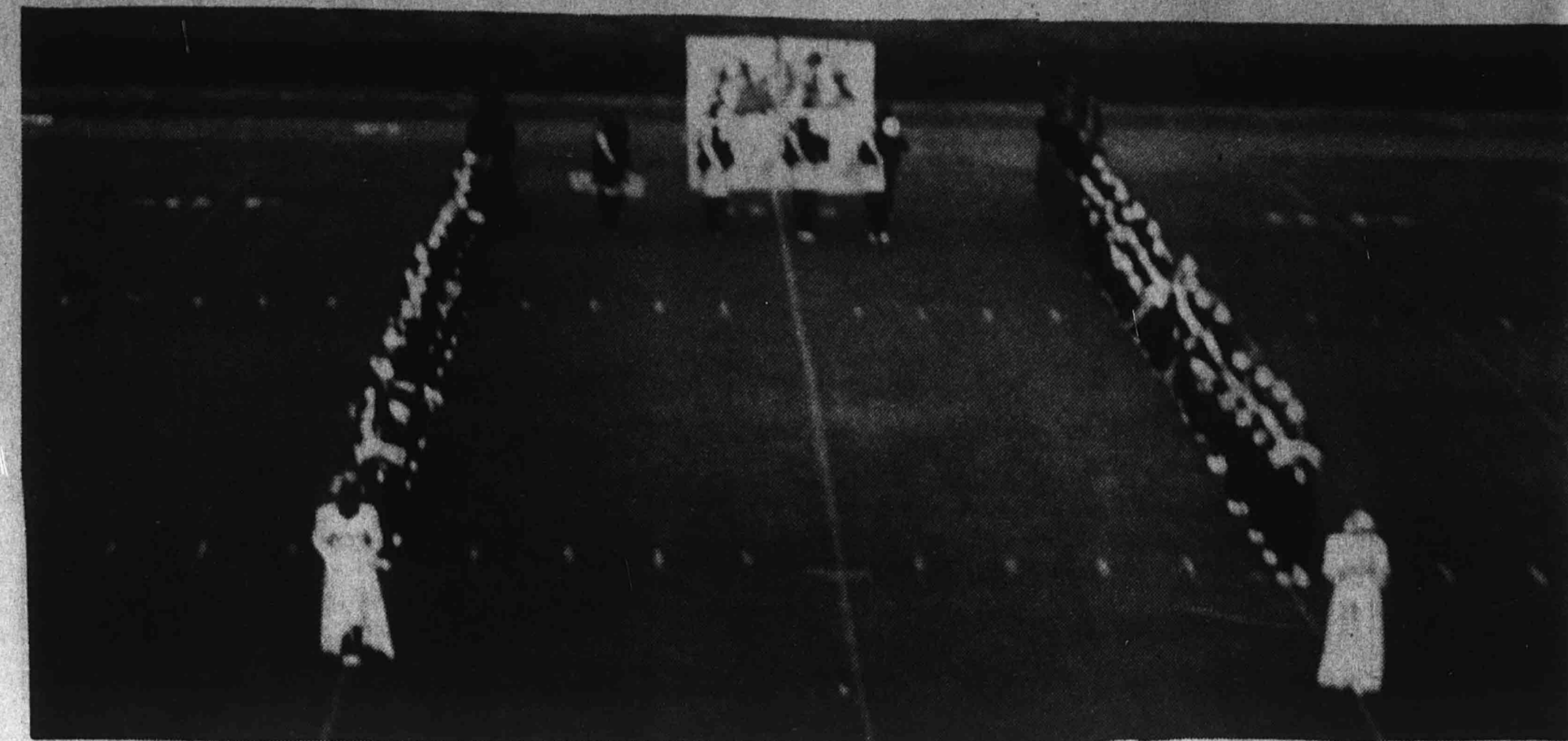

### Cooking Corner

For Great Grilling—Duck

(NAPS)—Any time of year is a good time to liven up your barbecue with grilled duckling.

Through selective breeding, today's farm-raised duckling is high in flavor and low in fat, making it a good choice for taste and health. For example, Maple Leaf Farms brand duckling has less than half the fat of either beef or pork and fewer calories and lower cholesterol than beef, pork or chicken.

Following are quick and easy tips to help you prepare a great grilled duckling:

1. **Shop Smart.** Look for Grade-A, frozen or fresh whole duckling; cut it into quarters.

4. **Glaze.** To enhance flavor, turn and glaze the duckling pieces frequently. Each of these recipes yields 1-1/2 cups glaze, enough for 4 to 10 pounds of duckling, quartered.

5. **Serve.** Let grilled duckling pieces set about five minutes before serving.

**Chutney:** In cup, over 1/4 cup golden raisins pour 1/2 cup boiling water and set aside to "plump"; drain. Melt 1/2 cup currant jelly over low heat in saucepan. Stir in raisins and 1/2 cup chutney.

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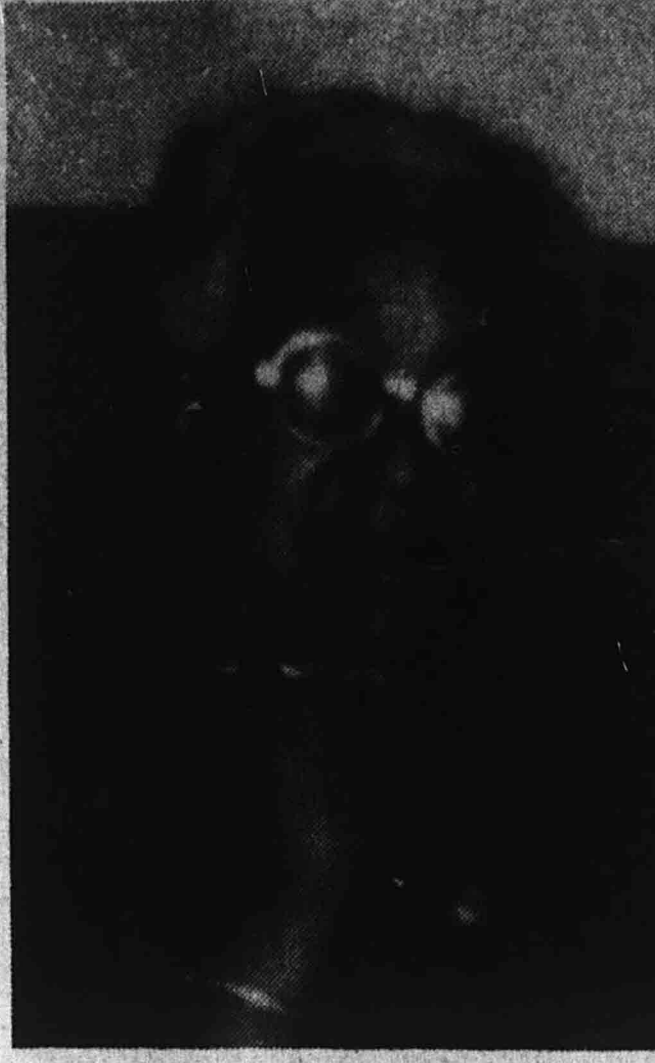

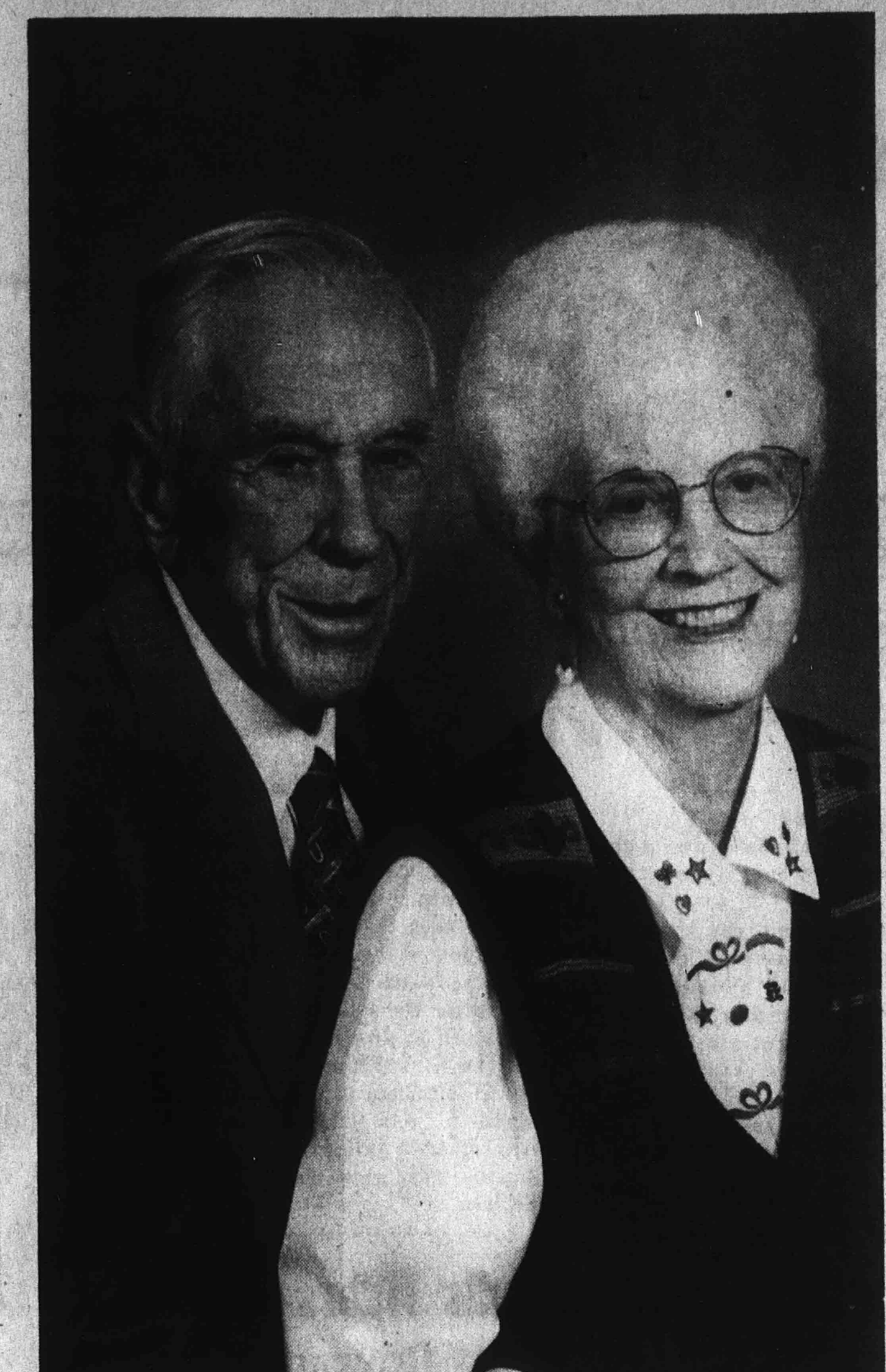

### Paschal Urges Seeding of Winter Cover Crops

F. H. PASCHAL, County Agent

If 20 per cent of the cropland in Lauderdale County were seeded in crimson clover this month, the feed produced would be equivalent to 728,000 bushels of corn new worth \$1,200,000. Our land would be protected against washing by winter and spring rains and those rains should be used for the production of feed worth at least \$55.00 per acre.

If only 10 per cent of our cropland were seeded right away to barley or oats or wheat and these crops produced next year, the feed produced would be equivalent to 364,000 bushels of corn new worth \$600,000. Our land would be protected against washing by winter and spring rains and those rains should be used for the production of feed worth at least \$30.00 per acre.

The fine rains we have just had surely make favorable soil conditions for the planting of alfalfa, crimson clover, ryegrass, vetch and other crops needed for feed production and soil improvement. Heed these Pasture Tips!

About double the usual seedings of crimson clover and ryegrass or oats, barley, or wheat will make a profitable pasture for buying hens which will save at least 50 per cent on the feed bill and make substantial increases in the production of eggs during fall and winter months. Seed one acre for each 100 hens.

Fertilize Strawberries Next Week

Strawberry growers can almost double their profits on berries next spring by the application of 500 pounds of 14-8 fertilizer per acre this coming week. Distribute the fertilizer on the top of the rows and knock it off the plants. Fertilizer applied later when the ground is cold or applied next February will not have time to increase the growth and producing ability of the plants. Fertilize strawberry plants.

Kill Peach Borers in October

Peach borers should remain in the ground until they are killed by frost. Kill them with a spray of DDT or other insecticide.

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### Election

This week the call for the referendum to determine whether the sale of beer shall be decontrolled in Halls has been made. We believe that it is only fair and proper that the people of Halls should be allowed to express their wishes in the matter and WE KNOW that it is the duty of every qualified citizen to go to the polls and state his views. Go to the polls on Tuesday, October 15, and exercise your sovereign right to vote. There has been some criticism of the board for the failure to act within themselves but we feel a vote of the people is the only fair way to decide any issue of such proportions.

### Street Cleaning

Last week we griped a little bit about the street cleaning and where it stopped in the business section. Well, it seems that we didn't have much influence as the streets are still dirty. Across the street from the office along side the building occupied by the post office and former location of the cleaners there is still a huge accumulation of paper and trash that to our certain knowledge has been there for some time. It is impossible to prevent paper and trash from being thrown along the sidewalks and streets but it does seem to us that the man cleaning the streets could be instructed to clean it up. That does not mention coming down in front of our building, the theatre, and the other business houses in this block but a section that is directly across from the Mayor's Office. At one time Halls had the reputation of an unusually clean town but we can't boast of such a reputation now. How about it Mr. Mayor and Mr. Alderman, can we get the streets cleaned up?

### The Farm Bureau

Elsewhere in this issue of the Graphic will be found an advertisement from the Farm Bureau urging that farmers join that organization. It is our belief that the farmers of the nation are neglecting their own rights and needs when they fail to support such an institution which is working so hard to better the lot of the farmers in relation to other businesses and labor in general.
