


### CHRISTMAS CONCERT


## **Open House For** Sugar Hill Library

Glenn Thompson Dies; Star Newsman, Donor Glenn Thompson, 92, Ripley native who co-founded Ripley High School's newspaper, High Life, as a junior in Ripley High School in 1921 and retired in 1969 after 9-1/2 years as the editor of the daily Dayton, Ohio, Journal-Herald, died Nov. 17th in Bethany Lutheran Village in Centerville, Ohio, a nursing home in which he had resided, with heart problems, for a bit over a year. He was the son of Will and Rylla Thompson, who resided at 194 South Jefferson, in the

present Billy Poston home. His father was in the hard ware business on the west side of the Square in Ripley. He co-founded High Life with Walter "Bulldog" Durham, who later published the weekly Henning Progress before becoming Plant-To-Prosper editor of the Memphis Commercial Appeal, promoting improvements in

Mid-South agriculture. Library Aid Was Crucial Glenn's challenge gift to Sugar Hill, The Lauderdale County Library, in Ripley, of \$25,000, to be matched 1-for-, went over its goal, in a son, of Ripley.

Dayton's City Beautiful Council, its Area Progress Council of business leaders, the Park District of Dayton and Montgomery County, the Ohio Conservation Association, which he served as its first president, and the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission.

He was a founder and later president of Little Miami, Inc., which pressed Congress to pass the 1967 Wild and Scenic Rivers Act which now protects the Little Miami River, in Ohio, the Hatchie River, in West Tennessee, and many other rivers.



In 1991, Glenn told his secretary to call him, in his obituary, a

He was president of the Dayton-Montgomery County Historical Society when it hired its first staff member. He served as a director of the Ohio Historical Society.







## FARM BUREAU HISTORY BOOK WAS TRAGIC, HAPPY STORIES

As noted in an earlier column, the new book, "From The Ground Up, A 75 Year History of the Tennessee Farm Bureau Federation". contains the names of a lot of people. These are tolks who had leadership roles at the state and county levels from 1921 up to the present time.

There are also some brief light hearted stories about individuals that we have known through the years. There is one tragic story, however, that happened before my 42 year tenure with the organization.

Last year, the employees of the Tennessee Farm Bureau drove over 770 thousand miles in their official travels. That is a lot of exposure on the highways, but in all the years that the employees have been driving, none have been killed in a traffic accident. They have been most fortunate.

There has been one death, but it was not traffic related. It was a cold blooded murder that occurred 50 years ago. J. Edward Sprouse, Jr., was a young accountant for both the Tennessee Farmers Cooperative and the Tennessee Burley Tobacco Growers Association when they were still housed in the Farm Bureau headquarters in Columbia.

Sprouse had been working



for about a year, but this was just after World War II, and he couldn't find suitable housing in Columbia for his wife and two small children, and therefore they remained in Clarksville. He would stay in Columbia during the week, and return home to be with them on the weekend.

On Monday morning, January 6, 1947, Sprouse was returning to Columbia to begin another week's work. Near Brentwood, he picked up two hitchhikers. Instead of being grateful for his kindness, the two young men took him through Columbia and out the road to Centerville. They turned off on a side road, tied Sprouse to a tree with his own necktie and belt, and shot him seven times, as he plead for his life for the sake of his wife and two babies.

The killers were captured later near Athens, Alabama driving Sprouse's car. They led police and friends to the spot where the body was found.

Thankfully, that sort of incident has not been repeated in the Farm Bureau family.

On the much lighter side is the story in the book about former Tennessee Farm President Joe Bureau Hawkins. Before he became president of the organization in 1986, he was a dairy farmer in Johnson County. He was also a member of the county commission there when it was still called the county court. This made him a justice of the peace, and gave him the authority to con-

The young lady remained in the car, but the young man got out. He came over and said he was looking for Joe Hawkins.

"I'm Joe Hawkins. What can I do for you?", Mr. Hawkins asked.


"We want to get married", the young man said. "Can you marry us?"

Mr. Hawkins said that he could, and he asked the young man if he had a marriage license. He didn't, and he was told that he would have to have one. "Since it's Saturday, and the courthouse is closed, you: can't get a license until Monday. If you'll get your license Monday and come back, I'll : marry you", Mr. Hawkins told

The young man returned to : the car, had a short conversation with his girl friend, and then came back to where Joe : and Bart Hawkins were standing.

"Well, could you just say a ? few words over us to get us by until Monday morning?", the obviously anxious bridegroom asked.

Joe and Bart Hawkins got a big laugh out of that story, and they both enjoy telling it today. We thought it was worth putting in the Farm Bureau history book.

## **REMEMBERING A VISIT** WITH RED SKELTON

A quote by Fred Posey of Prattville, Alabama in the November issue of Progressive Farmer magazine caught my eye. On their monthly feature page called, "Cornerstones", Mr. Posey said, "Memories are the perfume of yesterday".

To me, to be able to remember is one of the precious gifts that God gave us. And as I grow older, I find that the bad memories fade, and the good ones become brighter.

One of my very happy memories concerns the great comedian Red Skelton. Never in my wildest dreams would I have ever believed that I would get to meet him, and even have a one on one conversation with him.

It happened this way. Mr. Skelton was the featured entertainment at the 1983 American Farm Bureau convention in Dallas, Texas. Since I was the convention song leader and master of ceremonies, it allowed me to be back stage on the evening that he was to appear. asked my wife, Mary Jane, to bring her camera so that she could make a picture of Red and me together. He was most gracious, and she snapped a quick picture just before he went on stage.

The · picture turned out great, and I thought that would be the end of it. However, a few months later, Mr. Skelton came to Nashville for a show, and held a news conference ahead of time at the Hermitage Hotel. Thinking I just might get the picture autographed, I went to the press conference early.

I never expected to see him sitting in the lobby of the hotel, but he was there, and signing some of his plates with clown faces on them that he paints. I introduced myself to him, and he remembered the Dallas convention, and some of the things that happened there.

He autographed the picture, which hangs in my den, and as we talked, I told him about a man sitting near me at the Dallas performance that never laughed the entire time. There might have been times that this man had a brief smile, but it was seldom. I told Mr. Skelton that I couldn't understand that.

Mr. Skelton said he used to worry about things like that, but not any more, and he told me this story. He said that when he was in vaudeville, after the show, he would stay on stage to speak with anyone who wanted to talk to him. At one particular show, he noticed a gentleman who never smiled the entire time, and it bothered him.

Afterwards, when folks were lined up to speak, he noticed this gentleman in line, and he thought; "Oh, my, what is he going to say to me"?

When the gentleman got to him, he said, "Mr. Sketton, I guess you noticed that I didn't laugh tonight", and Mr. Skelton told him that he had.






