

McCalla's dead-line for the fine, last Friday, was extended when he was told occupancy was being delayed by the State Fire Marshal's office.

In a 1993 suit, McCalla ordered a new jail, to replace the one at West Jackson and Monroe, in Ripley, be opened by Sept. 23, 1995.

The contractor failed to complete the new Justice Center on time. McCalla then set the new dead-line (last Friday).

County officials have rushed this week to meet the State Fire Marshal's requirements. They are hopeful the \$50,000 fine can be avoided.
