# Robbers Strike Henning Bank

Officers are seeking two black men who robbed Volunteer Bank in Henning of thousands of dollars about 10:25 a.m. Wednesday of last week.

One held a revolver on tellers while the other leaped over a counter to fill a bag with cash.

Tellers said one wore a long wig under a baseball cap.

They said the pair escaped in a black Chevrolet Metro.

As it headed east through the tunnel under the Illinois Central Railroad, a witness said the men were hanging out of the windows of the car, which was smoking

because dye and pepper gas had been released from stolen cash.

The car, stolen and believed to have been used in the robbery of a Pizza Hut in Shelby County, May 19th, was found abandoned, with a wig and a baseball cap, in Bethlehem Cemetery, just east of Henning.

There were women in the first medical-school class at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, more than 100 years ago. In '93, for the first time, they outnumbered men in the freshman class.

The antibiotic clarithromycin seems effective in preventing a common bacterial infection in AIDS patients. Those on the drug were 9 percent less likely to develop the infection than those receiving a placebo.

There seems to be a correlation between diabetics with retinal damage and low levels of zinc, a small-scale study found. Even minimal supplements help, the *European Journal of Clinical Nutrition* notes.

New ultrasound testing method for breast cancer has been recommended for approval by an FDA advisory panel. The High-Definition Imaging ultrasound is said to differentiate between benign and cancerous lumps.

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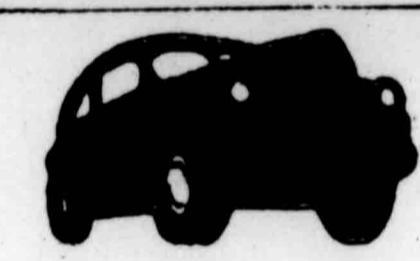
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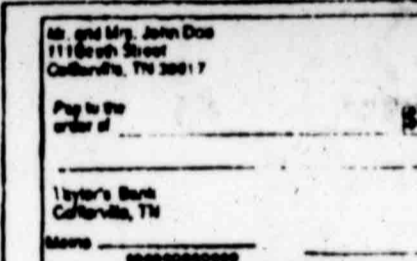

If a county fire department needs help, Ripley assists.

Ripley has "mutual aid" agreements with Henning, Halls, and Gates, in this county, and with Brownsville and Covington. An agreement with Dyersburg is pending.

If one city needs the other's aid, it will be provided, at the cost of the provider.

County fire departments have two other resources available:

--The prison complex at Fort Pillow has a fire department which will assist in fighting fires beyond the prisons' boundaries.

--The state Forestry Division makes available, from Ripley, a John Deere 350 bulldozer with plow attachment, which can go where fire trucks can't, and two pick-up trucks with 150-gallon water tanks, to fight grass and forest fires.

Rhea has 12 full-time firemen, working 24-hour shifts; 12 volunteers, working a 12-hour shift monthly; and five reserve firemen, working 24-hour shifts.

Three pumpers are supplemented by a 55-ft. ladder truck and a 750-gallon tanker.

"We use less water now," Goad says, "from the old days when fire-fighting was just to put more water on it. Sometimes, less water is better."

"But we have to have water, and to fight a fire out in the country, without fire-plugs, we need a good water supply."

"Pumping 100 to 150 gallons a minute, it runs out fast."

Goad's department fielded more than 250 calls last year, many of them false alarms, including two bomb threats.

And he personally rescued a kid from a tree, for a 12-year-old.

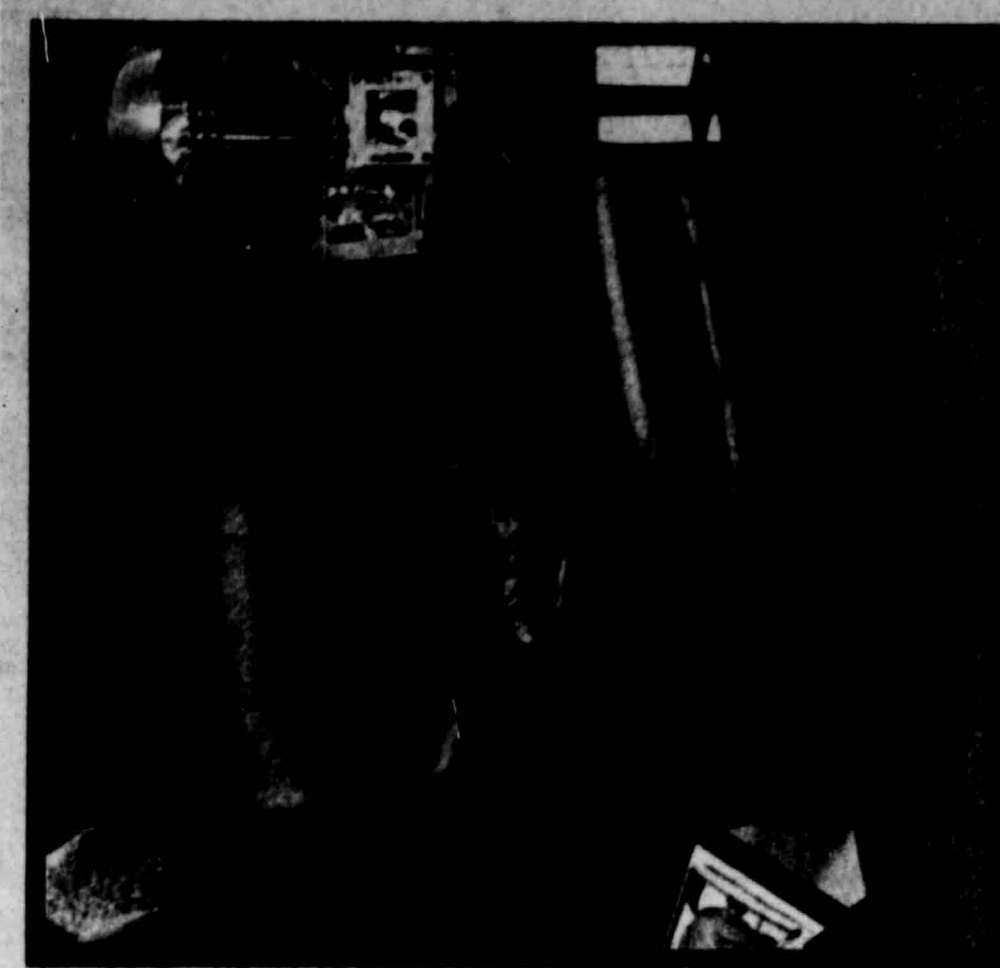

## Steamboat Docks At Ashport

The Grand American Queen docked at Ashport last Friday morning on an historical tour at Fort Pillow State Park. The 418 foot vessel is 110 feet high and its gross tonnage is 3,707 pounds. She is the newest steamboat sister to the Delta and Mississippi Queen steamboats built by the Delta Steamboat Co. She was set afloat in June 1995.

Driving down Highway 19 West, nearing the river, she appeared to be a magnificent grand hotel on the bank. With the river above flood stage, you could step on the gang plank and go on board.

This is a rare sight today but 50 years ago it was very common to see these steamboats docked at Ashport and other river ports up and down the Mississippi River.

Mr. Woodrow Kirkpatrick, who is now deceased, would tell me stories about being a young boy and hearing the steamboats whistle. He said he "and the other boys would run down to Ashport and meet the boats. We'd help them unload supplies for the farmers and general stores. When the showboats would come in we could hear the music coming down the river. Back then many families lived in the river bottom. Cars were a rare thing. This was the mule and wagon days. If a man owned a team of mules, he was as proud as we are of our automobiles, we never took anything for granted! We welcomed any entertainment. Our social life was church."

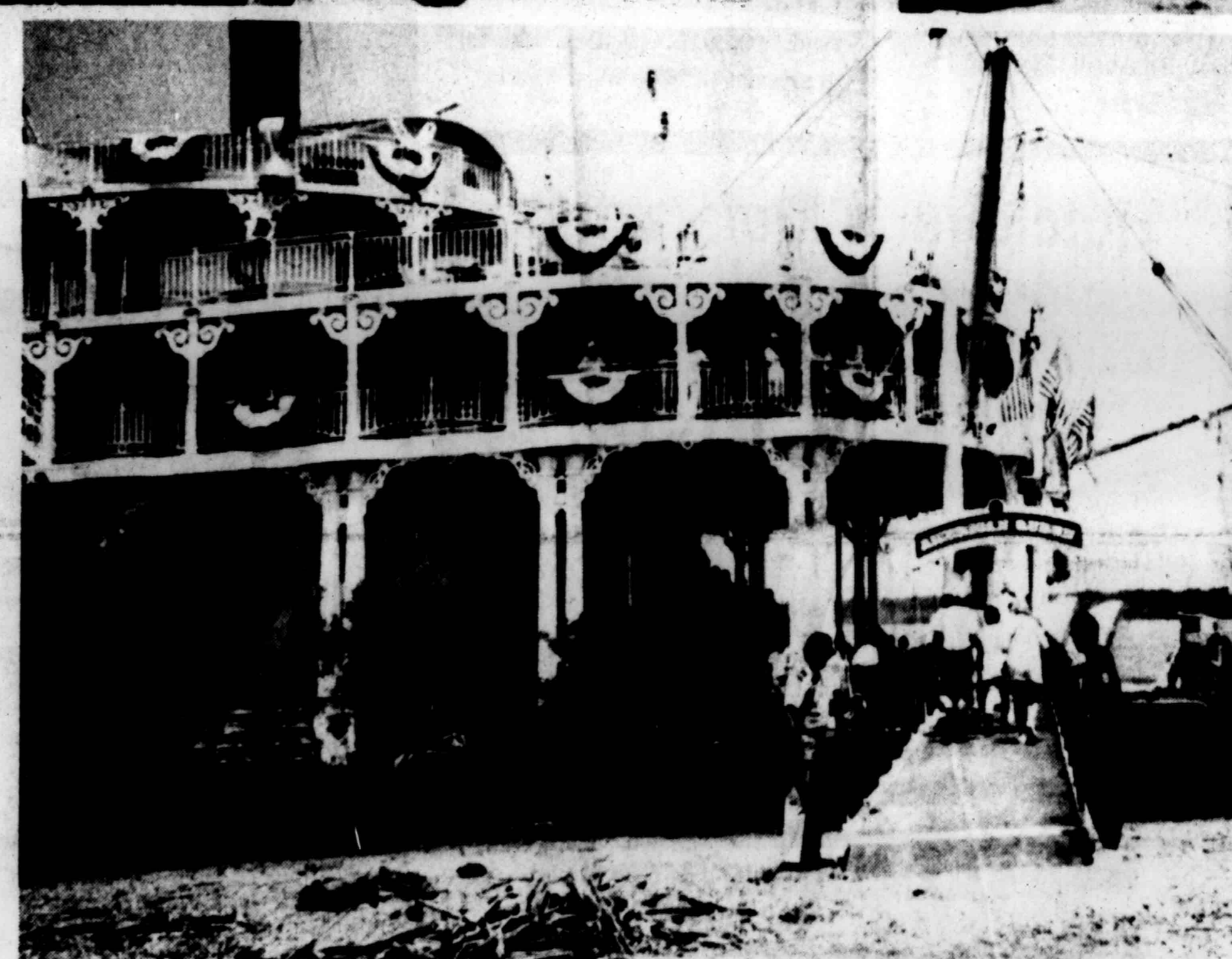
Ashport was named for the Ashwood the boats would stop and stock up on.

The old Ashport has long been gone, "caved off in the river," Mr. Woodrow would say. The people would have to keep moving back.

"There used to be a black cemetery at Ashport, it caved off in the river too," he said. "I'll never forget those days, there were some hard times but we didn't know because everyone lived the same hard way. We didn't know another life existed, we had no T.V."

## Ripley Holds Tax, Adds Library Aid

Ripley aldermen Monday approved a 1996-97 budget with no rise in the real estate tax rate (\$1.68 per \$100 assessment).

The budget includes \$5,000 for a new Library, on the former Jack Palmer property on Lafayette, and a pledge of \$5,000 from each of the next three years.

The city has traditionally paid 1/3rd of the county's costs of operating Sugar Hill. The Lauderdale County library, at 123 South Jefferson, since 2/3rds of its users are in the Ripley area.

In the last fiscal year, users borrowed 25,040 hard-bound books, 2,261 paper-backs, 1,304 video cassettes, 1,394 audio cassettes, and 250 magazines.

The visually-impaired enjoyed cassettes and large-print books.

Children's programs (story hours and a Summer Reading Program) drew 1,408.

Ripley's new city park, costing more than a million dollars, has 2,250 children registered.

The Library secured 79 inter-library loans, for books not on its shelves, and answered 3,735 reference questions.

At public cost of \$1.50 per county resident, the state estimates the value of services rendered at \$670,083 (\$28.35 per resident).

The Library has out-grown Sugar Hill, at 123 South Jefferson. Adding a federal-state grant of \$120,000, and a county grant of \$60,000, to about \$140,000 raised privately (another \$30,000 in prospect), the Library could not expect, without Monday's aid from the city, to seek bids on a project estimated to cost \$375,000.

Five aldermen voted (Jimmy Harrison, absent) went 5-0 to support the Library's needs.

### Public Transportation Operates Under New Name



The Delta Human Resource Agency has been awarded the rural public transportation program, starting July 1, 1996, in Tipton, Lauderdale, and Fayette Counties by the State of Tennessee Department of Transportation previously operated by MIFA County Connection.

The Agency already operates several programs such as Child Care Broker, Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program, Weatherization, Community Services Block Grant, HOME (USDA) Commodities in those counties. According to John V. Sarral, Executive Director, and Ms. Jean McAlister Transportation Coordinator, of Delta Human Resource Agency, the public transportation will enhance service for the programs in place and in turn referrals from other agency programs will be a real asset for coordinating transportation.

The public transportation program is funded in part by local, state and federal monies. Kathy Duenkel, Public Transportation Manager with Tennessee Department of Transportation (TDOT) has been very supportive and helpful in assuring that this program experience a smooth transition. Local county governments have been very involved in preparing for Delta HRA to manage the rural transportation.

Eligibility is not a necessity therefore any one can ride the van regardless of age, income or need. Residents need only to call for scheduling appointments. Many vans are equipped with lifts to transport wheelchair passengers. Trips for shopping and banking as well as medical appointments can be scheduled. Delta HRA vans are available for out-of-county trips in addition to local trips. Many dialysis patients use the public transportation to get in to clinics for treatment. Passengers fee safe since the vans pick them up at their home and take them to their desired destination. There is no need to worry with traffic or unsafe parking garages.

Many passengers who are Tenn Care recipients are approved for transportation to be paid by Tenn Care for medical appointments. Other contract services are available.

Our drivers are long term, experienced and caring employees. They are professionals who have received on-going training in passenger assistance, defensive driving, and emergency and evacuation procedures. The primary goal of our staff is the safety of our passengers.

For your convenience, a local county office in each of the three county areas. Our service areas include local, Dyer, Haywood, Madison and Shelby Counties. However if you have a need for transportation outside these areas, you may contact your local county office to inquire about services.

We ask that reservations be made at least 3 days in advance or as soon as you learn of your appointment. This will insure you of having a seat on the van when you need to go. Likewise, cancellations as far in advance as possible are appreciated since this will free the schedule for other passengers needing transportation.

The fare are: \$1.00 round trip in resident county, \$4.00 round trip out-of-county, .50 each additional county line crossed, and .25 each additional stop.

LEARNING COUNTIES, COUNTY SEAT TOWNS IN TENNESSEE CAN BE CONFUSING

Since we are observing the 200th year of our state, it would be a good time to learn a little more about it, whether you are a native born Tennessean, or a relative newcomer.

One of the areas where I have found that there is a woeful lack of knowledge about our state concerns the names and locations of the 95 counties and county seat towns. Because in so many cases the county seat town does not match the name of the county, it can become confusing.

There are several cases where the county seat and the county do not match up. For example, Knoxville is the county seat of Knox, Dyersburg is the county seat of Dyer, Sevierville is the county seat of Sevier, Greeneville is the county seat of Greene, Lawrenceburg is the county seat of Lawrence, Waynesboro is the county seat of Wayne, and Loudon is the county seat of Loudon.

In fact, Loudon is the only one where the county seat and the county name are the same.

In addition to Dyersburg being the county seat of Dyer County, there is also the town of Dyer in Gibson County. Also located in Gibson County is the town of Rutherford, but there is also Rutherford County, where Murfreesboro is the county seat.

Decaturville is the county seat of Decatur County, just across the Tennessee River in west Tennessee, but there is also the town of Decatur which is the county seat of Meigs County on the Tennessee River in east Tennessee.

Dickson is the largest town in Dickson County, but you have to go a few miles north to Charlotte to find the county seat.

Jefferson City is the largest town in Jefferson County, too, but Dandridge is the county seat.

Then there is Blountville and Blount County, but they don't match up. Blountville is the county seat of Sullivan County, while Maryville is the county seat of Blount County.

There is Franklin and Franklin County, but Franklin is the county seat of Williamson County, while Winchester is the county seat of Franklin County.

Shelbyville is not the county seat of Shelby County. Memphis is, while Shelbyville is the county seat of Bedford County.

Perryville is located just across the Tennessee River from Perry County and is in Decatur County, while neighboring Linden is the county seat of Perry County.

Men who eat at least 10 servings a week of pizza, pasta and other tomato-based foods reduce their risk of prostate cancer by 45 percent, researchers at Harvard University found. Even four to seven servings lower the risk by 20 percent.

Combination therapy of cisplatin and Taxol, the drug originally derived from the bark of the Pacific yew tree, helps ovarian cancer patients to live longer, an Emory University study found. It was more effective than a cisplatin-cyclophosphamide blend.

Bypass patients who were taught self-hypnosis, relaxation skills and visualizing a return to a normal lifestyle got better results after surgery than others, according to doctors at Columbia-Presbyterian Hospital in New York.

New eye drop form of a drug for glaucoma--carbonic anhydrase inhibitor--seems to reduce fluid in the eye without causing the side effects of systemic drugs. The FDA has approved it.
