

Gates Police Chief Says Firing Illegal

Gates Police Chief Ed Thomason, fired April 16th by a 3-0 vote of aldermen, has called the action illegal and has consulted Robert L. Hutton, Memphis attorney.

Mayor Booker J. Nance was told by phone, before Christmas, of a U.S. grant of \$40,984 to enable hiring an additional policeman.

Thomason admits he received a letter explaining procedures to claim the grant. The letter was post-marked Jan. 22, 1996.

At the March meeting of aldermen. Thomason said he had not received such a letter.

At the regular April meeting, he said he had received the letter but had mistaken it for routine mail from the office which sends him "Wanted" posters.

He said he had taken it home. two weeks earlier, to study it. He was asked to bring it to City Hall next day, April 9th. He did not.

On the evening of April 14th. Mayor Nance, still without the letter, saw Thomason at the police station and requested his resignation. Thomason refused.

Mayor Nance then called the special meeting of aldermen which fired Thomason, on the motion of Brenda Carter, seconded by Booker Nance, Jr.

Terry Janda added the majority vote. Johnny Marvel abstained


