## Alleged Thief Flees Into Police Offices

Steven Parker, 19, of 199 Barbee, Ripley, is charged with assault, burglary, and theft after an alleged attempt at robbing the cash register at the front of Mays-Dunavant Drugs, at 111 N. Main in Ripley, about 1:57 p.m. Monday.

According to General Sessions Court records, Ann, wife of Dr. Thomas S. Dunavant, Jr., partner in Mays-Dunavant, accosted a man taking currency from the till.

He threw about \$65 in her face, pushed her down to the floor, and ran south

on Main St., she told police. She wasn't injured.

From South Main, an east-west alley divides the block just south of Ripley's Court-house Square.

On the alley, Ripley police have a parking lot and a rear entrance to their offices.

Parker used the entrance. He came out in hand-cuffs.

## Fulton Gets 22 Years For Murder In Halls

Timmy Fulton, 19, of Ripley, found guilty by a Circuit Court jury of second degree murder of Jonathan Wayne Cunningham, 38, of Alamo, in Halls, July 7, 1995, has been sentenced to 22 years in prison, without parole, in addition to a \$50,000 fine assessed by the jury.

Cunningham died at the corner of Pearl and North Church Sts. in Halls, of a gun-shot wound in the abdomen.

Kevin Currie, 19, of

Ripley, was also charged in the murder.

He was sentenced in February to eight years in prison, with a 30% eligibility for parole.

## Man Knifed, Four Others Facing Charges In Fracas

Barry Steve Culver, 26, of Apt. 4, 220 N. Main, Ripley, knifed in the back and sent to Baptist Hospital Lauderdale about 11 p.m. Saturday, is charged with disturbing the peace.

Charged with assaulting him are Jonathon J. Gaines, of Apt. 2, 220 N. Main, Michael Lee Korszoloski, 21, of 467 Perkins, Ripley, and Jeffery Wayne Sanders, 24, of 334 Eastland, Ripley.

Gaines is also charged with maintaining a disorderly house, resisting arrest, assault of an officer, and destruction of city property.

Arrest reports charge that after he was placed in a patrol car, he kicked out a rear window.

Terry A. Steelman, 22, of Apt. 3, 220 N. Main, is charged with maintaining a disorderly house and with interference of an officer's duty.

## Ricky McWilliams A FFA National Finalist

Finalists for the American Star Farmer Award for the National FFA organization include Halls FFA member, Ricky Joe McWilliams, son of Mr. and Mrs. Larry McWilliams, for establishing profitable agricultural enterprises, demonstrating outstanding management skills, earning the American FFA Degree and meeting other agricultural education and leadership requirements.

Mr. McWilliams will receive \$1,000 from the National FFA Foundation and will travel to Europe or Costa Rica for an international experience tour, competing with the three other finalists for the award at the 69th National FFA Convention Nov. 14th-16th in Kansas City, Mo.

Mr. McWilliams and his two older brothers run the production part of the family's 22,000 acres of land. He also owns almost 2,000 acres where he grows cotton, corn, soybeans and wheat. To provide extra income during non-crop production months, he raises ten head of Polled Herefords.

He plants no-till soybeans on erodible land and grows winter wheat as a cover crop. He has built thousands of feet of terraces and established grass waterways to slow water runoff.

There have been four generations of McWilliams farming the rich soil along the Mississippi River. "The land is some of the most productive in the world," according to Mr. McWilliams. Unfortunately it is also subject to flooding. "I have lost crops several times when the river has reached flood stage," he says. Almost 400 acres of his wheat were destroyed in this year alone.

While in high school, Ricky served as Halls FFA chapter president and won the regional FFA public speaking contest. "He participated in practically everything FFA had to offer and was one of the best chapter presidents the Halls Chapter has had," states Robert Taylor Conder, past FFA advisor.

Mr. King purchased \$4 million in capital equipment and implemented many new programs including a cardiac arrhythmia evaluation service, sleep disorder lab and fitness and wellness department.

## Jury Convicts Man Whose Dogs Killed

A Circuit Court jury has convicted Roger Hostetler, of 3037 Hwy. 19 East, of criminally negligent homicide in allowing his Rottweiler dogs to kill a next-door neighbor, Mattie Lee Drake, 86, in the yard of her home March 8th.

The jury imposed the maximum fine, \$3,000.

The conviction also carries a prison sentence of one to two years.

Sentencing is set for Nov. 25th.

## Gun Taken From L. M. S. Student

An eighth grade student at Ripley Middle School brought a gun to school Monday and showed it to another student who reported the incident to a teacher. The teacher summoned the assistant principal, Ron Johnsey, who confiscated the gun and called police. The student is being held in Memphis. An investigation is underway.

The student may be prosecuted under Federal and State law by the district attorney. Bobby Webb, superintendent, reported that the student may be suspended from school for a minimum of one year. "We have guidance counselors to educate students about adverse effects of violence and how to deal with crisis."

School principles have hand held metal detectors to use when they suspect weapons on students.

## Ripley Board Approves Spec Building Contract

The Ripley City Board and Aldermen met Monday and approved the contract for a new industrial spec building to Forcum-Lannom with a TVA loan of \$275,000 and a balance of \$575,000 from local banks. There was a motion made to deed 25 acres to Ripley's Industrial Board for the building.

A proposal to apply for a Community Development Block Grant for sewers in the Skyline area was approved.

U. S. Representative from the 7th District John Cooper (D) captured 2,380 votes and Sen. Gordon received 2,481 votes.

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What causes colic? When a child is breast-fed, the culprits may be cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, cow's milk, onion or chocolate in the mother's diet, says the *Journal of the American Dietetic Association*. Stop these foods, then add one at a time.

The discomfort of urinary tract infections can be alleviated with a new nonprescription drug, Uristat. The medication can be taken up to two days for discomfort, but it does not cure the URI.

Simpler and safer method has been devised to retrieve a swallowed coin from a child's esophagus. It uses a balloon catheter-aimed via X-ray--inserted beyond the coin. Then the inflated balloon is pulled out, it brings the coin along.

A transdermal patch that delivers estrogen to the bloodstream was effective against severe postpartum depression, the British journal *Lancet* reported. Eighty percent of those treated improved within three months, while most in the comparison group did not.

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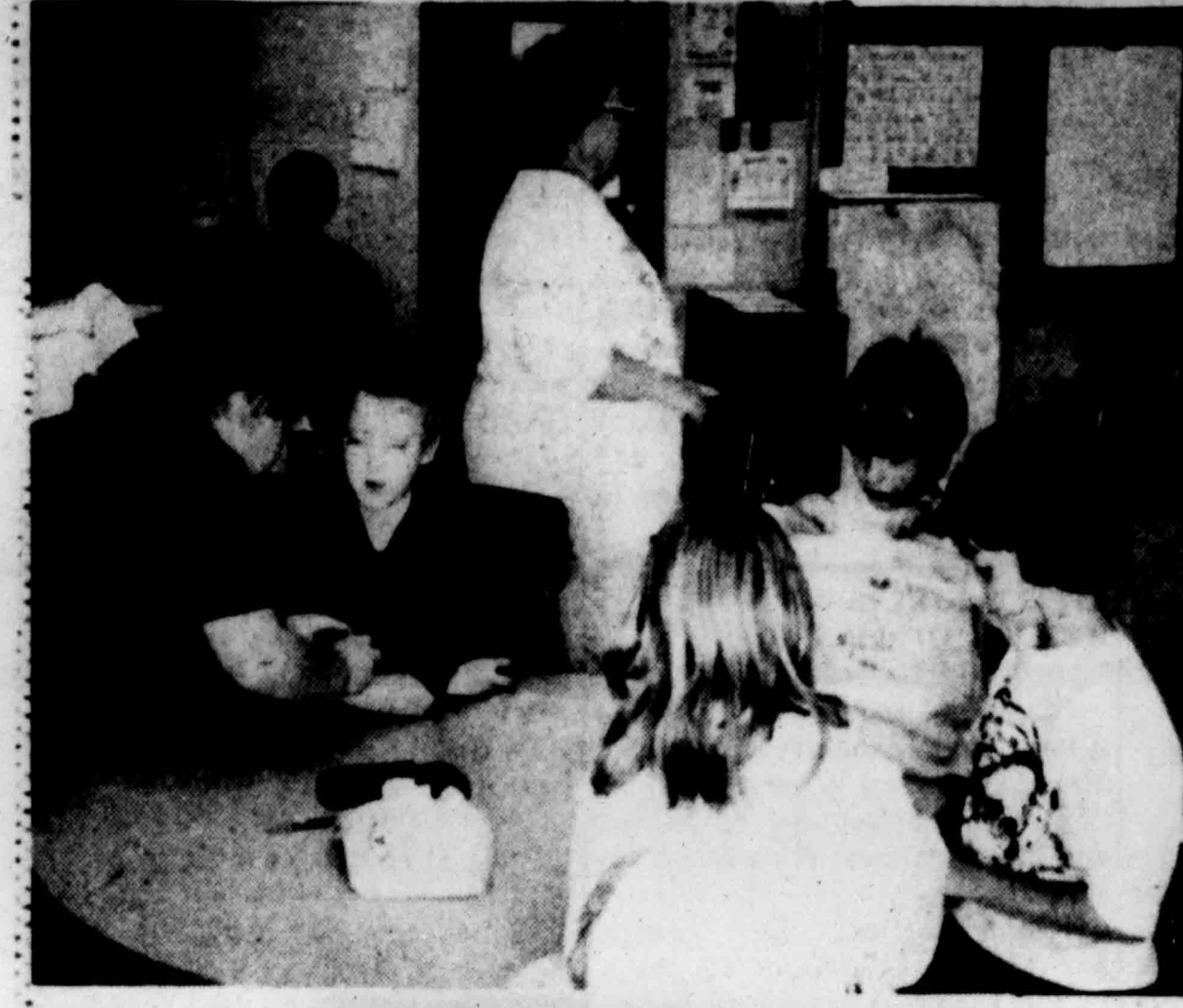

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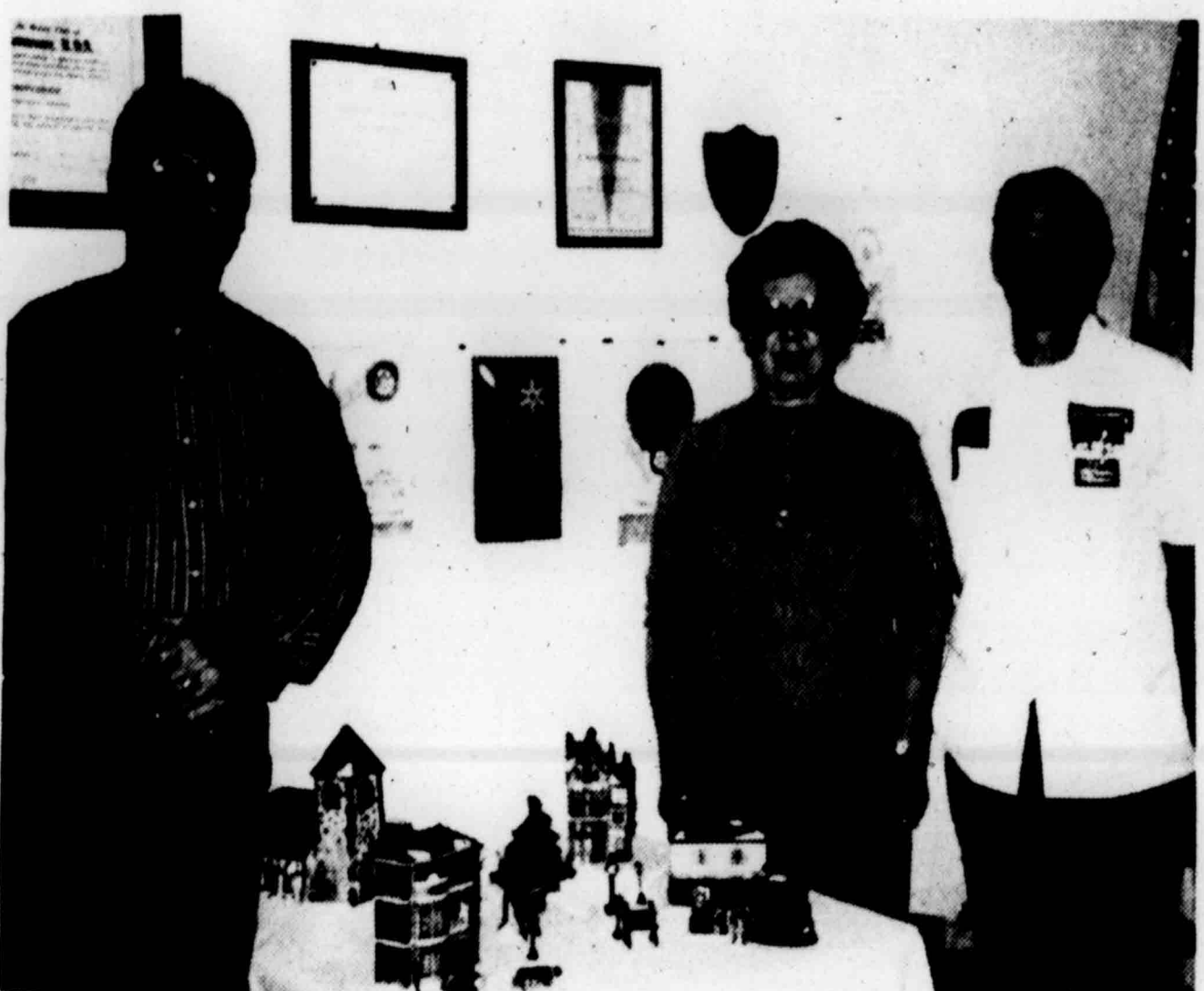

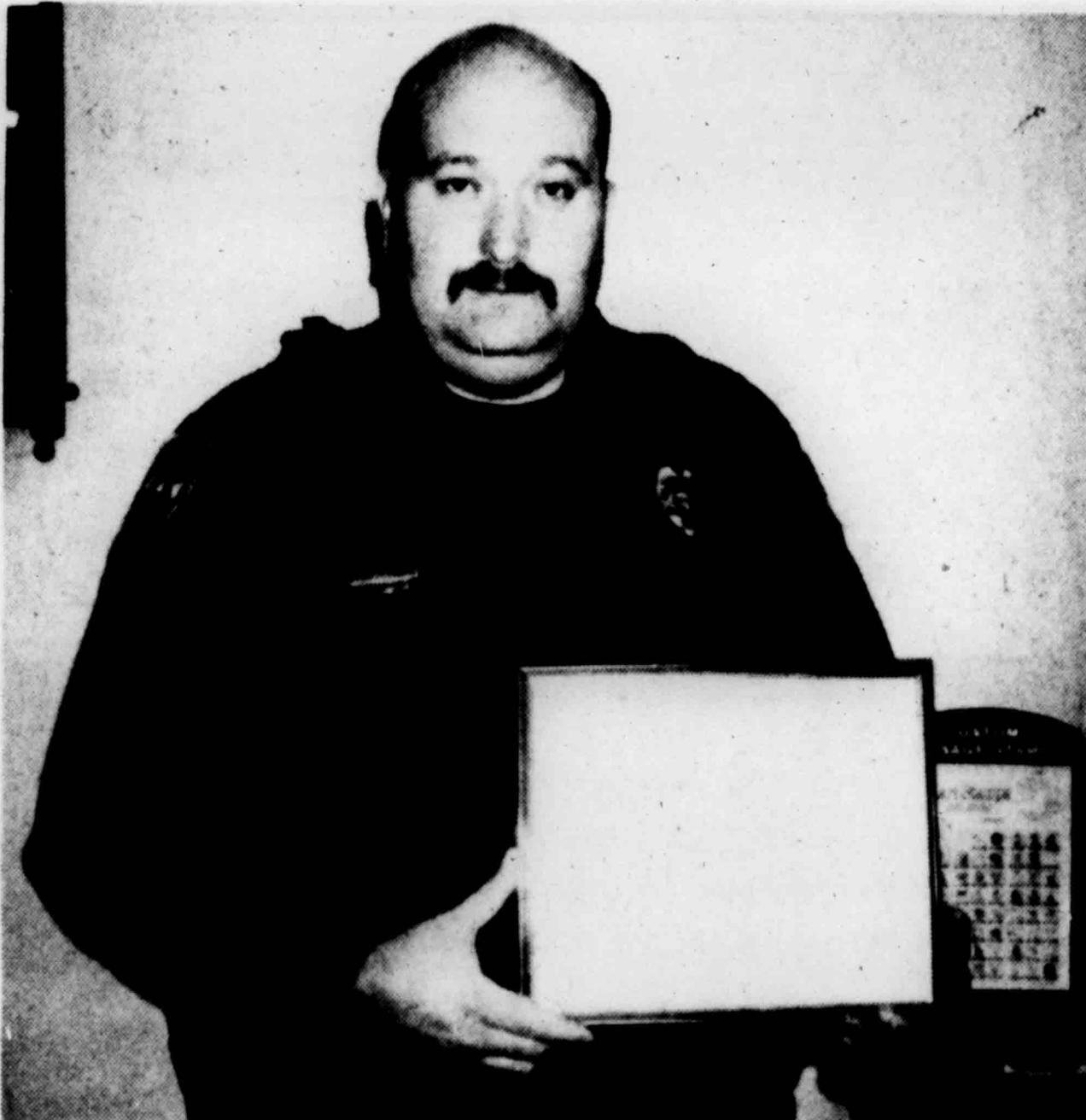

## Convenience Center Sought At Land-Fill

Lauderdale County Commissioners, meeting Monday, approved application for a state grant of up to \$125,000 to provide a Convenience Center at the county land-fill at 3231 Curve-Nankipoo Road, where trash could be dumped at an estimated fee of 2¢ per pound.

A grant would require 20% match by the county, but officials believe this could be provided "in kind," in construction work, etc., without cash outlay above currently budgeted county expenses.

Commissioners also agreed to apply for a \$500,000 Community Development block grant for the Lauderdale County Water System.

The \$61,798 in matching funding would be available from the Water System.

Commissioners rejected a federal offer of \$4,600, to fight church arson, because of many complicated requirements.

County attorney J. Thomas Caldwell advised Commissioners that U.S. Dist. Judge Jon McCalla has dismissed a suit by Kevin Maben against General Sessions Court Judge Billy Wayne Williams for trying his felony case without jurisdiction.

McCalla found Maben had not exhausted his rights in state courts; the case remains alive, thrown back into state courts.

To defend the county against a suit by Wiley Hutcherson, of Halls, who is asking \$6,000,000 from county tax-payers for his failure to obtain county re-zoning for a proposed new land-fill near Halls, Commissioners approved as co-counsel the firm of Thomason, Hendrix, Harvey, Johnson, Mitchell, of Memphis, with the case assigned to the firm's Kemper Durand.

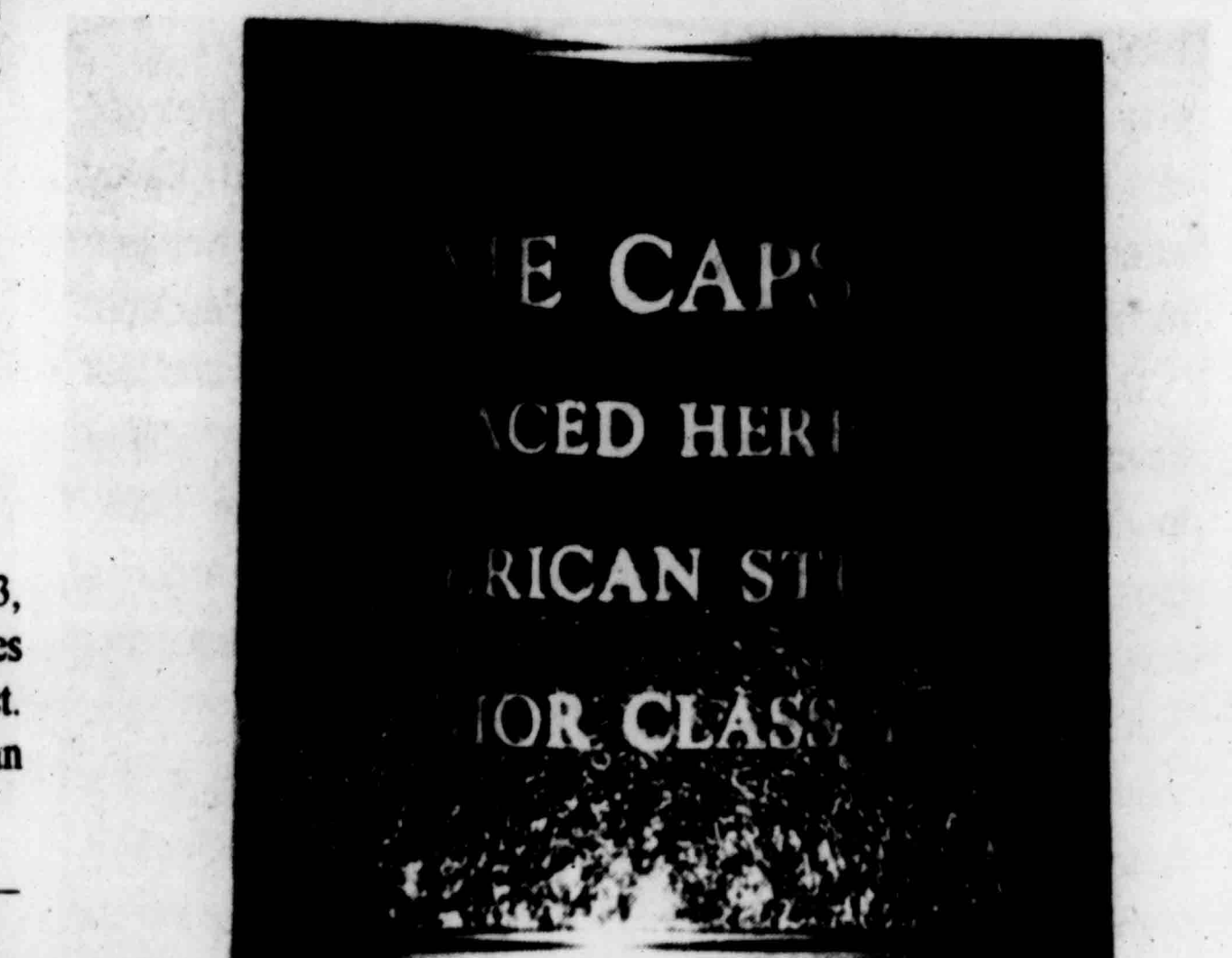

**Big Changes in National Farm Convention From One Held in Nashville in 1934**

Opryland Hotel complex. They will be paying \$99 per night, plus tax for the rooms. Rates at surrounding hotels and motels for the overflow will be about \$75 per room.

That's a far cry from the rates charged at the 16th annual meeting, held in downtown Nashville, December 10-12, 1934. Room rates advertised for that convention were \$2.50 for a single room and \$4.00 for a double room at the Andrew Jackson and Hermitage Hotels. These were preferred hotels because they were just across the street from the War Memorial Building where convention sessions were to be held.

The rates at the Noel and Sam Davis Hotels were the same as the Hermitage and Andrew Jackson. It was noted that they were three blocks away from the auditorium, but that they were "new hotels".

Rates at the Maxwell House, Tulane and Savoy Hotels, which were two and three blocks from the auditorium, were two dollars and four dollars per night. Other hotels, including the Clarkston, Merchants and Argonne were as low as a dollar per room per night. There were also rooms available in private homes where delegates could get a bed for as low as 50 cents to \$1.00 per person.

The convention is already having an impact on the tourist industry. 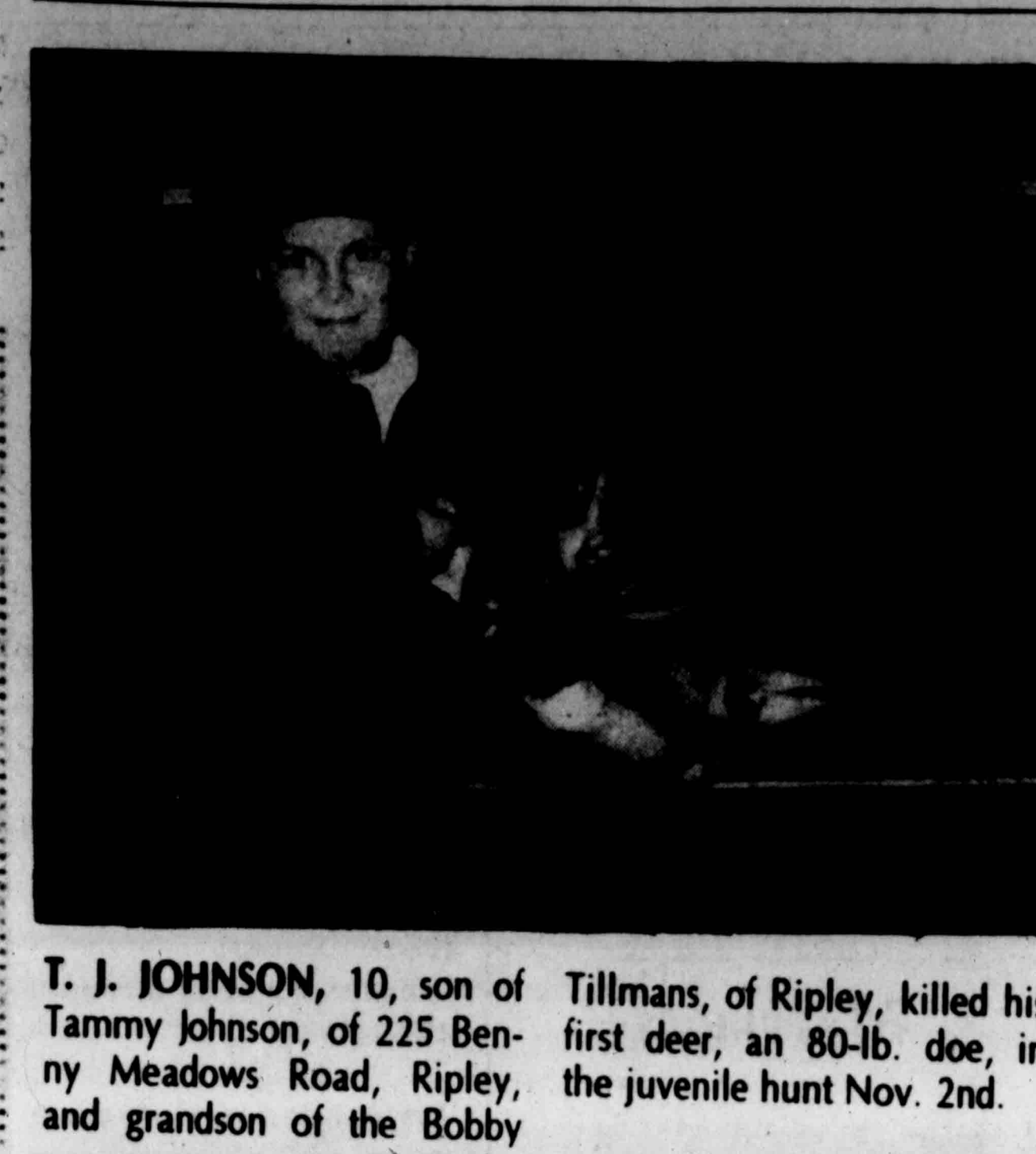

Menopause and depression do not necessarily go together, say scientists at the University of Pittsburgh. Only 10 to 15 percent of women get depressed, and they tend to be those who give up easily, feel overwhelmed, are self-absorbed or suppress anger.

One-hour treatment for enlarged prostates may take the place of drugs or surgery. The FDA has approved the Prostaton, a device that heats the prostate (painlessly) with microwaves.

Overweight women had four times the risk of renal (kidney) cancer as those of normal weight, a National Cancer Institute study found. Doctors question whether weight gain causes hormonal imbalance triggering tumor growth, or damages kidney blood vessels.

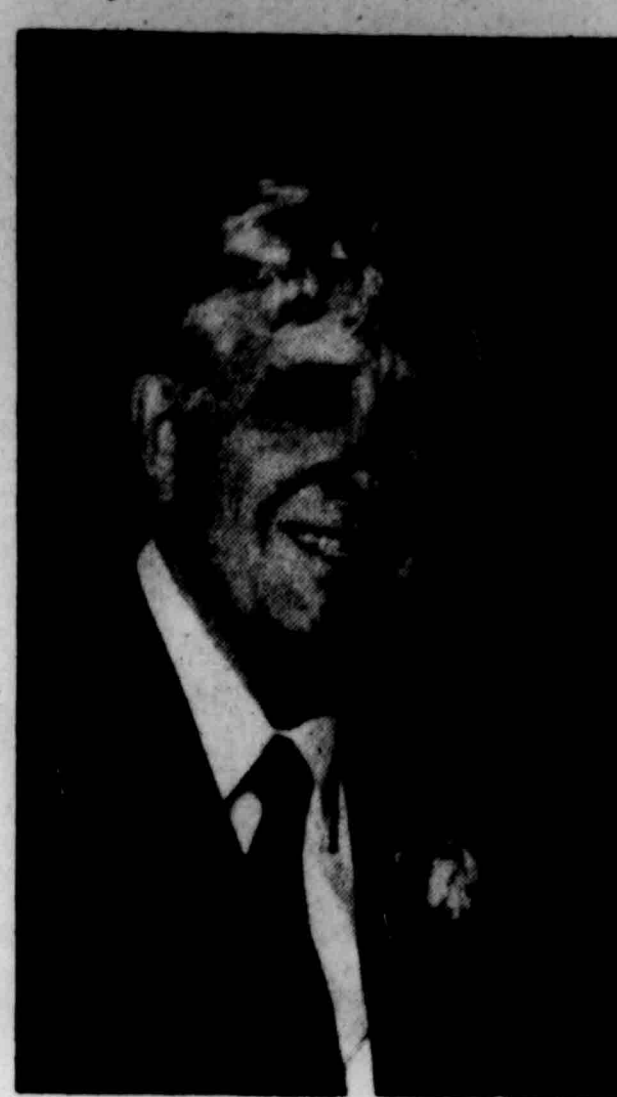

## For Miles Around

WRITING TENNESSEE FARM BUREAU HISTORY WAS PLEASANT ASSIGNMENT

Two years ago, my responsibilities at Tennessee Farm Bureau shifted from being director of communications to a part-time employee. My assignment was to write the history of the organization. I had two years to finish my work, with the book scheduled to be ready for the 75th annual convention, set for December 8-11 in Nashville. The book is finished and in print. It has been an interesting two years. Although I have been writing a weekly column for 34 years now, and edited the Tennessee Farm Bureau News for 32 years, I had never written a book before.

It was a labor of love, however, because out of the 75 years that Farm Bureau has been in existence, I was on the staff for almost 42 of them. It has been my privilege to know many of the persons whose names are in the book. Researching the book brought back a lot of memories.

The text includes the story of the Tennessee Farm Bureau, a brief history of each of the 95 county Farm Bureaus, and of the Tennessee Young Farmers and Homemakers. The latter is the organization sponsored by both the University of Tennessee Agricultural Extension Service and the Tennessee Farm Bureau. It was begun in the mid-1940's for young people between the ages of 18 and 30.

Currently, the 95 county Farm Bureaus have over 470,000 member families, making Tennessee the number one state Farm Bureau in the nation. There are over

800 employees of the Tennessee Farm Bureau and its affiliated economic service companies. The majority of those, 570, work in the Tennessee Farm Bureau headquarters building in Columbia. There is probably another thousand at work in the 95 county organizations.

The Tennessee Farm Bureau headquarters building was constructed in 1968, with two additions after that. Currently another wing is being added to that facility because of the growth of membership and membership services.

The first president of the Tennessee Farm Bureau was Joe Frank Porter, a farmer from the Williamsport Community in Maury County. That is why the state office ended up being in Columbia. He was elected the president of the then temporary organization in 1921. It was decided that when there were 20 county Farm Bureaus organized with a total of ten thousand member families, the permanent Farm Bureau would be established.

That was done in July of 1923, and Mr. Porter was elected each year as president until he decided to retire at the end of 1946. In his last annual report, he wrote these words as he reflected back 25 years:

"Looking backward, I can see a little table, two cane-bottom chairs, and a second-hand typewriter in one corner of the county agent's office in the basement of the Maury County Courthouse in Columbia. A little sign on the table read, 'The Tennessee Farm Bureau'. It was a good thing the sign was there, else we might have been overlooked."

I used his quote in the foreword of the book, because it shows such a contrast between where the organization began, and where it is today.

It is a people book. Listed are the names of everyone who has served as president in each of the 95 county Farm Bureaus. That varies from as few as one in Scott County, which was the last county organized. That was in 1954. Those that go back to 1921 have had as many as 24. The average is about 12 persons, which means over a thousand names of just county Farm Bureau presidents.

There are also the names of the 54 persons who have served as state directors of the organization and they served in the Young Farmers and Homemakers chapter, there are the names of those who have served as presidents and state committee members.

That is a list of 470 names and the years that they served.

The Young Farmers and Homemakers named a state queen each year, and held a discussion meet contest. Those winners are also remembered.

There are a lot of individual stories in the book. One is about a young accountant for the organization who was murdered by two hitchhikers that he picked up on his way to work one morning. Another is a young Knox County girl who was selected to sing at the 1935 American Farm Bureau convention, and how she got to be on stage when Franklin Roosevelt to speak.

There is also the story about how Scott County became the 95th county Farm Bureau organized. We'll tell you about these later.
