Ricky McWilliams A FFA National Finalist

Finalists for the American Star Farmer Award for the National FFA organization include Halls FFA member, Ricky Joe McWilliams, son of Mr. and Mrs. Larry McWilliams, for establishing profitable agricultural enterprises, demonstrating outstanding management skills, earning the American FFA Degree and meeting other agricultural education and leadership requirements.

Mr. McWilliams will receive \$1,000 from the National FFA Foundation and will travel to Europe or Costa Rica for an international experience tour, competing with the three other finalists for the award at the 69th National FFA Convention Nov. 14th-16th in Kansas City, Mo.

Mr. McWilliams and his two older brothers run the production part of the family's 22,000 acres of land. He also owns almost 2,000 acres where he grows cotton, corn, soybeans and wheat. To provide extra income during non-crop production months, he raises ten head of Polled Herefords.

He plants no-till soybeans on erodible land and grows winter wheat as a cover crop He has built thousands of feet of terraces and established grass waterways to slow water runoff.

There have been four generations of McWilliams farming the rich soil along the Mississippi River. "The land is some of the most productive in the world," according to Mr. McWilliams. Unfortunately it is also subject to flooding. "I have lost crops several times when the river has reached flood stage," he says. Almost 400 acres of his wheat were destroyed in this year alone.

While in high school, Ricky served as Halls FFA chapter president and won the regional FFA public speaking contest. "He participated in practically everything FFA had to offer and was one of the best chapter presidents the Halls Chapter has had," states Robert Taylor Conder, past FFA



What causes colic? When a child is breast-fed, the culprits may be cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, cow's milk, onion or chocolate in the mother's diet, says the Journal of the American Dietetic Association. Stop these foods, then add one at a time.

The discomfort of urinary tract infections can be alleviated with a new nonprescription drug, Uristat. The medication can be taken up to two days for discomfort, but it does not cure the URI. Simpler and safer method has been devised to retrieve a swallowed coin from a child's esophagus. It uses a balloon catheter-aimed via X-ray-inserted beyond the coin. Then the inflated bal-

loon is pulled out, it brings the coin along. A transdermal patch that delivers estrogen to the bloodstream was effective against severe postpartum depression, the British journal Lancet reported. BIG CHANGES IN NATIONAL FARM **CONVENTION FROM** ONE HELD IN **NASHVILLE IN 1934**

Early next year, January 5-9, some 7,000 Farm Bureau members from the 50 states and Puerto Rico will gather in Nashville for the annual meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation. This will be the 78th annual event for the nation's largest general farm organization, but only the second time that it has been held in the state of Tennessee.

A lot of people in Tennessee are getting excited about the event. One of the reasons is that retired General Colin Powell will be the keynote speaker on Tuesday, January 7. Because of that, and the fact that folks want to come to Nashville because of the country music and Tennessee hospitality, convention officials are expecting this to be one of the largest attended conventions

recent years. The convention is already having an impact on the tourist industry. Reports from the Maury County Convention and Visitors Bureau are that at least nine bus loads of tourists from the convention have already made reservations to see the historic sites there. The convention will also bring a rash of business to the Music city attractions and other places of interest in the state.

Most of the convention delegates will be housed at the

It was also pointed out that taxi fare from the bus and train stations to the hotels was 25 cents per person.

While the 1934 convention did not have a famous general to speak to them, they did have the U.S. Secretary of State, who was Tennessee's own Cordell Hull. Also on the program was Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace, who later served as vicepresident, 1940 to 1944, and ran for president in 1948 as a candidate of the Progressive

Secretary Wallace was to speak at the annual banquet at the Scottish Rite Temple, but the crowd was so large that many did not even get to eat. It became necessary to move the speaking to the War Memorial Building that seated 2,400 persons. "Every available seat was taken and crowds stood in the aisles

and hallways", the Farm Bureau News reported.

In 1935, President Franklin Roosevelt addressed the convention in Chicago in person, but at the Nashville convention, he talked to the delegates via telephone. That would be a simple thing for a president to do these days. In fact, it would be done with sight and sound through a satellite hookup. However, rigging up a long distance telephone conversation so that the entire audience could hear was rather new in 1934. Membership in Farm Bureau has changed even more than the prices of hotel rooms. The business session at the 1997 convention will see official delegates representing 4.5 million Farm Bureau families from 50 states and Puerto Rico. Back in 1934, the official voting delegates were representing 222 thousand families in 37

It's a real boost for Tennessee to have the American Farm Bureau convention coming here once again. We just hope the January weather will be good for them.

WRITING TENNESSEE FARM BUREAU HISTORY WAS **PLEASANT ASSIGNMENT**

Two years ago, my responsibilities at Tennessee Farm Bureau shifted from being director of communications to a part-time employee. My assignment was to write the history of the organization. had two years to finish my work, with the book scheduled to be ready for the 75th annual convention, set for December 8-11 in Nashville.

The book is finished and in print. It has been an interesting two years. Although have been writing a weekly column for 34 years now, and edited the Tennessee Farm Bureau News for 32 years,

It was a labor of love, however, because out of the 75 years that Farm Bureau has been in existence, I was on staff for almost 42 them. It has been my privilege to know many of the persons whose names are in the book. Researching the book brought back a lot of memo-

The text includes the story the Tennessee Farm Bureau, a brief history of each of the 95 county Farm Bureaus, and of the Tennessee Young Farmers and Homemakers. The latter is the organization sponsored by both the University of Tennessee Agricultural Extension Service and the Tennessee Farm Bureau. It was begun in the mid-1940's for young people between the

ages of 18 and 30. Currently, the 95 county Farm Bureaus have over 470,000 member families, making Tennessee the number one state Farm Bureau in the nation. There are over

800 employees of the Te affiliated economic service companies. The majority of those, 570, work in the Tennessee Farm Bureau headquarters building in Columbia. There is probably another thousand at work in the 95 county organizations.

The Tennessee Farm Bureau headquarters building was constructed in 1968, with two additions after that. Currently another wing is being added to that facility because of the growth of membership and member ship services.

The first president of the Tennessee Farm Bureau was Joe Frank Porter, a farmer from the Williamsport Community in Maury County. That is why the state office ended up being in Columbia. He was elected the president of the then temporary organization in 1921. It was decided that when there were 20 county Farm Bureaus organized with a total of ten thou sand member families, the permanent Farm Bureau

would be established. That was done in July of 1923, and Mr. Porter was elected each year as presi dent until he decided to retire at the end of 1946. In his last annual report, he wrote these words as he reflected back 25

"Looking backward, I can see a little table, two cane bottom chairs, and a secondhand typewriter in one corner of the county agent's office in the basement of the Maury County Courthouse Columbia. A little sign on the table read, 'The Tennessee Farm Bureau'. It was a good thing the sign was there, else we might have been over-

I used his quote in the foreword of the book, because if shows such a contras between where the organization began, and where it is

It is a people book. Listed are the names of everyone who has served as president in each of the 95 county Farm Bureaus. That varies from as few as one in Scott County, which was the last county organized. That was in 1954. Those that go back to 1921 have had as many as 24. The average is about 12 persons, which means over a thousand names of just county Farm Bureau presidents.

There are also the names of the 54 persons who have served as state directors of the organization and the ears that they served. In the Young Farmers and Homemakers chapter, there are the armes of those who have served as presidents and te committee members. That is a list of 470 names and the years that they

Another is a young Knox County girl who was selected to sing at the 1935 American Farm Bureau convention, and how she got to be on stage when they wheeled in President Franklin Roosevelt to speak. There is also the story about how Scott County became the 95th county Farm Bureau organized. We'll tell you about these later.
