WTRB Disc Jockey Critical After Crash

Harold Burroughs, 58, of Covington, radio disc jockey for WTRB in Ripley, remains in critical but stable condition in The Med following an accident Thursday evening of last week at the intersection of Highway 51 and Highway 87 in Henning.

Mr. Burroughs and his wife, Judy, 56, were driving south on Highway 51 when a vehicle driven by Roger Hostetler failed to stop at the intersection, crossed both lanes, and hit the Jeep Cherokee driven by Mr. Burroughs, going south.

Mr. and Mrs. Burroughs were transported to Baptist Hospital Lauderdale, Mr. Burroughs was air-lifted to The Med in Memphis where he suffered a heart attack, collapsed lungs, two broken legs and fractured skull. Mrs. Burroughs remained in Baptist Hospital Lauderdale until Monday.

Mr. Hostetler was not injured. He was charged with vehicular assault and driving under influence. He is out on a \$25,000 bond.

Jury Slams Judge For \$375,000 Plus

A U.S. District Court jury in Memphis Tuesday awarded Kevin C. Maben, of Ripley, \$75,000 in damages, plus \$300,000 in punitive damages, from General Sessions Judge Billy Wayne Williams, of 1103 Lightfoot-Luckett Road, for 67 days in jail. Attorney's fees will be added to the total due.

The judgment is against Williams, personally. U. S. Dist. Judge Ron P. McCalla had previously ruled that Lauderdale County was not responsible for Williams' judicial acts.

Four Arrested In Armed Robbery

Jackie Johnson, 20, of Dyersburg, William Terry Jr., 25, of Gates, April Davis, 18, of Crockett County, and a juvenile were arrested on Highway 209 north of Halls about 1:30 a.m. July 30th following an attempted armed robbery at H & A Food Mart at 11:30 p.m. July 29th.

Halls Police Officer Jerry Mitchell reported that Jackie Johnson attempted the robbery with a bandana over his face and a gun. The gun and bandana were with the four suspects when apprehended.

All suspects were arrested, taken to the Lauderdale County Justice Complex and charged with aggravated armed robbery. A bond hearing was Aug. 4th in General Sessions Court.

THOMAS GAUSE, SR., 62, retired assistant Chief of Police, of Ripley, died of cardiac arrest August 1st in William Bowld Hospital in Memphis.

Services are set for 11 a.m. August 7th in Elam Baptist Church in Ripley, of which he was a member, with burial in Elam Cemetery, Currie's Funeral Home has charge.

Assistant Police Chief Gause received the Officer of the Year award in May.

Born in Lauderdale County in 1933, Mr. Gause attended Lauderdale County Schools and graduated from the Tennessee Law Enforcement Academy.

He joined the Ripley Police Department in 1965, the first black officer hired in Lauderdale County. He was promoted to sergeant in 1978 and to captain in 1982. In 1986 he was promoted to Assistant Chief of Police. He served 32 years on the police force.

He leaves his wife, Lillie V. Gause, of Ripley; three sons, Thomas Gause, Jr., and Andre Bonds, both of Ripley, and Ronald Al Gause, of Jacksonville, Fla.; four daughters, Malinda Gause Russell and Lavelle Gause, both of Ripley, Jacqueline Gause Lowe, of Louisville, Ky., and Glenora Gause Ellis, of St. Louis, Mo.; a brother, Lewis Clarence Gause, of Detroit, Mich.; three sisters, Mayneida Nolen, Mollye R. Noel and Levada Maben, all of Elyria, Ohio; 12 grandchildren; and a granddaughter, Tomicka Gause, he raised as his own.

Maben bought a 1982 Datsun from Bud's Auto Sales in Halls in 1991, for \$1,219. After an accident in Ripley, Dec. 1, 1991, Maben was charged with driving on a revoked license. On Feb. 5, 1992, the Datsun was totaled in a collision with a vehicle owned by David Blakely, of 236 Church Street, Ripley.

Blakely's insurance company paid Maben \$1,132.52, but Maben did not pay Bud's Auto Sales for the car. In March, 1992, Bud Fitzhugh sued for the amount then due: \$1,141.

The case came before Judge Williams Oct. 27, 1993, on a felony charge against Maben of hindering a secured creditor.

Williams says he did not realize that it was a felony charge, for which a district attorney general's representative would be present.

He sentenced Maben to 11 months, 29 days in jail, suspended upon payment of \$1,141 plus court costs, within 60 days.

Maben never paid, and subsequently spent 67 days in jail, being re-arrested in December, 1994, and again in 1995.

can a person do this when you don't get good quality of food and not satisfied you don't have a business.

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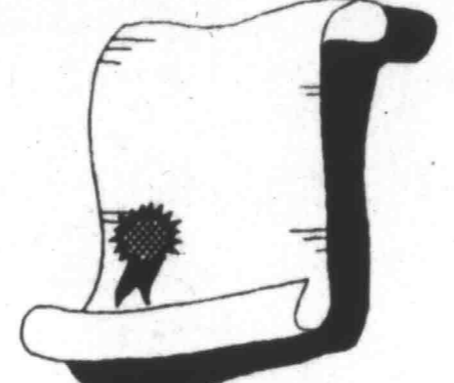

Rudeness On
The Roadway
Adds To Summer Heat

If you have driven around the streets in your hometown, or in any of our major cities, you have found the art of tact and manners has been replaced with rudeness. It continues to increase on rural roads as well. During the summer, more and more farmers must be on the roadways with their farm machinery, not by choice but by necessity. Each day, they make their way to fields and see the rudeness of drivers who have lost patience following a slow moving tractor and wagon.

The way people drive these days, it is just plain luck that any of us get to where we are going safely. Today's attitudes of drivers reminds me of an army story that touches on the ability of how one uses tact.

Early one morning, an Army captain approached his sergeant with a bit of sad news. "Sergeant," he said, "we just got notice that Smith's grandmother died. You'd better go break the news to him."

The sergeant walked into the barracks, paused at the doorway and shouted, "Hey Smith, your grandmother died."

The captain was horrified. "Sergeant, that's no way to tell a man that his grandmother has died. Look how you have shocked him. You have to use tact in a situation like this. I think we'd better send you to the Tact and Diplomacy School."

So the sergeant spent a year studying at Tact and Diplomacy School. On the day he returned, the captain

approached him.

"Well, sergeant, how did you do in school," the captain asked him?

"Fine," replied the sergeant. "I've really learned how to be tactful."

"That's good, because we've just gotten notice that Lopez's grandmother died. Go in and tell him."

The sergeant entered the barracks, paused at the doorway and called his men to attention. When they were lined up he stepped before them and ordered, "All those with living grandmothers step forward...not so fast Lopez."

The sergeant must be one of those who drives on our roads, especially on the national rural roads. It is important that we all understand how to share the road safely with farm vehicles and learn to be more patient when it comes to following or passing these pieces of equipment.

If you have driven on rural roads, you know the spine-tingling chill when you pop over a hill and come upon a slow-moving tractor. Only a split-second reaction can save you from a collision.

Usually our first reaction is anger, but with a little understanding, we all can arrive at our destination unharmed.

One of the most common collisions happens when a motorist tries to pass a left-turning farm vehicle. A tractor that appears to be pulling to the right side of the road to let motorist pass instead, may be preparing to make a wide left turn. Check the left side of the road for gates, drive-ways or any place a farm vehicle might turn. Watch the farmer's hand and light signals carefully.

Rear-end collisions with farm vehicles also are common because of the large difference in speed. It can be difficult to judge traffic speeds

Rep. Tanner Attends Wetland Dedication Funding Add 2 Police Officers Crihfield Settles Claim Of Fraud

United States Representative John Tanner joined the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency (TWRA), Ducks Unlimited and other sportsmen and women last Friday to dedicate the Cold Creek Waterfowl Refuge in Lauderdale County. The dedication ceremony was held at noon on the site on Grammer Road.

U.S. Representative John Tanner announced Wednesday of last week that the Halls Police Department would receive \$88,858 to hire two full-time police officers.

Talmage Crihfield, Jr., a Lauderdale County farmer, entered an agreement to settle claims that he defrauded the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency with false applications for disaster credit, according to Veronica F. Coleman, United States Attorney for the Western District of Tennessee.

Without admitting liability, Mr. Crihfield agreed to pay twice the amount of the alleged fraud plus interest to settle the claim, more than \$170,000.

An investigation by the USDA's Office of the Inspector General showed that Mr. Crihfield submitted false applications for disaster credit in 1993, claiming loss of a turnip crop, and in 1994, claiming prevented planting of corn. He received more than \$78,000 on his 1993 claim.

The government contends that the 1993 claim was false because Crihfield did not plant or lose turnips on that farm that year. The 1994 application is alleged to be false because Mr. Crihfield did not even lease the federal property on which he claimed to have been prevented from planting corn due to a Mississippi River flood.

Mr. Crihfield denies that either of the claims was false or fraudulent, but chose to settle the claims before suit was filed. By settling, he avoids the treble damages and civil penalties of not less than \$5,000 per false claim that are mandated under the federal False Claims Act.

Williams took the Fifth Amendment (protection from self-incrimination) 12 times in his appearance in last week's emergency hearing.

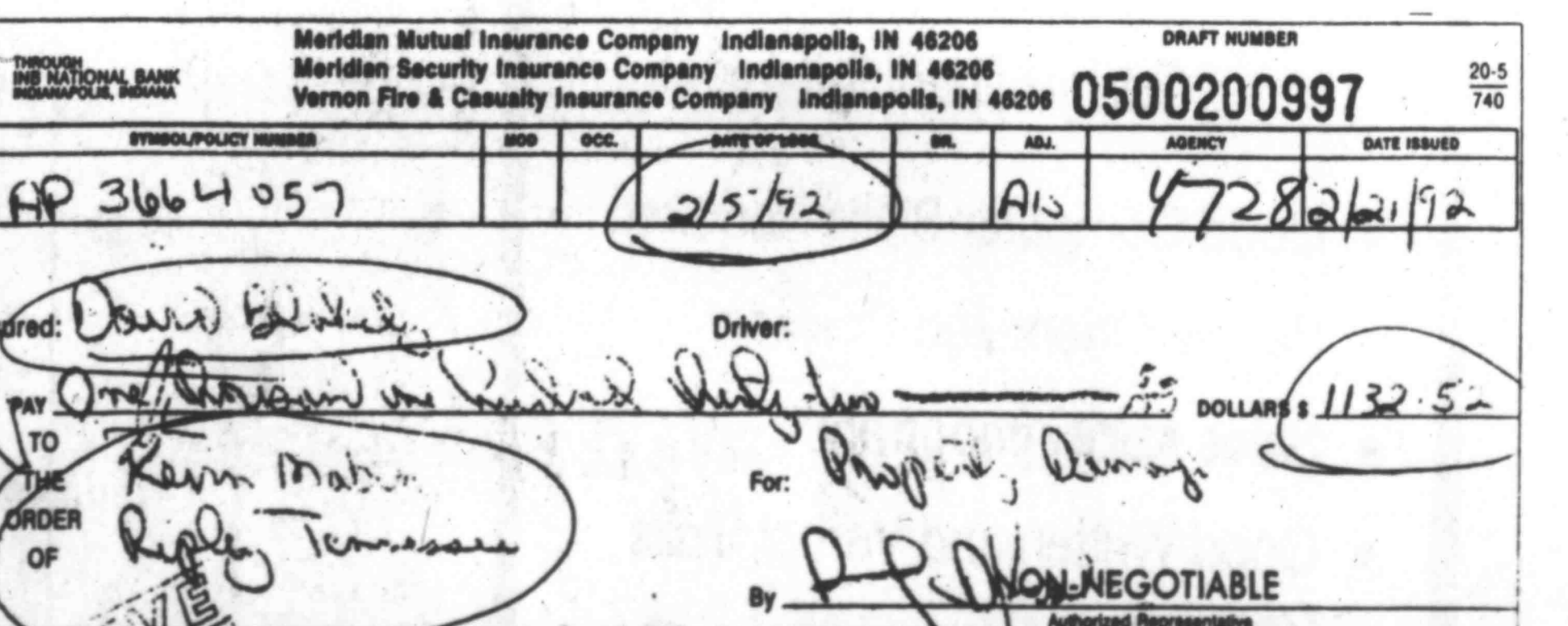

For lack of payment to Bud's, Maben spent 67 days in jail, and General Sessions Judge Billy Wayne Williams has been ordered to pay him \$375,000.

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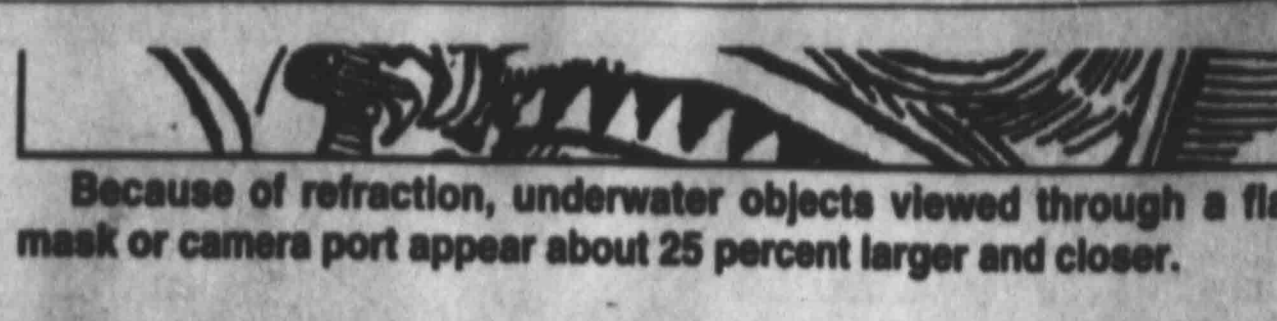

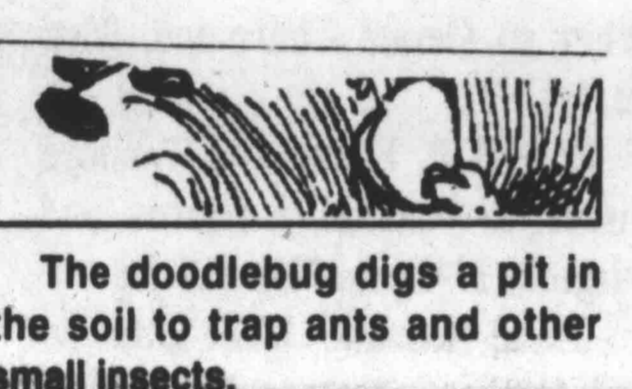

The Origins of Fire HYDRANTS
 by Eric Morganthaler
 The fire hydrant is an important tool in the fire service because it provides the water needed by firefighters to extinguish a fire. Fire hydrants are familiar sights on city street corners, though they are less common in rural communities where the fire service generally relies on other sources of water. The word *hydrant* - *hydr-* (water) + *angi-* (vessel) - came into the English language about 1828. Prior to that, fire hydrants were called *fire plugs*.
 Why were fire hydrants called fire plugs and why are they still sometimes called fire plugs today? The term *fire plug* originated in the 1800s to describe the first efforts to acquire water from underground wooden water mains made of bored-out, crude logs. These logs were tapered at each end to fit together to form a "piping" system for carrying water. When a fire occurred, firefighters would bore a hole into this log main and collect the outpouring water in buckets or by suction hose. After the fire had been extinguished, wooden pegs - known as fire plugs - were pounded into the drilled holes to stop the flow of water. In some cases, the plug was already inserted into the wooden mains at half-block intervals. When the firefighters needed water, they would simply remove the closest plug.
 Philadelphia was one of the first cities to successfully put into service wooden water mains with fire plugs. New York City and Boston followed later with similar water supply systems.
 Today, fire hydrants are constructed of cast iron, and water mains are constructed of ductile iron, cast iron, or plastic underground pipe. With these types of fire hydrants and piping systems, pressures and pipe diameters have greatly increased. Because of greater pressures and larger diameters, more effective water supplies can be established to fight fires. Although the days of wooden fire mains and wooden plugs are gone, many people still refer to the fire hydrant as a fire plug.

State Troopers Prepare For Labor Day Weekend

State troopers are preparing for a Labor Day weekend with one of the most concentrated enforcement efforts ever by the Tennessee Highway Patrol.

The Department of Safety will use virtually every resource available during what typically has been a deadly holiday period on Tennessee roads.

"We recently placed nearly 70 new troopers on the job, giving us the first full Highway Patrol force we've had in some time," explained state Safety Commissioner Mike Greene. "The timing could not be better, because we'll need every officer we've got to help over the three-day holiday. The Highway Patrol and our Commercial Vehicle Enforcement officers will work closely in what will be a tremendous effort to save lives on our highways."

During the 1996 Labor Day weekend 19 people died in traffic crashes in Tennessee. Of the traffic fatalities, 14 were vehicle occupants and twelve were not wearing safety restraints, six of them were ejected from the vehicles during the crashes. Of the 19 fatalities, eleven were from alcohol-related accidents.

According to Tennessee Highway Patrol Col. Jerry W. Scott, "There should be some hours during the weekend when we may have a trooper every 15 to 20 miles on the interstate."

Over the course of the 78-hour holiday period, from 6 p.m., Friday Aug. 29th through midnight, Monday, Sep. 1st there should be at least one enforcement roadblock in every county of the state and two DUI checkpoints per each of the state's eight THP districts.

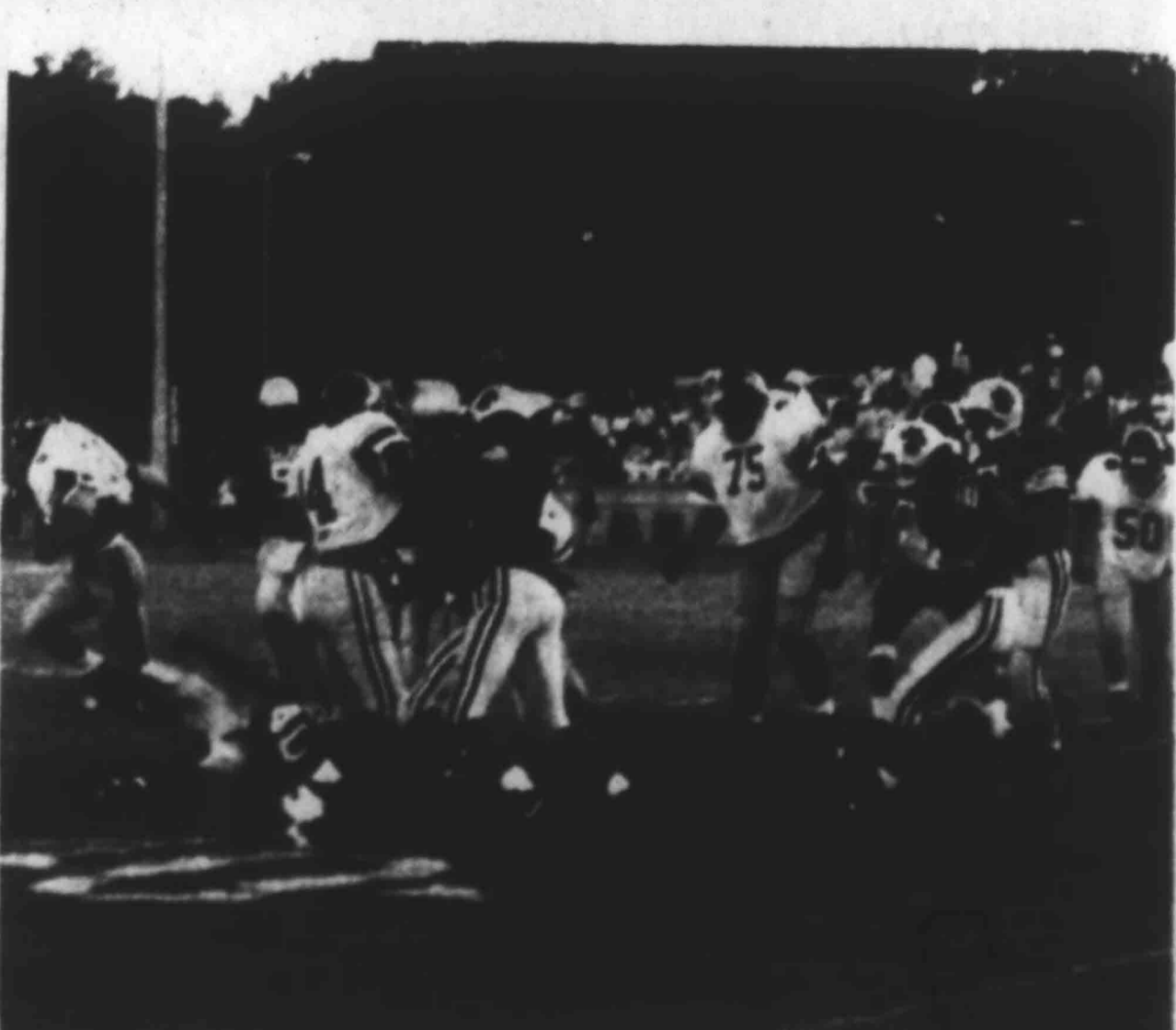
Williams says Maben first appeared in his court, charged with hindering a secured creditor (Bud's Auto Sales, of Halls), on Aug. 27, 1993.
