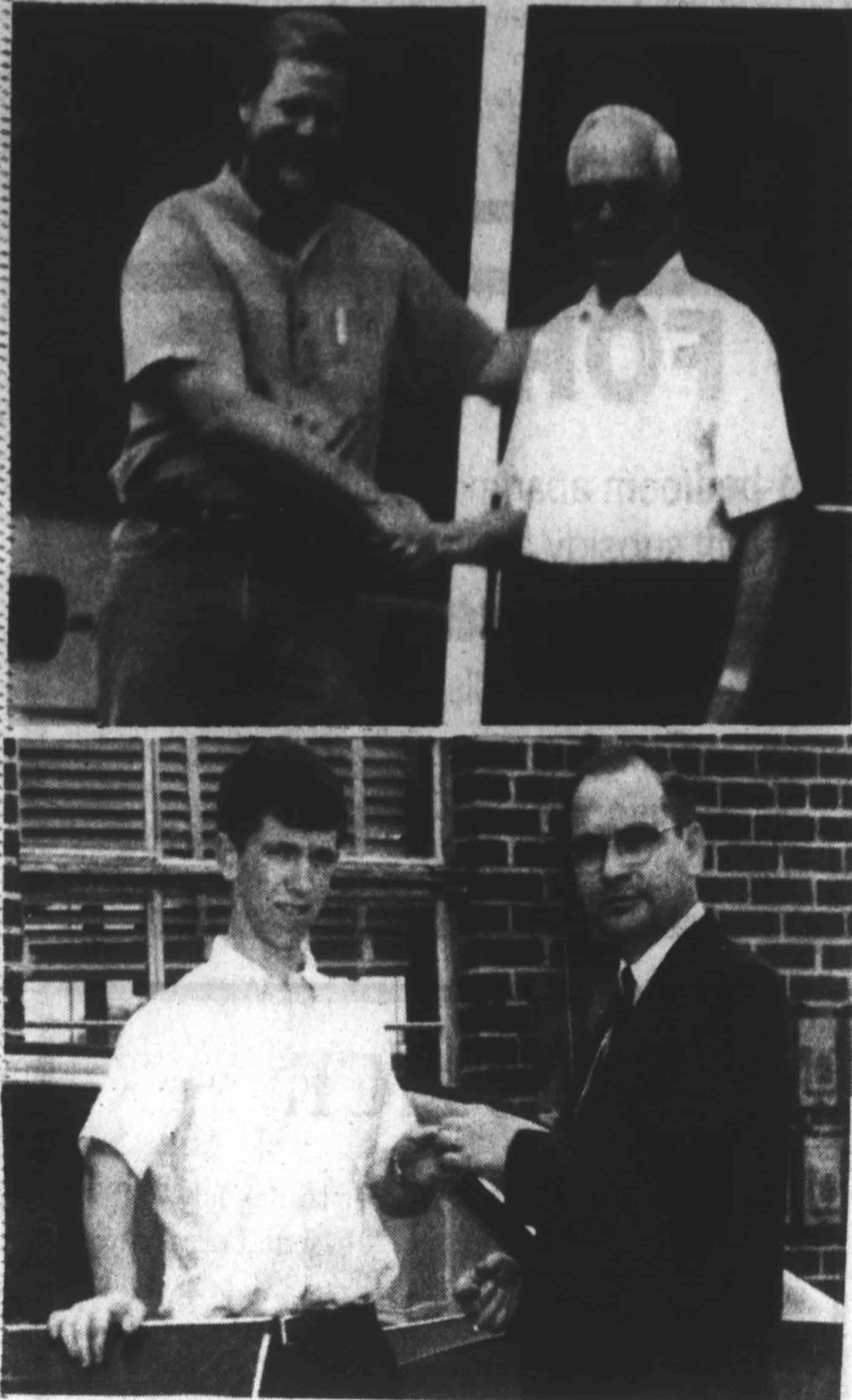


New Owner

June 21st marked the end of a half century in the auto industry business for Mr. Drumwright.

"I started to work for General Motors in 1944," stated Mr. Drumwright. "From there I worked for the Tucker-Bussey Motor Company in Ripley in 1945, and later Curtis Person Chevrolet in Millington and Walker Chevrolet in Covington. I purchased Millington Auto Parts in 1957 and sold in 1988 and Auto Trac Parts Store in Covington, of which I am still affiliated."

"Motor Parts and Batteries

was established in 1961 and consolidated with Pratt's Auto Parts in 1963."

"This is my life and really all I've known," continued Mr. Drumwright. "My son, Dennis, manages Motor Parts. My oldest son, Jimmy, managed the Millington Auto Parts until it was sold in 1988 at which time he joined me in the Chevrolet dealership, which I purchased in 1967 from Tucker-Henderson Company, formerly Tucker bussey Company, when it was located on Washington Street in Mid-Town Center. We eventually bought land on Cleveland Street at our present location and we have been in the Chevrolet dealership business there for 30 years."

"Now that I'm retiring," stated Mr. Drumwright, "I plan to travel and just enjoy life."

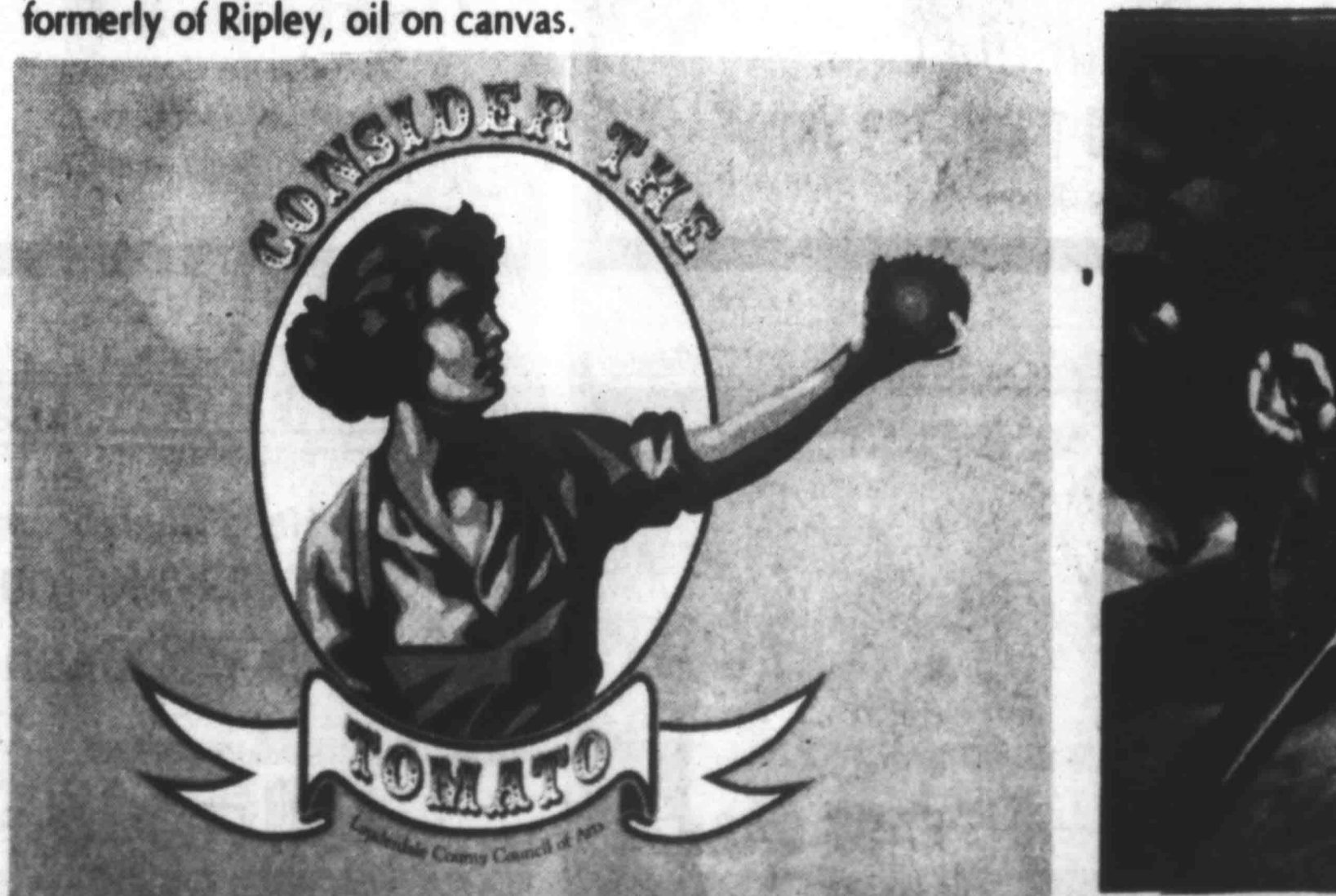

EQIP Applications Accepted At F.S.A.

"The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service and the Lauderdale County Farm Service Agency are accepting applications for cost-share for the new Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP)," according to Vernon McBride, chairman of the Lauderdale County Soil Conservation District.

The EQIP program was established in the 1996 Farm Bill to provide a voluntary conservation program for farmers with soil, water and related natural resource concerns. It offers five to ten year contracts with 75 percent cost-share payments to implement a variety of soil and water conservation practices.

Eligible EQIP practices include critical area planting, diversions, cross fencing (to enhance rotational grazing), field border, filter strip, firebreak, grade stabilization structure, grassed waterway, heavy use area protection, pasture and hayland planting (conversion to grassland and pasture renovation), pipeline, pond, riparian stream buffer, spring development, stream crossing, streambank protection, terrace, tree planting, trough (for livestock water), waste management system, water and sediment control basin and well decommissioning.

There are two sign-up periods. Applications received by July 15th will be evaluated separately from those received after July 15th.

CROP ACREAGE REPORTS

Annual acreage reports are required for all farms that are enrolled in AMTA (production flexibility contracts) and fruits and vegetables are planted; price support benefits (loans) will be requested; enrolled in conservation reserve program; produce a crop for which (NAP) benefits will be requested; and acreage covered by a (CAT) policy serviced by FSA.

Producers are reminded that July 15, 1997, is the deadline for filing these acreage reports.

The Versatile Tomato



Red Ripe and Ready

Tomatoes are nature's own fast food. Their bold color and delicate flavor are enjoyed world-wide. The tomato is native to America, with a history dating back to 700 A.D. Nothing says summer like "home grown" tomatoes. They add variety to our summer menus and are nutritious as well. One medium tomato provides over one-third of an adult's daily requirement of vitamin A and C, is low in sodium, contains no fat and has only 35 calories.

Stages of Ripeness

The best flavor comes from tomatoes that are allowed to ripen completely on the vine. Such fully-ripe tomatoes have an overall rich, red color and a slight softness. Tomatoes are fragile and cannot withstand a lot of pressing or poking to determine ripeness.

Look for tomatoes that are:

- Firm, but well ripened - to insure flavor.
- Free from blemishes - to reduce waste and safeguard flavor.
- Of good color - depending on variety
- Fairly well formed - for serving attractive slices or whole tomatoes

Home Care

Ripe tomatoes: The proper place for a fully ripe tomato is in the refrigerator. However, tomatoes stored in the refrigerator for some time lose their characteristic flavor and develop a flat taste. For peak flavor place in the refrigerator for only two or three hours to chill before eating.

Unripe tomatoes: Mature tomatoes with a slight greenish cast will ripen in a day or two at room temperature.

Quantities to Buy

The quantities of tomatoes to buy for different purposes can be easily calculated.

Unit of Purchase	Quantity	Yield
1 pound	3 medium or small	4 servings
1 bushel	50 pounds	About 18-24 quarts canned

Tomato Tips

- Make a practice of peeling and cutting tomatoes just before using. If they must be prepared early, keep them covered in refrigerator until time to cook or serve.
- Select the ripe tomatoes that are firm and plump.
- To peel tomatoes: Stroke the skin with the dull edge of a knife blade until skin is loosened, or dip the tomato in boiling water for 1 minute, or run fork into tomato and rotate it over heat of cooking unit until the skin is tight and shiny. Cool at once in cold water.

Preserving Tomatoes

Freezing: Tomatoes can be frozen successfully. It is true that fresh, ripe tomatoes don't freeze well. But if there is a good supply of tomatoes and freezer space, freeze them stewed or as juice.

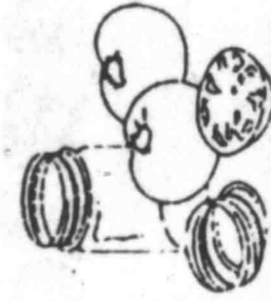
Canning: Tomatoes can be water bathed or pressure-canned following the instructions in "Canning Foods," PB 742, available at your local Extension office.

*** TOMATOES CANNOT BE CANNED BY OPEN KETTLE METHOD.** If you do not have a 1990 or later canning book, you need to obtain one. Many changes have been made, one of which is adding ascorbic acid to home-canned tomatoes. (The reason ascorbic acid is being added is because the new hybrid varieties have less acid than older varieties.)

Dried: Many gourmet recipes currently feature sun-dried tomatoes. These are just dried tomatoes. You can prepare them yourself using a dehydrator.

SALSA, the Mexican word for sauce, refers to sauces intended to make food look and taste better. These spunky little sauces are guaranteed to tickle your taste buds—literally. So, sometimes the sensation comes from the combination of tomatoes and fiery jalapeno peppers, or perhaps it's simply the play of the cold salsa with hot food when you spoon it over vegetables or meat. Promoted County Commissioners Approve Budget With No Tax Increase

The Lauderdale County Commissioners met Monday and voted to approve the new budget for 1997-98 with no tax increase on property, which remains at \$2.30 per \$100 assessment, or wheel tax, \$55 per vehicle.

Included in the budget is a three percent raise for county employees.

County Executive Rozelle Criner explained the employee insurance plan and stated they would stay with Prudential Insurance with a slight increase in premiums. He also reported that a new attorney Kemper Durand, an attorney in Memphis, had been hired for Sheriff Ron Rickard's law suit with Sheriff's deputies.

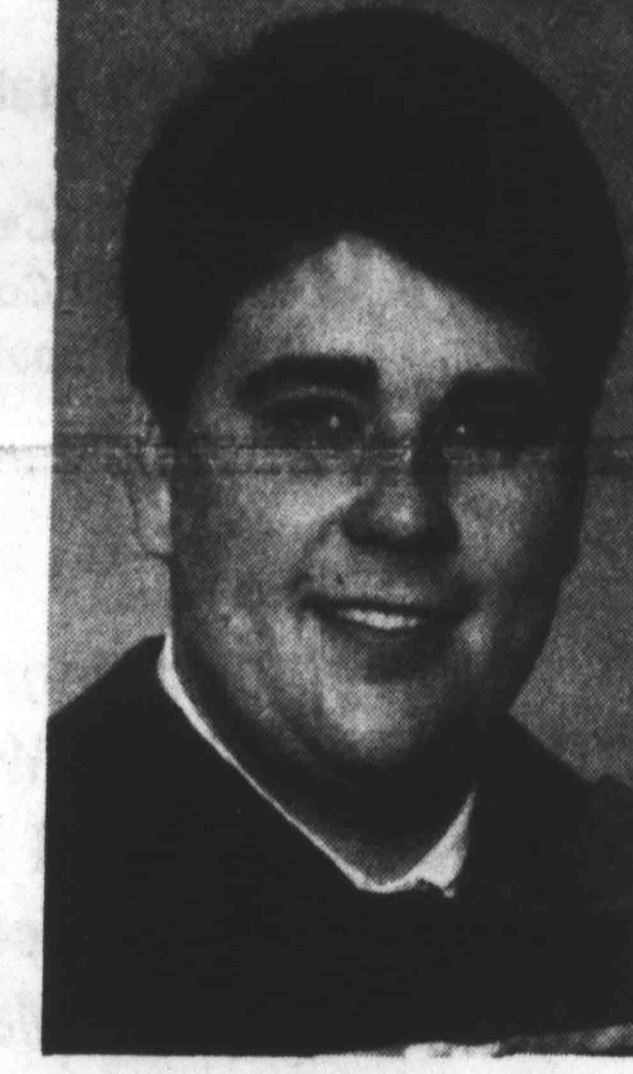

Crockett County F.S.A. Offers Aid To Farmers

According to Jerry Arnold, Agriculture Credit Manager, "Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers and operators are available through the Crockett County Office of the Farm Service Agency (FSA)."

FSA's state executive director, David H. McDole, stated, "This authority is pursuant to the Administrator's notification on June 12, 1997, of severe physical losses in Arkansas, caused by high winds and a possible tornado, which occurred on or about May 27, 1997. As a result of these losses, Lauderdale County, as a contiguous county in Tennessee, is named as an area eligible for Federal disaster assistance pursuant to the provisions of Section 321(a) of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act."

Applications for assistance will be accepted through Feb. 12, 1998 for qualifying severe physical losses only. This notification is coded N548.

Farmers qualifying for emergency loans may borrow up to 80 percent of their actual production loss, not to exceed a maximum of \$500,000 or that amount actually needed, whichever is less.

These are just a few of the products American consumers have been buying lately to pamper their pets, reports the Animal Health Institute.

"People will go to great lengths to show affection for their pets," says Alexander S. Mathews, president and CEO of the Animal Health Institute, the Alexandria, Virginia based trade association which represents manufacturers of animal health products.

In fact, animal health product sales for pets have increased by 45 percent since 1993. At the same time, product sales for livestock increased just three percent during the same time.

A recent survey conducted by the American Animal Hospital Association found that 70 percent of respondents view their pet as they would their own child. I don't think I would go that far, comparing my dog and cat with my child, but it is no wonder that pet owners are often willing to go to such lengths to keep their pets, or companion animals, as they are referred to in the animal health field, happy and healthy.

Woodville Cemetery Benefactor Praised

Bill Thomas, Scripps-Howard writer on senior citizens, has syndicated nation-wide his report that Evelyn Lancaster, of Ripley, will tell you that she owes her life to Woodville Cemetery. His report:

Lancaster is a 75-year-old fireball who stands only 4-foot-10 and has lived in the West Tennessee hills all her life. What's more, she never wanted to leave.

"People nowadays are so restless," she says. "I never wanted to go anywhere, unless it was with Charles Kuralt, the man with the van... I told a friend if Charles Kuralt stopped here, I'd say, 'Wait! Let me get my hat.'"

When Lancaster was in the 11th grade at Brownsville High School, she decided to marry the boy next door. He was 21, she was 16 and she never regretted it. They were married in 1938 during the Great Depression.

"We farmed for the first several years and then, in 1952, we built a little country store across the road."

The Lancasters ran the store for 27 years, then closed it and thought about a new life. "Bill said maybe we could do a few things we always wanted to do. We'd never been anywhere because one of us always had to be in the store. But our time together like that didn't last but 15 months. Bill had a heart attack one Sunday night in church. He died about a week later."

After more than 40 years of marriage, Lancaster was devastated by her husband's death. She buried him in the Woodville Cemetery, not far from where they both grew up. The cemetery has several dozen graves, the oldest dating back to about 1840.

"For the first year after Bill died, I prayed every night I would die, too. I'd gotten a double tombstone — it says 'Together Forever' — and I was sitting on that, bawling, when somebody on a tractor drove into the cemetery to turn around. I said, 'I'm going home and think of somebody who's got some money and see if we can put up a wrought iron fence.'"

For Lancaster, it marked the beginning of an amazing journey that has changed her from a widow paralyzed with grief into a lively, hard-working woman who is perhaps the best friend a cemetery ever had.

After learning the fence would cost \$1,750, she began seeking help from people with family buried in Woodville.

"A Memphis man sent a check for \$200, then I collected another \$100 and another. I didn't get enough the first year, but the wrought iron man said he'd put up the fence and we could pay later," she said. "No, we pay cash or not at all."

"When we were only \$200 short, I thought, 'I'll do without biscuits and pay the rest myself.' Well, I went to the mailbox and there was a check for \$200 from Peru. I know this sounds like preachers telling tales you don't much believe, but it was from Tommy Chapman, whose mama and daddy are buried here. I called the wrought-iron fence man and told him, 'I got it! Come on!'"

In 1980, Lancaster was appointed secretary-treasurer of the Woodville Cemetery.

"They made it kind of legal and everything," she said.

She got others involved in the cemetery's care, too. "In the summer, we have the grass mowed every two weeks. I'd wear out four brooms a year sweeping off the tombstones after each mowing."

Not surprisingly, Lancaster has become something of a cemetery historian. She's familiar with every stone, and when strangers come looking for gravesites of half-forgotten family, she acts as guide.

It's not easy. Three years ago, at 72, she had a hip operation that has made it tough to get around. Although she uses a walker, she still manages to visit the elderly in rest homes and she shops for people who are unable

The Board of Directors of Bank of Troy has entered into a letter of Intent with First Citizens Bancshares, Inc., the bank holding company that owns First Citizens National Bank, with offices in Dyersburg, Newbern and Ripley. After the acquisition, First Citizens plans to continue operating Bank of Troy as a separate bank under its current name and charter with independent Board of Directors.

Gates Maloney, chairman of the board and president of Bank of Troy, said he looks forward to the bank's association with First Citizens National Bank. "We feel that our current customers will benefit from the strength of combined resources of the two institutions especially in light of the expansion of large regional banks into our market area." He indicated that the acquisition will be subject to regulatory approval, as well as other conditions, and he expects the acquisition to be complete by year end.

According to Stallings Lipford, chairman of the board of First Citizens, "A complete description of the transaction will be submitted to shareholders of Bank of Troy after the definitive acquisition agreement is executed and prior to a shareholders meeting of Bank of Troy which will be called later this year to approve the acquisition. We look forward to the continued involvement in the bank by Mr. Maloney and our association with the Troy community."

Bank of Troy had total assets of about \$57 million as of June 30th. Total assets of First Citizens Bancshares, Inc. were about \$333 million at that time.

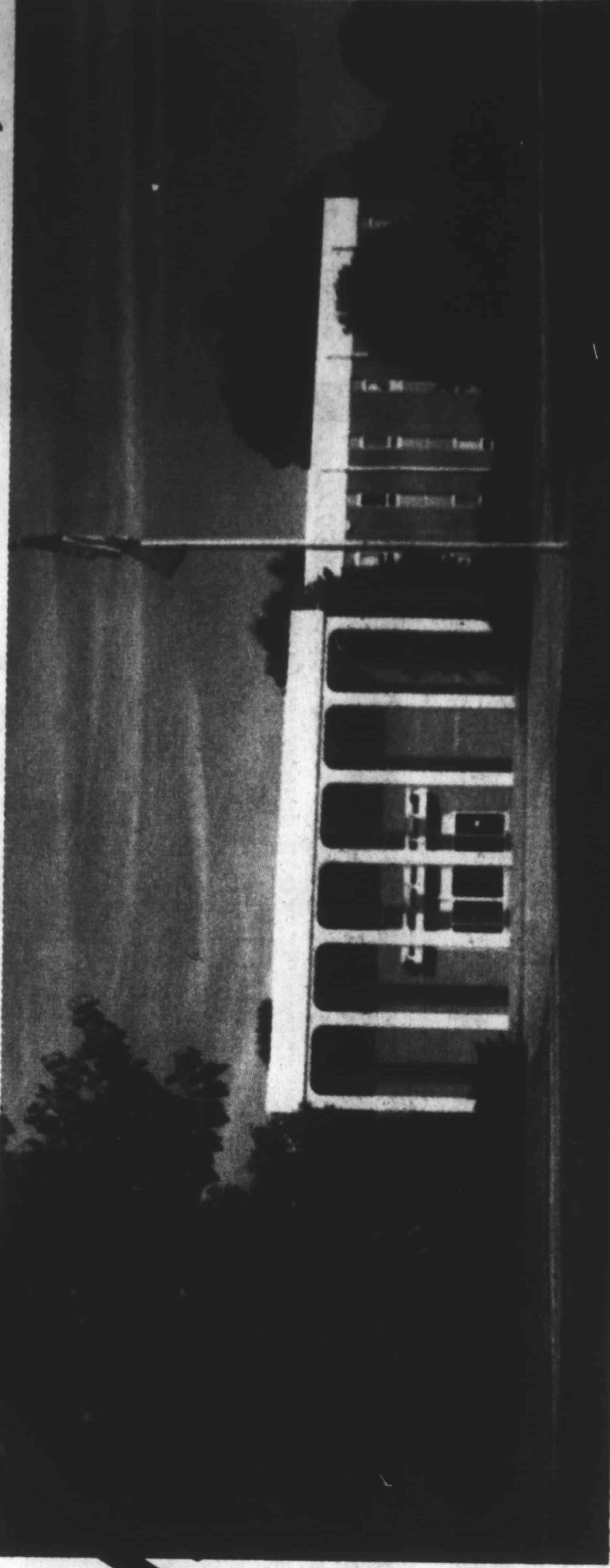

Registering after the first official day of classes:

Students who register for a class after the first official day of classes need to be aware that enrollment in classes is not guaranteed but may depend on the number of classes missed and the instructor's assessment of the student's chances for success in the course.

Dropping Courses:

To drop a course, a student must complete a Change of Registration form and follow the procedures listed on the form. Forms may be obtained in the Office of Admissions & Records or from the academic advisor or at the Gibson and Tipton County locations. A student is not officially dropped from a course until this form is processed in the Office of Admissions & Records. Failure to comply will result in a grade of "F". Please refer to the Academic Calendar in this schedule or in the 1997-1998 DSCC catalog for deadlines to drop.

Tennessee Board of Regents policy prohibits students from dropping courses in the College Preparatory Program (remedial/developmental). Under extenuating circumstances, however, a course may be dropped with the approval of the advisor and the Director of the College Preparatory Program.

Courses may be dropped without a grade through approximately the first two weeks (14 calendar days beginning with the first day of class). After this time, a grade of "W" is given if the course is officially dropped.

Drop Vs. Withdrawal:

If a student is enrolled in only one course and does not want to remain in that course or wishes to withdraw from all courses, a Permission to Withdraw form must be obtained and appropriate signatures obtained. Forms are available in the Office of Admissions & Records and the Gibson and Tipton County Centers. Failure to withdraw officially from school will result in an automatic grade of "F" in all courses. Please refer to the Academic Calendar in this schedule or in the 1997-1998 DSCC Catalog for deadlines to drop.

Grade Reports:

A grade report showing the grade received, credit hours earned, and quality points earned is mailed to the permanent address of each student at the end of the term. No student will be issued a grade report or transcript until all debts or obligations owed to the College have been satisfied.

The Office of Admissions and Records will not release any grade except by the official copy sent by mail. To protect the confidential nature of the student's records, no grades will be released by phone.

Class Cancellations and Changes:

Dyersburg State Community College reserves the right to cancel classes that do not have sufficient enrollment. Divisions offering more than one section of the same course may close sections as necessary to promote the most effective instruction. Instructor assignments are also subject to change.

While this schedule of classes has been prepared on the basis of the most current information at the time of printing, the schedule is subject to change without notice, obligation or liability.

Notice: When you register for a class and do not attend, you will receive a grade of "F" unless you properly drop or withdraw. See page 75 of the 1997-1998 catalog for Drop/Withdrawal procedures.
