Ripley Holds Realty Rate But Ups Water & Sewer Rates 14%

Ripley's City Board, meeting Monday, held the real estate tax rate at \$1.68 per \$100 assessment but approved an average 14% hike in city water and sewer rates, effective with August billings.

New rates (for minimum 2,000 gallons) are \$4.50 per month for water, \$6.10 for sewer, for residential users. An advertisement in The Enterprise includes complete new rates.

Allen & Hoshall, of Memphis, architects and en gineers, surveyed 115 city water rates and 113 city sewer rates in the state.

For water, Ripley's new minimum (\$4.50) compares to an average of \$6.14 in the survey.

For 5,000 gallons, the figures are \$9 to \$12.72; for 15,000, \$25.40 to \$33.45; and for 25,000, \$36.50 to \$55.51.

For sewer service, Ripley's new minimum (\$5.10) compares to \$6.43; for 5,000 gallons, \$10.05 to \$14.99; and for 15,000, \$32.60 to \$40.64.

The County told McCalla that it had no control over Judge Williams' rulings.





The Tomato is the fruit of the (surprise!) tomato plant, a vinelike plant which belongs to the nightshade family. The tomato plant
likes a sunny, hot, and humid environment. It originated in South
America and was domesticated by the lncas. They bred the tomato
so it had many ruffles and ridges. Spanish monks cultivated the
tomato, although it was not widely accepted by Europeans as an
edible fruit. Thomas Jefferson was known to be a connoisseur of the
tomato and tried to convince people it was a great fruit(no wonder
he is considered a great American).

During the nineteenth century, the tomato was affectionately call
the love apple, or in french, pomme d'amour. At the turn of the
century, a gardener decided that he didn't like the ridges and ruffles
of the Incan tomato. He spent twenty years breeding them out and
produced the Paragon, the first formal variety of the tomato. It is
now the most widely grown "vegetable" (it's a fruit, you know) in the
United States.

The origin of the cultivated tomato is somewhat unclear.
Ethnobotanists and geneticists however have attempted to track
down the centre of domestication. "The genus Lycopersicon- the
botanical group to which the tomato belongs- is native to western
South America, and only Lycopersicon lycopersicum var.
cerasiforme, the wild cherry form of the cultivated species, has
spread throughout Latin America and the New World Tropics.
Second, the tomato was not known in Europe until after the
discovery and conquest of America, descriptions and drawings first
appearing in the European herbals of the middle and late 16th
century.

Common Misconceptions about the tomato:

Over the years many myths have stemmed from the tomato vine. Among them are:

The tomato is poisonous:

FACT: The tomato is, in fact, perfectly harmless, and mighty tasty as well. This myth originated when people noticed that the tomato is related to the nightshade, a wild plant with toxic berries.

Tomatoes are vegetables.

FACT: Tomatoes are not vegetables- they are fruit. A fruit is defined as the mature ovary of an angiosperm, meaning that is develops from the reproductive structures of an angiosperm (flowering plant). The fruits themselves are fleshy bodies containing seeds. Tomatoes neet all these criteria. There is no scientific definition for vegetable; however, vegetables range from taproots (such as the carrot) to tubers (the potato) to stems (asparagus).

MYTH: All tomatoes are red when ripe.

FACT: There are myriad varieties of tomato, and not all of them are red when ripe. Tomatoes run from yellow to deep purple in. Goolor. For example, the Lemon Boy variety is yellow, and the Cherokee Purple is, well, purple.

Growing tomatoes is fin and yields many great tasting finit. However, a person cannot just plop a couple of seeds into the ground and hope for them to grow. In this section, I hope to outline how to grow tomatoes.

Before planting, one must determine what tomato varieties are right for him or her. The first consideration is space. The space must be a well drained and sumny area of ground. If a person has a small space for growing tomatoes, she should grow determinate

plants, ones that stop growing after a certain time. If a person has a larger space, then she can grow indeterminate tomatoes, or ones that keep growing through the year. Next, varieties can be chosen by use. There are three main types of tomatoes, Slicing Tomatoes, Cherry Tomatoes, and Paste Tomatoes. The first two types are generally eaten unaltered, although slicing tomatoes make wonderful sauce. Paste tomatoes are used for canning, sauce and ketchsup. Within each category of tomato, there are many varieties. These have to be chosen by personal prefence. Several popular varieties are Celebrity, Brandywine, Better Boy, the beckteak family, Lemon Boy, Roma, and the Supersweet 100.


Once a person has their seeds she should not plant them right away. Tomatoes are usually planted eight weeks before the last frost. They should be planted in a soilless mix (potting soil) in small containers called "six packs", which can be obtained at any local garden center. The newly planted seeds germinate in 70 to 75 degrees (F) of warmth and need to be constantly watered Immediately after the first seed germinates, the "six packs" need to be placed in full light for 12 to 14 hours a day. Many gardeners use grow lights (usually flourescent lights), although some areas are sunny and warm enough that the tomatoes also be placed outdoors.

After the first rue leaves (the second set of leaves) are fully developed, the stronger tomatoes should be transplanted into six inch pots. All others should be discarded. The number of plants a person saves depends on the space available for tomatoes. Each tomato plant needs three square feet in a garden, so plant accordingly. The transplants need to be left outside in the day to get used to the outdoor temperatures. The tomatoes will need as much sun as possible.

Preserving Tomatoes

Freezing: Tomatoes can be frozen successfully. It is true that fresh, ripe tomatoes don't freeze well. But if there is a good supply of tomatoes and freezer space, freeze them stewed or as juice.

Canning: Tomatoes can be water bathed or pressured following the instructions in "Canning Foods," PB 742. available at your local Extension office.

* TOMATOES CANNOT BE CANNED BY OPEN KETTLE METHOD! If you do not have a 1990 or later canning book, you need to obtain one. Many changes have been made, one of which is adding ascorbic acid to home-canned tomatoes. (The reason ascorbic acid is being added is because the new hybrid varieties have less acid than older varieties.)

Dried: Many gourmet recipes currently feature sundried tomatoes. These are just dried tomatoes. You can prepare them yourself using a dehydrator.

During the 1997-98 academic year, all students whether residents or non-residents of Tennessee, will pay a maintenance fee of \$48 per semester hour not to exceed \$543 per semester. All students who enroll in three or more hours will also pay a \$25 Technology Access Fee. Fees are subject to change at any time by action of the Tennessee Board of Regents. 


