#### Districts 1 And 7 City Elections Set

Gates and Henning elections for mayor and alderman are set for Thursday, June 5th. Polls will open at 9 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Voters in District 7, the Town of Gates, will be held at the Gates Library. 849 voters are registered in District 7, 409 in the city and 440 in the county.

Candidates for mayor are Booker Joe Nance, Sr., Brenda Carter and Johnny R. Marvel.

Candidates for alderman are Terry Janda, John Hammond, Booker Joe Nance, Jr., Ocie Trosper and Mike Warren. Voters will elect four aldermen.

The location for voters in District 1, Town of Henning, will be at the Henning Fire Station. There are 1,226 registered voters in District 1; 763 in town and 463 in the county.

Candidates for mayor are Billy Poe Brandon, Fred Montgomery, Jr., Jerry Holland and Howard Spivey, Sr.

Candidates for alderman are Cubert Bell Sr., Chuck Brown, Barry Dewalt, Baris Clayton Douglas, Kathryne Farmer, Kevin Henderson Sr., Ora (Dean) Nelson, Renee Rose, Frances Webb, Ella Webber and Tyrus (Spoon) Wright. Voters will elect six aldermen.

#### **Brownsville Expects Industrial Growth**

Haywood County purchased 65 acres adjacent to its industrial park Monday, adding the land in hopes of luring more industry to Browns-

"We feel this is valuable land for our needs," stated Brownsville Mayor Webb Banks. "It squares off our industrial park and gives us more than 100 acres in one block."

City and county leaders shared the \$100,000 price for the former farm land, purchasing the land in two separate tracts from Cherry Lea, of Brownsville, and Carol Walker, of Ripley.

Brownsville's newest recruit is Willamette, purchasing 15 acres in the park earlier this year and constructing a \$20 million facility. The company will cut rolls of paper for use in copiers, computers and fax machines.

Eight of Haywood County's largest employers are located in or near the industrial park including the Stackpole Corporation, producers of ball-bearings for electric motors, and MTD-Cub Cadet, manufacturers of lawn mowing equipment.



#### **Auditor Suggests Bookkeeping** Services For Town Of Henning

Dennis F. Dycus, CPA, CFE, CGFM, Director, Division of Municipal Audit for the State of Tennessee, Comptroller of the Treasury, wrote to Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen in the Town of Henning, June 2nd.

"We have reviewed the annual financial report on the Town of Henning for the three years ended June 30, 1995, as audited by Willie Mae Harmon, Certified Public Accountant. As a result, this report has been accepted and filed as part of the public records of the State of Tennessee.

"The report revealed that the financial records for the municipality were 'in total disarray' during the period under audit. Records were missing for several months in their entirety. The records that were available were so out of balance and full of errors that they were virtually useless in establishing anything of financial relevance. During the three year period under audit, the town received over \$321,000.00 in grants through the State of Tennessee, some of which were federally funded, but could not account for all of the expenditures under those grants. Never in the history of this office have we seen a municipality's financial statements with account titles like 'unexplained differences' that had balances as high as \$220,929.46. Apparently, these accounts had to be used because your auditor was unable to determine anything about the financial activity that had occurred. The condition of the municipality's financial records resulted in your auditor issuing a disclaimer of opinion in the 1993, 1994 and 1995 financial statements.

"In 1988, this office performed a special purpose investigation related to an embezzlement of \$8,735.68 in the Town of Henning which resulted in an indictment. In 1995, this office issued another special purpose investigation report which disclosed another embezzlement in the amount of \$72,417.28 which resulted in an indictment as well as a conviction. The continuous failure of the elected officials to correct known deficiencies has provided the opportunity for seemingly perpetual theft, fraud, waste and abuse of municipal funds. It is the responsibility of the elected officials of the municipality to both safeguard the assets of the municipality and to comply with the provisions of its own charter, Tennessee Code Annotated, the Internal Control and Compliance Manual for Tennessee Municipalities, and all other applicable laws and regulations. Please note that knowingly or willfully neglecting to perform any duty enjoined upon a public officer is cause for ouster from such office, as provided by Section 8-47-101, Tennessee Code Annotated.

"It is our understanding that, as

plete the 1996 audit of the Town of Henning because accurate and complete records of the town's financial transactions are still nonexistent. In short, there is still no evidence that the town's management has made any real efforts toward bringing the records of the municipality in compliance with generally accepted accounting principles, as required by Section 9-2-102, Tennessee Code Annotated, and described in the Internal Control and Compliance Manual for Tennessee Municipalities, nor has there been evidence that the staff has the ability to do so. Please note that there are other avenues available to municipalities who have had difficulties in finding personnel who possess the knowledge and experience to accurately and completely establish and maintain books and records in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Bookkeeping services may be obtained by private accounting firms or from nonprofit corporations specializing in governmental accounting, such as the Local Government Data Processing Corporation in Columbia, Tennessee. It has become increasingly clear that there appears to be very little chance of im-

"Regardless of the route determined by municipal officials to be the best for resolving the town's voluminous accounting inadequacies, immediate action should be taken to bring the town into the financial compliance demonstrated by many other small municipalities who manage to adequately fulfill their fiduciary obligations to their citizens. Please inform this office in writing, within 30 days of the date of this letter, of the measures taken to correct all of the deficiencies brought to your attention both by this office and by your auditor.

#### WHY I COULD NOT SUPPORT THE BUDGET DEAL by U.S. Senator Fred Thompson (R-TN)

UNITED STATES SENATOR • TENNESSEE

Washington is busy celebrating this week. The budget deal worked out between President Clinton and the Republican leadership in Congress was approved by both the House and Senate. The agreement is being hailed as a bipar-

tisan triumph that will balance the budget by the year 2002. I do not agree. It would certainly be worth celebrating if we could agree on a bipartisan plan that would truly cut spending, balance the budget, and shrink the size of the federal government. However, convincing the American people of something that isn't true is worse than doing nothing at all - although it is clearly to the short-term political benefit of all incumbent politicians.

The fact is that this budget won't balance by the year 2002, and it wouldn't matter much even if it did. Anyone can come up with a budget that balances on paper. Congress has passed seven so-called budget deals in the last 15 years - and the budget still isn't balanced. The problem is that the new spending and the tax cuts always sail through, but the corresponding budget

Why do I say that this deal won't balance the budget? First, because it is based on extremely optimistic assumptions about the economy. The budget negotiators assumed that the current economic expansion — already in its sixth year — would last another five years, making it the longest boom in U.S. history. Could all of these things happen? I guess it's possible. Are

they likely to happen? Not in my view. Second, 72 percent of the spending cuts in the agreement are put off until the last two years, when President Clinton will be out of office and this Congress will be long gone. This is a time of economic prosperity. We have a President in his second term who one would think could afford to demonstrate some political courage. Yet this budget increases spending up front and puts off all of the heavy lifting. If we don't have the courage to make the tough choices now, what makes us think that some future President and some

Why do I say that even if this budget did balance by 2002, it doesn't

Because the truth is that while getting to balance in 2002 will be hard. staying in balance after that will be even harder. We are facing a demographic time bomb that is going to explode about a decade from now, when the Baby Boomers begin to retire. Over the next 35 years, the number of Americans over the age of 70 will double. Yet our entitlement programs. such as Social Security. Medicare, and Medicaid, already consume over 60 percent of the federal budget. If we do nothing, by the year 2012 these programs will consume the entire federal budget - 100 percent - leaving nothing for roads, schools, national parks, and defense. That is not acceptable. Yet this budget agreement includes none of the structural reforms that are

The only number in the budget deal that is really relevant is next year's spending. All of the rest is little more than speculation. And what happens next year under this budget agreement? Spending increases by \$69 billion

The deficit increases by \$23 billion. We are moving in the wrong direction. Of course I support the tax cuts in the agreement, modest though they are. However, we as conservatives should not allow ourselves to be bought off with a piddling tax cut to keep us from blowing the whistle on a budget deal that increases spending and does nothing to reform our entitlement pro-

#### **MEDICARE WILL EXPIRE IN 2001**

Every year, the Medicare Board of Trustees releases its report on the status of the Medicare program, and every year, the news gets worse. Recently the Medicare Trustees announced the 30-year-old senior citizens' health care system will be bankrupt in 2001 and will cease to provide beneficial health care for America's elderly. That's just four short years away.

Medicare is a bedridden patient that's showing acute symptoms of

chronic disease. It needs immediate attention, but will never leave the hospital if we keep using band-aid fixes to stop its chronic hemorrhage. A bipartisan reform effort is the only way to successfully save our Medicare system. Medicare began deficit spending in 1995, and its chronic condition is the result of two factors. First, the program faces a looming demographic landslide as the Baby Boomers approach retirement and as more and more Americans are living longer. The number of Americans over 70 years old will

Medicare system is shrinking rapidly. Meanwhile the average life expectancy has risen from 61 years in 1935 to a projected 78 years in 2025. Second, Medicare is a 30-year-old program that has changed very little since its creation, despite huge advances in medicine and medical practice in

the last three decades According to the 1997 Trustees Report, the Medicare system will be exhausted in 2001. That leaves little for today's aging Americans and nothing for our children and grandchildren. Ignoring this problem now will only harm future generations and future efforts to mend the system. To bring the program into actual balance, over the next 25 years under the intermediate assumptions, would require either that Medicare expenditures be reduced by 40 percent or that Medicare income be increased by 66 percent throughout this

We have taken the first step toward a bipartisan solution with the historic

Trust Fund expenditures exceeded revenue by \$2.6 billion in 1995 and \$5.3 billion in 1996. Predictions forecast the losses would grow to \$12.8 billion this year, \$20.1 billion next year and \$28.6 billion in 1999.
