Programs Aid Wildlife Habitat

There are a variety of programs to provide money to develop a wildlife habitat, according to UT Wildlife Specialist, Charles Dixon. It doesn't matter whether you plan upland or wetland habitat.

Under the new farm bill's Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), wildlife habitat is just like soil and water conservation. You receive 50 percent of the cost of establishing cover and an annual rental payment for the 10 or 15 year period.

If your land is currently in CRP, you can re-enroll it. You must re-bid and compete nationally for acceptance. Mr. Dixon says that land planted to wildlife-friendly cover will receive favor for renewal. Converting land presently in fescue to wildlife-friendly cover can boost the final score and improve the possibility of bid accep-

Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency (TWRA) has \$1 million to use over the next two years as additional cost-share money to aid in planting wildlife-friendly cover. TWRA will consider land newly re-enrolled in the CRP program or land converted from fescue to wildlife-friendly cover.

The money from TWRA is in addition to what you get from CRP. You can get up to \$40 per acre under this program. You get \$30 per acre for the purchase of native, warm-season grasses and \$10 per acre to eradicate fescue.

The Wetland Reserve Program seeks to restore converted wet-

FAA Chicken Causes British Government Concerns

In the last few months,

have covered just about every topic there is concern ing chickens. My articles have gone from the true meaning of "free range" chicken to locating people who still serve pulley bones at Sunday dinners. Due to these less than masterpieces of poultry literature, I have received numerous offerings of chicken dinners, letters accusing me of being prejudice to fowl, and phones calls suggesting that I should spend my time doing something else other than "fowling" the newspapers with my chicken humor.

You would think I would learn a lesson and leave the subject of chickens alone, but I am a slow learner. With the encouragement from one of my preacher friends, who happens to be Carmack Skelton from Columbia, I am attempting one more article that contains information

about our fine feathered friends and dinners. Carmack recently saw

some interesting information, that he shared with me, that appeared in a recent issue of Meat and Poultry magazine. The editor of the magazine quoted from Feathers, the publication of the California Poultry Industry Federation

telling the following story: The US Federal Aviation Administration has a unique device for testing the strength of windshields on airplanes. The device is a gun that launches a dead chicken at a airplane's windshield approximately the speed the plane flies.

The theory is that if the windshield doesn't crack from the carcass impact, it'll survive a real collision with a bird during flight. It seems the British were very interested in this and wanted to test a windshield on a brand new speedy locomotive they're developing. They borrowed FAA's chicken launcher, loaded the chicken, and fired.

The ballistic chicken shattered the windshield, broke

the engineer's chair, and embedded itself in the back wall of the engine's cab. The British were stunned and asked the FAA to recheck the test to see if everything was done correctly.

The FAA reviewed the test thoroughly and had only one recommendation: Use a thawed chicken. It is amazing that some-

times the things that are the most obvious are often forgotten or taken for granted. In the news almost everyday, we read of people becoming sick from food improperly prepared, which many times happens in their own homes. Things that our grandparents practiced years ago on a regular routine basis, such as washing your hands, cooking food to the correct temperature, and other simple good, safe, food preparing habits, are now being overlooked by the modern day generation.

Last week, USDA Secretary Dan Glickman and Health and Human Services Secretary Donna Shalala, jointly announced Fight BAC!, (BAC stands for bacteria,

which is pretty catchy I think) a new component of the administration's Food Safety Initiative. This campaign is aimed at educating consumers and food preparers about the basics of safe food preparation. Now, the government has to tell us how to cook our food. I have always heard that I should wash my hands and never eat raw food, but now the administration has to develop a special campaign just so we know these things we should have learned in kindergarten.

Just as I said earlier, the most obvious is often forgotten or taken for granted. It is important to remember that eighty percent of foodborne illnesses can be prevented through proper food handling and preparation.

The Fight BAC! campaign features four key principles of basic sanitation and food handling steps to reduce the risk of foodborne illness.

First, you should always wash your hands and surfaces often; second, prevent cross-contamination; third. cook foods to proper temperatures; and fourth refrigerate promptly. Follow these simple steps and you should stay bacteria free!

You will soon be seeing TV public service announcements and other methods of media reporting to make the public aware of how they can prevent food bacteria problems. There will even be a web site on the Internet where consumers, health professionals, educators and the media can learn the latest news about preventing foodborne illness. The web site address is www.fightbac.org. which should be up and run-

Maybe with this new campaign, we can soon remember the obvious and avoid taking our food safety for

Who knows? This just may be my last chicken story. I sure don't want to take my readers for granted.

AWARENESS PROGRAM DRAWS ATTENTION TO SILENT- DEADLY VIRUS

For nearly 20 years, I spent every day in a hospital tending to the needs of my patients. While I've temporarily replaced medicine with my work in the United States Senate, I still keep abreast of health threats that could affect my fellow Tennesseans. Hepatitis C is one such threat that is just beginning to get the attention it deserves.

A viral infection that causes inflammation of the liver, hepatitis C is on the rise in Tennessee and the United States. Common symptoms of the disease resemble that of a mild flu, with fatigue, nausea, loss of appetite, headaches, abdominal pain and fever. While the symptoms may not seem that dangerous, as many as 80 percent of infected people develop chronic hepatitis C which can lead to cirrhosis of the liver, cancer and the need for a liver

Many of those infected with the virus are completely unaware of their infection and may remain unaware for as many as 20 years, when recognizable symptoms begin to pop up and the damage is already done. As a result, hepatitis C is the leading indication for liver transplantation in the U.S. and causes about 8,000 deaths each year. That number is expected to triple in the coming decades

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the National Institutes of Health estimate that as many as 95,000 Tennesseans may already have hepatitis C. Throughout the country, as many as four million people could be carrying the virus.

That's why I commend the state of Tennessee for designating October as Hepatitis Awareness Month. Tennesseans are being asked to speak with their doctors about hepatitis risks, symptoms and treatment, and to take the appropriate steps to reduce their risk of infection. In addition, nearly 300 health centers in the state are distributing brochures to give Tennesseans more information on hepatitis and how it's transmitted.

Hepatitis C is found in blood, and can be transmitted by using razors, needles, toothbrushes, tattooing, body piercing or acupuncture needles used by an infected person. People who are most at risk are those who've had a blood transfusion before 1990, health care workers, IV drug users, hemodialysis patients, infants born to an infected mother, and people with multiple sex partners. No vaccine exists for this strain of hepatitis, but treatments and maintaining a healthy life-style can help if the infection is caught early

This month especially, I encourage all Tennesseans interested in more information about hepatitis C, those wishing to be tested for the virus, or those seeking treatment to see a physician or health care provider as soon as possible. And I thank the state of Tennessee for bringing this important issue to the forefront of the public's attention.







Justice Reid To Vacate **Seat On Supreme Court**

Justice Lyle Reid announced Tuesday he will not seek reelection to the Tennessee Supreme Court at the end of his eight-year term in August.

"If I hurry I may have time for one more career," stated the 67year-old former chief justice. "I am not sure what the future holds, but I am sure I will find something useful and exciting."

Justice Reid, of Brownsville served as chief justice from 1990-1994. He was appointed to the Court of Criminal Appeals in 1987 and elected in 1988. He was elected to the state Supreme Court in August 1990. He was a member of the Tennessee House of Representatives in 1967-68 and was in private law practice in Brownsville from 1963-86. He served as Haywood County attorney from 1964-86. He was named deputy commissioner of the Department of Commerce and Insurance in 1987 before his appointment by Gov. Ned McWherter to the appellate

Under state law, Justice Reid's seat on the five-member court will become vacant on Sept. 1st. The 5-member Appellate Court Nominating Commission will acwill appoint Justice Reid's succes-

Chief Justice Riley Anderson and Justice Frank Drowota III. Justice Adolpho A. Birch, Jr. and Justice Janice Holder will seek retention election.

1 cup pitted California dates 2 cups wild rice

1 medium onion, chopped

2 stalks celery, chopped 3 Tablespoons butter 1 teaspoon dried rosemary

1/2 teaspoon dried thyme 1/3 cup diced ham or turkey

½ cup sliced dried apricots 1 green baking apple, peeled, cored and chopped ¾ teaspoon salt

LADY VOLS MAKE, HOST HISTORY

Next year in Tennessee, a very special construction project will be drawing near completion. Once the last nail is driven and the opening ceremony ribbon is cut, Knoxville will be home to the National Women's Basketball Hall of Fame.

It's only fitting. Now the rest of the country can celebrate the achievements of their hometown teams in a place where women's basketball history is made every year. And this year was no exception.

In March the determined Lady Vols became only the second team in history to win two national titles back to back. Under the inspired leadership of Coach Pat Head Summitt, this team has won five national championships since 1987, and thrust women's basketball into the sports limelight.

Equally impressive are the individual achievements of this solid team. Last season, Vol Senior Michelle Marciniak was named Most Valuable Player in the Final Four tournament, going on to join Tiffani Johnson and All-American Chamique Holdsclaw on the all-tournament team.

And the success doesn't stop on home soil. This summer Holdsclaw has led the U.S. national team tour across Europe as part of the World Championships qualifying process. That's even more impressive when you consider that Holdsclaw was the only college player on the 12-player national squad, which included an Olympian and several American Basketball League pro-

This kind of player talent and hard-driving ambition is why some 8,000 fans turn up at every home game.

And Coach Summitt has been pushing her teams to excellence every step of the way for over two decades. An accomplished player in her own right, Summitt played on the 1976 Olympic team, coached the 1984 women's team to a gold medal, and has been named Coach of the Year by so many athletic organizations, she's probably lost count. In 22 seasons, she has built a stunning 596-133 record of success.

With that record, Coach Summitt has taken women's basketball a long way since 1966, when her family had to move to a neighboring town so she could play the sport she loved, because her local high school didn't even have

I'm proud of Coach Summitt and all of the players who work hard every day to stay at the top of their game. These young women are an inspiration to all of us who dare to dream, and are important role models for student athletes

Renently the team was in Washington for a White House reception to applaud their-second National Championship win. Congratulations, Lady Vols. I know you'll make us proud again this year.

From the opening game against Mississippi in a few short weeks, to the Final Four in Kansas City next year, we'll be cheering for you.
