

Dr. Hartman Named Alumnus Of The Year

Projects for Lauderdale County Schools, was named Lambuth University's Alumnus of the Year.

Dr. Hartman began her career as a teacher in the Davidson County School District. She was a pre-school teacher at Oakhaven United Methodist Church and a kindergarten and first grade teacher in the Lauderdale County School System. She has been actively involved with the progressive movement in education.

In 1995 Dr. Hartman presented a Character Education lecture at the East Tennessee Title I Conference, the Middle Tennessee Title I Conference and the International Reading Association Regional Conference. In 1994 and 1995 she was a presenter before the West Tennessee Title I Conference which she chaired in 1996.


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Halls Hosts Gibson: Both Want 1st Win

The fire hydrant is an important tool in the fire service because it provides the water needed by firefighters to extinguish a fire. Fire hydrants are familiar sights on city street corners, though they are less common in rural communities where the fire service generally relies on other sources of water. The word hydrant—hydr- (water) + angi- (vessel) - came into the English language about 1828. Prior to that, fire hydrants were called fire plugs.

Why were fire hydrants called fire plugs and why are they still sometimes called fire plugs today? The term fire plug originated in the 1800s to describe the first efforts to acquire water from underground wooden water mains made of bored-out, crude logs. These logs were tapered at each end to fit together to form a "piping" system for carrying water. When a fire occurred, firefighters would bore a hole into this log main and collect the outpouring water in buckets or by suction hose. After the fire had been extinguished, wooden pegs - known as fire plugs - were pounded into the drilled holes to stop the flow of water. In some cases, the plug was already inserted into the wooden mains at half-block intervals. When the firefighters needed water, they would simply remove the closest plug.

delphia was one of the first cities to successfully put into service wasins with fire plugs. New York City and Boston followed later with water supply systems.

Today, fire hydrants are constructed of cast iron, and water mains are constructed of ductile iron, cast iron, or plastic underground pipe. With these type of fire hydrants and piping systems, pressures and pipe diameters have greatly increased. Because of greater pressures and larger diameters, more effective water supplies can be established to fight fires. Although the days of wooden fire mains and wooden plugs are gone, many people still refer to the fire hydras as a fire plug.

We spend a lot of time discussing fat grams and calories as well as nutrient value of the foods we consume in our daily diets. The subject that bothers me the most, that appears in the media, is all the hype over carcinogens and other chemicals in what we eat. When they compare me to a rat or mouse, seem to lose interest in the article or news report. There seems to be too much concern over dead rats who are overfed certain foods and chemicals.

Back in 1958, when the States Congress passed legislation to keep carcinogens out of our food supply, it was assumed that carcinogens were rarely found in foods and were put there by humans, either purposefully, through food additives, or inadvertently in the form of pesticide residues.



Flu Vaccine Available At Health Department

Flu shots are available from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. beginning Oct. 13th at the Lauderdale County Health Department.

According to Dr. Fedia Wadley, State Health Officer, Flu is associated with 20,000 deaths nationwide in an average season. Flu vaccines are 70 to 90 percent effective in preventing flu among healthy adults.

Influenze, also called "the flu," is caused by viruses that infect the respiratory tract. Flu symptoms include fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, headache,

muscle aches and extreme fatigue.
Although nausea, vomiting and diarrhea sometimes occur during a flu infeciton, such symptoms are rarely prominent.

Annual flu shots are recommended for people at high risk of having a serious complication when they get the flu. This includes all persons age 65 and older and persons of any age with certain chronic health conditions. Vaccination is recommended for health care providers and others who have frequent contact with persons at high risk for serious flu complications.

lot of fun. Are Halloween activities really just innocent holiday fun most people believe them to be? Where did this holiday originate and why is it celebrated? Most people are not aware of the evil history of Halloween. Three hundred years before Je-

The Romans did, however, add a ceremony in honor of Pothe association of apples and the custom of "bobbing" for them. Pope Gregory The Great incorporated the Druids holiday to be a universal church observance, to

honor all the dead saints. Halloween is the shorted version of All Hallow Eve, the evening before All Saints Day, Nov. 1st.

The lighted face on a pumpkin is an ancient symbol of a damned "Jack-o-lanterns" were named for a man called Jack, who could not enter heaven or hell. As a result, he was doomed to wander in darkness until Judgment Day.

Increase In Gates

Anyone with a telephone in Gates could see the local portion of their telephone bills increase by five percent if the Gates Board of Aldermen passes a model ordinance proposed by the Tennessee Municipal League during its next meeting Nov. 10th. The ordinance would charge BellSouth and other telecommunications companies a fee for use of the right-of-way within the city; and the fee would be passed on to local telephone consumers.

"We don't believe this ordinance is legal since BellSouth's use of the right-of-way is governed by state law," stated Kay Gibson, regional manager for BellSouth, "and we don't want to see, what is, in effect, an additional tax on telephone customers' bills. We are opposed to this ordinance and believe that the citizens will be too if they understand the effects on them.

"In addition, we have an existing contract with the City of Gates which does not contain any rightto-use fees. The 1996 Telecommunications Act does not change the existing contract," concluded Mrs. Gibson, "and it doesn't give local governments any new power to charge other fees."

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
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
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
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



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Strugglers igers Visit Halls 1 Fellow
