Mrs. Ricks, in a Jeep Cherokee south-bound ahead of his truck, swerved off the road to the right to avoid a City of Ripley sweeper truck traveling north on Highway 51 making a wide U-turn at Coffee Shop Road entering the southbound lanes of Highway 51.

The Jeep missed the sweeper truck, but the asphalt truck, also swerving off the road to the right, did not; it struck the

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

Southwest Electric **Increases Rates**

According to Jack Fox, General Manager of Southwest Tennesser Electric Membership Corporation, the Board of Directors approved a rate increase during their August 26th board meeting.

"This rate change is necessary because of the recently announced rate increase by the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA)," stated Mr. Fox. "This is the first increase by TVA in ten years. Southwest has not had a rate increase since May 1, 1992. Our expenses and capital investments continued to increase during this time, however, we were able to absorb these costs by cutting expenses and through growth in sales."

The residential electric bill consists of four components. The customer charge and/or minimum bill, a charge for kilowatt hours for the first 800 used, a charge for kilowatt hours used over 800 and any special charges such as outdoor lighting or special billing.

Southwest will apply the increase to the first 800 rate block. The rate will increase from 5.780 to 6.515 cents. The over 800 rate block is not affected and will remain at 5.680 cents.

To provide additional funds for the cooperative, Southwest will increase the customer charge and/or minimum bill from \$6.72 to \$8.30. The maximum amount of the increase will be \$7.46, even to the highest user. This increase in margin will help cover the cost of maintaining service to existing customers, building new lines and servicing the debt.

An increase is also scheduled for outdoor lighting and commercial class consumers. Small commercial (under 50 kw) will see kwh rate increase to 7.054 cents. From 51 to 1,000 kw accounts will see kwh rates increase to 7.049 cents on the first 15,000 and 3.414 cents change in the customer charge for these accounts. Over 1,000 kw customers will see similar increases. Outdoor lighting rates will increase from 4.158 to 4.250 cents.

NEW BUDGET GIVES TENNESSEANS THE TAX RELIEF THEY DESERVE

Just last week, the House and Senate cast their final votes to give hardworking Americans their largest tax cut in sixteen years. By combining tax credits for children with capital gains relief, education credits and death tax reductions, this tax package will benefit all Americans of all ages in all tax

That means the parents of our country's 43.1 million children will pay \$500 less per child in taxes. And the 4.8 million parents with kids in college, as well as students paying their way through college, will owe \$1500 less per student in taxes. In all, an American family of four earning \$30,000 per year will see their taxes cut in half. A family earning \$40,000 will receive a 30 percent tax cut and a family earning \$50,000 will see a 21 percent tax cut.

Last year, more than 2.37 million Tennesseans filed tax returns with the Internal Revenue Service. And when April 15 rolled around, hundreds of thousands of them found that they still owed a total of more than \$1.34 million to the federal government. As the cost of raising a family and affording higher education has become more expensive, the value of the personal exemption has dropped dramatically. In 1948, the American family paid about 3 percent of its total income to the federal government in taxes. Today, that family is paying closer to 25 percent. Americans are working harder and harder, but instead of improving their standard of living, they're padding the government's pockets.

These numbers show us that Tennesseans and all Americans are way overdue for real tax relief. For a typical family of four Tennesseans, the \$500 per child tax credit would give them enough extra money to pay three months worth of groceries, three years of gas bills, 11 months of electric bills or keep their cars fueled for nearly nine months.

Tuition tax credits would give students and parents of students the extra money they need to help cover the costs of books and living while the student invests their time toward earning a higher degree.

And even if they aren't raising a family or have kids in college, Tennesseans will reap the benefits of this package in other ways. Anyone who wants to sell a piece of property or investment will immediately pay less tax on the income from that sale than they would today. In fact, the capital gains tax rate will be cut from 28 percent to 20 percent under this bill. In 1995, more than 226,000 Tennesseans paid capital gains taxes to the tune of \$2.65 million. And despite popular belief that a capital gains tax cut is only for the rich, more than half of the Tennesseans who had to pay capital gains taxes in 1995 — 160,786 to be exact — had incomes of \$75,000 or less. Forty thousand of those capital gains filers actually had an income of less than \$15,000. Similar reductions in the burden of the death tax (exemption from \$600,000 to \$1 million by 2008 and \$1.3 million for family farms and businesses) will ensure that the family members of farmers and small business owners can afford to keep the farm or carry on the business when the preceding generation passes on.

The bipartisan tax relief bill is a significant victory for our taxpayers and for future generations of Americans. While both political parties can claim success in this summer's budget skirmishes, the American people are the true victors who will reap the benefits of our first significant tax cut in nearly two decades for years. The challenge before us now is to keep the federal budget in balance, and I'm committed to making sure we do just that.

We would take our dairy cattle to compete for ribbons and prize money. This

required spending several nights in the barns with the cows, but it also meant spending many enjoyable days with friends from across the state who had the same "fair fever" you experienced every September.

When not working with or showing our livestock, the farm kids would hit the fairgrounds to enjoy a time of fun. The smell of cotton candy, carmel apples, and sawdust seem to be an aroma that you never forget once you experience it.

To hear the call of the midway barker looking for his next victim, to the sound of the bell ringing from the sledge hammer hitting its target swung by the boyfriend trying to impress his girlfriend, are sounds that are embossed into your memory.

Fairs for years have been the showplace for the latest in new farm technology. Kids have enjoyed climbing on new tractors and pretending they were tilling the fields for next year's crops. I can remember climbing into the driver's seat of a brand new John Deere and wishing to someday drive one of those machines across our fields, rather than the "red belly" Ford we would have to keep for several seasons.

It was fun to go through exhibits of flowers grown by ladies to win the purple ribbon, to see rows of canned goods in shades of every color of the rainbow, to smell the aroma of the baked goods up for competition, and to enjoy the atmosphere of everyone sharing in the excitement of the fair.

Today, I only have the chance to visit our state fair as a visitor rather than an exhibitor. TENNESSEANS DESERVE NEEDED SERVICES, FAIR RATES

by Senator Fred Thompson

In 1933 The Tennessee Valley was beginning to show signs of the toll taken by the Great Depression. Farmland was depleted from overuse and improper crop rotation, too many trees had been cut down for timber, and crop yields were getting smaller.

Seeing the great need for resource management, President Roosevelt asked Congress to create "a corporation clothed with the power of government but possessed of the flexibility and initiative of a private enterprise." And the Tennessee Valley Authority came to be.

Today it is the nation's largest power corporation—providing electric power to 7.3 million people in seven different states. But from the beginning its responsibilities went far beyond just power production — including flood control and navigation on the Tennessee River, malaria prevention, reforestation, erosion control, and management of a whole variety of public lands, including the Land Between the Lakes National Recreation Area.

TVA built dams to harness and control the water supply and generate electricity, developed fertilizers and taught farmers how to better manage their land, and worked to preserve the environmental integrity of the area.

Over the years, TVA has changed in significant ways. In 1959, it began to issue bonds to make its power system self-financing. Today TVA's power sales are 100 percent self-supporting.

Recently TVA has considered more changes—some of the most significant in its history—including a proposal offered earlier this year by the TVA Board to eliminate federal funding for the important non-power programs discussed earlier.

While I did not rush to make a judgement on this TVA proposal, I was concerned that Congress—the only entity responsible for oversight of TVA— Ann Smith attended a football should be given the chance to look closely at any major changes TVA undergoes now and in the future. I was also concerned that the people of the Tennessee Valley had had no input into this TVA proposal, and would've had Lewis Mills, Mrs. Wendall Sandno opportunity to express their view on TVA's non-power programs under TVA's plan.

In March Senator Frist and I sent a letter to Senator Pete Dominici, whose

Energy and Water Appropriations Subcommittee funds TVA's non-power programs, asking that Congress and the public be involved in any major changes that fundamentally alter TVA's mission and responsibilities.

A few months into the debate, TVA Chairman Craven Crowell withdrew his proposal, saying that public meetings and telephone surveys in Tennessee convinced him the public overwhelmingly supports TVA's non-power programs and wants TVA to continue to administer them. And in July, the Senate approved an \$86 million appropriation for TVA's non-power programs in the FY 1998 Budget.

Still, the debate continues over the future of these programs. Last month the House of Representatives included no funding for these important programs in its version of the FY 98 Energy and Water Appropriations bill, suggesting instead that TVA raise its electricity rates in order to pay for them. Senator Frist and I think that's unfair.

TVA's non-power activities are Congressionally-mandated, statutory responsibilities of the federal government. In other parts of the country, natural resource and infrastructure management programs are funded through various other appropriated agencies, including the Army Corps of Engineers, the Bureau of Reclamation, the U.S. Forest Service, and the National Park Service. Residents there are not expected to assume the costs of these types of federal responsibilities by paying more for their electricity.

Tennesseans shouldn't be expected to unfairly shoulder this burden either. I believe Tennesseans should benefit from the same flood control, navigation, and land management services as other taxpayers all across the country. And those services should continue to be provided by the TVA.


