

If You Haven't Needed It For Ten **Years-Throw It Away**

If there is one good thing about moving, it probably is the fact that you get the opportunity to get rid of items that you should have never kept in the first place.

Moving is a punishment that I would not wish on anyone. If you have never had to move, you may not understand why it is such a big deal, but if you have, I am sure you are feeling sympathy for me as I move out of a house we have

lived in for ten years. The house also has a full basement, not only in size but also in content. We have kept every item we have ever owned and it has been taking up residence in our

As we planned our move to a new home, we had forgotten what moving entails. It requires you to live out of boxes for a week until the movers arrive, and causes your entire lifestyle to change from one of simplicity to one of total confusion. You can't find your

socks, bowls to eat out of a

pen to write with, or even a chair to set in to look for your socks. Everything is either boxed or stacked up. as well as located in anoth-

er house not yet livable.

Over ten years, I have kept every piece of wood that have sawed off of other pieces of wood that were much longer when I started. I don't know why. I guess it is because I was raised by a set of parents from the Depression Era. I have always been taught to be conservative. So, if it looks like I could use a left over piece of two-by-four for something else, I kept it.

When I cleaned out my shop, I found pieces of wood less than three inches long. Maybe I was planning for a very small project, but getting rid of that woodpile was

I loaded it in a borrowed pickup, which is necessary for moving, and proceeded to the county dump. Today they are called Environmental Waste Deposit Facilities, but to me they are still the dump. proceeded to the area marked "junk", but was stopped and reprehended by the supervisor for placing my wood pieces in the wrong container. I thought I had junk, but he said I had demolition materials. So, I proceeded to throw my little pieces of wood into a container that had everything in it from brush to a bathroom commode. To me it all still looked like junk.

Next, we started going through boxes that had not been opened for ten years. In fact, they were packed from our last move. They had more miles on them than a 68 Ford Mustang.

At this point we completely lost our minds. We

decided to have a yard sale. Yard sales should be handled by professionals and not us amateurs. We worked two weeks to sale \$2,000 worth of goods for \$178. We could have sold more valuables for less money if it had not have

rained. What did we do with what we had left over? We took it to the environmental junk place and guess what? It wasn't junk either. It was household garbage.

After being somewhat experienced in moving we have come up with a basic rule. If you have not needed an item for ten years, you probably will not need it in the next ten years, so throw it away. It could save you a lot of time when ever you move. Better yet. Reduce the statue of limitations on junk in the basement to five years and be real surprised with the amount of extra room you will have. It could save you a lot of embarrassment at the environmental junk throwing away place too.

They Do It?

As the rain slowly fell

against the mud splattered windshield of his pickup truck, 34 year old Perry County young farmer Johnny Skelton wondered out loud, as we traveled about his farm, surveying his crops. The night before more than eight inches of rain had fallen upriver causing major flooding and death along the river. All Johnny could do was watch as the flood waters covered and destroyed his entire spring's work of plowing and planting. More than a thousand acres of corn and soybeans lay victim to the river's muddy waters. His total year's income was now at the mercy of the Buffalo

"Why do I do this," he said as we watched the Buffalo River flow from its banks on to his newly plant

ed soybean fields? "I guess. because I enjoy being a farmer," he went on to explain. "All my life I have looked forward to spring planting and fall harvest. used to have a job at a local plant in town and farm about seventy-five acres on the side. I decided that if was going to farm I needed to put all my effort into it. So I quit my public job and went into farming full time.

On days like this you do wonder why, but I wouldn't

So often when reports of flooding are in the news, they show the homes and businesses damaged, but others are often victims as well. Just like Johnny, farmers who farm the river's fertile bottom lands can only watch as flood waters destroy their crops. Lost are not only the plants of corn and soybeans, but also the manhours of plowing,

Farmers inves thousands of dollars into their crops, which many times are lost due to the rage of Mother Nature.

"After seeing the river go over my soybean field last night, the first thing I did this morning was call my implement dealer to let him know that this fall's payment on the combine may not be as large as I had earlier planned," Johnny said with a slight quiver in his voice. "He said he understood and he would work with me during this tough time. That sure is good to know."

A county or two North of Johnny's farm, Humphreys County row crop farmer Jeffrey Spann had also spen the day watching the flood waters of the Duck River rise near his corn crop. "If the water doesn't reach or cover the ears, my crop will be alright," Jeffrey said. "When the water gets over the ears of corn, the ear is ruined. Also, if the water runs through the field, it will knock the corn plants down and make almost impossible to harvest.' Just like Johnny, Jeffrey

also has farmed all his life His first paycheck came from Moony Lynn, late husband of Loretta Lynn, at the age of seven for farm work on the Lynn Ranch. He farms because he enjoys being farmer. He enjoys seeing things grow and feels he has accomplished his work task at the end of a successful harvest season.

Farmers have faced the

weather since creation and

will continue to do so. Farming is not an easy life with nothing but green pastures and cute baby calves. There are floods, hail storms. droughts, insects, government regulations, and many times low prices. However, there is the reward of accomplishment after a good year and a bountiful harvest. Every year it doesn't flood, but they have to take the good with the bad. You may slow a farmer's accomplishments, but you can never stop his ambition.

Why do they do this you may ask? Just like Johnny's answer after the flood, because they enjoy being a farmer. I'm just glad they do.





They came back and asked to use the phone. When they entered the home, they attacked Mr. Webster and one said he would kill him. He was knocked unconscious. by what he believed to be a black-


Mr. Webster had several gashes in his head, some to the skull, requiring stitches and he had lost a lot of blood.

F.S.A. Offers Loan **Deficiency Payments**

Charlene Winslow, director of the Farm Service Agency, said Loan Deficiency Payments (LDP's) are currently working for corn and soybeans. It is also available for grain sorghum and cotton when the price works.

Forms must be signed prior to harvest of the commodity to be eligible for payment.

The LDP is calculated using the difference between the daily market rate minus the differential for the county, subtracted from the county loan rate. The rate of pay varies day to day. Your rate based on the day of delivery of the buyer, or, if farm stored, the day the CCC-666 is approved.



County Farmers Urged To Seed Winter Cover Crops

Vernon McBride, chairman of the Lauderdale County Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors, stated that winter cover crops, seeded annually, help control erosion. Legume winter cover crops, including vetch and crimson clover, give about 40 to 60 pounds per acre of nitrogen. The winter cover crop increases organic matter and water holding capacity. Wheat, rye and oats are non-legume plants used for winter cover crops.

Mr. McBride urged Lauderdale County farmers to plan now to seed winter cover crops on their fields this fall.



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

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
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
