Gang Problem 'Over Blown' In Brownsville

Brownsville Mayor Webb Banks says the city will launch an intensive effort to counteract the negative image created by an Associated Press story in September which stated that gangs have a "stronghold" in Brownsville.

The story, which appeared of the AP wire Sept. 28th quoted Memphis FBI Special Agent Thomas Locke from a speech he had made to the Union City Rotary Club. Though Agent Locke was speaking about the gang problem in West Tennessee, the wire story singled out Brownsville, making it appear the FBI considered Brownsville's problem unique. Agent Locke said his words were "blown out of proportion" and that he cited Brownsville only because it is an example of a city where there is a great degree of cooperation between local, state and federal law enforcement agencies.

"We are not naïve," Mayor Banks said. "We know gangs have a presence in Brownsville, but we are not aware they represent a threat to the citizenry. In fact, our local law enforcement agencies have been working with the FBI for many months to keep gang activities to a minimum."

The mayor said he will appoint an ad hoc committee of local citi-

zens to address the damage to the city's image caused by the wire release and to add citizen input to attempt to prevent further proliferation of gangs.

"The Brownsville has been steadily proving," said Mayor Banks, "with the recent influx of new industries and a public school system continually recognized for its excellence. We're putting gang members on notice that their activities will be closely watched, and we're putting the community at ease."

Time For Cushaws, A Hog Killing, and Thanksgiving

With the elections over and things sort of settling down for the winter, it's time start thinking about Thanksgiving and cold

All summer we have wished that it would cool off, and now that we are starting to see mornings with frost on our windshields, most of us are looking forward to spring all over again. We are never satisfied with the weather's current conditions, but we have no choice. The important thing is to make the best of it, whatever it may

With Thanksgiving just around the corner and a sure nip in the air, I start having visions of smokehouses full of fresh mea from an old-fashioned hog killing. There is nothing better than fresh tenderloin hot biscuits with gravy, and new molasses. Of course, those molasses will need a chunk of real cow butter chopped and stirred up in them with a fork to make the meal complete.

There are not many hog killings performed these days on Tennessee's farms due to modern processing facilities being available They are much more efficient, safer, cleaner, and a whole lot warmer than standing outside all day in the cold. However, hog killings in communities across Tennessee several years ago, were social events that included neighbors helping neighbors.

Most were events scheduled by checking the almanac

"signs" even before looking at the thermometer. The main goal was to prepare meat for the coming year and to preserve it the best way that they knew how.

In a feature story on the Depression, appearing in a Tennessee newspaper January 14, 1932 the following was written, "With the coming of cold weather, little streams of smoke may be seen during early hours of the morning at country homes...Gathered around these little fires are farmers killing hogs, and women tending lard ... There is no depression in the kitchen, for there is plenty to

During the Depression and in later years, people who lived on a farm did eat good. Today, thanks to modern agriculture, everyone has the opportunity to eat we whether they live on a farm or not. The hog killing has been left to someone else, the lard tending has been replaced by vegetable oil, and the social event now occurs down at the Y soccer field.

Yes, times have changed but not our enjoyment of eating. People still enjoy it and for some reason this time of the year, our appetites increase. I guess it has something to do with storing up for the winter.

Modern farming has come a long way from the days of hog killings, but it still provides families with wholesome food just like in days past. The good part is you don't have to kill, process, and store it yourself.

Thanks to Tennessee's farm families, this fall I will enjoy fresh cushaws baked in brown sugar, sweet potatoes, and fresh tenderloin from

Tennessee farms. It is a good time to "Pick Tennessee Products" for your dining room table and stock up for Thanksgiving.

Make your next fall social event a happening focused around Tennessee farm products. It want be as nostalgic as a hog killing, but it will be a lot warmer.

Faulty Turkey Parts Could Cause




Two Arrested With Drugs In Haley Park

You would think Germany had enough problems of their own without

Woodard Indicted In Federal Court

Thomas Tucker Woodard, of 1485 Ungerecht Rd., Ripley, was indicted November 16th in Federal Court in Memphis and charged with two counts, false and fraudulent claims and statements and entries generally.

Having been born at an early age in Rutherford County and being raised there, I know the problems folks in that part of the state have had for years with stray animals. Stray animals are a major problem for farmers and rural people.

We always used the term "dropped" rather than stray, but in the country it pretty much means the same. Someone who has not been careful to prevent nature from doing what nature does, will leave you a litter of pups at the barn gate and expect you to take care of them.

I have never understood why folks bring them to farms or out in the country expecting farmers to raise their mismanagement mistakes. know farms are large open areas with lots of trees and fields, but there are only so many dogs and cats a farmer

can use. In most cases, the farmer would rather chose his or her own pet than be the dumping ground for unwanted animals. Many times these stray animals cause damage and carry disease to the farmer and his livestock.

It seemed we always had someone's dog with a litter of pups coming to the barn. Of course, we had no place to put them, and then it became our responsibility to do what the original owners should have done in the very beginning. It wasn't fair to us or the animals.

I can still remember seeing cars from town slowing down just past our barn and then speeding off. Then in a few minutes we would have a new kitten or dog on our door step.

Many times I wanted to repay the favor. When the price of hogs would go down to where we were almost giving them away, I thought about taking a truck load of pigs to town and leaving them on those same people's doorstep. I changed my mind on that one though. could fatten up the pigs and eat them. They didn't deserve a free meal.




