

Free Shot Day For **Public Health Week**

Health officials at the Lauderdale County Health Department, as part of National Public Health Week, April 5th - 11th, will offer a "Free Shot Day, from 8 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. April 7th. Parents of school-age children are urged to eview immunization records for second measles, mumps and rubella shots needed for school - required for all students entering kindergarten, fourth, eighth and twelfth grades this fall.

The mission of public health in America is to promote physician and mental health and prevent disease, injury and disability.

Public health prevents epidemics and the spread of disease, protects against environmental hazards, prevents injuries, promotes and encourages health behaviors, responds to disasters and assists communities in recovery and assures the quality and accessibility of health services.

Public health services include monitoring health status to identify community health problems; diagnosing and investigating health problems and hazards in the community; informing, educating and empowering people about health issues; mobilize community partnerships to identify and solve health problems; develop policies and plans to support individual and community health efforts; enforce laws and regulation to protect health and ensure safety; link people to needed personal health services and assure the provision of health care when otherwise unavailable; assure a competent public health and personal health care workforce; and evaluate effectiveness, accessibility and quality of

When Is Supersize Enough?

Every now and then, eat a meal in a fast food establishment that has started increasing the size of your order when you say the word "supersize." All of the fast food places are doing it and they are adding a new meaning to the term "a large order." For just a little bit more in cost, you can have your order of french fries served in a refrigerator box, and your soft drink in a gallon bucket.

very seldom take advantage of this added value due to an experience that has left me paranoid of food coming in larger than life paper boxes.

It all began as I was traveling to a meeting and became very hungry along the way. Not wanting to spend travel time in a major restaurant, I decided to stop at the next "Burger Doodle" for one of their famous value meals.

Drive-thru was out of the question. I never can understand what they are saying when you order from those boxes located on a fence post out back.

Question? Why will a nationally known company spend thousands of dollars for a sign shaped like french fries, and can be seen by the space shuttle on cloudy day, but will put in a Ronco \$21.95 speaker system at the drive-thru that sounds like fish talking under

I hate to talk to a box. It's a lot like voice-mail on a business phone, but it is more humiliating due to the fact you are hanging out of your car window talking to no one. To avoid the embarrassment of me hollering out of my car window at a rusty box on a post, I usually go inside. Besides, if you go inside you have the added honor of arriving at your meeting smelling like a huge french

Inside, I placed my order

for a #3 extra economy meal. You can select from eight different meals listed on the extra economy meal board. I is located over the bins where the burgers come shooting out from some place in the back. All the meals come with fries and a medium soft drink. However, if you say the magic words, "super-doopersize-it," you can get more fries and a bigger drink for only fifty cents more. Being a growing boy, (out and not up), I said the magic words.

When my order arrived, it was too much for a man and not hardly enough for a horse. The burger was of normal quantity, but the number of fries I received must have caused a potato shortage in Idaho. The soft drink was served in a container I am now washing my car in on Saturdays.

Using both hands, and all of my strength, I proceeded to the condiment table with my purchase to get ketchup for my fries. Another question. Why do they give you ten pounds of potatoes, but serve ketchup



No matter what the monetary value may be, the embarrassment of a "super-dooper-size-it" walk is not worth it.
