Joe H. Walker, Jr., Dies, 80; Lawyer, Banker, Legislator

Joseph Hillary Walker, Jr., 80, Ripley attorney and banker who served in the state legislature and in a Constitutional Convention, died Thursday of last week, of heart failure, in Baptist Hospital East in Memphis.

Services were at 2 p.m. Saturday in First Baptist Church in Ripley, flooded with floral tributes and requiring seating in the balcony. Burial was in Maplewood Cemetery in Ripley, Garner's Funeral Home in charge

Born in Birmingham, Ala. April 7, 1919, he was the son of the late Joseph Hillary and Nora Arnold Walker

Walker was graduated from Norwood Grammar School and Phillips High School and took a bachelor of arts degree from the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa in 1941.

War Brought Him Here

He first visited Lauderdale County as an officer in the Army Air Force during World War II.

Training at the Dyersburg Air Base in Halls, he met Ann Tucker. daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Tucker III, of Ripley. They were married in Forrest City, Ark., Dec. 31, 1944.

Serving in bomber forces in the European Theater, he won five awards of the Distinguished Flying TOSS

Discharged as a major, he later served in the Air Force Reserve.

Legal Career Memorable

In 1947, he took a law degree from the University of Alabama, where he was a member of Sigma Nu and of Alabama Quadrangle.

He established a practice in Ripley, with notable success in both civil and criminal cases.

Always affable, he could quickly establish rapport with a jury


Opponents were often deceived by his off-hand casualness. until he struck for the crux of the matter.

He had been admitted to Supreme Court practice.

He was Ripley's city attorney from 1948 to 1987.

Served In House, Senate

He was elected to represent Ripley First Baptist Church.

Guilty Of First Degree Murder

Bruce Lee Robinson pled guilty first degree felony murder of Latoria Renee Taylor, 22, and Lexius Floyd, a child of 22 months. The murders occurred in May 1996, when the door of a home at 105 Watkins in Ripley was kicked open. The State alleged that two co-defendants, Bwana M. Editor: I read in your paper that Dr. Webb, our school superintendent, going around with his hat in his hand from the County Commission to the Board of Mayor and Aldermen, in a quest for additional funds. He says he's losing too many teachers to the surrounding counties, and needs the additional dough to toss them to keep them a home. We have the finest teachers, he says, and if we want to keep them we need more money. Here's a word of advice, Mr. Superinten dent: Don't hold your breath until you get it. For it probably isn't forthcoming from either of the sources you've tried so far. What you don't get it? Maybe it's time to approach this thing from an unfamiliar angle, namely the premise that there are more important things than money, even in Lauderdale County. I ask my fellow citizens to con-

sider the following facts, of which some of them may not be aware Did you know, for example, that you are hired to teach in the Lauderdale County School System, you may be dismissed form its service for any reason, until you obtain tenure? No, let me be entirely accurate, for the document you sign upon being hired states specifically that they don't have to give you any reason at all to fire you. You serve entirely at the pleasure of the Superintendent, the school board the principal of the school, and Lord knows who else. They don't have to demonstrate your incompetence, moral laxity, failure to perform your duties, or any of the usual reasons that it takes to be fired. If one person, whoever it might be, doesn't like you, you could be gone. Say someone doesn't like fat people, for example. You could be gone. Suppose you are cross-eyed. You could be gone. These aren't reasons, but they don't have to have one. What if your husband writes a less than flattering letter to the local paper? You could be gone, because it only takes one offended person, and it's lights out for you. What if, (and this is somewhat more likely) some local politician has a friend or relative who needs a job? Reason enough, since you don't have to be given a reason at all to be shown the door, regardless of the sacrifices you've made to get a teaching certificate. The school system is already lousy with brothers, sisters, husbands and wives, mothers-in-

law, and more cousins and kissing cousins than you can count. These people must all take precedence over you, and hardly tends to make you feel wanted.


But if that doesn't make you feel wanted, this surely will. The first week in April, the Superintendent's office will inform all the non-tenured teachers that they are fired. Don't take this the wrong way, they say, it's just this troublesome state law that says we have to tell you whether or not you are hired for next year before April 15. So what we do is fire everybody and hire the ones we want back at the end of the school year. (Parenthetically, I offer the observation that loophole searching is second to Christianity as a religion in Lauderdale County, but it is practiced with much greater fervor.) One may interpret this situation in any number of ways, but many of us would deduce that it means you have a job unless someone with better politics comes along, in which case you're toast. Remember, you've already signed a document which says that you may be dismissed without any reason. Now you really feel wanted. You wait and wait, until the last day of school, when you will be told whether your services will be required again. Not before then, for you serve at the king's pleasure.

Is this legal? Maybe, although doubt it. Someday they'll try it on somebody who won't take it lying down, and it will probably cost the county a couple of hundred thousand to settle a lawsuit, as is usual around here. Is it right? Well, I know the answer to that, but you may decide for yourselves.

Here's my point Dr. Webb. don't see what purpose it serves for you to go around saying how much you value the teachers and the fine job they are doing in public, when you're shaking the money tree. while your actions show that you actually regard them as dispensable, and easily replaced. If you really cared about keeping them, you might consider treating them more like trained professionals, and less like day laborers. Given the situation I have described, why should a teacher feel any loyalty to this school system? You might as well go somewhere else for a little more money, and I don't blame anyone for doing so. Go for the green, girls.

As Farm Prices Decrease So Does Marketbasket Cost

You may not have noticed that your grocery costs have gone down lately, but believe it or not they have. At least, that is what a recent survey conducted by a group of farm ladies discovered last month.

Every quarter during the year, a survey is conducted by the American Farm Bureau using 16 selected items on a list that the average consumer will buy during that quarter. The survey is conducted by Farm Bureau Womens Committees across the United States, including ladies from Tennessee. They go to local grocery stores in their areas, and compare the price of items on the list to prices from previous guarters and survevs.

This quarter, the average price of the selected grocery items fell 82 cents from the year's first quarter The 16 selected items on the survey cost \$32.05, down from the first quarter's average of \$32.87.

Before you run out and invest your 82 cents of savings, you need to understand what caused your good fortune. It was due to the misfortune of your neighbors, the farmers.

Retail prices are finally catching up to prices being felt on the farm level. Farm prices have tumbled like Jack and Jill going down their famous hill. Farmers nationwide have seen their commodity prices at rock-bottom lows and the 82-cent drop represents a retail reaction to those prices.

Hog prices fell to Great Depression levels back in the winter, but retail prices are

just now showing real decline for the consumer.

Dairy product prices are also showing decline due to dairy prices falling for the farmer. In the survey, a gallon of whole milk fell 18 cents to \$2.60, while a pound of cheddar cheese dropped 11 cents to \$3.15. Dairy prices on the farm level have fallen sharply throughout the year. In June, which is known as dairy month, Tennessee had less than 1000 Grade-A dairy farmers still in business. That is now the lowest number of dairy farmers in our state's history, with only 998 farmers still milking.

Of the 16 items on the survey, 11 fell in price. A pound of sirloin tip experienced the sharpest drop, falling 29 cents to \$2.51. Other decreases included cereal, \$2.75 per 10-ounce box, down 12 cents; corn oil, \$2.57 per 32-ounce jar, down 12 cents; whole fryers, 97 cents per pound, down 9 cents; eggs, 85 cents a

dozen, down 6 cents; vegetable oil. \$2.30 per 32 ounce jar, down 5 cents; white bread, \$1.12 per 20ounce loaf, down 4 cents; mayonnaise, \$2.84 per 32ounce jar, down 3 cents; and pork chops, \$2.75 per pound, down only one cent.

However, there were five items that increased in price. A five-pound bag of flour, at \$1.43, jumped 11 cents. With wheat prices down, the increase must have come from packaging.

Potatoes at \$1.58 per five-pound bag, were up 6 cents.Ground chuck was up 6 cents; bacon increased 3 cents and apples went up 2 cents.

The most amazing thing about the survey was that this guarter's average total price is only \$3.55 higher that the price from the inaugural survey, conducted during the first quarter of 1989. What else has only increased by

this small of an amount in the last ten years? Food is still a bargain thanks to the farmer.

Plating it Safe

- · Keep meat and other fresh foods cold before they are cooked. If it takes more than 30 minutes to get home from the store, take an ice chest along for raw meat and poultry.
- · Follow safe handling instructions on raw meat and poultry packages.
- · Wash hands well in hot soapy water before and after handling raw meat and other fresh foods.
- Keep raw meat and meat juices from coming into contact with other foods during preparation.
- Wash utensils, counters and cutting surfaces with hot soapy water after contact with raw meat.
- Keep carving boards separate from other cutting boards.
- · Refrigerate cooked foods promptly after serving (within 2 hours of cooking). For more rapid cooling, use small, shallow containers to store leftovers, or cut large portions into smaller portions.
- · Freeze leftovers that you won't eat within a few days.


· Cover and reheat leftovers to 165°F or until steaming hot. Stir foods while you reheat them to ensure that all the food reaches the appropriate temperature. Reheat sauces, soups and gravies to a rolling boil for at least minute before serving.

- · Never taste leftover food that looks or smells strange to see if you can still use it.
- · Dispose of any potentially unsafe food in a garbage disposal or a tightly wrapped package so people or animals cannot eat it.





It was just an old brick building, so why all the to-do? Indeed, it was just that, but the pile of rubble left by the tornado leaves me with a jumble of feelings that are difficult to express.

Halls UMC, that lovely old church, stood at the heart of our little town for nearly one hundred

To go all alone into the empty sanctuary and spend a few minutes absorbing the quietness and the beauty was to stand on holy

That little congregation of our ancestors faced the same challenge we are facing today when their building was also destroyed by a cyclone at the very same site. The slate roof with which they topped their new building was mute testimony to their faith, foresight and
