Countians' Sister Drowned When A Tour Boat Sinks

Lana Jo Berry, 42, of Dyersburg, stepsister of Douglas Matthews, of 1531 Curve-Woodville Road, Ripley, and of Ollie Matthews, of Locust St., Halls, was drowned Saturday morning when a tour boat suddenly sank in Lake Hamilton, near Hot Springs, Ark.

A technician at World Color Press in Dyersburg, met there Andrea Beasley, 28, wife of Tony Beasley and mother of Logan Beasley, 3.

With the Beasley family, she planned a weekend in Hot Springs. Work schedules prevented her husband, Collie Berry, 48, whom she married Aug. 17, 1985, from going.

Saturday morning, Tony went camping, the women and Logan, just before noon, boarded a "duck boat," Miss Majestic, to tour Lake Hamilton

The amphibious vehicle, a relic of the World War II era, is owned by White & Yellow Duck Sightseeing Tours, and was a popular tourist attraction.

A metal hull on wheels, it had a canvas roof fitted across the top.

The Coast Guard says hundreds of such boats are in use.

Miss Majestic passed a Coast Guard inspection Feb. 23rd.

But a few minutes after leaving the dock, when the boat was about 100 yards from The Landings condominium, its driver, Elizabeth Helmbrecht, 56, of Hot Springs, saw water rising in it and headed back toward the shore.

Within 30 seconds, the boat sank, trapping all but three or four of its 13 dead under the canvas center, who was in charge of the

roof before they could plunge overboard.

Logan died in the tragedy.

Services for Mrs. Berry were at 11 a.m. Tuesday in Dyersburg Funeral Home, with burial in Fairview Cemetery in Dyersburg.

Survivors include three sons, Kyle and Shane, of Dyersburg, and Russell Downing III, of Camden; two daughters, Bridgett Berry, of Lebanon, Ky., and Jessica Ferguson, of Trenton; her mother and step-father, Louise and Joe Byrd, of Samburg, her father and stepmother, C. M. and Winnie Crews, of Bartlett; two brothers, Andy Crews, of Samburg, and Chris Crews, of Bartlett, a sister, Amy Price, of Dickson; and four grandchildren.

Mater Plant'n Time In Tennessee

A few years ago, there called "Home Grown Tomatoes." The song chimed all of the wonderful things about growing your own tomatoes, and very soon became the national anthem for backyard gardeners. Of course, we all know that the proper pronunciation for the bright

red fruit is "tomaters", when conversation among fellow "love apple" growers. And this time of the year the conversation is hot and heavy on who has their "tomaters" planted.

During the winter, we have spent most of our dinning time wishing for a homegrown "tomater." Not one of those white, hard things called a "tomato" from somewhere other than our garden, but a real "mater."

There is a difference between a tomato and a

"tomater." A "tomato" is a fruit grown hundreds of miles away and has the consistency of a wet baseball. It is usually served in restaurants, ball parks, and any place you eat other than home. It doesn't have much of a taste, but serves the purpose until "tomater season comes around.

A "tomater" is a bright red, juicy fruit that has had our love and care for several months. That love and care has involved our nurturing those tiny seeds in our window sills, to planting the plant in the garden, putting aluminum foil around the stem to keep cutworms away, wrapping that plant with quilts during cold snaps, feeding the plant with only the best fertilizers, watching it grow daily, suckering it, dusting it for bugs, and finally picking a ripe "tomater."

Home grown "tomaters" are what summer is all about. There is nothing any better than a fresh "tomater" straight from your garden. They are great straight from the vine with a little salt. You can't beat "tomaters" and cottage cheese, but "my" favorite method of consuming the tasty garden fruit is by making a "tomater" sandwich.

My summer wouldn't be complete without a fresh "tomater" sandwich every day or so. There are many ways to make one, but there is only one true country way to serve up your garden delights.

A country "tomater" sandwich has to be made in a orderly routine using mayonnaise, white bread (or lite bread as it is called in the country), and a fresh ripe "tomater" from the garden.

You place two slices of fresh lite bread on a plate. Next, take a kitchen knife and spread a good amount of mayonnaise on both slices of bread. Make sure the knife hits the sides of the mayonnaise jar so a click can be heard sounding from the jar. This doesn't help the taste of the sandwich, but it reminds you to buy more mayonnaise the next time you are at the store. It looks like a good "tomater" season this year and we wouldn't want to run low on mayonnaise.

Next, slice your home grown "tomater", avoiding the temptation to swipe a slice for now, into several thick slices. You should not be able to read a newspaper through any of the slices. This helps hold in the juice, and besides, if you wanted thin slices you could have gotten a "tomato" at a restaurant in town.

Add pepper and salt as desired. Place the slices on the lite bread and gently put the pieces of bread together. Ladies may want to cut the sandwich in a triangle, but eaters" like their sandwiches whole to avoid the losing of any juice.

Bite into your sandwich and enjoy what summer is all about.


