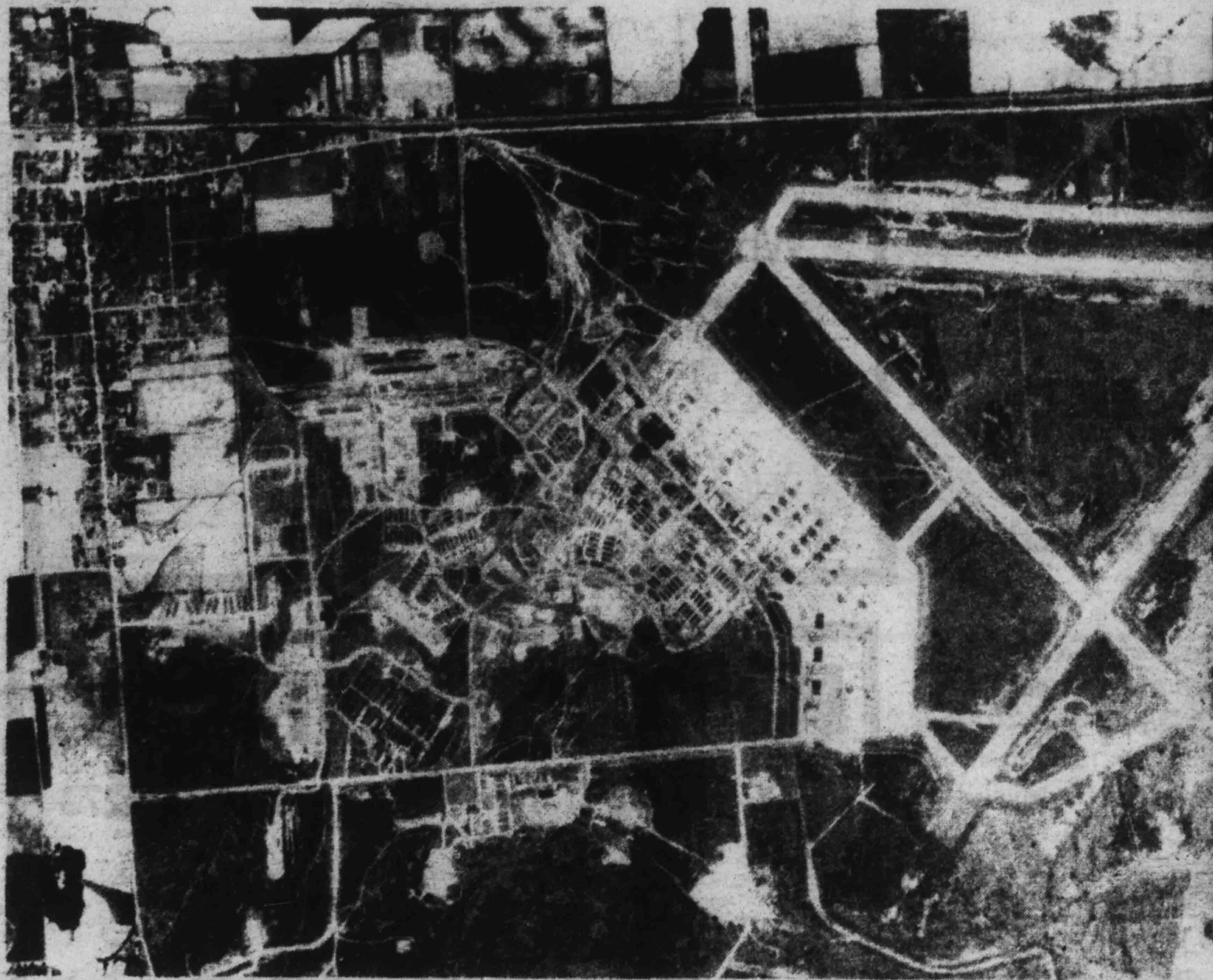

THE DYERSBURG ARMY AIR BASE in Halls, pictured July 9, 1945, will hold the Eighth Annual Air Show Aug. 26th and 27th. With attendance increasing, 2,000 the first year to 30,000 last year, the Air Show is one of the largest events in Lauderdale County.

T-shirts are available at the Lauderdale County Chamber of Commerce, Bank of Halls, Arnold Drug Store, and both locations of The Lauderdale County Bank. Advance tickets are available for \$6 at any bank in Lauderdale County.

Scheduled events include B-17, B-25, SBD Dauntless, and "Kate" torpedo bombers, and other warbirds including, P-51, P-47, Sea Fury, T6, Yak 52, T-34, Stearman, and T-28. Many others are scheduled to appear. With over 30 planes on the air base and flying in formation, the pyrotechnics, aerobatics, and the 101st Parachute Team round out the exciting weekend.

Gates open at 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily. The Veteran's Museum will be open for those who wish to purchase souvenirs and escape the heat. Pictures of the air base and the B-17, lower

photo, are available for purchase of \$10.

A reunion of the veterans from the Dyersburg Army Air Base is scheduled for Fri., Aug. 25th at The Lannom Center, in the new Dyersburg/Dyer County Chamber Building, with a social hour at 6 p.m. and dinner at 7 p.m. Registrants are invited to come to the base to see the B-17s come in after lunch. The Yankee Lady is expected to land at 1 p.m.

The facility, located 13 miles south of Dyersburg, adjacent to Halls, was in operation from 1942 to 1945. Thousands of airmen took their last stateside training here before going into combat overseas.

It was home to the 346th Bombardment Group, 373rd Sub-Depot, 419 Base Headquarters and Air Base Squadron, 742nd AAF Band, 956th Guard Squadron, and the 4th Army Airways Com. Sq. and Weather Sq. It also included Medical, Veterinary, and WAC detachments. The base hospital served military personnel and was the major medical facility in the care for civilians as well. Dist. 8 Congressman John Tanner was born at the base hospital.

The facility had libraries, a sewer system that was built to serve 26,000, olympic-sized swimming pool, and a movie theater that seated 600.

After the end of the war, the base was hastily dismantled, farm land sold, and barracks and guard shacks moved to private property becoming housing and storage buildings.

In 1992, a non-profit corporation, Dyersburg Army Air Base Memorial Association, was formed by Patricia Higdon, Martha Crites, and Tim Bivens, to preserve the portions of the



WWII facility and to promote the air base as an integral part of the United States history.

The air show is a continuation of the efforts of the group to promote the history of the air base and Halls.

HALLS FIRST ASSEMBLY of God Church has purchased land approximately one half mile north of the new First United Methodist Church site on Gates 6 Road in Halls.

With a congregation of 135 to 140, a building committee of Thomas Belton, chairperson; J. H. Brown, Mary Jo Stanley, Bobby Hill, Frances Johnson, and Mike Moore, was formed.

The new building will have eight classrooms and two nurseries. There will be seating for 290 with 300 seating possible in the fellowship hall.

The front of the church will face Hwy. 88 West and will have

nine stained glass windows, eight were saved from the original church. Expected completion date is early 2001.

The Rev. Randy Jetton is pastor of the church.

Power Plant Locates In Haywood County



The Board of Directors of the Lauderdale County Economic and Community Development Board held its first annual meeting July 27th.

Board members received a copy of the annual report. Mike Allmand, Chairman, and Annette Fisher, Executive Director, LCECD, gave reports of accomplishments and plans for the coming year.

Special appreciation was given to existing industry for continued confidence in Lauderdale County, and to Union Planters Bank and Ronnie Tatum, President, for providing offices for LCECD.

LCECD was formed during the third quarter of 1999 when Lauderdale County, Ripley, Halls, Henning and Gates joined hands with Ripley Economic Development Corporation to provide a stronger economic base for countywide growth.

Twelve existing industries made a 3.5 million-dollar investment in Lauderdale County offering 457 new jobs during the past year, bringing the total of industrial jobs to 4,139. Local industry also leased five existing available industrial buildings during this same time period.

Two new companies that have located in Lauderdale County are MacDonald's Industrial Products, employing 14 employees, with an expectation of over 200, in the production of aluminum and magnesium parts; and Tennessee Polymer Services, employing 8, for grinding plastics and warehousing.

With the addition of these two companies, industry contributed a total investment of 10.4 million dollars for Lauderdale County, July 1999, through June 2000.

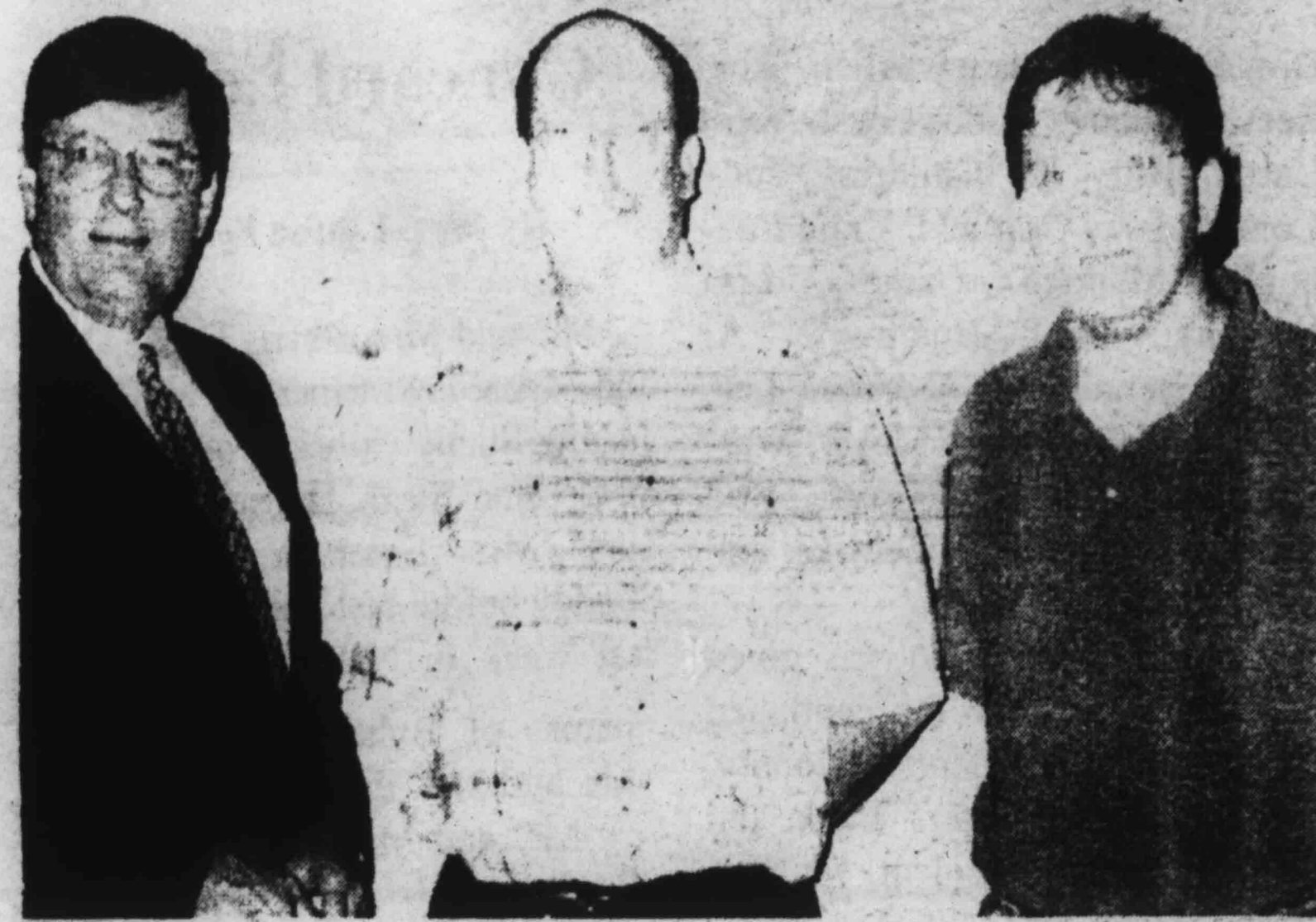

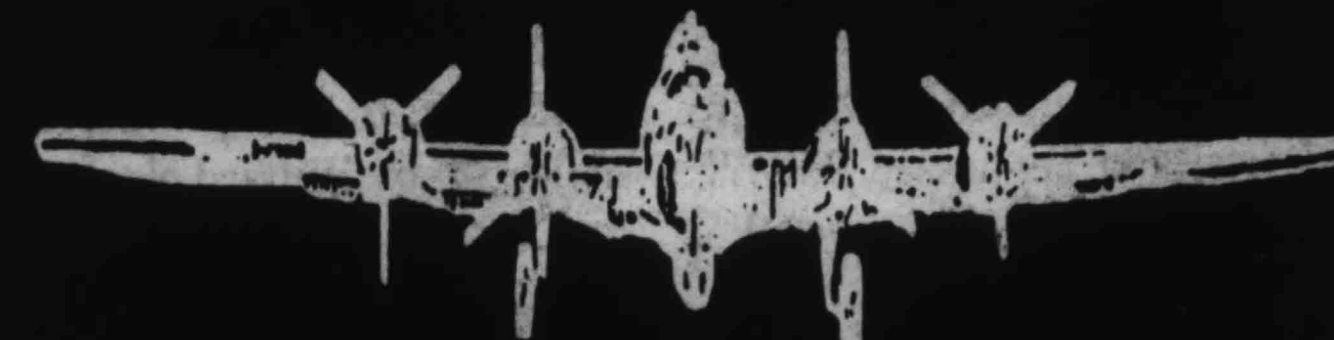

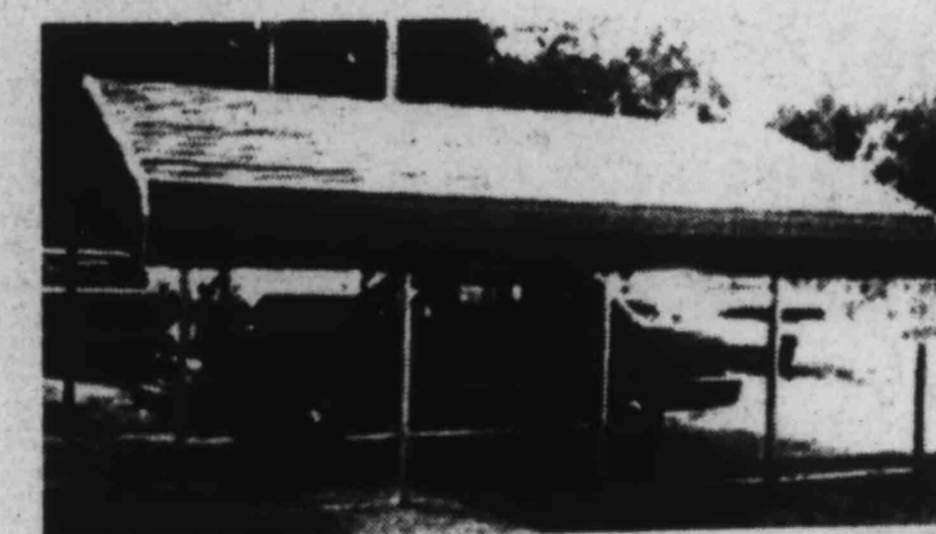

Avoid Becoming A Heat Stroke Victim

Heat exhaustion is caused when the body sweats profusely, and the temperature is slightly elevated, signs similar to the flu. The elderly and children are especially prone to suffer this type of heat injury. Muscle cramps, nausea, headache, vomiting, thirst, and irritability are typical reactions to heat exhaustion. Treatment involves cooling the person with cool water mist and fanning the person to promote evaporation. Placing ice packs under the body will help in the cool down process. This is possibly a serious medical emergency.

Heat stroke is the most serious of all. A person with heat stroke requires immediate medical attention. Symptoms range from confusion to seizure to coma and a body temperature as high as 105°.

The key, to preventing heat related injuries, is to know what to do. Check on elderly friends or relatives, especially if they do not have air conditioning and make sure they have air circulating. Check with local agencies, which provide fans to the elderly and shut in for assistance. Delta Human Services has a program where qualified applicants are able to receive help with utility bills. Outings scheduled for the hottest part of the day should be avoided, try yard or garden work in the earliest part or very latest part of the day, perhaps after the sun goes down.

With the rising temperatures and heat index warnings, Lauderdale County residents should take extra precautions, when outside. Three persons have been treated at Baptist Hospital Lauderdale for heat related injuries and one was transported to Memphis.

Most do not realize they are in danger until it is too late. When working in the yard or garden, be sure to drink plenty of liquids, wear

cool, light colored clothing, and take cooling breaks in the shade.

Children especially need to be watched. They need to be reminded to keep out of the direct sun and to drink liquids often.

There are four types of heat related injuries, prickly heat, heat cramps, heat exhaustion, and heat stroke.

Prickly heat causes a rash and, while not as serious, can be very annoying. It is the mildest of heat related conditions and can be treated.

Heat cramps are caused when the body over heats and loses electrolytes. Treatment requires rest in a cool place and replenishment of oxygen.

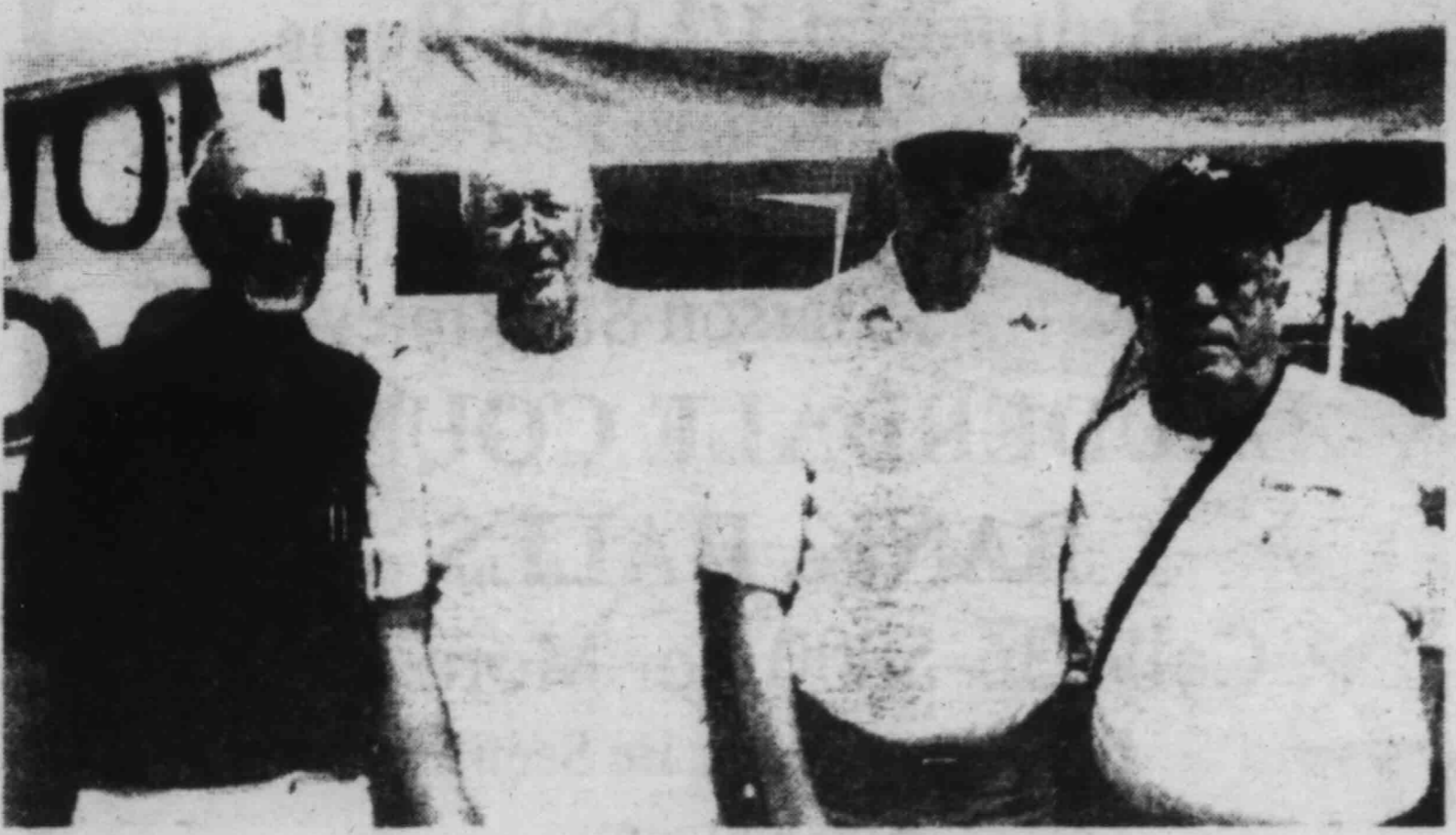

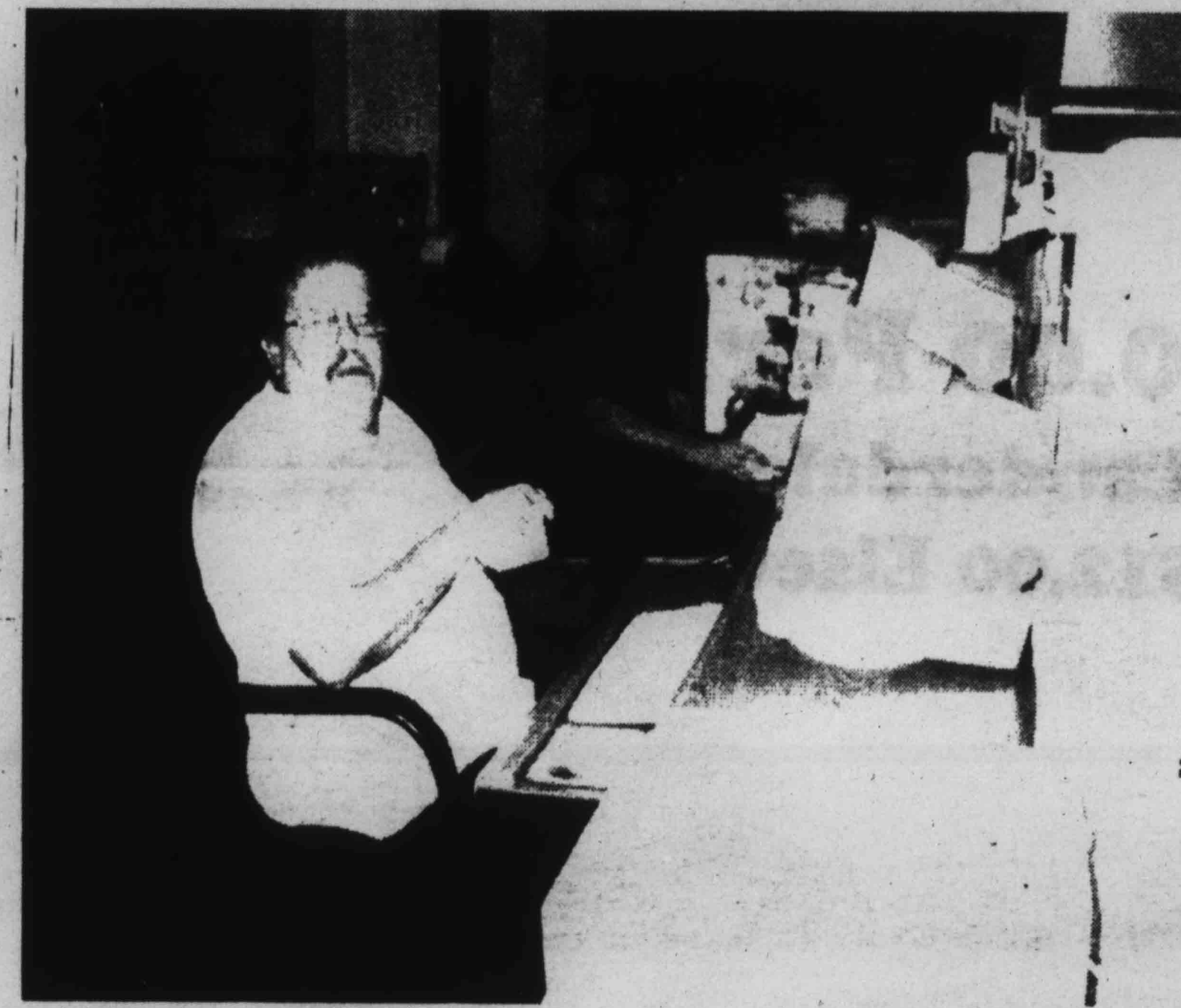

AVOCADO STIR-FRY

- 2 boneless, skinless chicken breast halves, sliced crosswise
- 3 Tbsp. prepared stir-fry sauce
- 1 Tbsp. canola oil
- 1 medium onion, thinly sliced
- 1 red bell pepper, thinly sliced
- 1 tsp. dried basil leaves
- 3 Tbsp. chopped fresh cilantro leaves

- 2 ripe California avocados, pitted, peeled and cubed

Apricot-Dijon Pork Salad recipe created by Patricia Schroedl

- 1 cup apricot preserves
- ¼ cup white wine vinegar
- 2 tablespoons Dijon-style mustard
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1 pound pork tenderloin
- 1 10-oz. package mixed salad greens
- 1 15-oz. can apricot halves, drained, sliced
- ½ cup dried tart cherries, or dried cranberries
- ¼ cup crumbled blue cheese
- 8 green onions, cut into ½-inch pieces
- ¼ cup toasted pecan pieces*

Combine apricot preserves, vinegar, mustard and ginger in a small bowl. Reserve ¼ cup for salad dressing. Butterfly pork tenderloin (cut almost in half, but not quite through), horizontally; open and lay flat. Grill or broil tenderloin 4-6 inches from heat source for 5-6 minutes per side. Brush with remaining apricot mixture during last 2 minutes on each side. Move tenderloin to cutting board.

Meanwhile, combine greens, canned apricots, cherries, cheese, pecans and onions. Divide mixture among 4 plates. Slice tenderloin into ½-inch pieces. Arrange on top of greens mixture on each plate; drizzle with reserved apricot mixture just before serving. Serves 4.

* To toast pecans, place pecan halves in shallow baking pan in a 350° oven for about 10 minutes. Let cool, chop coarsely.

Linguine With Roasted Vegetables Prep time: 35 minutes Yield: 6 (1½-cup) servings

- 6 oz. uncooked linguine
- 4 tomatoes, coarsely chopped
- 1 eggplant, unpeeled, cubed
- 1 red bell pepper, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1 zucchini, sliced
- 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 3 tablespoons olive or vegetable oil
- 1 teaspoon dried basil leaves
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon pepper
- 2 oz. (½ cup) shredded fresh Parmesan cheese

1. Cook linguine to desired doneness as directed on package. Drain; cover to keep warm.

2. Meanwhile, heat oven to 450°F. spray 15 x 10 x 1-inch baking pan with nonstick cooking spray. In large bowl, combine tomatoes, eggplant, bell pepper, zucchini and garlic. Toss with 2 tablespoons of the oil, basil, salt and pepper. Place vegetables on sprayed pan.

3. Bake at 450°F. for 12 to 15 minutes or until vegetables are tender and lightly browned.

4. Place cooked linguine in serving bowl. Add remaining 1 tablespoon oil and roasted vegetables; toss gently to mix. Sprinkle with cheese.

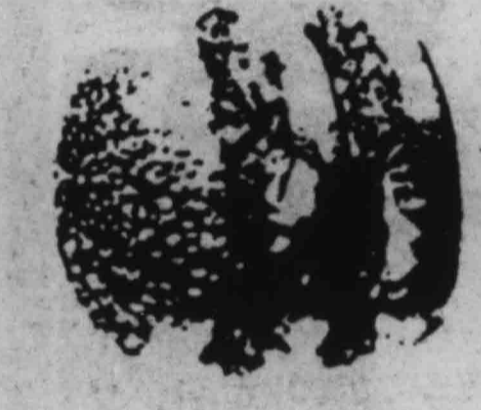

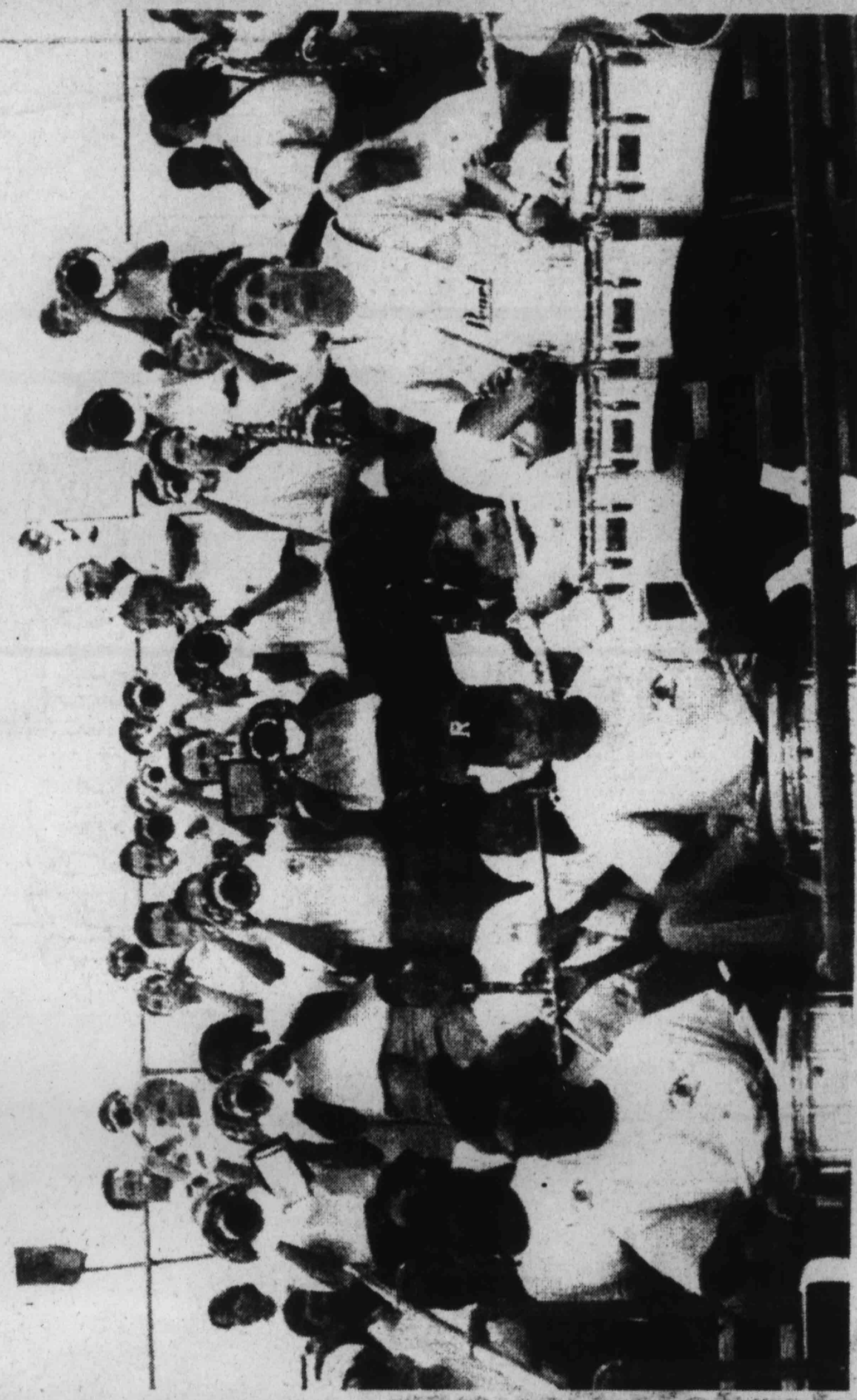
