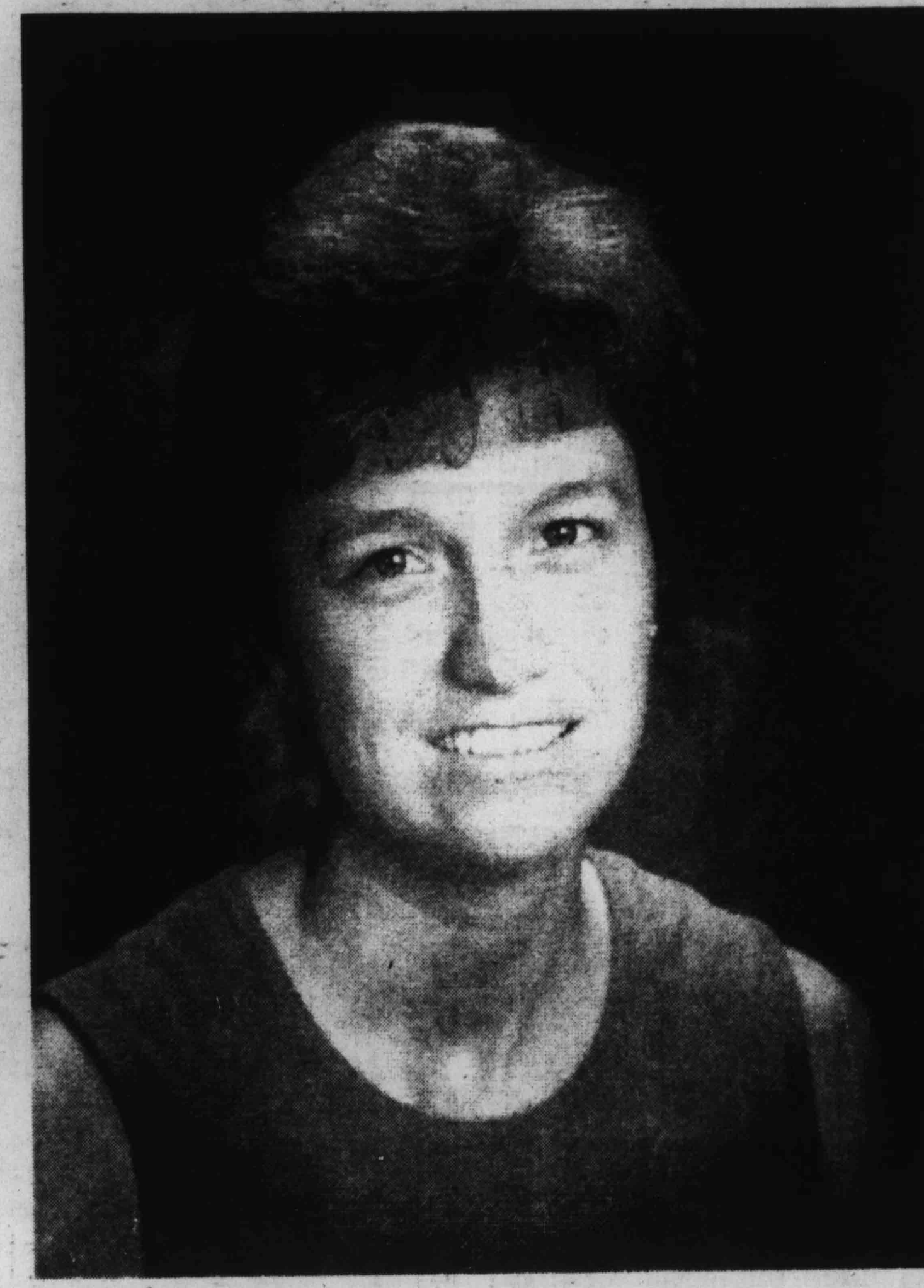

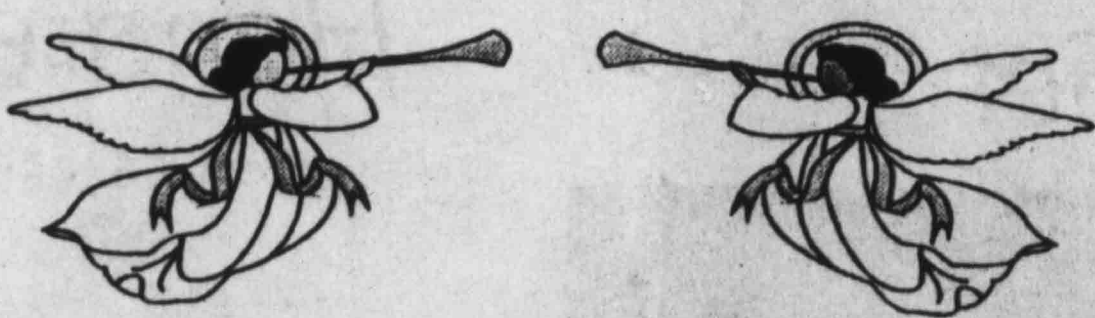

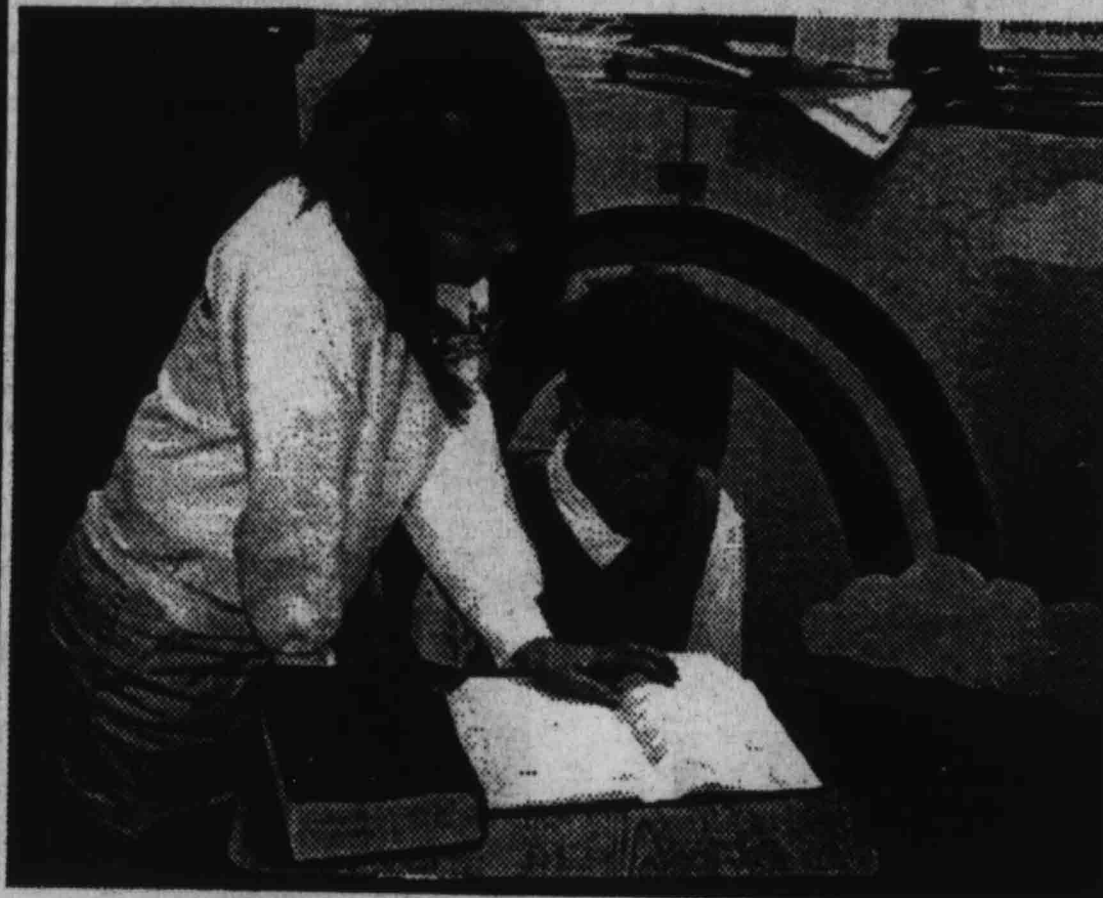
BACK TO SCHOOL

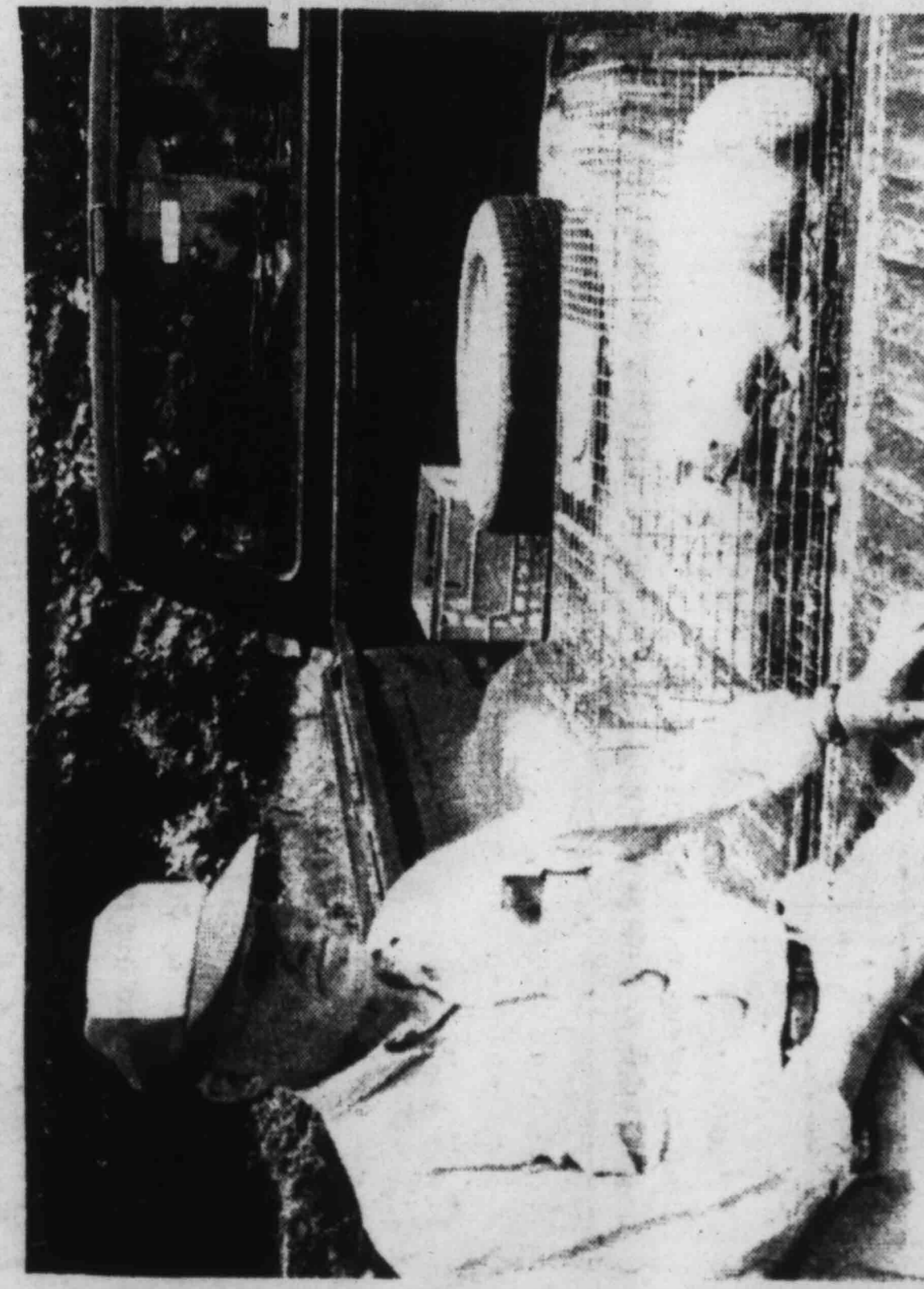

Cool Desserts For Hot Weather

Summer weather just naturally turns our taste buds to those cool desserts like lemon ice box pie and homemade ice cream. However, since the mid 80's when the outbreak of salmonella was so intense-6,604 illnesses and 43 deaths, people have been somewhat hesitant to sample those homemade lemon ice box pies and homemade ice cream.

The Extension Office has received many calls for recipes of these two favored desserts without using eggs.

Our lemon ice box pie recipe will be sure to satisfy your taste buds. I have had several versions of the recipe, but I think this one is best. The cream cheese gives the finished product a firmer texture and the real lemon juice gives that good lemon taste that's so good in the summer.

The two homemade ice cream recipes that follow are a real treat as well. The vanilla ice cream can become any flavor you want by adding a cup of your favorite fruit, bananas, fresh peaches, strawberries, or blackberries. Banana is our favorite!

When adding fruit, be sure to cut back a cup or two on the milk unless you have an exceptionally large freezer, otherwise the freezer will be too full and will not be able to expand and freeze properly.

Don't forget to "ripen" your homemade ice cream. Ripening improves both the flavor and texture of the finished product. After you electric freezer motor stops, remove motor, wipe lid and remove it carefully to prevent salt from contaminating cream. Carefully remove dasher, scraping away most of the ice cream adhering to it. (There will also be an interesting "bystander" wanting to finish "cleaning" the dasher.) Insert cork in hole in lid, replace lid on can. You may want to place a piece of foil over top. Carefully pour off all brine from the freezer. Push ice cream bucket back in freezer. Re-pack freezer with more ice and salt, a 4 to 1 ratio (4 parts ice to 1 part salt). Then set freezer in an old bucket or dishpan and wrap the entire freezer and bucket with old quilts or blankets.

The ice cream needs to ripen at least one or two hours and can be ripened up to four hours.

The ripening process does away with "soupy" ice cream, it also allows you to get ice cream made and out of the way before guests start arriving.

LEMON ICE BOX PIE

1-1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs
1/3 cup melted butter
1 can sweetened condensed milk
1 8 oz. pkg. Cream cheese
2/3 cup lemon juice

Combine first two ingredients and pat firmly into 9-inch pie plate.

Chill. (Can be placed in freezer for a few minutes.)
Mix condensed milk and softened cream cheese until fluffy. Add lemon juice. Mix well and pour into graham cracker crust. Chill several hours before serving. (Place in freezer and remove it 15 to 20 minutes before serving, can then be returned to freezer.)

Garnish with whipped cream and lemon twist before serving.

NOTE: low fat or fat free versions of these products can be used.

DON'S VANILLA ICE CREAM

6 cups milk
2 cups sugar
1 (12 oz.) can evaporated milk
1 (8 oz.) container frozen whipped topping, thawed
1 (5-1/4 oz.) pkg. vanilla instant pudding mix

Combine all ingredients in large mixing bowl. Beat at medium speed until well blended.

If adding fruit, cut back a cup or two on milk

(unless you have an extra large freezer)

Pour mixture into freezer can of a 5-quart hand-turned or electric freezer. Freeze according to manufacturer's instructions. Let ripen at least one hour.

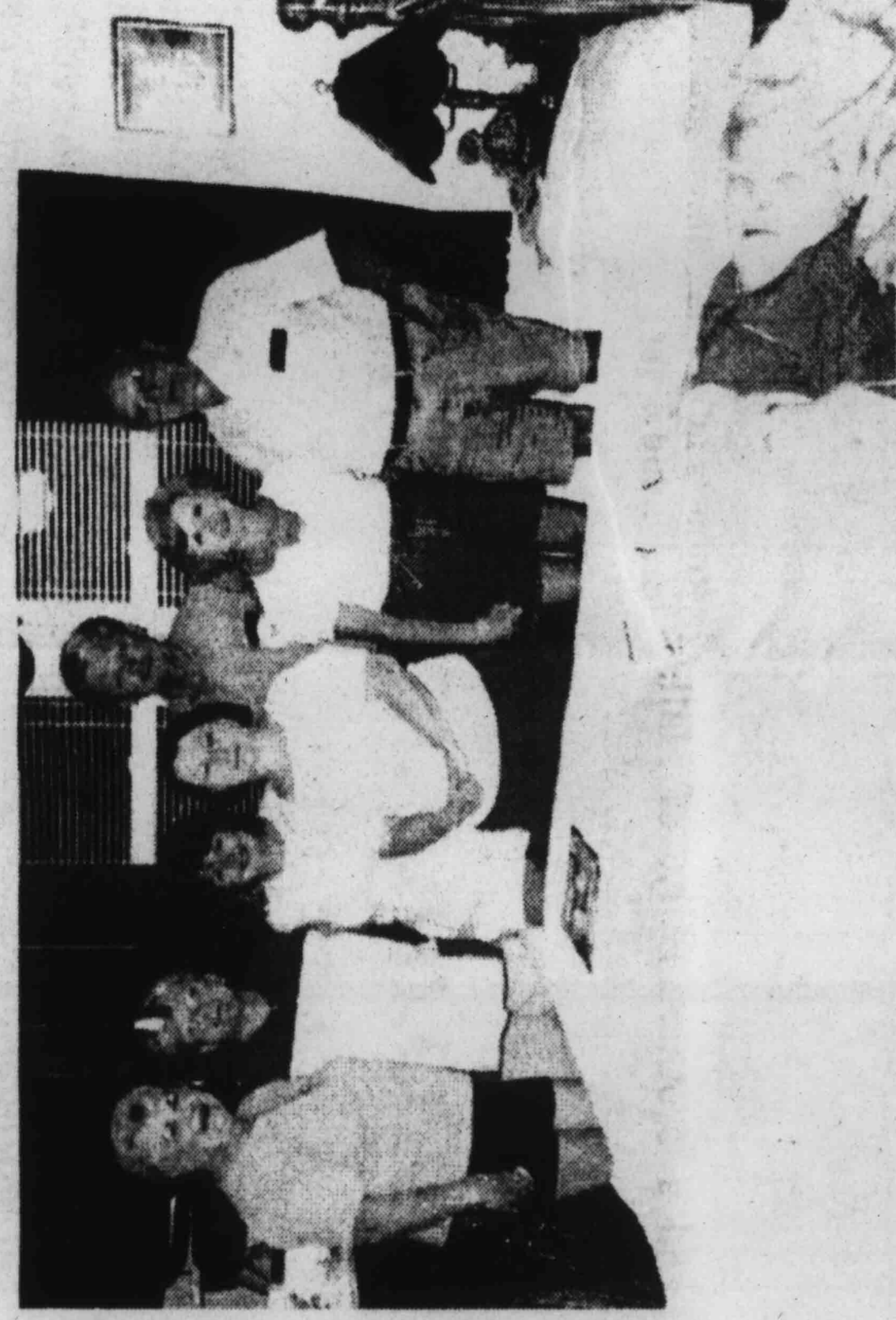
BUTTER PECAN ICE CREAM

1 cup coarsely chopped pecans
1/2 cup sugar
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
4 cups half & half or light cream
2 cups packed brown sugar
4 teaspoons vanilla
4 cups whipping cream

In a heavy skillet, combine pecans, sugar, and butter. Heat mixture over medium heat, stirring constantly, for 6 to 8 minutes or till sugar melts and turns a rich brown color. (Don't rush this step; however, if you don't stay with it, it will burn.) Remove from heat and spread nuts on a buttered baking sheet or foil. Separate into clusters and set aside to cool completely. Break clusters into small chunks. (This step can be done early in the day or the night before, so the buttered pecans will be ready to make the ice cream.)

In a large bowl combine half & half, brown sugar, and vanilla; stir until sugar has dissolved. Stir in pecan mixture and whipping cream. Freeze in a 4 to 5-quart ice cream freezer according to manufacturer's directions. Ripen 2 to 4 hours.

CROP LOSS COVERAGE

The Lauderdale County

coverage opportunities, beginning with crop year 2001.

"The new NAP program will provide immediate relief to farmers," said FSA's Lauderdale Acting County Executive Dir., Daniel Ungerecht, Jr. "Appraisers will inspect damaged crops, the County Committee will review claim, and payments issued once the loss threshold is reached."

NAP covers 50% of the producer's expected production at a payment rate equal to 55% of the crop's average market price. Benefits are limited to \$100,000 per crop year for each participant.

Crops in Lauderdale County eligible for NAP include alfalfa and other types of hay, cucumbers, peas, peppers, pumpkins, squash, sweet corn, tomatoes, and watermelon.

To be eligible for assistance, applicants must pay a nonrefundable administrative fee of \$100 per crop, and provide prior years' production data to establish a documented yield history for loss calculations and payments.

A farmer must have risk in producing the crop, comply with a conservation plan, and have a gross income under \$2 million.

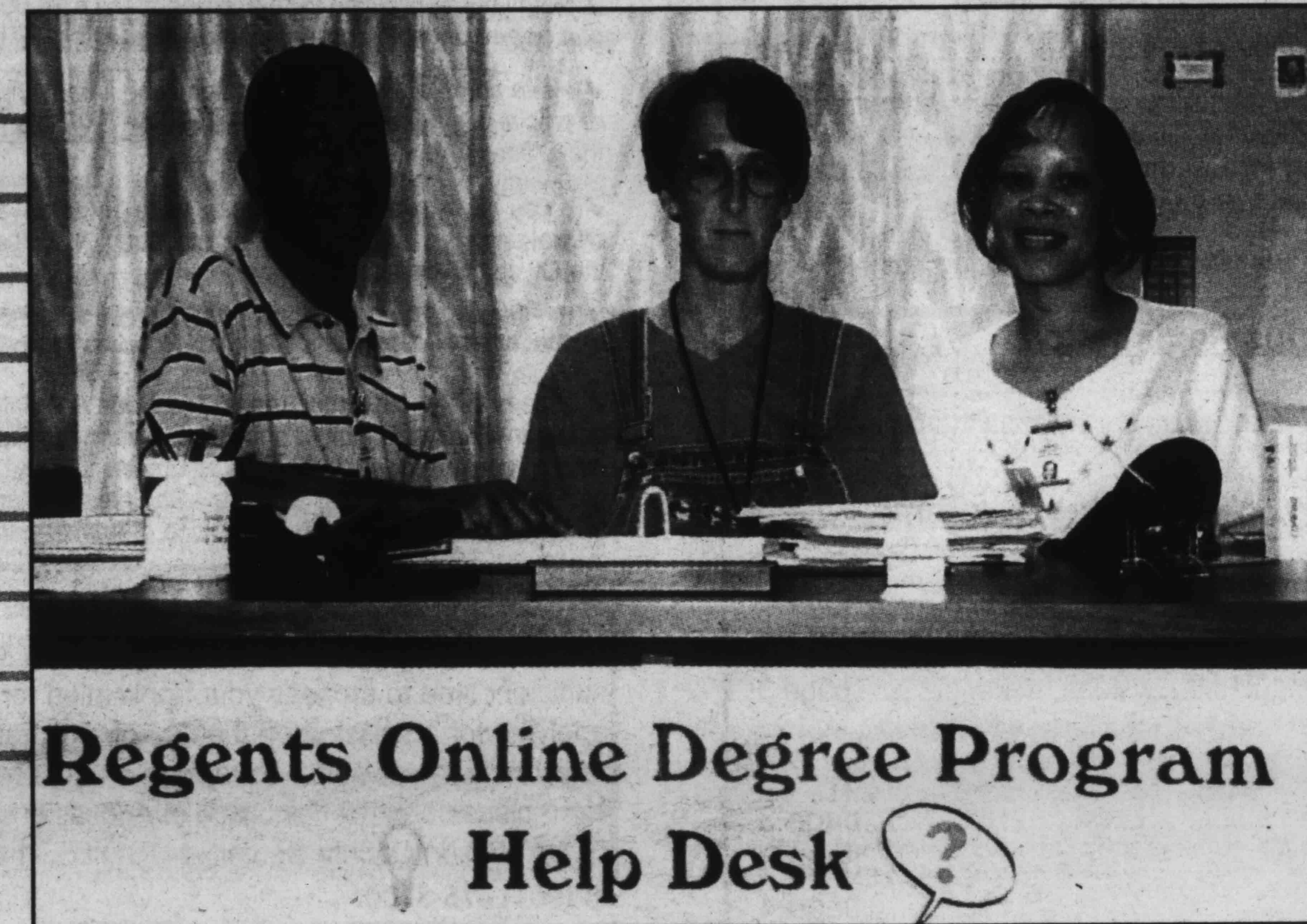

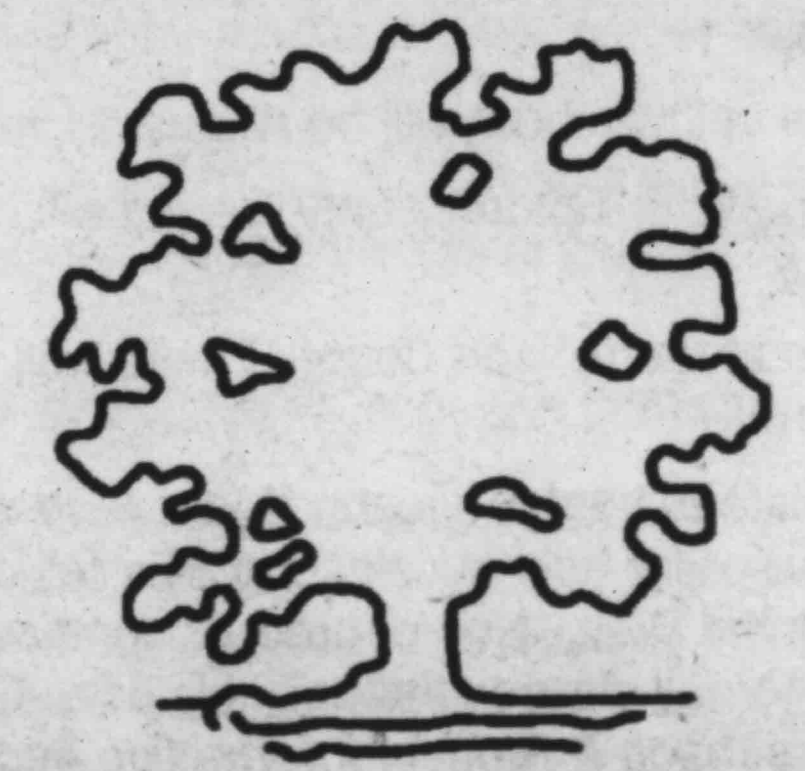

✓ If you have had college courses, have an official copy of all college transcripts and an official copy of your high school transcript or official copy of your GED scores mailed to the Office of Admissions & Records.

✓ If you are under 21, have your ACT scores sent to the Office of Admissions & Records or contact the Testing Office at (731) 286-3355 to set up a time to take a residual ACT.

✓ Unless exempted under Tennessee Code Annotated, proof of immunization with two doses of Measles, Mumps, and Rubella vaccines, administered on or after the first birthday, is required for attendance to all universities and colleges with an enrollment of greater than two hundred students. Students who are required to provide proof of immunization will be contacted by the Office of Admissions & Records.

GENERAL INFORMATION for all Students

Adding Classes

If you find it necessary to add a class, the addition will be possible provided it is within the class-add period and space is available in the desired class. Please refer to the Academic Calendar in this schedule for deadline to add. To add a class, you must complete a Change of Registration form and follow the procedures listed on the form. Forms may be obtained in the Office of Admissions & Records or from your academic advisor or at the Gibson and Tipton County Centers. There are times when adding classes may be accomplished by accessing DSCC's Web Registration & Student Information Access. Check with the Office of Admissions and Records for more information.

Advanced Studies Program

High school students who qualify for Dyersburg State's Advanced Studies Program should apply for admission, and with their guidance counselor's assistance, see that all admissions requirements - including Computerized Placement Assessment & Support System (COMPASS) testing - are met prior to registering. Students who are eligible for this program may be admitted for either joint or dual enrollment. Dual enrollment is the enrollment of a high school student in one or more specified college courses for which the student will be awarded both high school and college credit; joint enrollment is for college credit only. For more information, contact the Office of Admissions and Records at (731) 286-3330 or your guidance counselor.

Auditing a Class

If you wish to audit a class, you may not register for the class until after the day of regular registration. Individuals under the age of 17 may not audit any class without the written permission of the instructor and the Division Dean. Refer to head notes in this schedule under College Preparatory Studies and Physical Education concerning auditing those courses.

Class Attendance & Outside Study

Successful completion of college-level courses requires a specified amount of study outside the classroom as well as within the classroom. Successful completion of a degree program is dependent upon the student's commitment to study beyond the classroom.

Notice: When you register for a class and do not attend, you will receive a grade of "F" unless you properly drop. Refer to your catalog or contact the Office of Admissions and Records for more information.

Class Cancellations and Changes

Dyersburg State Community College reserves the right to cancel classes that do not have sufficient enrollment. Divisions offering more than one section of the same course may close sections as necessary to promote the most effective instruction.

Instructor assignments are also subject to change. While this schedule of classes has been prepared on the basis of the most current information at the time of printing, the schedule is subject to change without notice, obligation or liability.

COL 101 – The College Experience: Teamwork

This course is required for all concentrations under the University Parallel and Nursing majors. This one credit hour course promotes and develops success in college and in the workplace through an orientation to the educational process and teamwork and leadership practices.

Computerized Placement Assessment & Support System (COMPASS) Test

The Computerized Placement Assessment & Support System (COMPASS) test measures competency in reading, writing, and mathematics. While you cannot fail the COMPASS test, your performance will determine if College Preparatory courses will increase your chances for success. For more information including testing dates, times, and locations, call (731) 286-3355.

If you are required to take the COMPASS test or any portion of it and are placed in the College Preparatory Program, you must enroll in and complete the designated courses in sequence.

Confidentiality of Student Records

DSCC regards a student's academic record as confidential. The release of information contained in the record is governed by Federal Law, known as the *Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)*. Directory information such as the student's name, address, telephone listing, e-mail address, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended by the student will be released unless the student has asked DSCC to withhold such information. If you do not wish directory information released, please provide written notification to the Office of Admissions and Records.

The law does provide for the release of information to authorized college personnel, other institutions engaged in research (provided information is not revealed to any other parties), and certain federal and state government officials.

If you have questions concerning the provisions of this act, contact the Director of Admissions and Records.

Cost of Attendance at DSCC

While the cost of attendance for 2001-2002 is not available at the time of printing this schedule, the fees for 2000-2001 can be used as a guideline. During the 2000-2001 academic year, all students whether residents or non-residents of Tennessee, will pay a maintenance fee of \$56 per semester hour not to exceed \$647 per semester. There is also a \$5 facilities assessment fee for all students and a \$3 student activity fee for students enrolling in seven or more hours per semester. A Technology Access Fee is assessed based on the number of credit hours in which the student enrolls. The fee varies from \$40 for three credit hours to \$50 for four credit hours to \$62.50 for five or more credit hours. Fees are subject to change at any time by action of the Tennessee Board of Regents. For students who register after the first day of class, there is a \$10 Late Fee.

Tuition is charged to students who are not residents of Tennessee except for residents of Pemiscot and Dunklin Counties in Missouri and Mississippi County in Arkansas. In addition to the maintenance fees listed previously, students who are classified as out-of-state for fee-paying purposes must pay \$168 per semester hour, not to exceed \$1938 per semester. As with other fees, the amount of tuition is subject to change.

Dropping Courses

To drop a course, you must complete a Change of Registration form and follow the procedures listed on the form. Forms may be obtained in the Office of Admissions & Records or from your academic advisor or at the Gibson and Tipton County Centers. A student is not officially dropped from a course until this form is processed in the Office of Admissions & Records. Failure to comply will result in a grade of "F". Please refer to the Academic Calendar in this schedule for deadlines to drop. There are times when dropping classes may be accomplished by accessing DSCC's *Web Registration & Student Information Access*. Check with the Office of Admissions and Records for more information.

Tennessee Board of Regents policy prohibits students from dropping courses in the College Preparatory Program (developmental studies). Under extenuating circumstances, however, a course may be dropped with the approval of the advisor and the Director of the College Preparatory Program.

Courses may be dropped without a grade through approximately the first two weeks (14 calendar days beginning with the first day of class). After this time, a grade of "W" is given if the course is officially dropped.

Dropping Courses Vs. Complete Withdrawal from the College

If you are enrolled in only one course and do not want to remain in that course or if you wish to withdraw from all courses, a Permission to Withdraw form must be obtained and appropriate signatures obtained. Forms are available in the Office of Admissions & Records and the Gibson and Tipton County Centers. Failure to withdraw officially from school will result in an automatic grade of "F" in all courses.

Please refer to the Academic Calendar in this schedule for the deadline to drop. There are times when dropping classes may be accomplished by accessing DSCC's *Web Registration & Student Information Access*. Check with the Office of Admissions and Records for more information.

Financial Aid

If you have not applied for financial aid and are interested in applying, information can be obtained from the Financial Aid Office, located in the Student Center. Their number is (731) 286-3235.

Eligible pre-registered students who make no adjustments to their schedule of main campus classes and who personally contact the Business Office on August 14 or 15 may pick up their checks in the Business Office beginning at 2 p.m. on August 24. All other students receiving financial aid may pick up checks in the Business Office no earlier than nine days after classes begin. Students with Federal Financial Aid or loans must provide evidence of class attendance to the Business Office to get their checks. Your financial aid will be used first to pay your fees.

Eligible pre-registered students who make no adjustments to their schedule of Gibson County classes should report to the DSCC Gibson County Center on August 16 between 12:00 noon and 6:30 p.m. to sign an award card.

Eligible pre-registered students who make no adjustments to their schedule of Tipton County classes should report to the DSCC Tipton County Center on August 13 between 10 a.m. and 6:30 p.m. to sign an award card.

Grades at Term's End

Grades are not mailed to students at the end of the term but are accessible on the Web. To access your grades, you will need your Social Security Number and your Personal Identification Number (PIN). Students who need to provide a copy of their grades to their employer should request an official copy of their transcript to be mailed directly to the employer. This written request can be made at any time during the term. To protect the confidential nature of the student's records, no grades will be released by phone.

Grades will not be available until all debts or obligations owed to the College have been satisfied.

Graduation Candidates

Students expecting to complete course requirements at the end of 2001 Fall, 2002 Spring, or 2002 Summer should submit an Intent to Graduate form to the Office of Admissions & Records by October 26. Forms are available in the Office of Admissions & Records or at the Gibson and Tipton County Centers.

Honors Program

The Honors Program provides exceptional educational opportunities for highly motivated and well-prepared students. The program works individually with students in planning their educational experiences at Dyersburg State Community College. Students may earn Honors distinction by meeting these requirements: completion of a minimum of 12 hours of Honors course work; participation in the Honors Seminar; and participation in at least 2-3 special college educational/cultural events a year. To become a member of the Honors program, an incoming freshman must have a minimum ACT composite of 26 and a 3.5 high school grade point average (GPA). An existing student must have a minimum GPA of 3.5. To remain in the program, a student must maintain a minimum GPA of 3.5. An appropriate Honors distinction is indicated on the student's transcript and is recognized at graduation.

Possession of Weapons

T.C.A. 39-17-1309 prohibits the possession of weapons, including firearms, on any property owned, used or operated by Dyersburg State Community College. Furthermore, State Law prescribes a maximum penalty of six (6) years imprisonment and a fine not to exceed three thousand dollars (\$3000) for carrying weapons on school property.

Proof of Immunization

Unless exempted under Tennessee Code Annotated, proof of immunization with two doses of Measles, Mumps, and Rubella vaccines, administered on or after the first birthday, is required for attendance to all universities and colleges with an enrollment of greater than two hundred students. Students who are required to provide proof of immunization will be contacted by the Office of Admissions and Records.

Refund Policy

Refund procedures for maintenance fees and out-of-state tuition fees are outlined below. (All other fees are non-refundable).

Change of student's status which requires refund:

- A. Change in a full-time student's schedule which results in reclassification to part-time student status.
- B. Change in a part-time student's schedule which results in a class load of fewer hours during a refund period.

Other situations which require a refund:

- A. Withdrawing from the institution within the refund period.
- B. Cancellation of a class by the institution.
- C. Death of the student.

Refund Procedures

Refunds will be calculated for up to 60% of the term for first-time students at DSCC who withdraw from school and are receiving Title IV aid. Refunds for all other students will be calculated as follows:

- A. Refunds are allowed for the first 25% of the term. Beginning with the first official day of classes and extending through the first 14 calendar days of classes, there is a 75% refund. For the remaining days of this refund period, there is a 25% refund. No refunds will be made beyond the 25% period.

- B. 100% of the fees will be refunded for classes canceled by the institution.
- C. 100% of the fees will be refunded for "drops" or "withdrawals" prior to the beginning of the first official day of classes. No refund will be processed during the official registration period.
- D. 100% refund in case of student's death.

Refund policy for students receiving Title IV aid is subject to change by the Federal Government.

Registering after the First Official Day of Classes

Students who register for a class after the first official day of classes need to be aware that enrollment in classes is not guaranteed but may depend on the number of classes missed and the instructor's assessment of the student's chances for success in the course. Students who register late will need to meet with the instructor to discuss any work that has been missed and to complete and sign the form for Late Class Entry: Student & Teacher Agreement to Make Up Missed Work.

Student Load

A student is considered to be enrolled full-time if enrolled in 12 or more credit hours; the maximum number of hours credit for which a student may enroll is 19 hours. A student may request to enroll in more than 19 hours. Request for Overload forms are available from academic advisors or from the Office of Admissions and Records. You must obtain your advisor's signature on the form and meet specific requirements as outlined in the DSCC catalog before an overload can be processed.

Death Sought In Brasfield Murder

Stanley, 73, recovered from five wounds from a .22 caliber revolver.

Charged with Mann for the armed robbery, taking \$3,000, were Rodney Rhodes, 20, of 585 Perry Rd., Whiteville, and his cousin Darius Rhodes, 19, of 495 Perry Rd., Whiteville.

Mann, on foot, was arrested by police serving a search warrant in the area.

The Rhodes cousins, in a 1979 Cutlass, were stopped by Bolivar police on U.S. 64.

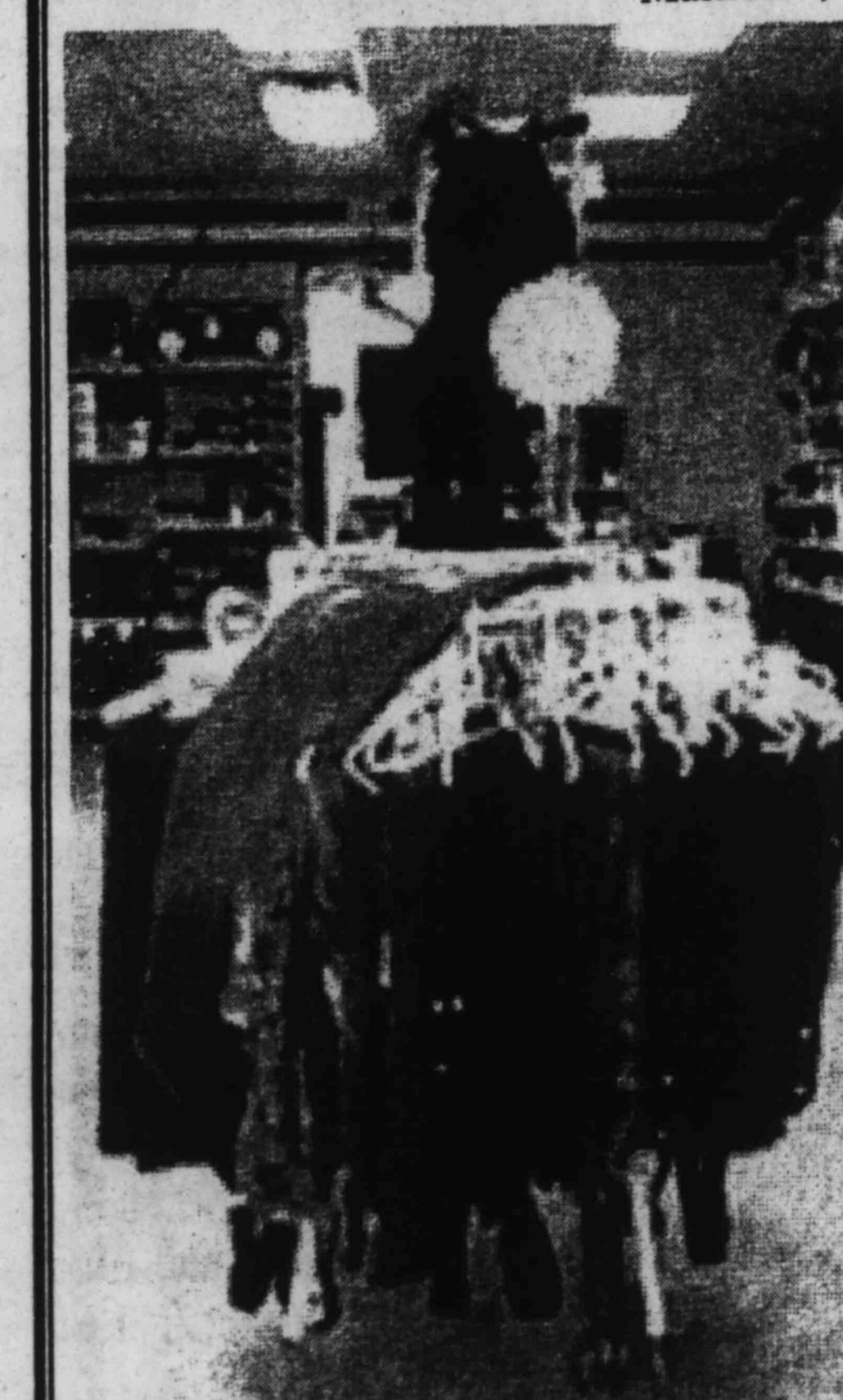

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CORR Protests County Meeting

CORR, Commission on Religion and Racism, carried out a picketing campaign outside the courthouse during the Lauderdale County Commissioners meeting Monday. Lauderdale County Highway Department employees appealed to the group in resolving grievances with the highway department.

Dr. Isaac Richmond, CORR National Director, stated that in a meeting with a dozen workers, grievances and complaints were outlined, including the department would not post job openings and positions becoming available denying qualified workers the opportunity to apply for positions; hiring and promoting workers with four, seven, and nine years of tenure over workers with 10, 15, and 20 or more years of seniority; creating positions, not posting them, then giving the job to someone less qualified and with less seniority than long term workers; department has no personnel manual by which workers may know their rights, rules, and regulations governing their employment; adding a time-clock responsibility to a worker's job, but refusing to increase worker's pay for the added responsibility; no black operators, one forced out and rehired as a janitor; and holding the County Commissioners' meeting at 9 a.m., making it "inconvenient" for the people to participate in the business of their county, they want the meeting changed to a time after general working hours.

CORR formulated and filed the grievances with the Board of Commissioners, County Executive Rozelle Criner, and the Lauderdale County Highway Department, requesting a hearing on the issues.

CORR formed the Lauderdale County Worker's Association, to focus on working conditions and labor problems throughout the county after receiving complaints from highway department workers and others.

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Readers Speak

Editor,
On Wednesday, August 15, 2001, I had the privilege of working with a group of professionals from Lauderdale County.

At approximately 3:30 p.m., we received a call of a four-wheeler accident in a very remote part of the county. As my partner, Gene Young, and I were responding to the scene, I could tell that this would be a critical call by the dispatch information given.

As we arrived on the scene, we were met by Halls Police Chief, Joe Pursell, and Officer Clay Newman at the edge of the road. They informed us that the accident had occurred about a mile off the road in the woods. I quickly gathered a few basic supplies I thought I might need and headed out to find my patient.

When I finally arrived at my patient, I found Deputy Sheriff Don Mullins at his side. As I did a rapid trauma assessment, I realized that his injuries were very serious. I radioed the dispatcher and requested AIR EVAC to be dispatched as well, while Deputy Mullins assisted me in stabilizing the patient.

I knew this was not going to be an easy task to extricate this man from the muddy timber, but as I looked up, help had arrived. My partner had brought extra supplies and assistance from Halls PD and local volunteers with a four-wheeler.

We carried the patient about 70 yards before we were able to load him on the four-wheeler trailer due to steep embankments. As we exited the woods, the helicopter was still about five minutes out. With the patient still in serious condition, we loaded him in the ambulance and administered further treatment until the helicopter arrived. Once loaded in the helicopter, he was immediately lifted to the trauma center.

As I sit back to recap the situation, I find myself overwhelmed with a sense of

pride. I realized that I was part of a team effort in the rescue operation that had just taken place.

My purpose of this letter is to send out a special thank you to all those who assisted during this emergency. So many times we overlook the emergency workers and volunteers in situations of this magnitude. I encourage everyone to express their appreciation to these "unsung heroes" when you see them risking their lives to save others.

Approximately 500 Americans will die this holiday weekend in car accidents, but most of those fatalities could be avoided if motorists took a few simple precautions.

Labor Day is the second most dangerous holiday for automobile travel, according to the National Safety Council. Only the New Year's Eve holiday ranks higher in terms of automobile-related injuries and fatalities. In addition to those who will die in accidents this weekend, experts estimate that another 25,000 motorists will suffer nonfatal, disabling injuries.

As an insurance agent, I get a glimpse each year of the toll that unsafe driving has on Tennesseans' lives following Labor Day weekend, and it isn't a pretty picture.

Motorists pack our state's highways seeking one last summer getaway, and they often leave safety and caution at home. According to a study by Progressive Auto Insurance, Labor Day drivers are more fatigued and more rushed than usual, and they're more likely to drive after consuming alcohol. Nearly 60 percent of motorists surveyed said that in order to get to their

destination as soon as possible, they would drive when they were too tired. About 25 percent said they had previously driven home when they had had too much alcohol, especially if the trip home was a short one.

These statistics are awfully discouraging, but there are steps motorists can take to make Labor Day weekend a safer time for everyone.

Of course, never drink and drive. Be sure to wear seatbelts. The national Safety Council estimates that 129 lives could be saved this weekend if all drivers and passengers wore their seatbelts.

Allow extra time to reach your destination. Stop for meals on long trips, especially during rush hours and around dusk. Take frequent breaks to stretch and relax. Pull over to read maps, discipline children or use a cell phone.

Our roads are becoming safer. According to the Tennessee Department of Safety, traffic fatalities are down nearly 15 percent compared to this time last year. This month, fatalities are down almost 45 percent from last August. And, seatbelt usage is increasing. The "Click It or Ticket" campaign conducted by local and state law enforcement agencies has resulted in a 20 percent boost, from 53 percent to

73 percent, in the number of Tennessee motorists who wear seatbelts while driving.

Seat belts save lives. The Department of Safety recently reported that of the 643 automobile drivers and passengers killed on Tennessee roadways during 2001, as many as 480 were not wearing seat belts at the time of the accident. That's about 75 percent of those killed this year!

I see the impact of unsafe driving every day when I'm at work, but I also see it when I'm driving on the highway. For me, Labor Day is an opportunity to spend time with my family as summer draws to an end, not a vacation from being careful while I drive. Please take the time to take

safe driving habits along with you this weekend!

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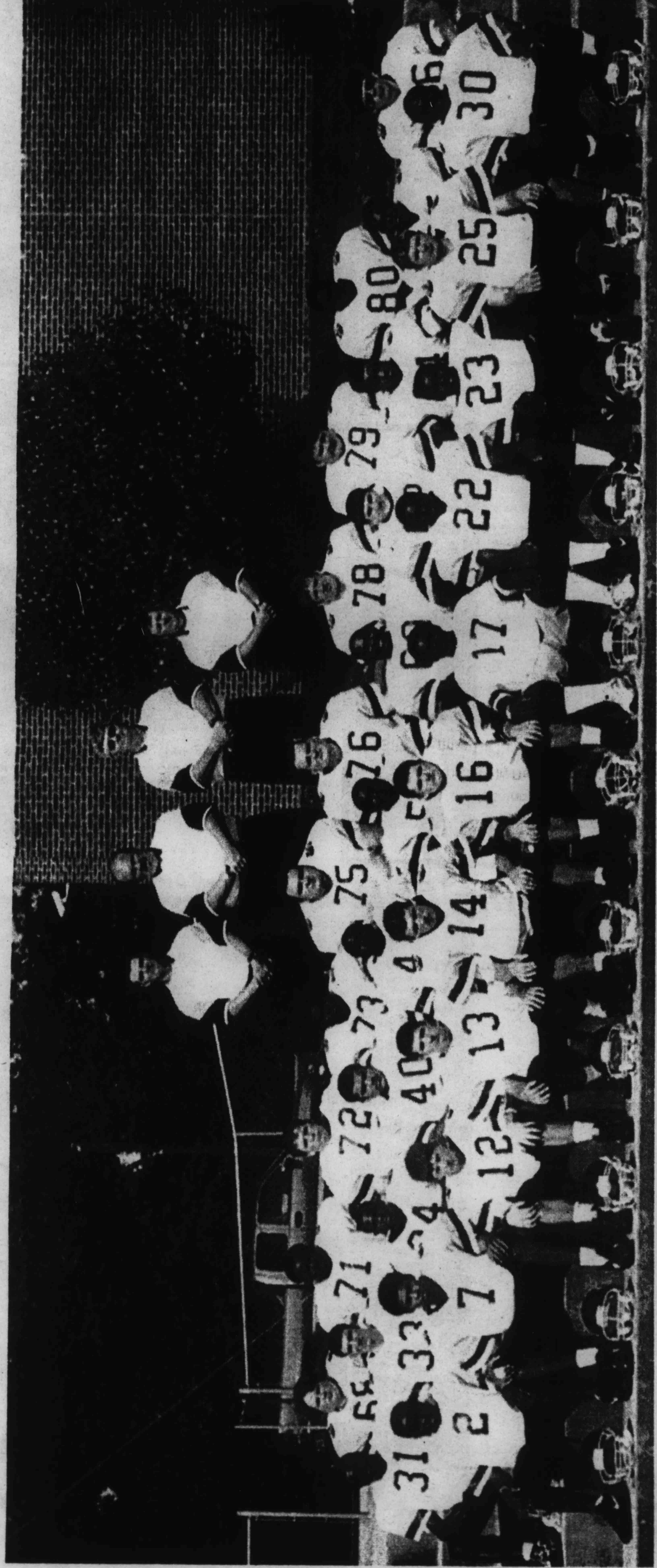

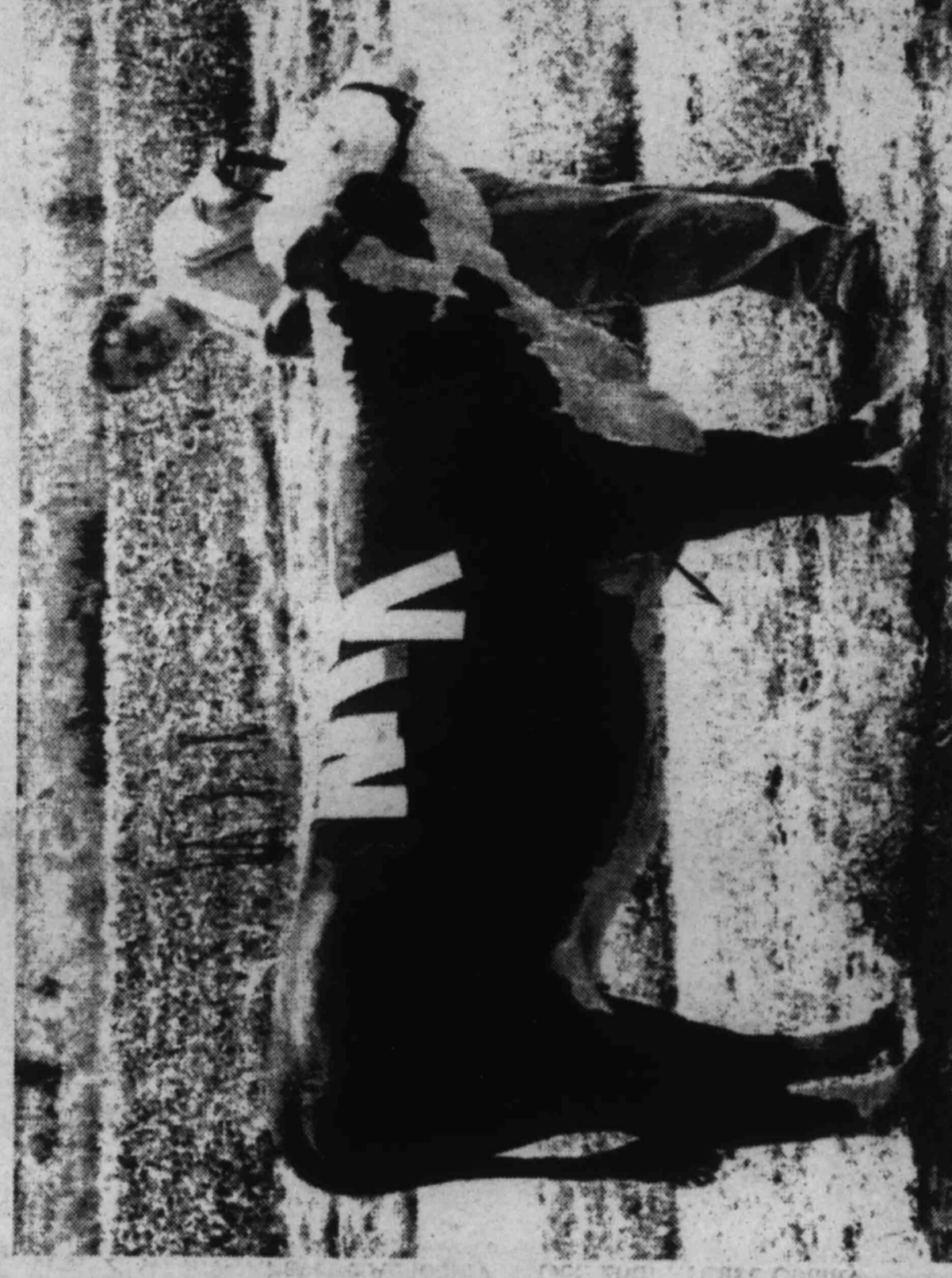

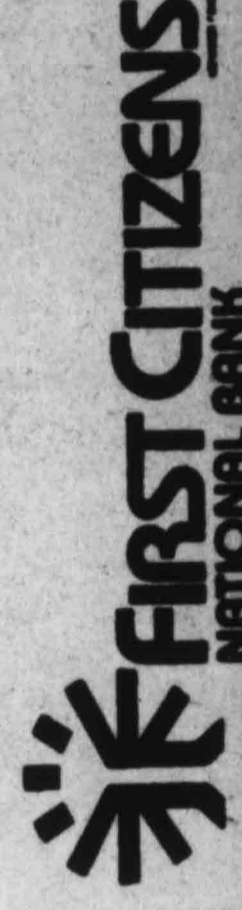
