

In a series of scenes spanning a 25-year time period, the two eventually grow closer and more dependent on each other, despite their mutual differences.





CHOCOLATE, CHOCOLATE, CHOCOLATE

As the February 14th date gets closer, we naturally start thinking about chocolate. I thought I would pull some of my favorite chocolate recipes to share with you this week. > Now if you have a real, and I mean real chocolate lover in your family, you might want to stir up the brownie trifle. This is a much quicker dessert that can be pulled together the night before and chilled. Our FCE ladies attending the Life Enrichment Conference last year, saw this dessert demonstrated by Eugenia Jetton, former home economist with Gibson County Electric. I have tried it a couple of times for church functions and it disappears quite quickly. Beware that it is a very rich dessert. Using skim milk in a sugar-free pudding mix works quite well. But, hey, the main thing with desserts, especially real ones, is to be modest with your serving size, as I told my FCE ladies when doing a program last May on "Flavor Enhancements for Older Americans." When trying to make a flavorful and healthful food, it sometimes pays to opt for a small amount of 'good stuff' instead of a lot of the 'reduced' or 'light' stuff. Cheese is a good example of this. However, all of these recipes do well with generic or store brand products.

CHOCOLATE PIE

1-1/4 cup milk
* 1 egg beaten
1 Tsp. vanilla
1 (8" or 9") baked pie shell

In a deep 2 to 2-1/2 quart microwave safe bowl, mix sugar, flour and cocoa together. Add milk and egg and beat with a wire whisk until mixture is mixed. Drop in butter. Microwave on medium High (7) for 7 to 9 minutes, stirring after 3 minutes, 6 minutes and 7-1/2 minutes. Stirin vanilla. Pour thickened mixture into baked pie shell. Top with meringue and brown in conventional oven.

*Note: 2 egg yolks can be used in the filling, saving the two whites for meringue.

CHOCOLATE-COVERED CHERRY COOKIES

1-1/2 cups all-purpose flour 1-1/2 Tsp. vanilla 1/2 cup unsweetened cocoa 48 maraschino cherries 1/2 cup butter/margarine I cup sugar 1/4 Tsp. salt 1/4 Tsp. baking powder 1/4 Tsp. soda 1 egg

In mixing bowl, combine flour and cocoa; set aside. In a large mixing bowl, beat butter on medium to high speed about 30 seconds or until softened and smooth. Add sugar, salt, baking powder and soda. Beat until well combined. Add egg and vanilla. Beat well. Gradually beat in flour mixture.

Shape dough into 1-inch balls, place on ungreased baking sheet. Press down center with thumb. Drain cherries, reserve juice. Place a cherry in the center of each cookie.

In a small saucepan (or in a glass measuring cup in microwave), combine the chocolate pieces and sweetened condensed milk; heat until chocolate is melted. Stir in 4 teaspoons of the reserved juice. Spoon about 1 teaspoon of frosting over each cherry, spreading to cover cherry.

Bake in 350 degree oven about 10 minutes or until done. Remove to wire rack to cool. 48 cookies.

BROWNIE SWIRL CHEESECAKE

1/2 cup sugar

Combine cream cheese, sugar and vanilla, mixing at medium speed until well blended. Add eggs, one at a time, mixing well after each addition. Pour over brownie layer. Melt chocolate chips in a microwave container. (A drop or two of cooking oil added to the chocolate chips can help the consistency and make it easier to pour.) Drizzle over cream cheese mixture. Cut through batter with a knife several times to create a marble effect.

Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes. Loose cake from rim of pan; cool before removing the rim from the pan. Chill. Garnish, if desired, with whipped cream and cherries. Approximately 16 servings. **BROWNIE TRIFLE**

1 large pkg. fudge brownie mix (for a 9 x 13 pan) 2 small pkgs. chocolate pudding mix 6 oz. pkg. Heath Bits 'O Brickle candy 1 12-oz. container frozen whipped topping, thawed

Prepare brownie mix and bake according to package direction, in a 9x13x2 inch pan. Let cool and crumble. Prepare chocolate pudding according to package directions, omitting the chilling. Place half the crumbled brownies in bottom of a 3-quart trifle dish or large bowl. (A clear bowl makes the dish look more attractive.) Top with half the pudding, crushed candy and whipped topping. Repeat layers with remaining ingredients, ending with whipped topping. Garnish with a few candy crumbs and chopped cherries if desired. Chill for 8 hours. Makes 16-18 servings.



12,000 of Tennessee's three reduced by 50%. and four-year-olds in poverty have no access to preschool programs despite proof of its positive effects on student achievement.

Be it ordained by the Town of Halls, Tennessee, that the following be adopted:

Personal Property Sales in Residential Zoning District

SECTIONS

- Intent and Purpose 2. Permit Required Term of Permit 4. Application for Permit
- 6. Exceptions 7. Conditions to be met 8. Right of Access for Inspection 9. Effective Date

SECTION 1. Intent and Purpose

It is the intent of these regulations to prohibit infringement of any businesses in any established residential areas and in so doing to regulate garage sales, yard sales, porch sales and other similar sales, so as to not disturb the residential environment of the area. It is not the intent of this Ordinance to seek control of sales by individuals selling a few of their household or personal items.

Permit Required SECTION 2.

> It shall be unlawful for any person desirous of holding a personal property sales (such as, but not limited to garage sale, porch sale, rummage sale, or similar sales), of clothing or any personal property items to hold such a sale without first obtaining a permit from City Hall.

Term of Permit SECTION 3

> Any such permit issued shall be for a term not exceeding two (2) consecutive calendar days:

Permits shall be limited to two (2) days per calendar month, per residential dwelling.

SECTION 5. Permit Fee

The permit fee for each sale shall be \$5.00 per sale.

SECTION 6. Exceptions

A. Persons selling goods pursuant to an order or process of a court of competent jurisdiction.

- B. Persons whom are acting in accordance with their powers and duties as public officials.
- C. Any person selling or advertising for sale an item or items of personal property which are specifically named or described in the advertisement and which separate items do not exceed four (4) in
- Any bona fide charitable, eleemosynary, educational, cultural, agricultural or governmental institution or organization, provided, however, that the burden of establishing the exemption shall be on the organization or institution claiming such exemption.
- E. Any person(s) selling items within a commercial district with a business or peddlers license.
- Conditions SECTION 7.

The permit shall be available for viewing by the public and Town Inspector during the length of the sale.

SECTION 8. Right of Access for Inspections

Mistletoe is everyone's favorite. The custom of kissing under the mistletoe may come from Roman times, when enemies reconciled under mistletoe. or may be derived from Norse legend. This plant, a partial parasite that grows high in trees, was mysterious and sacred to the Druids. For that reason, j was originally forbidden churches. But, in time, the Druids' "All Heal" became symbol for Christ, the "Healer of the nations."

Mexican poinsettias are called Flor de la Noche Buena, "flower of the blessed night." Their star-like shape is a reminder of the star of Bethlehem. Their scientific name means "most beautiful." The name we know them by was given to honor Dr. Joel Poinsett, U. S. ambassador to Mexico, who brought the first plants to this country in 1828. They quickly became Christmas favorites.

Long before Christmas trees were decorated, the fir tree was known as the tree of Christ. Some credit Martin Luther with decorating the first Christmas tree. On Christmas Eve, he saw evergreens glistening with snow against a starry night. To share the beauty, he cut a tree, brought it inside, and decorated it with lighted candles to suggest the stars over Bethlehem.

Hessian soldiers who fought for the British in the Revolutionary War and immigrants from Germany, Austria and Scandinavia brought this custom to the United States. They decorated their Christmas trees with homemade ornaments. cookies, fruit, nuts, small gifts and candles. The Christmas tree is a reminder that Christ is always with us. The lights on the tree and the star at its top say that Jesus is the Light of the world.

- 2 cups Santa Cruz Organic Orange Mango Juice
- 2 Tbsp. brown sugar
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. ground coriander
- 1/2 tsp. allspice 3 lbs. yams, peeled, cut
- into 1-inch cubes
- 1/2 cup golden raisins

1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Preheat oven to 375°F. Lightly oil a 2- to 3-quart baking dish. Set aside. In a saucepan, combine juice with brown sugar and spices. Stir over low heat until sugar dissolves. Spread half of the potatoes in the prepared dish. Sprinkle with raisins and walnuts. Spread with remaining potatoes, and pour liquid mixture over the top. Cover and bake until tender, about 1 hour, basting several times. Raise the temperature to 425°F, uncover and bake an additional 30 minutes until juices are thick and top is nicely browned.



pneumonia and other serious infections because the bacteria causing the illness is stronger than the antibiotic. When this occurs, practitioners must use stronger, and sometimes more expensive antibiotics, to cure common infections," said Dr. Allen Craig, State Epldemiologist.

Taking antibiotics for viral infections, such as the common cold or flu, can increase your risk of having resistant bacteria if you get sick. Everyone has bacteria living naturally in their bodies, and when an antibiotic for a viral infection is taken, the normal bacteria is exposed to the antibiotics. The exposure kills off the naturally occurring antibioticbacteria, while resistant organisms survive, becoming a kind of "superbacteria.

The Centers for Disease **Control and Prevention estimate** that over 50 million unnecessary prescriptions for antibiotics are written each year, because

by a virus, such as the common cold or the flu.

Throughout the current cold and flu season, members of Tennessee's Appropriate Antibiotic Use Campaign will provide interactive presentations and materials to practitioner, parent and child care groups across the state.

Studies suggest that educational campaigns, designed for both the public and physicians, lead to fewer antibiotic prescriptions. Decreased antibiotic use leads to a decrease in resistance.
