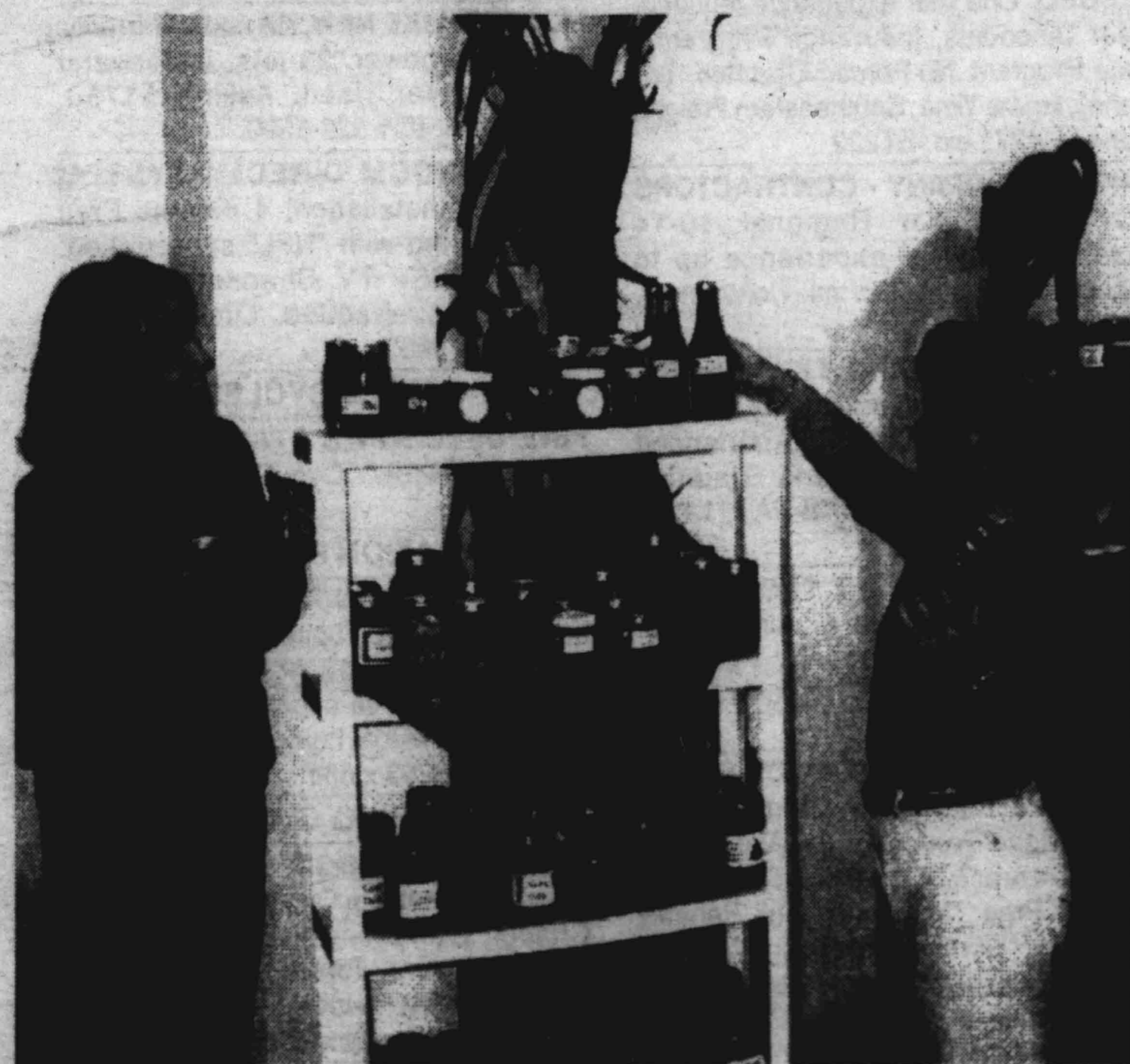

## LCECD Holds Annual Meeting

The Lauderdale County Economic and Community Development Board held its annual meeting Sept. 25th, to say thanks to all its members, and update them on economic development activity during the past year.

Mike Allmand, LCECD board chairman, said that despite the fact the national economy had found its way to Lauderdale County in the last year through two factory closings, A.O. Smith, in Ripley, and First Source Furniture, in Halls, the board was looking forward to a new year because of the strength of its program.

"Nine prospects visited Lauderdale County, of which

two were large Japanese companies, who took long, serious looks at Ripley," Allmand said. "Though they did not locate here, Lauderdale County officials did make a good impression on them and Ripley was considered a strong finalist in both cases," added Allmand.

Three companies that opened in Lauderdale County last year, include a distribution center for Archer Screw, in Ripley, and two wood pallet makers, West Tennessee Pallet & Crate, in Halls, and The Pallet Shed, in Henning.

More than 190 information packets were sent out about available land and buildings in the county, in addition to more than 1,700 pieces of information in response to advertisements in

And the Chargers resumed their winning ways last week, over Munford, 34-14, on 342 yards rushing.

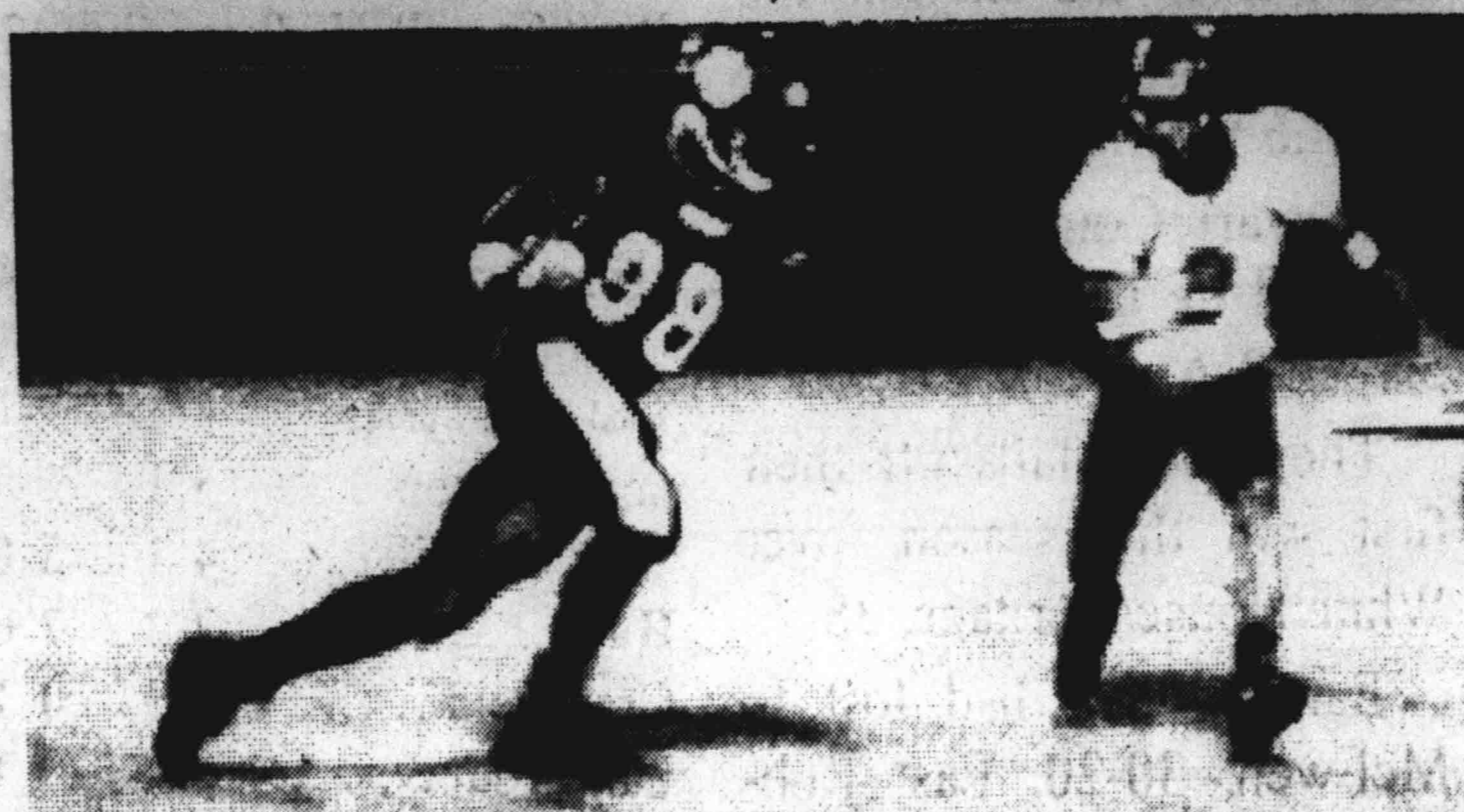
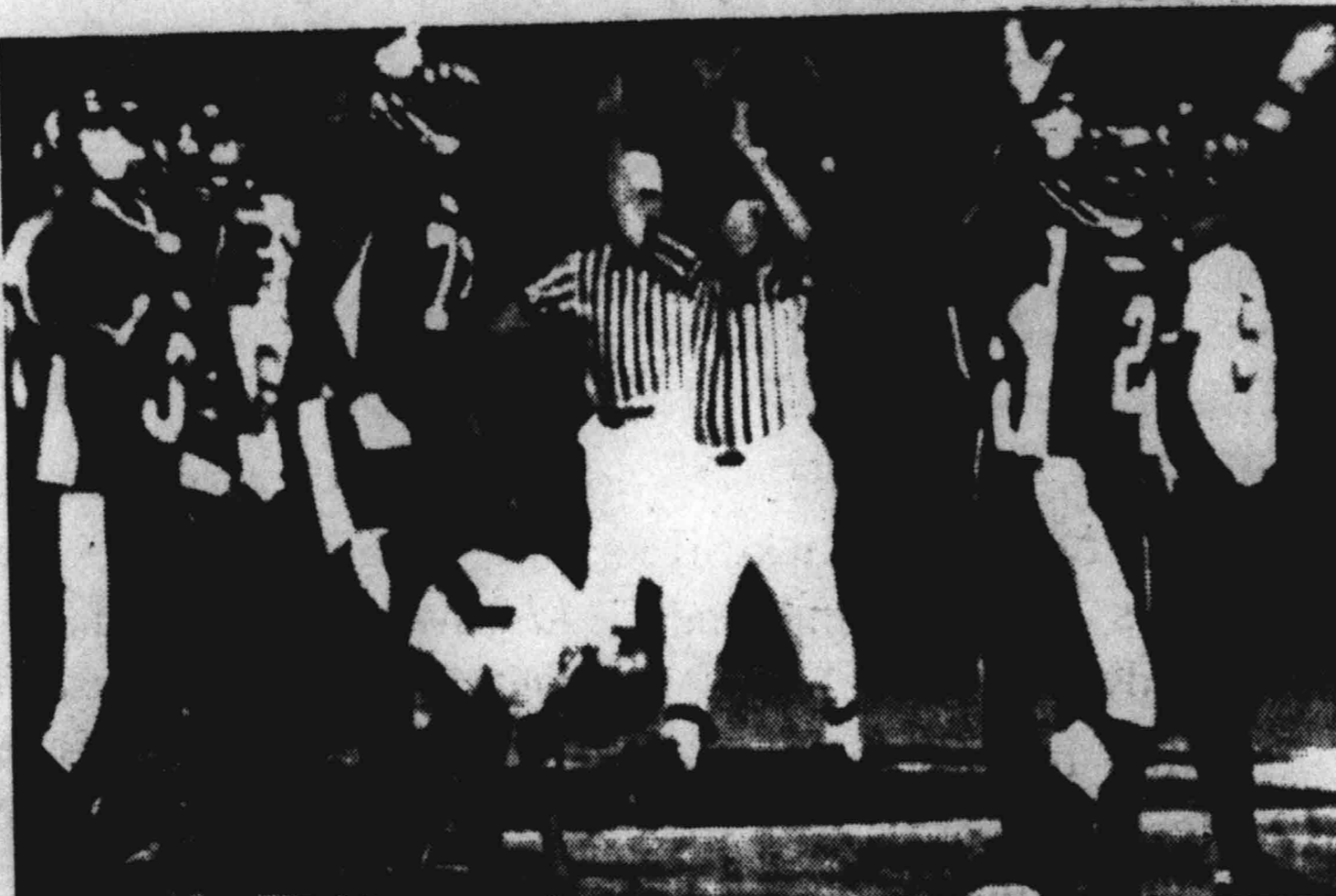

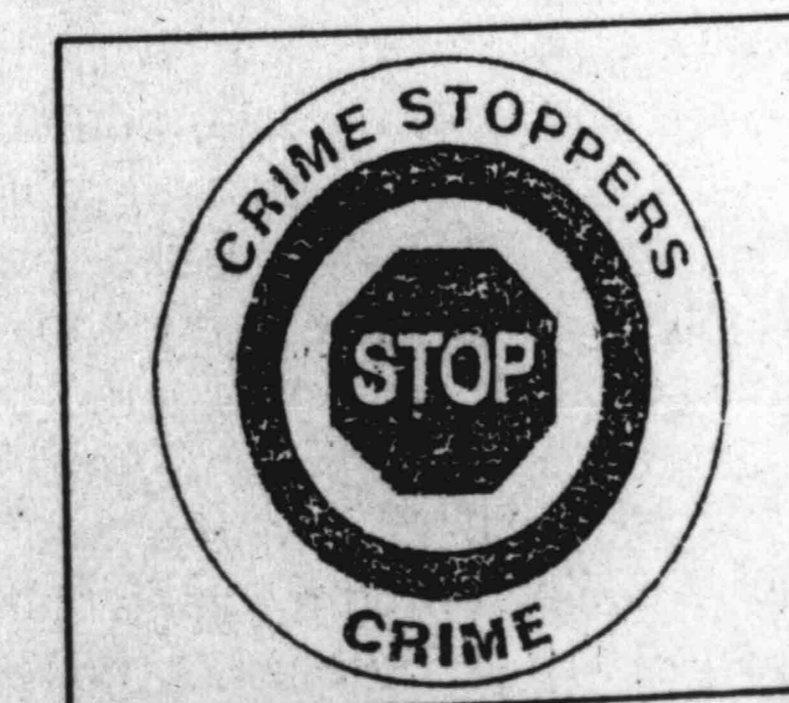

Flu shot protection takes about two weeks to develop and lasts about four to six months. A new shot is needed each year.

### Grant To Help Children Read

Tennessee schools will receive \$111.4 million in federal grants over the next six years to help all children read at grade level by the end of third grade.

The grant, funded under the No Child Left Behind Act, will support professional development for reading teachers in grades K-2. The grant also covers the cost of the vaccination site, and about five to ten percent experience mild side effects, such as headache or low-grade fever for about a day after vaccination.

An estimated 10 to 20 percent of the U.S. population contact the flu annually.

Flu symptoms include fever, cough, chills, sore throat, headache, muscle aches and extreme fatigue.

It is the fifth leading cause of death among the elderly, and is especially dangerous for people with diabetes, who are about three times more likely to die from flu complications, than those without diabetes.

Lana Seivers, Tennessee Commissioner of Education said, "Governor Bredesen and I are committed to ensuring that all children in Tennessee can read at grade level by the time they finish third grade, because they must succeed in the basics if they are to succeed in higher education and the workplace. Reading First provides early, critical resources to help teachers install in children a confidence and a passion for reading."

In Tennessee, Reading First awards will be used to support training of representatives from the State Dept. of Education and higher education, who in turn will host ten days of the Reading First in Tennessee Academy. The program will provide training in scientifically proven methods of instruction to K-3 teachers, K-12 special education teachers, and literacy leaders and principals of each of the recipient schools.

Schools eligible for the grant funds will apply to the State Dept. of Education. Awards will be made in January 2004.

2 cinnamon sticks

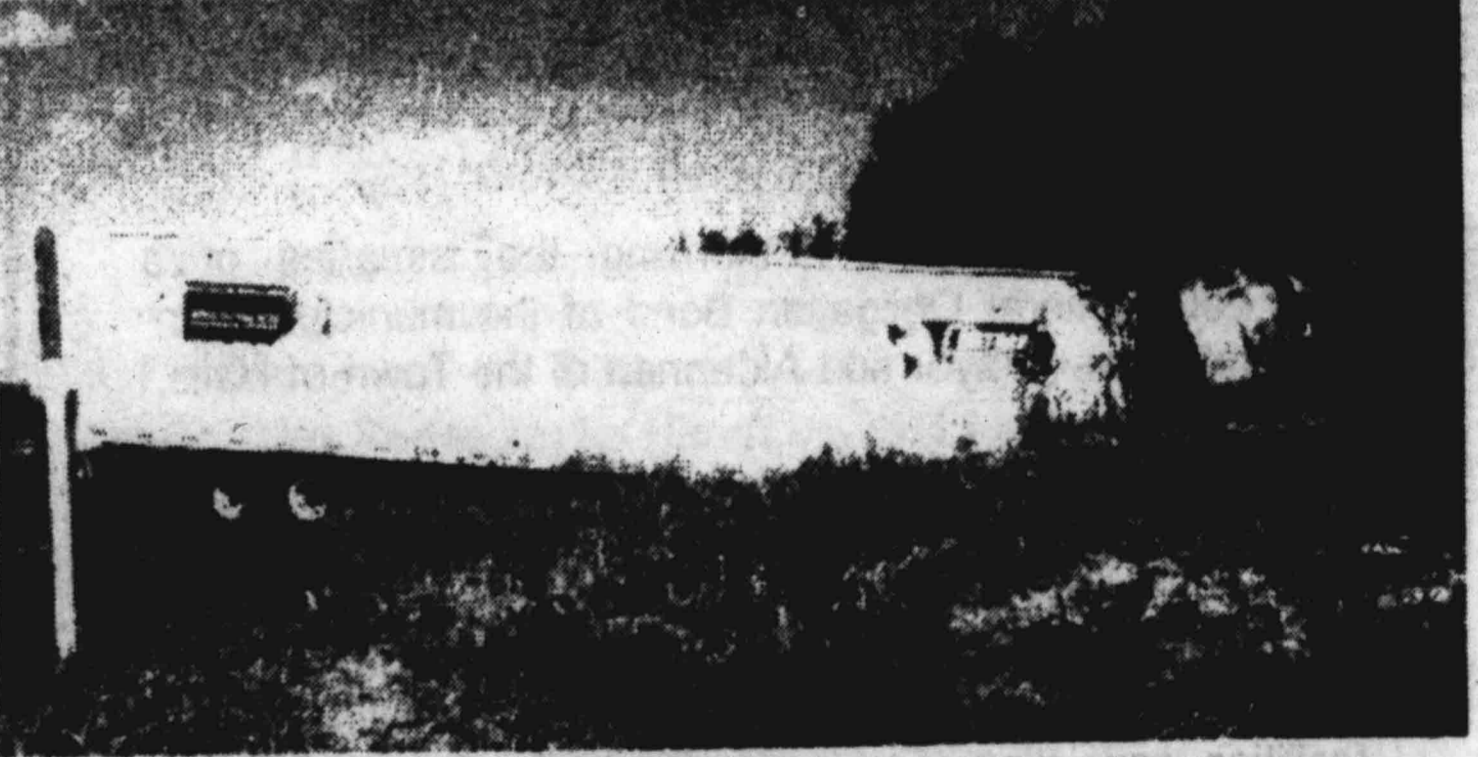
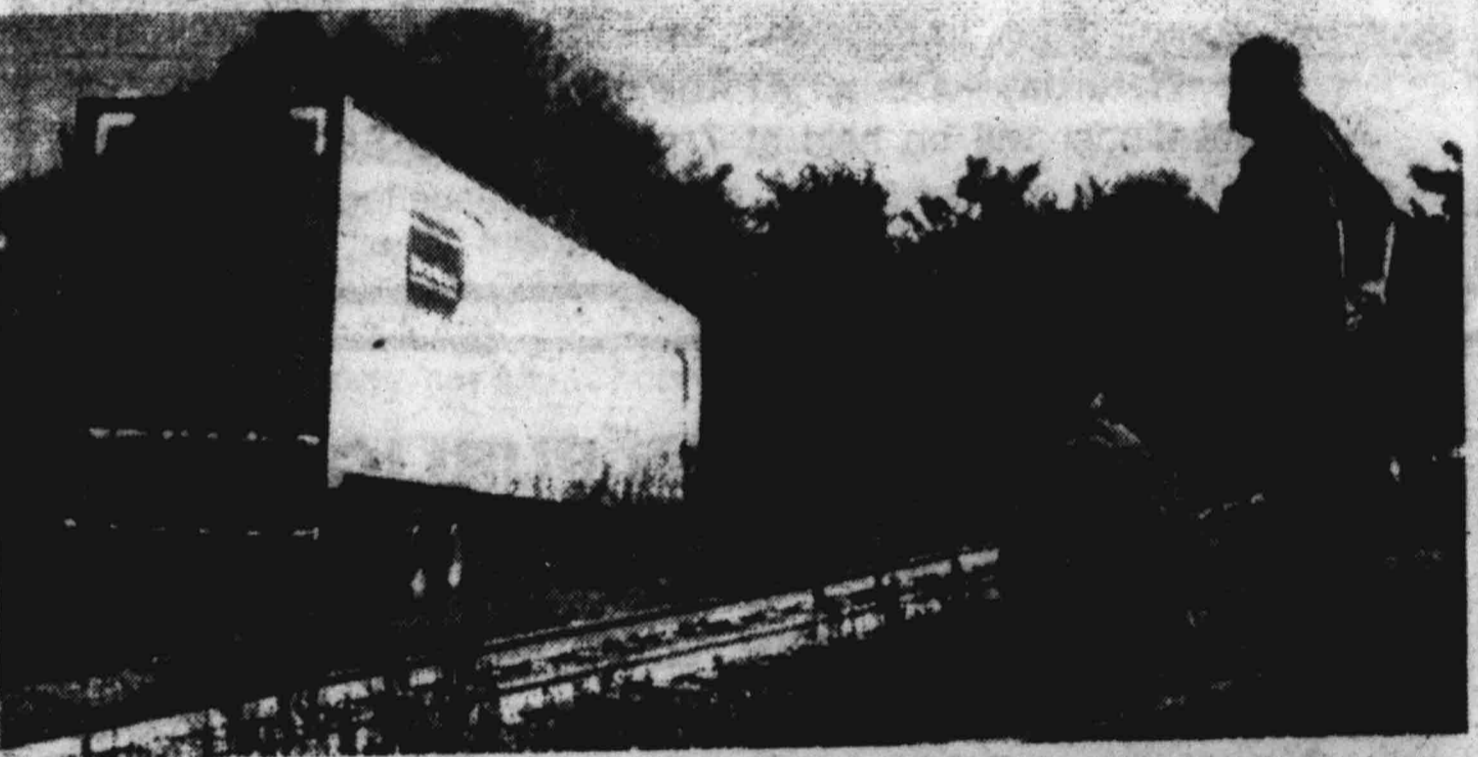
## Jury Sees Video: Halls Drug Sales

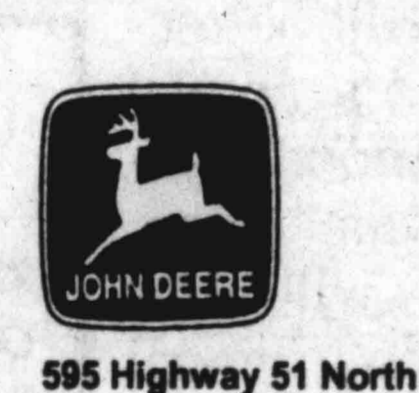

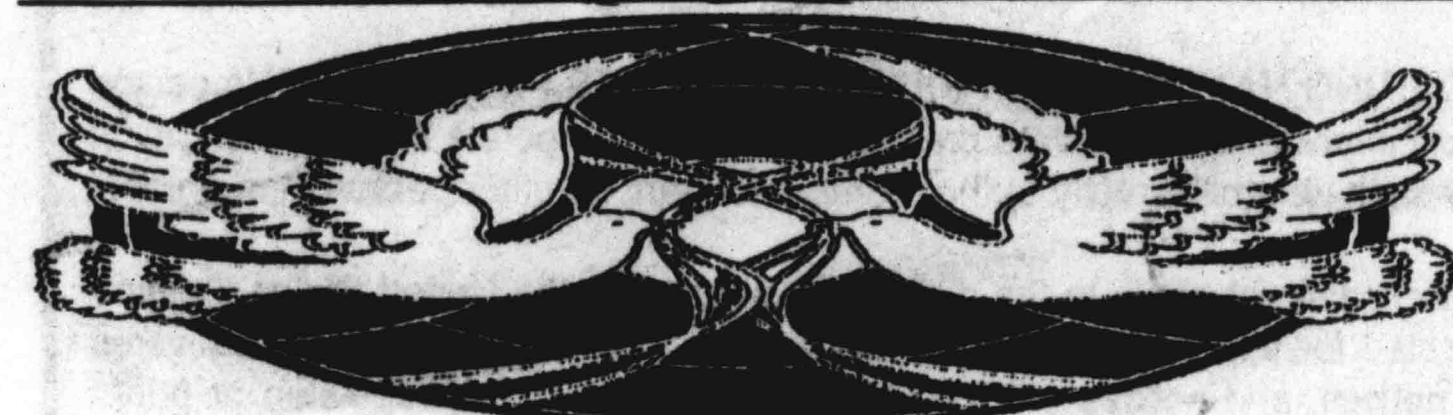

## ORDINANCE FOR CHARITABLE ROADBLOCKS ORDINANCE NO. 03-40

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING CHARITABLE OR RELIGIOUS SOLICITORS SOLICITING CONTRIBUTIONS AT STREET INTERSECTIONS.

WHEREAS, The Board of Mayor and Alderman has been apprised that due to the Town's lack of restrictions on allowing charitable solicitors to collect donations at various intersections of the streets within the corporate limits, complaints have arisen concerning the traffic congestion and hazards associated with said solicitations; and

WHEREAS, the Town desires to restrict the solicitations to one per month to be conducted on the date requested by the charitable or religious organization first applying or the particular month desired. One permit shall be issued per month.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Mayor and Alderman the following ordinance shall become a part of the Town of Halls Municipal Code:

**SECTION 9-305. NUMBER OF PERMITS PER MONTH.** Permits for charitable or religious solicitations within the Town's corporate limits shall be issued on a first to apply basis, to be conducted on the particular day of the month by the requesting charitable or religious organization. All charitable or religious solicitation permits issued shall allow no more than four solicitors from the permittee to be within the streets at any one time and all solicitations shall take place at the intersection of Tigrett & Carmen (street) and S. Church & Sharp (street) within the Town corporate limits. Any violation of this ordinance will be subjected to a fine of not less than \$50.00 per incident.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately after passage on the third reading, the public welfare requiring it.

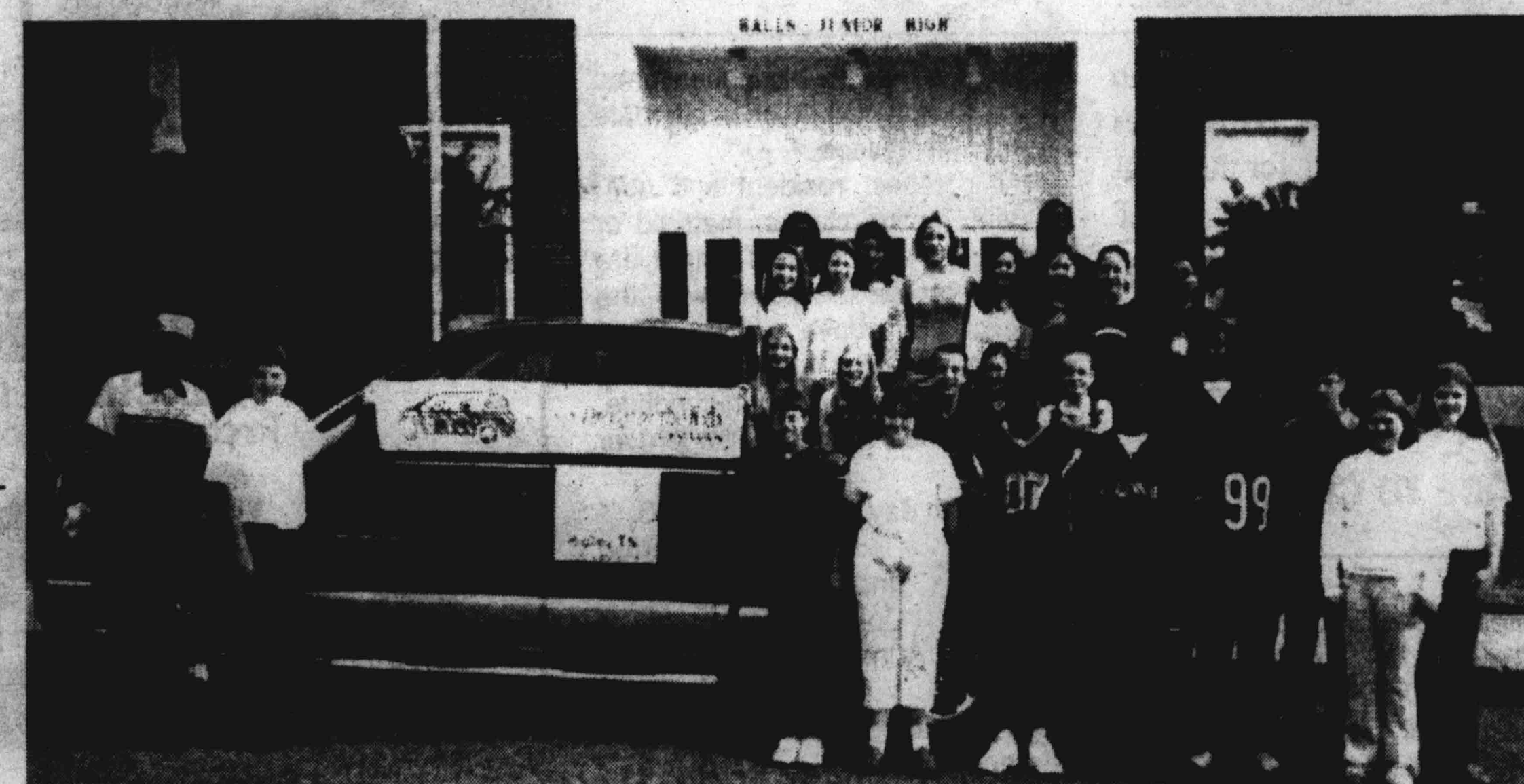

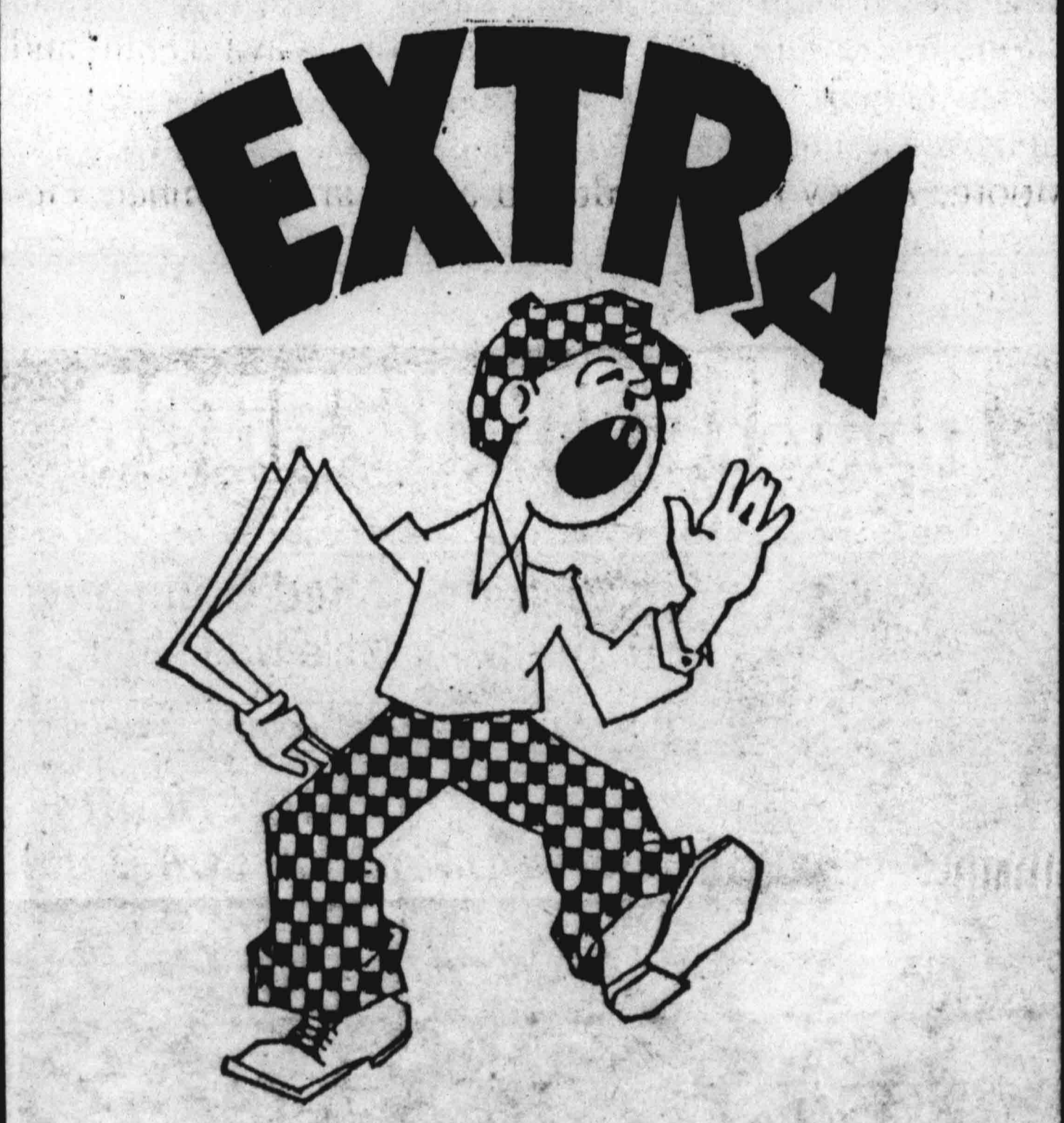

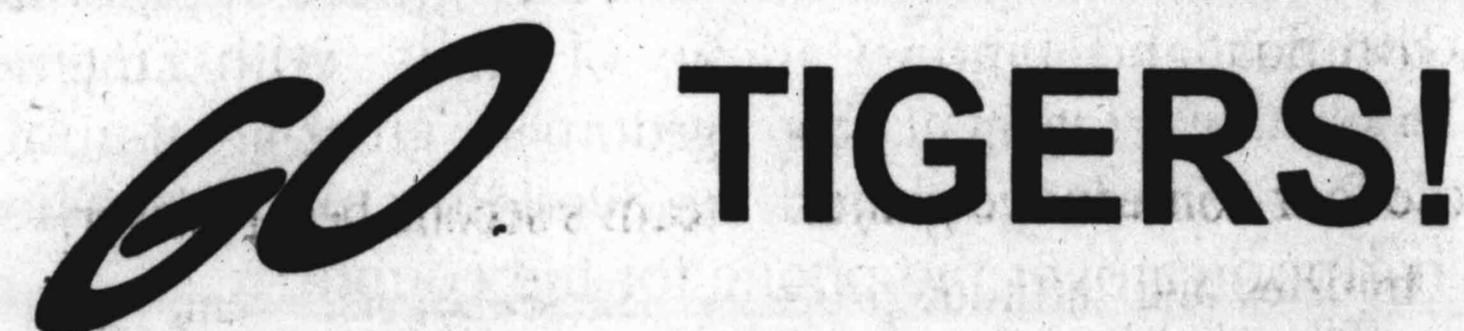

### WINTER CROP COVER

Dwaine Johnston, soil conservationist for the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service, reported that many county farmers are protecting their land from excessive soil erosion by annual seeding of a winter cover crop.

Legume winter cover crops, such as vetch, Austrian winter peas and crimson clover, give farmers approximately 40-60 lbs./acre of nitrogen. Non-legume plants, such as wheat, rye and oats, are also used.

A winter cover crop also increases organic matter and water holding capacity of the soil.

Johnston pointed out that the seeding of winter cover crops is not a new conservation practice, but one used by

the grandparents of most of the farmers.

This application has taken on a renewed interest in recent years, with implementation of the Food Security Act and Conservation Compliance.

Johnston encourages farmers to make plans now to seed winter cover crops on their fields this fall.

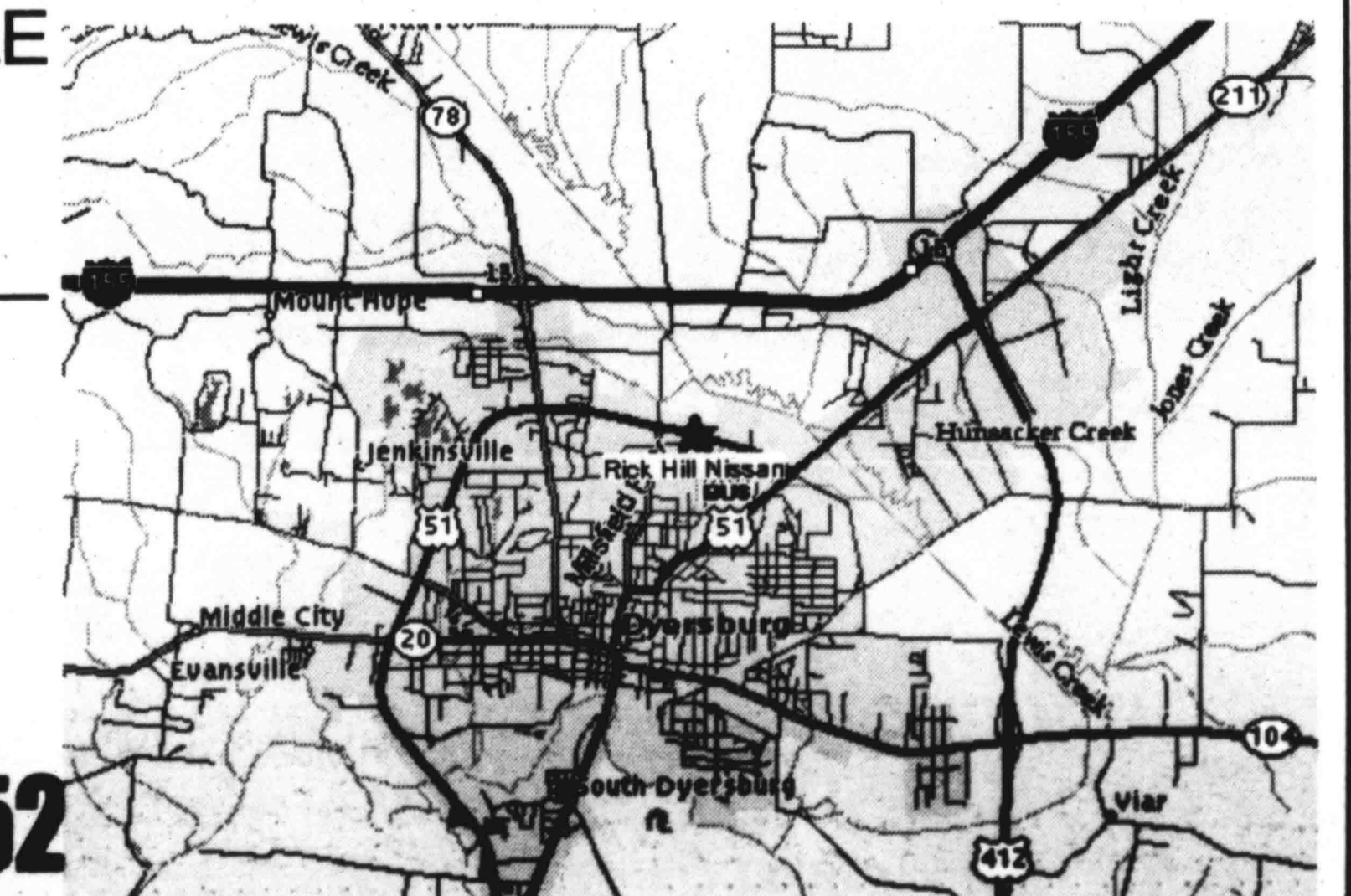

## Men Charged In Bomb Scare At Dyersburg Theft Ripley Wal-Mart

Two Lauderdale County men, Marquis Jamahl Bradley, aka Marquis Jamahl Morgan, 20, of Gates, and Derek T. Harvell, 19, of Henning, along with several juveniles were arrested Friday for the burglary of City Pawn in Dyersburg, according to an article in the *Dyersburg State Gazette*. The men were charged with burglary and theft of property of more than \$1,000, bond was set at \$25,000 each. They are being held in the Dyer County Jail. The minors, charged as juveniles, are being held in the McDowell Center for Children.

A pre-trial hearing is set for Oct. 28th.

Officers found the stolen property after an early morning raid at the Plantation Inn on U.S. Hwy. 51 S. During the raid, eight people, ranging in age from 15 to 21, along with several stolen items were discovered. Some of the items confiscated included a .40-caliber Beretta, a 9-mm Glock, a .45-caliber Ruger, a .9-mm Beretta, and a .22-caliber Taurus Magnum Revolver.

Ripley Police were called to Wal-Mart at approximately 4:28 p.m. Sat., Oct. 18th after an anonymous caller, dialing 911 from a pay phone at Wal-Mart, stated "There is a bomb in the building." The store was evacuated and a search was made of the building. Officers with Halls Police Department and Lauderdale County Sheriff's Department assisted in the search of the building. Ripley Police Investigator Steve Sanders took the videotape of the area around the pay phone for examination and officers are listening to the audio tape of the call.

When caught, the caller could face serious charges due to the nature of the threat. Ripley Police Chief Milford "Pop" Durham stated this is a serious offense and will not be taken lightly.

## 911 Service Review Set

County Executive Rozelle Criner will chair a meeting Wednesday of next week to discuss "911" emergency telephone service in the county.

911 services are funded by telephone bill fees, running about \$238,000 a year, and by appropriations of \$110,000 from the county, \$30,000 from Halls, \$10,000 from Henning, and \$6,000 from Gates. Ripley funds its own local service.

All 911 calls come to the county Justice Center in Ripley, handled by employees of the County 911 Board, with Frank Currie as chairman and Jonathan Gay, director.

Sheriff Louis Craig is not happy with dispatch of his officers by 911 workers.

He has asked Halls, Henning, and Gates, in renewing 911 contracts, mid-2004, to put him in charge of those working the phones in the 911 center in the Justice Center, without any change in current appropriations.

Criner has invited Currie, the sheriff, and representatives of the three cities to next week's meeting, hoping to resolve the problems.

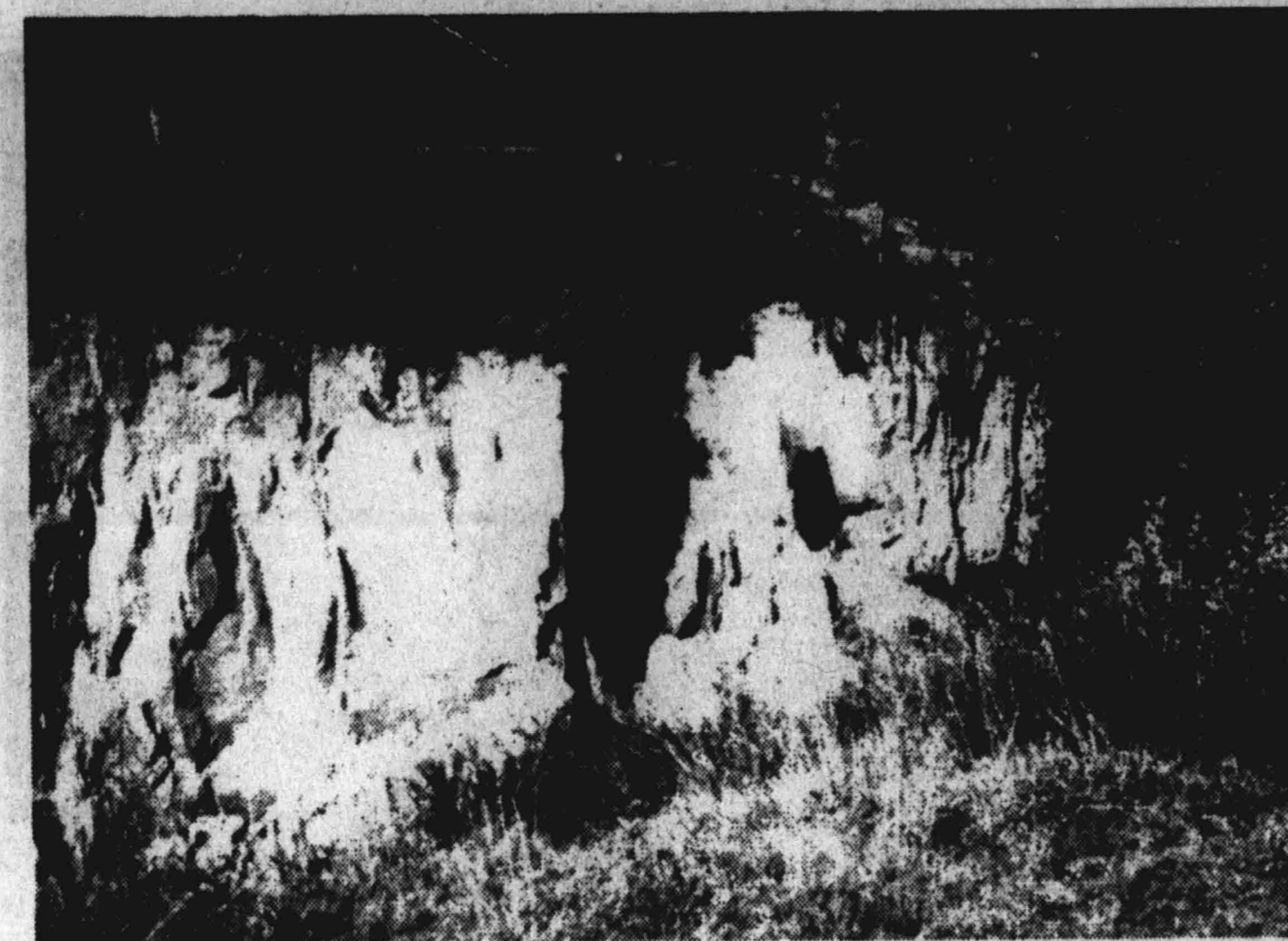

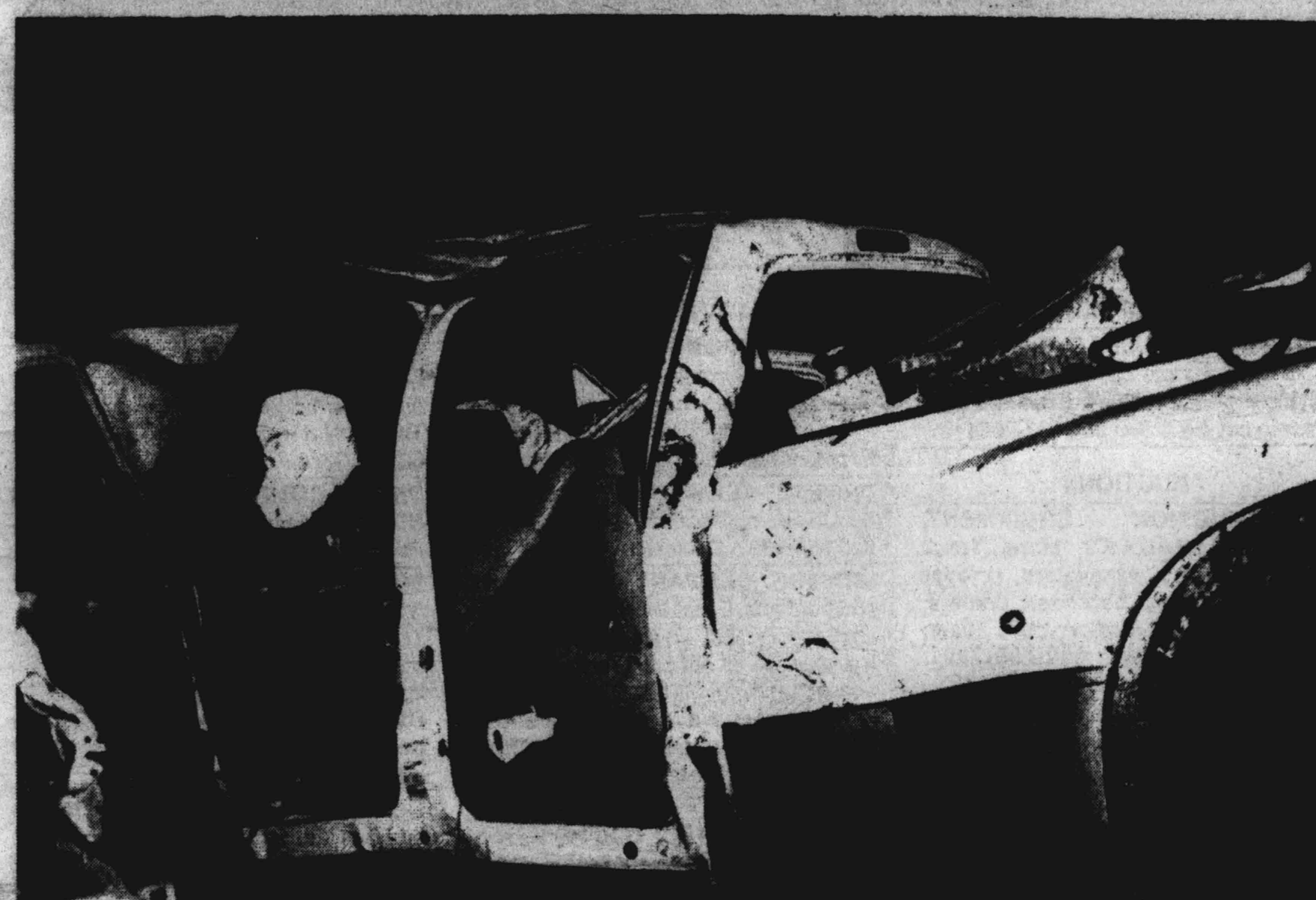

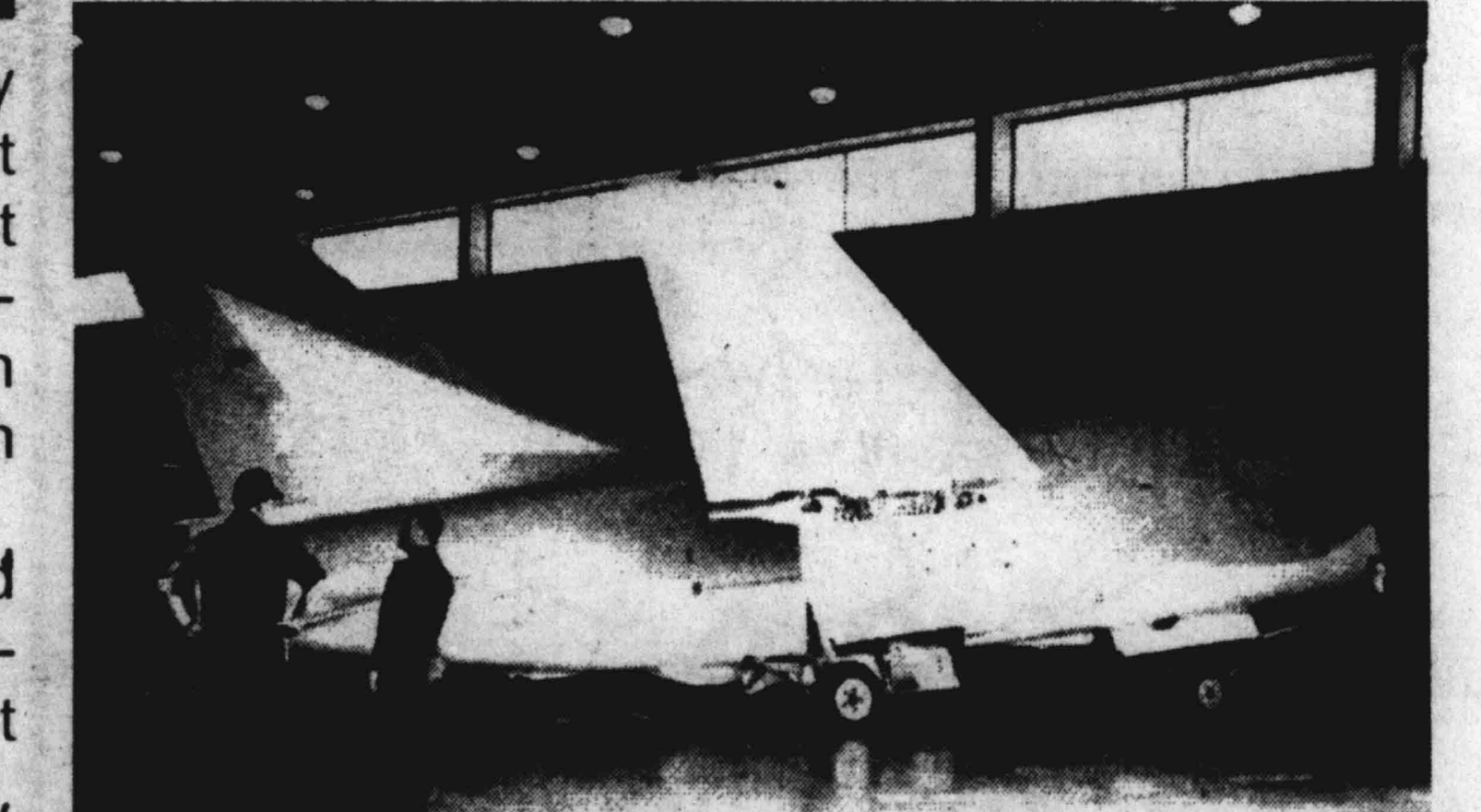

## Plane In Transport



**THE A-7E CORSAIR II**, introduced in 1965, is on loan from the Naval Museum of Naval Aviation, in Pensacola, Fla., and will be transported from Millington to The Veterans' Museum in Halls Sunday, Nov. 2nd.

The route is from Tchulahoma Rd. to Lamar Ave., to I-240E, Covington Pike to Barrett Parkway, to Hwy. 51 N to Halls.

The move, directed by Millington Naval Reserve Units and assisted by Det 1, Transportation Co. of the Tennessee National Guard, in Millington, will have escorts furnished by the Memphis Police Dept. and Tennessee Highway Patrol. The procession will begin at 4:30 a.m. and reach Halls about noon.

The plane is a single-seat carrier-based light attack fighter, developed for the U.S. Navy, and has a speed of 607 knots and a normal radius of action of 620 miles. Its single jet engine is already on display at the Veterans' Museum.

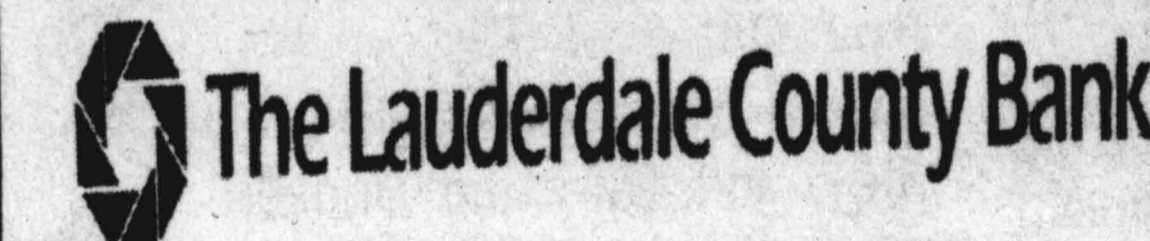
